Tyler, baritone and classical pianist who was the first African American graduate of Oberlin Conservatory of Music in 1904; and

WHEREAS, approximately 40,000 children are actively receiving treatment at any given time - the average age for a child being diagnosed with childhood cancer is 6 years old, compared with 66 years for adults' being diagnosed with cancer - sadly 80% of childhood cancer patients receive a late diagnosis, often being diagnosed with metastic disease due to the delay; and

WHEREAS, since the mid 1970's there has been an average increase of 0.6 percent in the incidence of childhood cancer each year, resulting in an overall increase of 24 percent over the last 40 years - two-thirds of childhood cancer patients will have chronic health conditions as a result of their treatment toxicity, one quarter of them will be classified as severe to life-threatening - half of childhood cancer families will be faced with significant out-of-pocket expenses as a result of this illness; and

WHEREAS, only four new drugs have been approved by the FDA to specifically treat childhood cancer over the last 20 years - the National Cancer Institute recognizes the unique research needs of childhood cancer and the associated need to increase funding for childhood cancer - there are hundreds of nonprofit organizations at the local and national level to include the Friends of the Faith Prudent Foundation which have been helping children and the families of children impacted by cancer to cope with the emotional, educational, and financial burden of childhood cancer - members of the research and healthcare communities have also been working to treat and to find a cure for childhood cancer; and

WHEREAS, there are too many children affected by this deadly disease; more must be done to raise awareness and to find a cure; the new Ohio Gold Ribbon Awareness License Plates that benefit the Center for Childhood Cancer at the Research Institute at Nationwide Children's Hospital represent a way to support the fight against childhood cancer, now therefore;

WHEREAS, Richard L. Trumka was president of the 12.5-million-member AFL-CIO from 2009 until his death on August 5, 2021. An outspoken advocate for social and economic justice, Trumka was the nation's clearest voice on the critical need to ensure that all workers have a good job and the power to determine their wages and working conditions. He led the labor movement's efforts to create an economy based on broadly shared prosperity and held elected officials and employers accountable to working families; and

WHEREAS, In 1982, at age 33, Trumka ran on a reform ticket and was elected the youngest president of the United Mine Workers of America (UMWA). There, in addition to reforming the UMWA's fractious bureaucracy, he led one of the most successful strikes in recent American history against the Pittston Coal Company, which tried to avoid paying into an industry-wide health and pension fund. Trumka was elected AFL-CIO secretary-treasurer in 1995, and held that post until 2009, when he was elected president; and

WHEREAS, Trumka's economic advocacy extended from the kitchen table and spanned the globe. He rallied international labor support for workers struggling for justice, and fought to end unfair trade practices and restore U.S. manufacturing strength. As secretary-treasurer, he carved out an innovative leadership role that continues today, working with programs that invest the collectively bargained pension and benefit funds of the labor movement to ensure they serve the long-term interests of workers; and

WHEREAS, Trumka's commitment to improving life for working people began early. He grew up in the small coal-mining town of Nemacolin, Penn. Nearly all the men in his family, including his father and grandfather, were coal miners. Trumka followed them into the mines, working there as he attended Penn State and Villanova University law school; and

Columbus Public Health has been awarded a grant from the Ohio Department of Health originating from the Centers for Disease Control and Other State Funds. This ordinance is needed to accept and appropriate \$132,000.00 in grant monies to fund the 2021-2022 Tobacco Use Prevention and Cessation Grant Program for the period of July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022.

The Tobacco Use Prevention and Cessation Program will serve the entire city of Columbus, with approximately 893,000 residents. Services to residents include second hand smoke prevention, youth tobacco use prevention, vape education and prevention, increased access to current cessation services/providers, and media promotion

to increase awareness and understanding around the dangers of tobacco use and current initiatives to prevent tobacco use.

According to 2018 data from the Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS), nearly 1 in 4 Columbus adults currently smoke and the prevalence of smoking is higher in Columbus than Franklin County, 24.9% compared to 20.7% (BRFSS 2018). Current Ohio smokers who are African American (23.5%) or report as multiracial (37%) smoke at a disproportionate rate compared to those who are white.

Within high priority neighborhoods, which are neighborhoods where the residents face numerous social determinants of health, therefore facing a disproportionate rate of chronic diseases, the percent of adults who currently smoke is high: Linden (55.8%), Northeast (18.7%), Northland (25.7%), Hilltop (40.5%), Franklinton (51.9%), Near East (41.8%), South Side (42.4%), and Southeast (33.6%) (Census Bureau, American Community Survey 5-year estimates, 2013-2017). Due to the high prevalence of smoking in Columbus, it is likely that the majority of residents, especially those living in the high priority neighborhoods, are frequently exposed to secondhand smoke.

This ordinance is submitted as an emergency so a delay in service does not occur since the FY22 grant deliverable reporting starts July 1, 2021.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** The program is fully funded by the Ohio Department of Health and does not generate revenue or require a City match (\$132,000.00).

The Columbus Kappa Foundation serves the community through a Safe Sleep Initiative in conjunction with CelebrateOne and works with Harm Reduction Ohio to distribute NARCAN to help mitigate some of the challenges with the opioid crisis. The Columbus Kappa Foundation organizes an annual turkey giveaway that has fed thousands of families over the past several years and an annual toy giveaway at Christmas to help the less fortunate. The Columbus Kappa Foundation conducted and contributed to voter registration drives and census awareness promotion. All of these programs are based at the historic Kappa House on Mt. Vernon Ave. These initiatives help build strong neighborhoods by providing services greatly needed in the community. These services promote healthy living and help those living in poverty get some of their essential needs met.

Fiscal Impact: Funding is available within the Neighborhood Initiatives subfund.

**Emergency action** is requested in order to avoid any delay in supporting the Columbus Kappa Foundation to allow uninterrupted services to help those living in poverty meet some of their essential needs.

**Background:** In April of 2021, the Columbus Recreation and Parks Commission voted in support of and Columbus City Council passed a resolution to support the Columbus Urban Forestry Master Plan (UFMP) and its immediate implementation. By authorizing the implementation of the Urban Forestry Master Plan, the Forestry Section of the Recreation and Parks Department can implement key recommendations through hiring staff, purchasing equipment, procuring tree service contracts, inventorying the City's street trees, designing a new facility for Forestry's North Zone, and engaging urban forestry consultants.

This ordinance is requesting the authorization of \$1,455,000.00 in voted bond funds and the authorization for the Director of Recreation and Parks to enter into various contracts relating to the Urban Forestry Master Plan. This ordinance will establish auditor's certificates and authorize expenditures in conjunction with the management of the UFMP. Contracts will be entered in compliance with the relevant provisions of Columbus City Code Chapter 329, however this legislation will set up all of the funding required to enter into contracts with vendors on an as-needed basis. All purchases will be through competitive bidding, through any current universal term contract, or through any current State of Ohio purchasing contract pre-approved by the City of Columbus Purchasing Office, per Ordinance No. 0582-87.

Within the total being authorized for the UFMP, this ordinance will also authorize the modification of an existing contract with Davey Resource Group to continue citywide street tree inventory. The expenditure of \$239,250.00 was legislated for the Street Trees - Site Assessment and Inventory 2020 Project by Ordinance 2336-2020. This ordinance will provide funding that will modify the previously authorized amount by up to \$300,000.00. The aggregate total amount authorized for this contract, including this modification, is \$539,250.00.

The staffing, supplies, services, and equipment needs that will be paid for as part of this funding request may

include, but are not limited to, tree installation, hazardous tree removal, stump grinding, tree site preparation, urban forestry professional services, cellular service, office supplies, forestry supplies, uniforms, and safety equipment. All supply, service, and equipment needs related to the UFMP have been established as one overall capital improvement project. Each purchase order will be written separately based on all City of Columbus Codes that apply.

The Columbus Urban Forestry Master Plan is the first citywide strategic plan to invest long-term in Columbus' trees. Over the next decades, the UFMP will guide the entire Columbus Community to prioritize, preserve and grow our tree canopy. Tree canopy refers to the part of a city that is shaded by trees. Canopy cover is the percentage of the city that is covered by trees when viewed from above, as opposed to other land cover like water, open green space, hard surfaces and bare soil. In Columbus, approximately 22% of the city is currently covered by trees.

Columbus faces many challenges today, and over the coming decades, and trees are part of the solution. Trees help reduce urban stressors by cleaning our air, providing shade, intercepting stormwater, and more. The benefits that urban trees provide is valued up to five times what it costs to maintain them. In Columbus, our trees provide approximately 38 million dollars in benefits each year. However, our tree canopy is vulnerable to threats from disease, pests, the changing climate and increased development. Also, the City is expecting to grow by 1 million residents in the coming decades. To improve and sustain our residents' quality of life, we needed a strategic plan to invest in our trees.

We engaged residents across Columbus through five avenues, including an online survey, an open house, small-group presentations, interviews, and multiple meetings of two stakeholder groups. These two stakeholder groups were comprised of over 100 community leaders and City of Columbus Staff. The themes that emerged were used to develop the vision, goals, and actions of the Urban Forestry Master Plan. The vision of the Urban Forestry Master Plan is to prioritize, preserve, and grow the tree canopy in Columbus, equitably across neighborhoods, to improve the health and quality of life for all residents.

The Urban Forestry Master Plan has three goals. One is a long-term goal and the other two are short-term goals. All are critical to achieving our vision for Columbus' urban forest. These goals are as follows:

- Goal 1: Reach Citywide Tree Canopy Cover of 40% by 2050.
- Goal 2: Stop the Net Tree Canopy Losses by 2030.
- Goal 3: Invest in Equitable Tree Canopy Across All Neighborhoods by 2030.

To reach our goals, we will follow four strategies, including community coordination and collaboration; best practices, dedication of resources, and stronger policies.

**Emergency Justification:** Emergency action is requested to allow immediate implementation of the Urban Forestry Master Plan, beginning this urgent work of prioritizing, preserving, and growing Columbus' tree canopy. With challenges on the horizon like population growth, public health issues, and climate change, beginning strategic investment in Columbus' trees immediately will ensure the continued health and safety of our residents.

**Benefits to the Public:** Trees provide tangible benefits to Columbus residents. As the 15th largest city in the nation, Columbus is home to over 898,000 people. Columbus had the 8th most intense urban heat island effect of major US cities impacting health, energy use, and water quality. The recently published Columbus Climate Action Plan recommends planting trees as a solution. Street trees are the workhorses as they clean our air,

reduce heat, and absorb stormwater. In an Ohio summer, trees provide the shade that makes walking outside bearable. Trees should be equitably distributed across the City so all residents benefit.

Community Input/Issues: Hundreds of stakeholders helped create the Urban Forestry Master Plan. Industry experts, universities, nonprofits, developers, community leaders, city staff and leadership, regional partners, landscape architects, and many others served on two stakeholder groups consisting of a Project Team of about 30 members and an Advisory Group of about 100 members. All members are listed in the Acknowledgments section of the UFMP and on the website (https://www.columbusufmp.org). These groups met periodically throughout the course of the plan's creation to provide input. The public was also engaged through an online survey, an open house, small-group presentations, and interviews. A final public comment period on the draft Urban Forestry Master Plan was held from February 16, 2021 to March 31, 2021 and public presentations were made to the Recreation and Parks Commission

Background: This ordinance authorizes the Director of Recreation and Parks to enter into two lease

agreements with Columbus City Schools (CCS) for two community playgrounds. The lease agreements will allow further partnership with Columbus City Schools as well as the West Side and Linden Communities. The lease agreements will involve two (2) separate projects.

The lease for the John Burroughs Elementary School, located at 551 S. Richardson Ave., Columbus, Ohio 43204, will be established for 2021 through 2031. The City of Columbus will be the <u>lessee</u> of this property owned by CCS. The City of Columbus will maintain the City assets, including the playground and shelter. This lease will facilitate the replacement of the existing playground and shelter that the City installed in 1998, with a 10 year lease agreement, which expired in 2008. The new lease agreement will allow for removal of older damaged equipment and replace with new equipment. The community, in attendance with meetings with community members and Civic Associations, have expressed concern for the lack of recreation within the community. The lease agreement will allow for the project to be successful.

The lease for the new playground installation at Linden Park and Community Center, located at 1350 Briarwood Ave, Columbus, Ohio 43211, will also be established. The City of Columbus will be the <u>lessor</u> of this lease, as the City of Columbus owns the Linden Park and Community Center. This will be a new playground to support the Linden Community Center, the CCS's Columbus Early Learning Center, and the Linden Community. Currently, the Columbus Early Learning Center does not have outdoor play equipment. This lease agreement will allow CCS to lease the playground and maintain the playground for use by The Columbus Early Learning Center. CCS will maintain the playground and associated fencing.

**BACKGROUND:** This ordinance authorizes the Executive Director of the Office of CelebrateOne, on behalf of the Office of the Mayor, to modify a contract with Planned Parenthood of Greater Ohio, to continue a community based peer to peer education program for teens in Franklin County. Funding was awarded by the Franklin County Department of Job and Family Services with Ordinance 2465-2020. In addition to having one of the highest infant mortality rates in the nation, Ohio ranks 23rd out of all 50 states for teenage pregnancies. Teen pregnancy is a significant contributor to prematurity, a leading cause of infant mortality, because pregnant teens have a higher risk for having a baby born too small or too soon.

A recent examination of the National Survey of Family Growth revealed that teens who received comprehensive sex education were 50% less likely to report a pregnancy than those who received abstinence-only education. Currently, without any state health education standards, many teens in Ohio and Franklin County do not have access to comprehensive, medically-accurate sex education.

The Office of CelebrateOne, in partnership with Planned Parenthood, plans to reinforce peer education by engaging youth in Columbus City Schools from the CelebrateOne neighborhoods starting Fall of 2021. Peer education supports the development of healthy lifestyles and responsible choices by adolescents. Peer educators will receive training and incentives to increase their knowledge of essential, evidence-based sexual health information, establish important leadership skills, and gain the confidence to engage their peers and larger community in vital conversations.

The original contract was established by Ordinance 1564-2020 which passed Council on July 20, 2020.

This ordinance authorizes the Executive Director of the Office of CelebrateOne to enter into a contract with The Homeless Families Foundation for the Housing Pregnant Women (HPW) program. The contract amount of \$75,000.00 is funded from the general fund and will be for the period of July 1, 2021 through March 31, 2022.

In late 2020, the City of Columbus awarded ESG-CV funds to the Community Shelter Board (CSB) in an effort to establish a new program - HPW. The goal of this program is to ensure that pregnant women who are at imminent risk of homelessness receive homelessness prevention assistance and avoid entering emergency shelter. They will receive rapid re-housing services to quickly re-house and stabilize the household. CSB is partnering with CelebrateOne to manage this project and the contracted support services being provided by The Homeless Families Foundation (HFF).

Specifically, these funds will be used to establish a client assistance fund for participants enrolled in the HPW program. The fund is intended to be a flexible set of resources to be used for payment of expenses that serve as barriers to stable housing like unexpected or unmet financial needs. The fund is administered by HFF to help HPW clients remain stably housed.

**Emergency designation:** This ordinance is submitted as an emergency so as to not delay program services and to allow the financial transactions to be posted to the City's accounting system as soon as possible.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** Funding for this program is available in the general fund. This ordinance is contingent on the passage of Ordinance 1911-2021.

To authorize the Executive Director of the Office of CelebrateOne to enter into contract with The Homeless Families Foundation for the Housing Pregnant Women program; to authorize the expenditure of \$75,000.00; and to declare an emergency. (\$75,000.00)

#### 1. BACKGROUND

The following ordinance authorizes the City Attorney's Office, Real Estate Division to hire professional services and to negotiate with property owners to acquire the various property rights necessary to complete the Arterial Street Rehabilitation - Cassady Avenue Widening PID105732 project.

The Department of Public service is engaged in the Arterial Street Rehabilitation - Cassady Avenue Widening project. The project will consist of improvements to the Cassady Avenue corridor from the City of Bexley Corporation line to 7th Avenue. This is the first of multiple phases to reconstruct the Cassady Avenue corridor with complete street improvements.

The cost to acquire the right-of-way needed to complete the project is estimated at \$2,142,657.00. If the cost to acquire the needed right-of-way should exceed this estimate, additional legislation will be submitted to Council requesting the needed funding.

The Department of Public service is currently finalizing construction plans and is prepared to authorize right-of-way acquisition pending passage of this funding legislation.

#### 2. FISCAL IMPACT

A reimbursement grant from the Ohio Department of Transportation will partially fund right-of-way acquisition from the Federal Transportation Grants Fund, Fund 7765, Grant #G592105 (Cassady Avenue 105732), in the amount of \$1,542,657.00. The entire amount of \$1,542,657.00 will need to be appropriated into the grant.

Public Service will contribute the local share for right-of-way acquisition in the amount of \$600,000.00 which is available in the Streets and Highway Bonds Fund, Fund 7704. An amendment to the 2020 Capital Improvements Budget, and a transfer of cash and appropriation, is necessary for the purpose of providing sufficient spending authority for the aforementioned project expenditure.

## 3. EMERGENCY DESIGNATION

Emergency action is requested to provide necessary right-of-way acquisition funding and prevent unnecessary delays in the Department of Public Service's Capital Improvement Program to ensure the safety of the traveling public.

To amend the 2020 Capital Improvement Budget; to authorize the City Auditor to transfer funds between projects within the Streets and Highways Bond Fund; to authorize the City Auditor to appropriate \$1,542,657.00 within the Federal Transportation Grants Fund; to authorize the City Attorney's Office to contract for

professional services relative to the acquisition of fee simple title and lesser interests in and to property needed for the Arterial Street Rehabilitation - Cassady Avenue Widening project; to authorize the City Attorney's Office to negotiate with property owners to acquire the additional rights of way necessary to complete this project; to authorize the expenditure of up to \$1,542,657.00 from the Federal Transportation Grants Fund and up to \$600,000.00 from the Streets and Highways Bond Fund; and to declare an emergency. (\$2,142,657.00) **WHEREAS**, the City of Columbus is engaged in the Arterial Street Rehabilitation - Cassady Avenue Widening PID105732 project; and

**WHEREAS**, the project will include improvements to the Cassady Avenue corridor from the City of Bexley Corporation line to 7th Avenue; and

WHEREAS, successful completion of this project necessitates the City acquire fee simple title and lesser interests in and to various properties located along the project corridor as additional rights-of-way; and

WHEREAS, right-of-way acquisition cost, including professional services, staff and land costs, have been estimated to total \$2,142,657.00; and

WHEREAS, Federal Transportation grant funds will be used to pay for a portion of this project; and

WHEREAS, this ordinance authorizes funding in the amount of \$2,142,657.00 for that purpose; and

**WHEREAS**, it is necessary to authorize an amendment to the 2020 Capital Improvements Budget for the purpose of providing sufficient spending authority for the aforementioned project expenditure; and

**WHEREAS,** it is necessary to authorize a transfer of funds within Fund 7704, the Streets and Highways Bond Fund, to establish sufficient cash to pay for the project; and

**WHEREAS,** it is necessary to authorize the City Auditor to appropriate \$1,542,647.00 within the Federal Transportation Grants Fund; and

WHEREAS, this ordinance authorizes the City Attorney's Office Real Estate Division to expend \$2,142,657.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to hire professional services and to negotiate with property owners to acquire the various property rights necessary to complete the Arterial Street Rehabilitation - Cassady Avenue Widening PID105732 project; and

WHEREAS, an emergency exists in the usual daily operation of the Department of Public Service in that it is immediately necessary to authorize the City Attorney's Office to negotiate all necessary right-of-way acquisitions for the project to prevent unnecessary delays in the Department of Public Service's Capital Improvement Program, to ensure the safety of the traveling public thereby preserving the public health, peace, property, safety and welfare; now, therefore

## 1. BACKGROUND

This ordinance authorizes the Director of Finance and Management to enter into a contract and issue purchase orders as needed with Bobcat Enterprises, Inc. to purchase a skid steer front loader with a trailer. This purchase will be made for the Department of Public Service, Division of Traffic Management.

Southeastern Equipment Co was the lowest bidder. However, they did not meet the minimum weight lifting requirements per the specifications, making the bidder unresponsive. The award is to be made to Bobcat Enterprises, Inc. as the lowest responsive and responsible and best bidder for all lines of its bid of \$79,219.00.

Searches in the System for Award Management (Federal) and the Findings for Recovery list (State) produced no findings against Bobcat Enterprises, Inc.

### 2. CONTRACT COMPLIANCE

The contract compliance number for Bobcat Enterprises, Inc. is CC004399 and expires on 2/16/2023.

## 3. FISCAL IMPACT

Funds are available and appropriated for these purchases within the Street Construction Maintenance and Repair Fund.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** The Health Literacy Grant Program is entirely funded by the grant from the Franklin County Board of Health and does not generate revenue or require a City Match.

To authorize and direct the Board of Health to accept a grant from the Franklin County Board of Health in the amount of \$97,537.00 for the Health Literacy Grant Program, to authorize the appropriation of \$97,537.00 from the unappropriated balance of the Health Department Grants Fund; and to declare an emergency. (\$97,537.00)

The dental equipment used in ten (10) patient exam rooms, including but not limited to patient exam chairs, work lighting, dentist work chairs, dental assistant stools and operatory cabinets, is in poor condition, has exceeded its useful life, and is in need of immediate replacement. Formal bids were solicited via RFQ019064 for replacement of these items. The City received three (3) responses:

Henry Schein, Inc. \$138,705.00

Benco Dental Supply Co. \$126,939.14

Dental Health Products, Inc. \$120,521.65

The lowest, responsive, responsible bidder, was Dental Health Products, Inc.

This legislation authorizes the Director of Finance and Management to appropriate and expend up to \$120,521.65 from the Neighborhood Health Capital Reserve Fund and to enter into a contract with Dental Health Products, Inc. for the purchase of dental equipment to replace dental equipment that is in poor condition and has exceeded its useful life; and to declare an emergency.

**Fiscal Impact:** Funding for the purchase is available and shall be from the Neighborhood Health Capital Reserve Fund 7784 (\$120,521.65).

**Background:** The City desires to support the Columbus Historical Society in its endeavor to create a permanent home for the not-for-profit organization and a community center in the historic Franklinton neighborhood. The Columbus Historical Society has an opportunity to purchase, restore, and preserve the historic Engine House #6, located at 540 West Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215. The site will be the permanent home for the not-for-profit organization and a welcoming community center for the historic Franklinton community. The Columbus Historical Society's growth in preservation and programming of the City's important multi-cultural history now requires the Society to have a permanent home. Engine House #6 was built in 1880 and was the site of the Columbus Fire Department's first emergency medical squad in 1934. The project will assist in the creation of jobs and related taxes from increased operations, tourism, guided tours, events, and educational programs in this growing Columbus community. The plan also includes creating a historical walk between the historical sites in the area, which will increase tourism. The City of Columbus is contributing up to \$150,000 to support the purchase of the property.

**Emergency Designation:** Emergency action is requested to provide funding due to the time sensitive project goals related to the property acquisition.

Background: The Women, Infants and Children (WIC) Program is a supplemental nutrition program for women (pregnant, postpartum and breastfeeding), infants, and children under five years of age, administered in Franklin County by Columbus Public Health with grant funds received from the Ohio Department of Health (ODH). Columbus Public Health has been awarded its annual grant funding from the Ohio Department of Health (ODH). A portion of the WIC grant funds is budgeted for the payment of rent for the lease of five (5) WIC Clinics - First Choice Rental Properties, LLC, for 77-83 Outerbelt Street; Best Corporate Real Estate Properties LLC for 1681 Holt Road; Jacinto W. Beard and Karen L. Beard for 4337 Cleveland Avenue; PLM of Cols for 3933 Livingston Avenue, and Beaumont 4522 LLC for 4550 Indianola. This ordinance, subject to acceptance of the grant funds by passage of City Council Ordinance 2085-2021 to fund the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) Program for the period October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2022, authorizes the expenditure of funds for the payment of rent for these five leases.

This ordinance authorizes the Director of the Department of Technology to renew an agreement with Columbus Fibernet LLC for fiber optic cable maintenance services in the amount of \$72,917.54, with a coverage term period from October 21, 2021 through October 20, 2022 for the CFN fiber duct system, in support of the City's fiber optic infrastructure. The original agreement (EL010409) and (EL011025) was authorized by ordinances 1296-2009, passed October 5, 2009, and 1327-2010, passed October 4, 2010. Buyer shall pay to Seller for Seller's services under this Section 9.1, an amount equal to \$0.19 (cents) a year per foot of conduit owned by Buyer (the "Maintenance Fee") for the period commencing 5 years from the Closing date and continuing thereafter for a period of 12 months ("Initial Term"). The first 5 years of this contract the fees will be waived. After the Initial Term expires, the Maintenance Fee shall increase annually by the change in CPI. This fee shall continue for so long as Seller is providing Scheduled Maintenance services to Buyer hereunder. Such payments are due up front on the first day of each anniversary of the Closing date."

The City of Columbus Department of Public Safety, Division of Fire needs to modify existing contracts with vendors associated with the City's Rapid Response Emergency Addiction Crisis Team (RREACT). RREACT is an innovative outreach service operated by the Division of Fire to actively address the opioid crisis negatively impacting far too many Columbus residents. RREACT outreach includes firefighters/paramedics, Crisis Intervention Team certified peace officers, a substance use case manager, a registered SUD nurse, a family

case manager, and trauma specialist. RREACT proactively connects and builds relationships with opioid users to 1) forge treatment and recovery pathways for users, and 2) provide multi-sector social service navigation and trauma counseling for children and other caregivers in the home. This multi-disciplinary outreach team goes directly into communities to connect with individuals who survive overdose (after Narcan© administration) but then refuse EMS transport to the emergency room. At these follow up meetings, team members assess immediate health needs, provide resource referrals, and create opportunities for users and family/household members to link with harm reduction supplies, treatment programs, trauma services, and social benefit supports.

**EMERGENCY ACTION**: This ordinance is submitted as an emergency so as to continue these important program services and to allow the financial transactions to be posted to the City's accounting system as soon as possible.

### 1. BACKGROUND:

The Department of Public Service, Division of Traffic Management, is engaged in the Traffic Signal Installation - Columbus Traffic Signal System (CTSS) Phase F project which is the sixth phase in a series of projects to migrate all Columbus traffic signals to a new central traffic control system. This will allow the city to choose among multiple vendors for some of the commodities related to the Traffic Signal System and ideally receive better pricing for needed materials.

In the course of affecting the Traffic Signal Installation - Columbus Traffic Signal System (CTSS) Phase F project, it is sometimes necessary to force the relocation of utilities from privately held easements. These relocations are in areas where the city has previously allowed utilities, but due to this project there is a need to relocate them at the city's expense. Utility relocation estimates are normally included in the budget for each project, but occasionally estimates are insufficient and not always in the city's control. This legislation provides a source of funding of \$350,000.00 for utility relocations, some of which are yet to be named, in order to provide for quick turnaround of these relocations once the utility and project are determined. The utility relocation work includes design, review, and associated utility pole modification, replacement, or other required work to accommodate the Columbus Traffic Signal System (CTSS) fiber optic.

Type:

To date, American Electric Power, AT&T, and the Division of Power have been designated as utilities needing to relocate facilities. City Council recognizes this ordinance does not identify all of the utilities that will receive the reimbursements and understands that its passage will give the Director of Public Service the final decision in determination for such contract(s). This council is satisfied it is in the best interests of the city to delegate this contracting decision.

The \$350,000.00 requested for this work is an estimate. Legislation requesting additional funds will be submitted for

Council's approval if the estimate should be short of the actual expenses.

#### 2. FISCAL IMPACT:

Funds in the amount of \$350,000.00 are available and appropriated within the Streets and Highways Bond Fund, Fund 7704, of the Department of Public Service's 2020 Capital Improvement Budget.

# 3. EMERGENCY DESIGNATION

Emergency action is requested to provide funding for utility reimbursements at the earliest possible time, as the utility work will need to start by October 2021 so project construction can begin on time.

**BACKGROUND**: This ordinance amends the 2020 Capital Improvement Budget and authorizes the City Auditor to transfer funds within both the General Permanent Improvement Fund and the Division of Fire's general fund budget. This ordinance also authorizes the Finance and Management Director, on behalf of the Division of Fire, to issue a purchase order to G&G Fitness Equipment, Inc. for commercial grade fitness equipment to replace aging equipment in City of Columbus Firehouses.

In May of 2017, a committee was convened to analyze the current inventory of fitness equipment across all City of Columbus fire stations and develop a long-term strategy for replacing aging equipment in a manner that is efficient, promotes consistency across locations, and supports current best practices in the field of exercise physiology. This committee consisted of representatives from the Division of Fire, the Public Safety Director's

Office, and the Department of Finance and Management. In the months following, the committee met several times to conduct firehouse visits and compile station footprint dimensions, and also conferred with an exercise physiologist to develop a standard set of equipment that would meet the safety, budgetary, and spatial needs of the project. A plan was developed and approved by the committee to replace aging equipment in existing firehouses in three (3) separate phases, subject to the availability of funding and Council approval, and this ordinance authorizes the expenditure necessary to complete the final phase.

**Bid information:** The Division of Fire, is in need to purchase this standardized commercial fitness/exercise equipment as specified in this ordinance as the final phase to replacing all venerable equipment within the City's fire stations. The Division of Fire is requesting a Bid Waiver for said commercial fitness equipment purchases to satisfy the Columbus City Purchasing Code. G&G Fitness Equipment is the sole distributor for this region for Life Fitness commercial fitness equipment which has been standardized by the Fire Division, and has provided the equipment in the past two phases of this project; additionally, the manufacturer has agreed to waive the 6% surcharge on the elliptical equipment that commenced on August 1, 2021.

Columbus Public Health has been awarded a grant from Franklin County Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services Board (ADAMH) for the Alcohol and Drug Services (ADS) Division. Ordinance 0166-2021 authorized the acceptance and appropriation of \$2,431,844.00 in grant money. Ordinance 0601-2021 authorized the acceptance and appropriation of up to an additional \$9,000.00 in grant monies to fund the Addiction Treatment Pilot Program through the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services to ADAMH for the period of July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021. Ordinance 1839-2021 authorized the acceptance and appropriation of an additional \$12,400.00 in grant monies to fund the Prevention Block Grant (State) from ADAMH for the period of January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021. This ordinance is needed to accept and appropriate an additional \$4,280.91 in grant monies to fund the Prevention Block Grant (State) from ADAMH for the period of January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021. The total amount funded for this period is \$2,457,524.91.

The Alcohol and Drug Services (ADS) Prevention Program will serve approximately 5,487 unique clients, who may receive multiple services, through Columbus City Schools, After School/Summer programs, Latina Prevention programming, HIV/Early Intervention sites, Parenting classes, and Recreation Centers. Of this number, approximately 2,855 adults and family members will be served; 1,832 children and adolescents through youth programming; and 800 transitional age youth will be served through youth mentoring, workforce development and programming. The ADS Comprehensive Treatment Program will provide treatment services to approximately 875 men and women through the provision of Biopsychosocial Assessments, Individual, Intensive Outpatient and Outpatient counseling. Due to the Pandemic and the necessity of maintaining smaller group numbers our projections may change throughout the year. 69% of the population to be served are men and 31% will be women. The Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) program is projected to serve 45 unique clients who will be prescribed Suboxone or Vivitrol.

This ordinance is submitted as an emergency so as to allow the financial transaction to be posted in the City's accounting system as soon as possible to maintain the clients' continuity of care. Up to date financial posting promotes accurate accounting and financial management.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** The Alcohol and Drug Services' (ADS) additional funds are from the Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health (ADAMH) Services Board for the Prevention BLOCK Grant (State) Program.

To authorize and direct the Board of Health to accept additional funding from Franklin County Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services Board (ADAMH) in the amount of \$4,280.91; to authorize the appropriation of \$4,280.91 to the Health Department in the Health Department Grants Fund; and to declare an emergency. (\$4,280.91)

WHEREAS, \$4,280.91 in additional grant funds have been made available through Franklin County Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services Board (ADAMH) for the Alcohol and Drug Services (ADS) Division for the period of January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021; and

BACKGROUND: This ordinance amends the current authorized strength, as set forth in ordinance 1736-2021.

The strength levels for most general fund agencies are set to be equal to the 2021 budget as amended by City Council (including the Departments of Health and Recreation and Parks). Authorized strength levels of smaller non-general fund agencies are set to be equal to the adopted 2021 budget as amended, while the strength levels of certain larger non-general fund agencies may have their strength set slightly higher to allow for flexibility in hiring.

Four full-time general fund civilian positions are requested in the Division of Police in order to allow for flexibility in staffing. In the Department of Recreation and Parks, 4 full-time positions are requested in the department's primary operating fund in order to assist with increased needs and workload in their fiscal and human resources operations. Within the Department of Finance, 10 full-time and 2 part-time positions are requested for the Division of Facilities Management in the general fund. Eighty-four full-time general fund positions will transfer in alignment with the transition of the Code Enforcement Division from the Department of Development to the Department of Building and Zoning Services. In addition, two full-time positions will transition from Building and Zoning Services' primary operating fund to the general fund, and one additional full-time general fund position is requested in order to facilitate the hiring of an Assistant Director for Code Enforcement.

Finally, there are two modifications herein to the language outlining strength levels for the promoted uniformed ranks of the Department of Public Safety. Four positions have been authorized for the newly created classification of Police Assistant Chief. In Fire, strength levels have been updated in order to accommodate a revised staffing policy with respect to Heavy Rescue companies by adding 1 Captain position and 3 Lieutenant positions.

**Fiscal Impact:** Funds for these strength levels are budgeted and/or the positions will not be filled until revenues have been clearly identified and appropriated. In all cases, the ability to hire will be monitored by the Division of Finance and Management. As such, there is no fiscal impact associated with passage of this ordinance.

**Emergency Justification:** Emergency action is requested to allow for the filling of budgeted vacant positions in certain departments in order to assure the immediate preservation of the public health, safety, and welfare.

To establish a new authorized strength ordinance for various divisions in the City of Columbus; to repeal ordinance 1736-2021; and to declare an emergency.

**WHEREAS**, the Mayor's Executive 2021 budget was submitted to City Council on November 12, 2020 for consideration; and

WHEREAS, City Council adopted said budget on March 1, 2021; and

WHEREAS, this ordinance repeals authorized strength ordinance 1736-2021; and

WHEREAS, an emergency exists in the usual daily operation of the City of Columbus in that it is immediately necessary to establish a new authorized strength ordinance to provide for the efficient operation of the city, and for the immediate preservation of the public health, peace, property, safety, and welfare; NOW, THEREFORE:

## BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS:

**SECTION 1.** That pursuant to Section 14 of the City Charter, the maximum number of officers and employees authorized to be employed within the various Departments, Boards and Offices of the City is hereby fixed and established as follows:

- -2- Refer to attachment ORD2169-2021previousstrength.xlsx

The foregoing positions authorized include all positions within each department, division, board, office or commission, whether appointed or elected except the members of any board or commission authorized by charter or ordinance. No Appointing Authority shall appoint full-time or part-time personnel in excess of the maximum permitted by this ordinance unless authorized by ordinance of City Council.

**SECTION 2.** Such of the positions within the Division of Fire as the Director of Public Safety and Fire Chief shall designate, shall be within the uniformed ranks and all other positions therein shall be deemed civilian positions, provided there shall not be in excess of five (5) Fire Assistant Chiefs and there shall not be in excess of four (4) Fire Deputy Chiefs; as a normal complement, in excess of thirty-four (34) Fire Battalion Chiefs nor as a temporary complement, in excess of thirty-five (35) Fire Battalion Chiefs at any one time; sixty-two (62) Fire Captains nor as a temporary complement, in excess of sixty-three (63) Fire Captains at any one time; one (1) Fire Chief; and two-hundred seven (207) Fire Lieutenants. The complements of fire captains and fire lieutenants are intended to be temporary, subject to review and change at any time.

Such of the positions within the Division of Police as the Director of Public Safety and the Police Chief shall designate, shall be within the uniformed ranks and all other positions therein shall be deemed civilian positions, provided there shall not be, as a normal complement, in excess of eighteen (18) Police Commanders, nor as a temporary complement, in excess of nineteen (19) Police Commanders at any one time; one (1) Police Chief; four (4) Police Assistant Chiefs; in excess of, as a normal complement, six (6) Police Deputy Chiefs, nor as a temporary complement, in excess of seven (7) Police Deputy Chiefs at any one time; in excess of, as a normal complement, fifty-eight (58) Police Lieutenants, nor as a temporary complement, in excess of sixty (60) Police Lieutenants at any one time; in excess of, as a normal complement, two hundred twenty-nine (229) Police Sergeants, nor as a temporary complement, in excess of two hundred thirty-three (233) Police Sergeants at any one time.

**SECTION 3.** Temporary appointments are not subject to the authorized strength ordinance. Additionally, limited appointments made to cover full-time and part-time employees on authorized leave (injury, disability or military leave) are not subject to the authorized strength ordinance. Student intern positions are not subject to the authorized strength ordinance.

**SECTION 4.** That Ordinance No. 1736-2021 and all other ordinances relative to the authorization of employees for any department, division, board or commission and all other ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

At the same time, in order to offer an alternative to employees who were unwilling or unable to provide banking information, the Columbus City Treasurer's Office entered into contract for two years with US Bank for payroll cards at no cost to the City.

In 2020, the City Treasurer's Office entered into a second contract with US Bank for payroll cards for its employees, again, at no cost to the City.

On February 17, 2021, the City of Columbus issued \$371,940,000 in general obligation bonds to fund the 2020 Capital Improvement Budget. In this sale, the tax-exempt series of bonds produced \$88,839,393.50 in gross premium. Of this premium, \$43,824,514.45 is applicable to the Divisions of Water, Sewers and Drains and Storm Sewer.

In accordance with the IRS guidelines and Auditor of State Bulletin 2014-001, this premium was allocated to various bond retirement funds and is being used for allowable purposes, which includes certain expenses that were budgeted in 2021 in various enterprise operating funds. Due to this, enterprise divisions will have budget savings in the respective operating funds.

In order to efficiently manage cash balances, the City will use the budget offset due to the allowable premium

usage and excess cash to fund capital projects. The excess funds will be transferred into new capital PayGo funds allocated by the division that generated the premium. By cash funding rather than financing the projects through the issuance of bonds, the City estimates around \$20,000,000 in nominal savings in interest expense over the next 20 years.

**Fiscal Impact:** This ordinance authorizes the City Auditor to establish new funds for creating PayGo systems, authorizes the transfer of cash within certain operating funds and authorizes the transfer of cash between funds. An amendment to the 2020 Capital Improvement Budget is necessary to align authority with the cash as it is transferred into the new PayGo funds. Emergency action is requested to transfer cash balances in the interest of timely and accurate accounting. (\$0)

## 1. BACKGROUND

The City of Columbus and The Annex at River South II, Ltd., are engaged in a Public-Private Partnership (3P) to make streetscape improvements in support of the redevelopment of the Trautman and HUB buildings in the River South District of downtown Columbus as part of the Downtown Streetscape - Trautman Building (High Street) project. This ordinance authorizes the Director of the Department of Public Service to reimburse The Annex at River South II, Ltd. (the "Developer"), for costs incurred relative to construction of the Downtown Streetscape - Trautman Building (High Street) project (the "Project").

In June 2015, the City of Columbus, acting through the Department of Public Service, agreed to reimburse the Developer up to \$260,000.00 to construct the Project pursuant to Ordinance 1437-2015 which authorized the execution of a Construction Guaranteed Maximum Reimbursement Agreement (the "Agreement") between the Department of Public Service and the Developer. Auditor's Certificate AC037890 was established for this expenditure, which was converted to ACPR000375 in January 2016 when DAX became the City's financial system.

ACPR000375 was cancelled in 2019 due to uncertainty concerning if the Project would be completed or reimbursement would be sought. The project has subsequently been completed and reimbursement has been requested per the terms of the Agreement. This ordinance will authorize the encumbrance and expenditure of the requisite funds to facilitate the issuance of payment to the Developer relative to this matter.

# 2. FISCAL IMPACT

Funding in the amount of \$260,000.00 is available and appropriated within the Streets and Highways Bond Fund, Fund 7704, to support this expenditure. An amendment to the 2020 Capital Improvements Budget is necessary to match cash and to establish sufficient budget authority for the proper project. It is also necessary to transfer

cash and appropriation between projects within Fund 7704 to align cash and appropriation with the proper project.

#### 1. BACKGROUND

The Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission (MORPC) is accepting Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC) Round 36 applications for the Local Transportation Improvement Program (LTIP) and State Capital Improvement Program (SCIP). MORPC serves in a staff support capacity to the District Three (Franklin County) Public Works Integrating Committee (PWIC).

OPWC requires that a designated official be authorized to submit said applications and execute project agreements for approved projects. Additionally, OPWC is required to award a minimum of 10% of the SCIP funding as a no interest loan; in order to make City applications more favorable, some of the applications may include a request for a no interest loan. 538005-100000 - Intersection - Broad St at James Rd - This project will improve the intersection of Broad Street and James Road. Project improvements including constructing medians along James Road, constructing additional turn lanes, providing new turn phasing, reconstructing existing traffic signals and installing backplates, modifying signal timing, and improving street signage. The total project cost is approximately \$7,086,937.

545012-100000 - Signals - Summit Street - Warren St to E 7th Ave - This project will replace and improve existing traffic signals at the following intersections on Summit Street: Warren Street; E. 1st Avenue; E. 2nd Avenue; E. 5th Avenue; E. 7th Avenue. The existing traffic signals at these intersections will be

completely replaced, including new poles and equipment, to meet current design and technology standards. **BACKGROUND:** 

Columbus Public Health has been awarded additional funding from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. This ordinance is needed to accept the additional funding of \$165,412.44 in grant monies for the

Healthy Start grant program for the period of April 1, 2021 through March, 31, 2022.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

This ordinance authorizes the transfer of financials and fixed assets for the Division of Code Enforcement from the Department of Development to the Department of Building and Zoning Services.

A recent citywide operational review identified that several of the Division of Code Enforcement's activities align with, and are beneficial to, the building and development community. To better structurally position personnel, programming, and future funding, this legislation will formally transfer the financial aspects and fixed assets of the Division of Code Enforcement from the Department of Development to the Department of Building and Zoning Services, assigning it the division code 43-02.

This ordinance is contingent upon passage of accompanying ordinance 2328-2021 which amends various sections of the Columbus City Codes in order to effectuate the transfer of the Division of Code Enforcement from the Department of Development to the Department of Building and Zoning Services. The division shall have as its primary duties the facilitation of the enforcement of codes and other duties as may be authorized by the director or ordinance of council. In addition, ordinance 2169-2021 authorizes the necessary transfers of authorized personnel strength levels from the Department of Development to the Department of Building and Zoning Services for the Division of Code Enforcement and Division of Administration.

The anticipated executed date of the re-organization is September 20, 2021.

**Emergency:** This legislation is being submitted as an emergency to allow for proper accounting of this division and to allow for as little interruption in services as possible.

**Fiscal Impact:** The Division of Code Enforcement is currently funded by the General Fund as well as federal funds related to the city's response to the COVID-19 pandemic. However, all current Development Taxable Bond Fund, Project Number 782004-100003, receipts and encumbrances, contracts, obligations, etc. currently established in division 44-03 for the Division of Code Enforcement within the Department of Development will remain in division 44-03 until exhausted, cancelled, and/or expired. Likewise, all current year transactions that have already occurred prior to when the re-organization is executed shall remain in the Department of Development (division 44-03).

This ordinance also establishes an imprest petty cash operating fund in the amount of \$500.00 for minor expenditures within the Department of Building and Zoning Services, Division of Code Enforcement (division 43-02). The imprest pretty cash fund, as established by the aforementioned \$500.00 shall be operated by the Director of the Department of Building and Zoning Services, who shall keep accurate accounting of such monies. The imprest petty cash fund for the Division of Code Enforcement under the Department of Development (division 44-03) shall be correspondingly disestablished; and

WHEREAS, fixed assets assigned to the Department of Development, Division of Code Enforcement will also be transferred to the Department of Building and Zoning Services, Division of Code Enforcement (division 43-02) and Division of Administration (division 43-01); and

**WHEREAS**, it is necessary to appropriate an additional \$470,210.00 from the Development Services Fund for 20% of the Division of Code Enforcement's personnel expenses for the remainder of 2021; and

**BACKGROUND:** The Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021, established the Emergency Rental Assistance (ERA) program on December 27, 2020. The Act authorized The U.S. Treasury to make payments to states and eligible units of local government, including the City of Columbus, to assist households that are unable to pay rent and utilities due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Under phase one of this program (ERA-1), the City received \$26,822,803.20 in ERA-1 proceeds in February 2021. The authorization to accept and appropriate these funds was granted pursuant to Ordinance 0284-2021.

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (March 11, 2021), authorized a second round of Emergency Rental Assistance funding (ERA-2) to eligible grantees (e.g. states and eligible units of local government). Under phase two of this program, the City of Columbus was allocated \$21,223,628.80 in ERA-2 funding. As such, the City received a partial payment of \$12,774,607.20 in ERA-2 proceeds in May 2021. This \$12.8 million received to date represents 60 percent of the total award. The U.S. Treasury will release the remainder of these funds at a

future date. This ordinance therefore seeks authority to accept and appropriate these proceeds.

Where expenditures require City Council approval in accordance with the Columbus City Codes, city departments will advance said legislation for consideration by City Council.

**Emergency Designation:** Emergency consideration is requested so that funds made available to the city can begin to be used as quickly as possible. A process has been instituted to allow the Department of Finance and Management and the City Auditor to transfer appropriations to City agencies.

WHEREAS, the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 was signed into law on March 11, 2021; and

**WHEREAS**, the U.S. Treasury allocated \$21,223,628.80 to the City of Columbus to assist households that are unable to pay rent and utilities due to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

**WHEREAS**, the U.S. Treasury made payment of \$12,774,607.20 to the City of Columbus in May 2021 and appropriation of these funds is now necessary; and

WHEREAS, an emergency exists in the usual daily operation of the Department of Finance and Management in that it is immediately necessary to accept and appropriate funds from the U.S. Treasury at the earliest possible time, thereby preserving the public health, peace, property, safety, and welfare; NOW, THEREFORE,

#### BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS:

**SECTION 1.** That \$12,774,607.20, or such final amount(s) as allocated by the U.S. Treasury, are hereby accepted by the City of Columbus from the U.S. Treasury as a result of the American Rescue Plan-Emergency Rental Assistance Program, and an appropriation of the same is authorized according to the account codes in the attachment of this ordinance

**SECTION 2.** That any interest earnings in the fund may be transferred, appropriated, and expended for the purposes of this fund as allowed by the grantor. All investment earnings are hereby deemed appropriated for the purposes of complying with all federal requirements pertaining to investment earnings.

BACKGROUND: This ordinance is being submitted to set forth the municipal services and zoning conditions the city of Columbus will provide upon annexation of a territory located in Madison Township. This ordinance is required by the Ohio Revised Code (ORC) as enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio. An annexation petition has been filed with Franklin County for this property. A service ordinance must be passed before the annexation meeting takes place before the Board of County Commissioners of Franklin County. Information regarding municipal services that would be available, should the subject site be annexed, has been compiled and is reflected in this ordinance. Should the petition be approved by the County Commissioners, a second City ordinance accepting the annexation will be required to complete the process. The time frames specified in the ORC require that this legislation be filed as emergency.

**FISCAL IMPACT**: The statement of municipal services and zoning conditions for a proposed annexation area has no fiscal impact. While provision of the stated services does represent cost to the City, annexation of land also has the potential to create revenue to the city.

To set forth a statement of municipal services and zoning conditions to be provided to the area contained in a proposed annexation (AN21-015) of 34.9± Acres in Madison Township to the city of Columbus as required by the Ohio Revised Code and to declare an emergency.

WHEREAS, a petition for the annexation of certain territory in Madison Township was duly filed on behalf of James R Cloyes CPA, LLC on September 1, 2021; and

**WHEREAS**, a hearing on said petition is tentatively scheduled before the Board of County Commissioners of Franklin County on September 28, 2021; and

WHEREAS, the Ohio Revised Code requires that before said hearing the Municipal Legislative Authority shall adopt a statement indicating what services, if any, the municipal corporation will provide to the territory proposed for annexation upon annexation; and

**Public Safety**: The City of Columbus, Department of Public Safety will be able to provide the appropriate level of safety related services to the proposed annexation area. Such services will include police and fire protection as well as emergency medical service to the subject property.

While the petitioner for annexation may have proposed future development plans for the property in question, the Department of Public Safety requests that the City exercise its discretion in the coming development planning and review process to ensure any future development will be properly served by the Department of Public Safety. Discussions between the City and the present property owner or any future developers regarding post annexation changes in zoning or other changes to the property should include the Department of Public Safety and the Department of Development to ensure any proposed development of the annexation property may be adequately accommodated. Specific details for safety services are dependent upon the parameters of future development that is ultimately approved by the City.

**Sanitation**: The station has no objection to this request.

**Transportation**: Maintenance will be available for any additional right-of-way that may be included in this annexation request. If this annexation contains existing signalized intersections, those intersections and signals are subject to Transportation Division Policy, which appeared in the December 6, 2003 Columbus City Bulletin, and any subsequent updates thereto.

**Water**: The site will be served by an existing 16" water main located in Ebright Road, the connection to which will be made the owner's expense.

**Sewers**: All sanitary and storm sewers required shall be constructed privately by the owners and developers at their own cost and expense with no cost to the City.

**Sanitary**: This site can be served by an existing 42 inch sewer located within an easement running through the south side of the site. Sewer plan: RP-5181

**Storm**: All storm sewers necessary for development/redevelopment of the area shall be designed in accordance with design policy and zoning codes in effect at the time of development.

All sanitary and storm sewers required shall be constructed privately by the owners/developers at their own expense with no cost to the city.

Section 2. If this 34.9± acre site is annexed and if the City of Columbus permits uses in the annexed territory that the City of Columbus determines are clearly incompatible with the uses permitted under current county or township zoning regulations in the adjacent land remaining within Madison Township, the Columbus City Council will require, in the zoning ordinance permitting the incompatible uses, the owner of the annexed territory to provide a buffer separating the use of the annexed territory and the adjacent land remaining within Madison Township. For the purpose of this section, "buffer" includes open space, landscaping, fences, walls, and other structured elements: streets and street right-of-way; and bicycle and pedestrian paths and sidewalks.

Section 3. **WHEREAS**, emergency action is recommended in order to implement the terms of the Memorandum of Understanding in a timely manner; and

WHEREAS, an emergency exists in the usual daily operation of the Department of Human Resources in that it is immediately necessary to amend the Collective Bargaining Agreement between the City of Columbus and CWA Local 4502, dated April 24, 2020 through April 23, 2023, by approving Memorandum of Understanding #2021-03; in order to implement the terms of the Memorandum of Understanding in a timely manner thereby preserving the public peace, property, health, safety, and welfare; NOW, THEREFORE,

#### BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS:

**SECTION 1.** That Memorandum of Understanding #2021-03 amends Appendix B of the Collective Bargaining Agreement between CWA Local 4502 and the City of Columbus dated April 24, 2020 through April 23, 2023.

**SECTION 2.** That City Council, in the best interests of the City, hereby recognizes and accepts Memorandum of Understanding #2021-03, a copy of which is attached hereto, executed between representatives of the City of Columbus and CWA Local 4502.

**SECTION 3.** That for the reasons stated in the preamble hereto, which is hereby made a part hereof, this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the Mayor, or ten (10) days after passage if the Mayor neither approves nor vetoes the same.

Due to the ongoing health crisis and public health emergency and to reduce and prevent the spread of

COVID-19, there exists a need for a face covering (mask) requirement in the City of Columbus.

**Fiscal Impact:** No funding is required for this legislation.

To require the wearing of face coverings in indoor public spaces in the City of Columbus to reduce and prevent the spread of COVID-19; to allow for enforcement and assessment of a civil penalty for a violation of said mandate; and to declare an emergency.

WHEREAS, COVID-19 is a respiratory disease that can result in serious illness or death, caused by the SARS-CoV-2 virus, which is a strain of coronavirus that can easily spread from person to person. The virus is spread between individuals through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes. It may be possible that individuals can get COVID-19 by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose, or eyes; and

WHEREAS, on January 30, 2020, the International Health Regulations Emergency Committee of the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a public health emergency of international concern; and WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the Columbus Board of Health declared a Public Health Emergency due to this imminent threat of an acutely hazardous disease, posing a high probability of widespread exposure to an infectious agent that poses a significant risk of substantial harm to a large number of people, a large number of serious or long-term disabilities, or a large number of deaths, and said Public Health Emergency has subsequently been renewed multiple times and is currently in effect; and

WHEREAS, since early March 2020, the City of Columbus has faced a pandemic that has resulted in extraordinary illness, long-term debilitating effects and loss of life, infecting over 100,000 and causing the death of more than 1,000 Columbus residents; and

WHEREAS, in the City of Columbus there is a current threat of an acutely hazardous disease, illness, or health condition; specifically, COVID-19, and Franklin County, where Columbus is located, has been designated by the Center for Disease Control and Prevention as currently having high community transmission levels, characterized by more than 100 new cases per 100,000 persons in the past seven days, and more than 10 percent of positive nucleic acid amplification tests (NAATs) tests during the past seven days; and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimates the Delta variant of the coronavirus now accounts for more than 90 percent of all sequenced coronavirus cases in the U.S.; and

WHEREAS, Columbus Public Health (CPH) has determined the Delta variant is currently the most dominant strain of COVID-19 locally, has spread quickly among unvaccinated people of all ages, and has shown the ability to infect fully vaccinated individuals, cause symptomatic illness and be spread to others; and

WHEREAS, the Delta variant is more aggressive and more transmissible than previously circulating strains and poses significant new risks in the ongoing effort to stop and slow the spread of the virus; and

WHEREAS, central Ohio hospital systems are experiencing increased numbers of COVID-19 cases and increased numbers of hospital beds and ICU beds utilized by COVID-19 patients; and

WHEREAS, staffing levels in central Ohio hospital systems are alarmingly low, taxing the ability of hospitals to provide COVID-19 care while tending to the community's other critical healthcare needs; and

WHEREAS, COVID-19 cases for 5 to 11-year-olds and 12 to 17-year-olds have increased dramatically over the past month, and slowing the spread is critical to the health and wellbeing of young people and to continuing safe, in-person learning in central Ohio school districts; and

WHEREAS, the CDC has recognized vaccination as the leading public health prevention strategy to end the COVID-19 pandemic, and vaccines are safe, effective and widely available to any eligible resident; and WHEREAS, while over 738,353 Franklin County residents have been fully vaccinated against COVID-19,

additional steps are necessary in order to protect against the rapid spread of the Delta variant; additional steps are necessary to ensure that the number of vaccinated residents continues to increase; and

WHEREAS, face coverings and other public health precautions have proved to be critical in slowing and stopping the spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, face coverings can decrease the spread of respiratory droplets from people, and evidence has grown, as shown in numerous recent studies, that the use of face coverings decreases the spread of COVID-19 within populations; and

WHEREAS, the CDC has issued guidance recommending wearing a mask indoors in public in most circumstances, even for fully vaccinated people, as well as where required by federal, state, local, tribal, or territorial laws, rules, and regulations, including local business and workplace guidance; and

WHEREAS, some people have medical or behavioral health issues, disabilities, or other physical reasons that necessitate that they be exempted from wearing a face covering; and

WHEREAS, the spread of COVID-19 continues to threaten the lives of the citizens of the City of Columbus and to substantially impair the functioning of city government and its ability to protect the lives and property of the citizens of the City of Columbus; and

WHEREAS, an emergency exists in the City of Columbus as fully articulated in the preamble hereof such that enactment of this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, property, health, or safety; NOW THEREFORE,

#### BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS:

**SECTION 1.** For the purposes of this ordinance, "face covering" means a piece of cloth, fabric, or other material that fully covers the mouth and nose and that is secured with ear straps or otherwise tied so as to prevent slipping. A face covering shall be worn so as to cover the mouth and nose in compliance with the CDC's guidance on wearing face coverings. A face covering may be factory-made, sewn by hand, or improvised from household materials and can be made of a variety of synthetic and natural fabrics, including cotton, silk, or linen. Ideally, a face covering has two (2) or more layers. Face coverings include, but are not limited to, bandanas, scarves, medical masks, and cloth masks. N95 masks, or other personal protective equipment that provides a higher level of protection than a face covering as defined in this Section are also included within this definition.

**SECTION 2.** For purposes of this ordinance, "surgical mask" means American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) Level 1, 2, or 3 approved procedural and surgical masks, to include an N95 respirator approved by the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) or a respirator from another country allowed by the Occupational Safety & Health Administration (OSHA), the Food & Drug Administration (FDA), or the Centers for Disease Control (CDC).

**SECTION 3.** For purposes of this Ordinance, "place of business" means any office, facility, building, or structure operated by or for a for-profit business or non-profit enterprise and which is engaged in the sale or other transaction of any kind for anything of value in exchange for goods, commodities, services, or temporary lodging and that is open to the general public or by appointment, and includes, but is not limited to, grocery stores, retail stores, pharmacies, health care facilities, restaurants and bars, banquet and catering facilities, personal care, grooming, and tattoo facilities, child care, day camp, and overnight camp facilities, hotels and motels (excluding a rented room or suite), gyms and similar facilities; but excluding religious facilities.

**SECTION 4.** For purposes of this Ordinance, "indoor areas" or "inside" means all space closed in by a roof or other overhead covering of any kind and walls or other side coverings of any kind on at least three sides with appropriate openings for ingress and egress.

**SECTION 5.** All individuals within the City of Columbus shall wear a face covering over the individual's nose and mouth in indoor areas accessible to the public and within the confines of public or private transportation regulated by the City of Columbus, unless otherwise exempted, as follows:

- a. While inside a place of business as to the areas within the place of business that are accessible to, and are intended for the use of, the public;
- b. While inside a City of Columbus operated building or facility as to the areas within such facility that are accessible to, and are intended for the use of, the public;
- c. In any public transportation such as a bus or other public transit vehicle regulated by the City of Columbus, as well as all Columbus airports, bus and train stations. This includes, but is not limited to, a taxi or any other vehicle for hire, even if the vehicle is privately owned; however, this provision does not apply to people traveling alone or with household members or friends in their personal vehicles;
- d. In certain high-density occupational settings where social distancing is difficult, such as manufacturing, construction, and agriculture and to include businesses or operations within North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) sectors 311 to 339 (manufacturing), 236 to 238 (construction), and 111, 112, 1151, and 1152 (agriculture);
- e. Workers in long term care facilities (LTC), including skilled nursing facilities (SNF), adult care homes (ACH), family care homes (FCH), mental health group homes, and intermediate care facilities for individuals with intellectual disabilities (ICF-IID) shall wear a surgical mask;
- f. Health care facilities other than LTC facilities must follow the face covering requirements in the CDC Infection Control Guidance for Healthcare Professionals about Coronavirus (COVID-19);

**SECTION 6.** All places of business are hereby encouraged to post clear information, in visible locations, advising those entering a facility of the mask requirement contained in this Ordinance.

Places of business shall require all employees, contractors, volunteers, and any other individuals that interact with the public to wear a face covering, and places of business shall only sell or otherwise enter into any transaction of any kind for anything of value in exchange for goods, commodities, services, or provide temporary lodging to those who comply with this ordinance. Any manager, owner, or person in charge of a place of business who recklessly fails or refuses to comply with the requirements of this ordinance may be found to be in violation of this ordinance. Anyone who declines to wear a Face Covering for any of the reasons which constitute an exemption should not be required to produce documentation or any other proof of a condition to a place of business.

**SECTION 7.** The requirement to wear a face covering through this Ordinance does not apply in the following situations:

a. Any individual who should not wear a face covering because of a medical condition, mental health condition

or developmental disability, or who is unable to remove the face covering without assistance, and any individual who should not wear face coverings under the CDC guidance.

- b. Individuals under 3 years old;
- c. An individual that is actively eating or drinking.
- d. When seeking to communicate with someone who is hearing-impaired in a way that requires the mouth to be visible:
- e. When giving a speech or performance for a broadcast or to an audience, including but not limited to plays, musical performances, wedding officiants and wedding participants;
- f. Working at home or while in a personal vehicle;
- g. When temporarily removing a face covering to secure government or medical services or for identification purposes;
- h. Individuals who would be at risk from wearing a Face Covering at work, as determined by local, state, or federal regulations or workplace safety guidelines;
- i. When wearing a face covering is impeding visibility to operate equipment or a vehicle;
- j. A child whose parent, guardian, or responsible person has been unable to place the face covering safely on the child's face:
- k. School individuals (including students, administrators, and teachers) on or in school or school district facilities, so that schools and school districts may follow the regulations and guidelines promulgated by their governing bodies and the Ohio Department of Education. For this Ordinance, "school or school districts" means any public, private, or charter school or institution that provides education for any or all of the following grades or education: kindergarten through twelfth grade; or a university, college, or similar post-secondary institution;
- l. In settings where it is not practicable or feasible to wear a face covering such as when receiving dental services, medical treatments, while swimming, or while acting as an on-duty lifeguard;
- m. When actively engaged in exercise, sport, coaching, or officiating in a training, recreational, or competitive capacity;
- n. When inside a personal or commercial vehicle either parked or moving that is not a vehicle described in Section 5(c);
- o. Law enforcement officers, firefighters, EMTs and other first responders, while encouraged to wear Face Coverings, are specifically exempt from this order while engaged in the exercise of their duties outside of an office or business-type setting;
- p. Individuals complying with the directions of public safety employees or emergency responders;
- q. Individuals inside religious facilities or other facilities used for religious ceremony, leading or actively

participating in religious services, funerals or wedding ceremonies, or otherwise engaged in First Amendment protected activity;

r. Facilities owned and operated by the Federal and State Government are exempt from this order.

**SECTION 8.** Columbus Public Health shall have the authority to investigate and is directed to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

**SECTION 9.** Citations to places of business under this Ordinance shall be written only to those places of business that recklessly fail to enforce the requirements of this Ordinance. Places of business are entitled to rely on their customers' or patrons' statements about whether or not they are exempted from the Face Covering requirements, and businesses and organizations do not violate this Ordinance if they rely upon such statements. Further, the posting of clear information, in visible locations, advising customers and patrons entering a facility of the mask requirements contained in this Ordinance shall be prima facie evidence of enforcement by a place of business as to customers and patrons.

If Columbus Public Health observes a violation of this Ordinance, a civil citation may issue and the following schedule of civil penalties may be imposed upon a place of business and/or a manager, owner, or person in charge of a place of business who recklessly fails or refuses to comply with the requirements of this ordinance:

- a. For a first violation, a warning of violation shall be issued;
- b. For a second violation, a fine of \$500.00 shall be issued;
- c. For a third violation and for each subsequent violation, a fine of \$1,000.00 shall be issued.

**SECTION 10.** If Columbus Public Health observes a violation of this Ordinance, a civil citation may issue and the following schedule of civil penalties may be imposed upon an individual who recklessly fails or refuses to comply with the requirements of this ordinance:

- a. For a first violation, a warning of violation shall be issued;
- b. For a second violation, a fine of \$100.00 shall be issued.
- c. For a third violation and for each subsequent violation, a fine of \$250.00 shall be issued.


Law enforcement personnel are not authorized to criminally enforce the Face Covering requirements of this Ordinance against individual workers, customers, or patrons. However, if a place of business does not allow entry to a worker, customer, or patron because that person refuses to wear a Face Covering, and if that worker, customer, or patron enters the premises or refuses to leave the premises, law enforcement personnel may enforce existing trespassing laws and any other laws that the worker, customer, or patron may violate.

**SECTION 11.** Violators have the right to appeal civil penalties pursuant to and in accordance with Columbus City Health Code Section 203.08.

**SECTION 12.** Columbus Public Health, through its Commissioner or designee, is hereby instructed to provide ongoing reports to City Council, no less than every 30 days, on the current status of the COVID-19 public health

emergency and the ongoing community response for so long as this Ordinance remains in effect.

**SECTION 13.** This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and upon signature by the Mayor shall take full force and effect at 8:00am on Tuesday September 14, 2021. This Ordinance shall remain in effect so long as the Mayoral proclamation of emergency issued September 10, 2021 remains in effect or until further act of Council.

### Scope

The City of Columbus Civil Service Commission is requesting proposals from psychologists and psychological consulting firms for the administration of a psychological screening procedure for entry-level police officer and firefighter candidates. Sealed proposals will be accepted through 3:00 p.m. on Friday, October 8, 2021.

The psychologist or consultant receiving the contract will be responsible for the administration of the psychological instrument, identification and interpretation of flag scales or profiles, and administration of a psychological interview for police officer and firefighter candidates as they complete the medical component of the selection process.

The Commission anticipates that up to 100 candidates could be scheduled for psychological screening during the remainder of 2021. Depending on the number and size of academy classes funded, a larger number of candidates could be scheduled in 2022 and after.

The contract for the selected psychologist or firm will be for a period from January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022 with

an option for two, one-year, renewal periods.

The Request for Proposals (RFP) is available on the City's vendor services website located at http://vendors.columbus.gov/sites/public/ Copies of the RFP will be sent electronically or mailed if requested.

#### The Hiring Process

Typically, thousands of individuals begin the selection process for the job of Police Officer or Firefighter. The Police Officer exam is offered more frequently, usually on a yearly basis, while the Firefighter exam is offered every two years. All qualified candidates are invited to the respective examination which consists of a multiple choice test, a writing sample test for police officer candidates, a video based oral exam, and a physical abilities exam. The Commission then establishes a list of eligible candidates in grade bands for each exam.

Before the City of Columbus is ready to start a class of police officers or firefighters at their respective academies, individuals undergo a background investigation beginning with the highest score band on the eligible list. After an applicant successfully completes the background investigation, a conditional offer of employment is made by the Department of Public Safety. Candidates with conditional offers are scheduled for a medical exam, vision and hearing exams, along with a cardiovascular stress test. Finally, the psychological instruments are administered by the psychologist following the background investigations and other medical examinations.

In accordance with this process, the psychological instruments are not administered to all candidates. However, all candidates who successfully complete the background investigation and the other medical tests are scheduled for the psychological evaluation. After the psychological instruments are scored and interpreted, the candidates are scheduled for a psychological interview with the contracted psychologist. The psychologist will also have an opportunity to review background investigation information on these candidates. As a result of this process, the psychologist makes a recommendation about the acceptability/risk of each applicant's fitness to be a Columbus Police Officer or Firefighter to the Commission. The psychologist may be called upon to testify about this recommendation.

The candidates will be rated on a five (5) point scale ranging from highly acceptable, low risk to high risk. The Commission is then notified in writing of the psychologist's recommendation. At times, the Commission may request that the recommendations be sent by email or facsimile in order to expedite the process and to allow sufficient notice to candidates.

## Project Requirements

The psychological screening project involves the following components:

#### Instrument Administration

The current process uses several personality inventories for the Police Officer and Firefighter processes. Proposers for this project should identify instruments to be used, provide support for the use of these inventories, and propose a plan for administering the instruments to police officer and firefighter candidates. Any differences in the instruments recommended for screening firefighters versus police officers should be identified.

If testing is to be completed electronically, identify the software to be used, any equipment the City would need, and security measures proposed to ensure applicants are completing testing.

Interpretation of Test Results

All candidates will be scheduled for an interview with the psychologist, as discussed above. This project and any proposal should include the identification of the target scales and critical scores which will be used to evaluate an individual in the psychological interview. A proposal for this project should consider and cite published research, as well as draw on the proposer's own past experience(s), especially experience with law enforcement selection.

## Psychological Interview

Proposers for this project need to develop procedures for administering the test and subsequent interview, evaluating the applicant, and reporting results to the Civil Service Commission with a turn-around time as short as possible.

## Rating Scale

The psychologist will make recommendations about candidates according to a system similar to the scale described above. The proposal should include a description of the rating scale to be used in determining a passing or failing recommendation.

## Scheduling and Reporting of Results

Candidates may be processed in groups of up to 80 and must be scheduled in a relatively short time period. Please include how much notice is needed for scheduling and a proposed turn-around time from the testing to the time the recommendation would reach the Civil Service Commission. A timely decision is critical as the psychological screening is only one part in an extensive selection procedure, and the procedure must allow for out-of-town candidates to complete testing and the interview in the same day, as well as allowing "last minute" alternate candidates to be scheduled and evaluated as positions are added or candidates withdraw. Include a summary of how results will be reported and what type of information will be included.

### Cost Proposal and Billing

Proposals must include the cost or pricing structure for the screening process, including use, administration, and scoring of the psychological instruments proposed, and the administration of the interview and recommendation. Proposed costs for reviewing any background documents should be identified. Any costs for a debriefing meeting with candidates who fail to meet standards must be identified. Proposals must also provide a cost for testifying, in defense of the process or recommendation(s), should litigation ensue, and any costs for the psychologist to consult with Commission staff, whenever deemed necessary by the Commission. Any setup costs, and other required costs should also be outlined in the proposal. If the contract is renewed for two additional years, identify any increases in costs for term two and term three. Invoices must itemize the costs, in detail, for each test administration and interview session.

## Logistics of Testing and Interviews

Proposals must outline the logistics of how a large group of people will be tested and interviewed over a short period of time. The location or proposed location for testing and interviews must be discussed. Companies located outside of the central Ohio area must detail the logistics, whether interviews would be in person or use video-conferencing. Proposed software or other technology should be identified.

### Additional Hours for Testing

Proposals should discuss the ability to offer an evening or a weekend block of time during months when candidates will be scheduled. Offering hours one evening per month between 5:00 to 8:00 p.m. or a half day one Saturday per month is being considered. This change is proposed in order to allow flexibility of scheduling for candidates.

### Licenses and Certification

Proposals must include copy of any certifications and licenses for primary psychologists or other professionals who will provide services for the contract.

A vitae of the project coordinator and other project principals should also be included.

#### Effect on Minorities

While the validity of the employment decision is paramount, adverse impact on minorities and females is a concern with any employment activity. The Civil Service Commission is committed to the reduction of such adverse impact, where possible. Proposals for this project should address this issue. Impact on minorities and females must be considered in the areas of administration procedures for the testing instrument, selection of the flag scales, the administration of the psychological interview, and procedures to follow should the applicant formally object to the recommendation. Precautions must be taken to ensure fairness in the test interpretation and interview process, and this must be outlined in the proposal.

#### Hate Groups and Biases

Proposals should address methods used to identify an applicant's affiliation with hate groups and any biases against protected groups.

## **Equal Business Opportunity**

The City of Columbus encourages participation of certified minority and female business enterprises. All bidders/offerors and subcontractors must have either (1) an application in their bid/proposal to secure a contract compliance number with the City of Columbus Office of Diversity and Inclusion or (2) a valid contract compliance number at the time the proposal is submitted. Companies with expired contract compliance numbers will be given seven (7) business days after proposal submittal to update their contract compliance information.

All bidders/offerors shall identify all subcontractor(s) who will perform any type of contracting on the City bid/proposal. All bidders/offerors shall include in their bid/proposal response the anticipated cost and scope of work performed by all subcontractors, along with their contract compliance numbers. While the participation of certified minority and female owned businesses is encouraged, the level of minority and female participation will not be a condition of the contract award.

### References

## Resources Provided by the City of Columbus

The Civil Service Commission and the Columbus Divisions of Police and Fire will provide support personnel for this project. City of Columbus facilities may also be used for larger group administrations. The extent to which the psychologist or consultant intends to use City of Columbus personnel, facilities or equipment must be addressed in the proposal. The City will provide a list of eligible candidates and will assist with scheduling for the psychological tests.

## Evaluation Criteria for Awarding the Contract

Pursuant to Columbus City Code §329.12, every timely proposal will be objectively evaluated by an evaluation committee and the contract will be awarded based on specific criteria in the following areas:

1. 25 points: Competence of the proposer to perform the required service as indicated by the technical training, education

and experience of the proposer's personnel. Proposals should include copies of any licenses or certifications.

- 2. 20 points: Quality and feasibility of the proposer's technical proposal.
- 3. 20 points: Ability of the offeror to perform the required service expeditiously as indicated by the proposer's workload and the availability of necessary personnel, and the extent to which the proposed procedures rely on City resources will also be considered.
- 4. 15 points: Procedural/administrative concerns including turn-around time for scheduling and reporting results. The City will also consider the location and the ability to handle a large volume of candidates and to schedule candidates as they pass their medical exams.
- 5. 15 points: Cost or pricing structure
- 6. 5 points: Past experience with employment screening, law enforcement, and public safety agencies would be beneficial. Proposals should be accompanied by a vitae of the project coordinator and other project principals and a photocopy of the psychologist's license(s). The proposal must include proposed costs and must describe time frames for reporting results, as discussed above. The City of Columbus intends to award the psychological screening contract before the expiration of the current contract on December 31, 2021.

**Equal Employment Opportunity** 

Each responsive proposer shall submit, with its proposal, a contract compliance certification number or a completed application for certification. 

#### REVISED BYLAWS

of

## THE NORTH LINDEN AREAS COMMISSION

Amended July 16, 2020

#### ARTICLE I. NAME & BOUNDARIES

All members shall be appointed by the Mayor with the concurrence of City Council.

Section 1. There is hereby created in the city of Columbus a Commission area to be known as the North Linden Area Commission, hereafter in this document referred to as the Commission.

Section 2. This area shall be bounded and described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the centerline of the railroad right-of-way west of Joyce Ave. and Hudson St. and proceeding in a westerly direction along the center line of Hudson St. to the first north-south railroad right-of-way immediately east of Indianola Ave.; thence proceeding in a northerly direction along the centerline of the railroad right-of-way to Cooke Rd.; thence proceeding in an easterly direction along the centerline of Cooke Rd. to Karl Rd.; thence proceeding in a northerly direction along the centerline of Karl Rd. to Ferris Rd.; thence proceeding in an easterly direction along the centerline of Ferris Rd. to the north-south railroad right-of-way west of Joyce Ave.; thence proceeding in a southerly direction along the centerline of the railroad right-of-way to the point of beginning.

#### ARTICLE II. PURPOSE

Section 1. These Bylaws shall establish the proceedings by which the North Linden Area Commission shall execute its duties and functions under the grant of authority set forth in Chapter 3109 of the Columbus City Code.

Section 2. This Commission is established to afford citizen participation in the decision-making process functioning in an advisory capacity and to facilitate communication, understanding and cooperation between neighborhood groups, city officials and developers.

#### ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

**Section 1**. There shall be maximum of 9 members of the Commission. All members shall be appointed by the mayor with concurrence of City Council.

- a) Seven (7) persons living in the Commission area shall be selected as resident members by the selection procedure outlined in Art. III, Sect. d.
- b) Two (2) members, who need not be area residents but who have shown a demonstrated interest in the area, shall be nominated by the selected members of the Commission.

- c) For selected members running for consecutive selected terms, the signatures of 25 residents within the area are not required.
- d) Except as otherwise specified, all members have equal rights.
- e) All members shall serve without compensation

Section 2. Selection, Terms, Vacancies

- a) Initially, terms shall be determined by lot with five (5) selected, two (2) nominated members and the Mayor's appointee serving for a term of three (3) years, four (4) selected and three (3) nominated serving for a term of two (2) years.
- b) Thereafter, all terms shall be for a period of three (3) years, staggered with four (4) of the commissioners' terms expiring on a given year and three (3) commissioners' terms expiring on a different year.
- c) Each term shall end on December 31 of the year the term expires.
- d) After the selection of initial Commissioners, selection of subsequent commission members shall be by residents of North Linden by petition and election.
  - i. Candidates must submit a resume, short biography, essay, and petition with signatures of at least 25 North Linden residents.
  - ii. Availability of petitions will be announced at the regular June and July meetings and published in available media.
  - iii. Petitions are due by the second Thursday in August.
  - iv. Candidates must be 18 years of age or older and be a North Linden Resident
  - v. Signers of petitions must be 18 years of age or older and be residents of North Linden.
  - vi. Petitions must contain 25 or more valid signatures for a candidate to be considered for selection.
  - vii. An election shall take place annually in the month of September.
    - a. All valid candidates, (Article III, Sect. 2d, i-vi), shall be placed on the ballot.
    - Election shall be by secret ballot. All North Linden residents and Commissioners attending the September meeting may cast a ballot.
  - viii. No election shall be scheduled if the number of candidates is less than or equal to the number of selected Commissioners with expiring terms.

- e) Any vacancies caused by death, resignation, disqualification, or by other means shall be filled for the unexpired term by appointment of the Mayor with the concurrence of Council. The area commission may recommend appointees to the Mayor to fill vacancies. Candidates for appointment must submit a resume, cover letter, essay and qualifying petition (ARTICLE III, Sect. 2d, i, iv-vi)
- f) A commissioner who is elected or appointed to a seat may not be elected or appointed to a different seat until the term of the seat held by the commissioner has expired.

## Section 3. Expectations and Responsibilities of Commissioners

- a) No member shall represent the Commission in its official actions except as specifically authorized by a majority vote at a regular or special meeting. This shall not be construed as a restriction upon the rights of individual members to represent their own views before public or private bodies, whether in agreement or disagreement with the official actions of the Commission.
- b) Statements made by Commissioners outside of official meetings, including on social media, do not represent the Commission unless the Commissioner has been directly authorized by position or vote to represent and speak on behalf of the Commission.
- c) When presenting personal views before public or private bodies or on social media, Commissioners should clarify that they are not representing or speaking on behalf of the Commission.
- **Section 4.** If a member of the Commission selected by the selection procedures moves out of the described Commission area, such member must relinquish his or her resident status *in writing* and be replaced per Section 2e. Resignation will be officially announced at the next public meeting.

#### Section 5. Attendance

- a) Commissioners are required to attend all meetings of the Commission
- b) Commissioners who communicate an absence to the Chair prior to a public meeting will be deemed excused. Except for emergency, Commissioners are not permitted to have more than three (3) consecutive excused absences.
- c) Commissioners who fail to communicate absence to the Chair prior to a public meeting will be deemed un-excused. Two (2) consecutive unexcused absences from regular monthly meetings (Art. V, Sect.1) or from four (4) regular monthly meetings in a 12 month period are in violation of Sect. 5a.
- d) A Commissioner in violation of part (b) or (c) of this section will be officially removed by the Commission at the next regular meeting.

## ARTICLE IV. OFFICERS

Section 1. The Officers of the Commission shall be Chair, Vice-chair, Zoning Chair, and Treasurer.

Section 2. Officers shall be elected by a majority of the Commission members present at the October monthly meeting.

Section 3. Each Officer shall be elected for a term of one (1) year, beginning January 1.

**Section 4.** The duties of the officers shall be:

- a) The Chair shall preside at meetings of the Commission and prepare the agenda for Commission meetings, in consultation with the other Commission members.
- b) The Vice-Chair shall perform the duties of the Chair in the Chair's absence and shall perform such special duties that may arise from time to time at the request of the Chair.
- c) The Treasurer shall receive and submit all Commissioners' requests with receipts for reimbursement; and shall receive and disburse all funds of the Commission.

Section 5. The Vice-Chair shall fill a vacancy in the Chair position. A vacancy in every other position shall be filled by election by a majority of the Commission members present at the subsequent monthly meeting. A vacancy filled for six (6) months or more shall be considered full term.

Section 6. Election of officers shall be by roll call.

## ARTICLE V. MEETINGS

- a) Regular meetings shall be on the third Thursday of each month at a stated time to be determined by two-thirds vote of the Commission and shall be open to the public. Regular meetings shall commence no later than 15 minutes after the stated time.
- b) The first regular meeting in January shall be the Annual Meeting at which time the new Commissioners shall take office, officers shall be elected by roll call (Article IV, Section 6) and annual reports from committees will be received.
- c) A regular meeting may be cancelled, or the meeting date changed, by a two-thirds vote of the Commission.

#### Section 2. Special Meetings

- a) Special meetings may be called by the Chair or by a majority of members present in a regular or special meeting or by the Chair at the written request of at least five (5) members.
- b) Written notice of any special meeting shall be given to each Commission member and the public at least seven (7) days in advance, except in an emergency. This written notice shall specify the date, time, and place of the meeting and describe all business to be conducted at the meeting.

- c) No business shall be conducted at a special meeting unless it was included in the notice of the special meeting.
- d) Special meetings shall be open to the public.

#### Section 3. Quorums

 $\Lambda$  quorum shall be defined as greater than 50% of the Commission members. A majority of the Commission members present and voting shall be required to approve a motion, except as otherwise provided.

**Section 4.** The business of the Commission shall contain the following unless otherwise directed by a majority of members present:

**Section 5.** The Chair may recognize members of the public who wish to address the Commission and have turned in speaker slips concerning issues under discussion and on the agenda a) If a member of the public wishes to be included on the Agenda, the person must contact the

Chair. In turn, the Chair will inform the Commission.

b) The member of the public must state their name and the issue to be presented.

c) A uniform time limit for such presentations may be set by the Chair.

**Section 6.** Issues brought before the Commission that are not under discussion, nor on the Agenda may be discussed or tabled by a vote of a show of hands so that proper authorities can be consulted.

**Section 7.** When guests are invited to speak to the Commission the time will generally be limited to fifteen (15) minutes or at the discretion of the Chair.

Section 8. Dissenting or non-concurring Committee member's reports may be filed by Commission or committee members and shall be attached to the Standing and Special Committees' reports.

Section 9. Commission meetings shall be limited to not more than three (3) hours unless deemed appropriate and approved by a majority of the Commission members present.

**Section 10.** Except as otherwise specified, meetings of the Commission shall be conducted in an orderly and reasonable manner using the latest current revision of Robert's Rules of Order as a guide.

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a) Voting shall take place by a show of hands

b) At the request of any Commissioner, a roll call vote may be granted.

### ARTICLE VI. COMMITTEES

**Section 1.** Appointment of Commission members to both standing and special committees shall be made by the Chair in consultation with Commission members and shall be subject to the approval of a majority of the Commission members.

**Section 2.** Each standing committee may appoint persons who are not Commissioners as committee members, subject to the approval by the Commission. All committee members have voting privileges within that committee. Non-commissioners may or may not outnumber Commissioners on any standing committee.

Section 3. Each committee shall select a member to Chair the committee, and may select other Officers and adopt internal rules necessary to carry out their assigned task. The selected Chair of any committee shall be a Commissioner.

- a) The selected Chair of any committee may be requested to step down as the Chair of that committee by the Commission Chair. The selected Chair of any committee may be voted out as the Chair of that committee by a two-thirds majority vote of the Commission.
- b) Voting by the entire Commission, for the purpose of removing a selected Chair of a committee shall be conducted at a Special Meeting of the Commission.
- c) At any time before voting by the entire Commission, for the purpose of removing a selected Chair, the selected chair may resign the chair.
- d) Leaving the committee is the decision of the individual. If the individual remains on the committee, the individual shall not publicly represent the committee or the Commission in a position of authority with regard to that committee or any of that committee's functions. The individual is an internal member only on that committee.
- **Section 4.** A special committee may be established or dissolved by a majority vote of the Commission. Its size, powers and duties shall be specified by the creating resolution.

Section 5. All committee meetings must be publicized by sending the date, location, time and agenda to the Department of Neighborhoods at least 7 days in advance for submission to the city bulletin.

Section 6. The Chair of the Commission shall be an ex-officio member of all committees.

Section 7. The standing committees and their responsibilities are:

a) Executive Committee

1. Consists of Chair, Vice-Chair, Zoning Chair, and Treasurer;

2. Prepare the agenda of regular meetings; plan the direction and scope of Commission activities;

3. Review finances and policies.

### b) Planning & Development Committee

1. Review & recommend long-range plans for the North Linden Area;

2. Investigate funding for implementation of such plans;

3. Develop methods for involving the citizens in such planning;

4. Maintain planning files.

#### c) Zoning Committee

Receive, review and make recommendations concerning applications for rezoning, zoning variances, demolitions and special permits for property located in the area.

### d) Community Engagement Committee

- 1. Review social and recreation services in the area and take appropriate action to improve or maintain them;
- 2. Monitor consumer business relations in the area;
- 3. Initiate, coordinate or assist at community-wide events;

Work to develop a community identity;

5. Work to improve the quality of life for all our residents;

6. Publicize the North Linden Area Commission as a community resource.

## e) Health & Safety Committee

1. Coordinate and/or initiate efforts to reduce crime in the community. Work with other groups as desired;

2. Initiate and/or help with efforts to maintain a clean community;

3. Initiate and/or assist with efforts to control conditions which interfere with the health of residents.

#### 4. Sub-committee - Code Enforcement

 Report known code violations in the North Linden Area Commission area to the appropriate Code Enforcement officer of the City of Columbus;

b. Become knowledgeable about code enforcement problems in the community and make constructive suggestions about remedying them; and

c. The Committee may undertake programs to educate the community about code enforcement issues.

## f) Job Creation and Workforce Development

1. Providing opportunities for entrepreneurship;

2. Partnering with businesses to offer employment.

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- 3. Sub-Committee Education
  - a. Linking business owners and educators;
  - b. Promoting training for employees.

#### g) Transportation Committee

Initiate and/or assist with efforts to alleviate vehicular traffic problems in the community

#### ARTICLE VII. CODE OF CONDUCT

Commissioners have an obligation to limit comments from litigious content that jeopardizes the NLAC. If comments are deemed harmful, by the NLAC, to any member of the Public and/or the NLAC, then the offending Commissioner must issue a public statement for the record at the subsequent NLAC meeting. This statement must include reference to the offense and indicate that her/his opinions and comments were personal and had no bearing on the NLAC.

#### **ARTICLE VIII. AMENDMENTS**

**Section 1.** A proposed amendment to these Bylaws shall be submitted in writing by any Commission member at any regular meeting.

- a) The proposed amendment shall first be read at the regular meeting when submitted and again at the next two (2) regular meetings following. The proposed amendment shall be voted on after the reading at the third regular meeting.
- b) With a unanimous vote of the Commission members present at the first reading, the proposed amendment may be voted on at the next regular meeting.
- c) Adoption of the proposed amendment shall be by a two-thirds majority vote of the entire Commission.

**Section 2.** In accordance with Chapter 3109 of the Columbus City Code, the approved amendment shall be filed immediately with the Department of Neighborhoods after its adoption. Such amendment shall take effect thirty (30) days after publication in the City Bulletin.

These results will be submitted the following month after sample collection and shall be used for extra strength billing for bypasses occurring for three (3) hours or more.

# SECTION III SCHEDULE OF COMPLIANCE

- A The Industrial User shall maintain a Slug Control Plan in accordance with 40 CFR 403.8,f,2,vi and Permit Standard Conditions, Section II, (H).
- B For billing purposes, all valid samples taken at Sample Site 001 during a calendar month will be averaged for BOD5, TKN and TSS. Extra strength will be calculated using these averages and the total monthly flow discharged.

If bypass occurs during a sampling day, that sample will be invalidated. For bypasses occurring for three (3) hours or more, the start and end times and total flow of the bypass shall be noted on the SMDR.

Industrial User shall collect and analyze four days of composite samples at the influent to pretreatment (Sample Site 005) for BOD5, TKN and TSS semi-annually in the months of April and October. These results will be submitted the following month after sample collection and shall be used for extra strength billing for bypasses occurring for three (3) hours or more.

- C For the purposes of this Permit, a "bypass" is any period of bypass, which occurs continuously without interruption for at least three hours or more. Examples of authorized bypasses include the following as allowed by Standard Conditions, Section II. (L), (3) and (5) of this permit and Columbus City Code Chapter 1145.34 (E).
  - 1. Temporary overflow or bypass due to blockage of the bar screen at the BERS lift station;
  - 2. Temporary lift station high temperature to protect the integrity of the BERS force main;
  - 3. Temporary loss of two of the three lift station pumps due to mechanical problems;
  - 4. Temporary EQ tank high temperature to protect the integrity of the BERS anaerobes in the reactors;
  - 5. Temporary EQ tank high pH to protect the integrity of the BERS anaerobes in the reactors;
  - 6. Temporary power outages that result in all or part of BERS outage;
  - 7. Twice per calendar year for maintenance of the BERS system with 33% bypass (one reactor out of service). The facility is to provide the City of Columbus fourteen (14) days notice prior to bypassing BERS for this maintenance purpose. The facility is to make the notification by telephone to the Pretreatment Offices at 645-0365 at least fourteen (14) days prior to bypass and provide written notification to the City within two (2) working days following verbal notification. Loading Limits will be suspended during scheduled 33% bypass with one reactor out of service.

With exception of (C) 7 above, any bypass occurring for three (3) hours or more shall be reported to the Southerly WWTP by telephone at 614-645-3990 (leave voicemail if not answered) and the Pretreatment Offices by telephone at 645-0365 or email at pretreatment@columbus.gov within twenty-four (24) hours of occurrence. This notification shall give the reason for the bypass, and the start date and time.

The Industrial User shall notify the Pretreatment Offices by email address pretreatment@columbus.gov only, within twenty-four (24) hours of the end of any bypass. This notification shall give the end date and time and the total flow of the bypass.

- D The Industrial User shall provide the Pretreatment Office with copies of all correspondence and monitoring data submitted to and received from the Ohio EPA that is associated with NPDES Industrial Stormwater Permit requirements. This shall include but not be limited to: NPDES permits; No Exposure Certification, and; required sampling and analysis reports.
- E Industrial User will collect a one day composite sample at Sample Site 001 and analyze for Arsenic,
  Cadmium, Chromium, Copper, (Cyanide to be collected as grab sample), Lead, Mercury, Nickel, Selenium,
  Silver and Zinc in the month of March. These results will be submitted by the end of April each year.

# SECTION I: DEFINITIONS

All terms in the permit shall be defined as in Columbus City Code Chapter 1145 except as defined in this section.

- (A) "Approved Laboratory Procedures" means the measurements, tests, and analyses of characteristics of water and wastes in accordance with analytical Federal guidelines as established in Title 40, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 136; or when none exists, as required by, or approved by, the regional Administrator of the United States Environmental Protection Agency; or when none exists, by the State of Ohio, or the Director.
- (B) "Bypass" means the intentional diversion of waste streams from any portion of an Industrial User's treatment facility.
- (C) "Compliance Schedule" means a detailing of the time increments and accomplishment milestones equaling the shortest total time required for the Industrial User to reach compliance with Categorical Pretreatment Standards and/or Discharge Standards pursuant to Columbus City Code Chapter (CCC) 1145 as issued by Director's Order or as contained in the permit.
- (D) "Composite Sample" is a sample consisting of multiple aliquots taken over a period of time from the same source and intended to represent the "average" character of the source, as defined in Columbus City Code Chapter 1145.02.017
- (E) "Director" means the Director of the Department of Public Utilities, City of Columbus, or designee.
- (F) "Director's Regulations" are the Regulations promulgated pursuant to Columbus City Code Chapter 1145 to direct and control the discharge of wastewater to the Columbus Sewerage System.
- (G) DOSD" is the Division of Sewerage and Drainage for the City of Columbus.
- (H) "Federal Categorical Industry" is any User subject to Categorical Pretreatment Standards by USEPA in accordance with Section 307 (b) and/or (c) of the Clean Water Act.
- (I) "Flow-Proportioned Composite Sampling" means sampling performed in conjunction with a flow measurement device that collects sample aliquots in proportion to flow increments discharged during the sampling period.
- (J) "Good Faith Effort" is measured against the following standard: Industry is required under the Clean Water Act to take extraordinary efforts to comply. This means that business-as-usual is not enough. Prompt, vigorous, and in many cases, expensive pollution control measures must be initiated and completed as promptly as possible.
- (K) "Grab Sample" means one discrete sample collected from one source and at one point in time.
- (L) "Industrial User" means the User permitted to discharge wastewater to the DOSD sewerage system.
- (M) "Industrial Wastewater" means any combination of liquid and water-carried wastes discharged from any industrial or commercial establishment resulting from any trade or process carried on in that establishment. This includes the wastewater from pretreatment facilities and polluted cooling water.
- (N) "Milestone Date" is the final date for completion of a required item as specified in a compliance schedule.
- (O) "Monitoring Site" means a site accessible to the City for the collection of samples and/or flow data, and/or other parameters representative of the user's discharge to the POTW.
- (P) "O&M" means Operation and Maintenance manual for the wastewater treatment system.
- (Q) "Operating Day" is the portion of the day when the Industrial User is actively producing goods and services in a manner that would be considered representative of its' normal activity.

- (R) "Person" means any individual, partnership, co-partnership, firm, company, corporation, association, joint stock company, trust, estate, governmental entity, or any other legal entity, or the legal representatives, agents or assigns of such entity or individual.
- (S) "POTW" or "Publicly Owned Treatment Works" means a treatment works as defined by Section 212 of the Clean Water Act, which is owned by the City. This definition includes any devices and systems used in the storage, treatment, recycling and reclamation of municipal sewage or industrial wastes of a liquid nature, including sewers, pipes and other conveyances that convey wastewater to a POTW Treatment Plant.
- (T) "PTI (Permit-to-Install) Application" means an application to OEPA and the Pretreatment Office for permission to install equipment to treat the Industrial User's wastewater prior to discharge to the DOSD sewerage system and includes detailed engineering plans, engineering design report and basis for design and operation with all supportive data, calculations, equipment and appurtenances relevant to the wastewater treatment system.
- (U) "Pretreatment Office" means:

- (V) "Quarterly" shall mean the normal calendar period defined by January March; April June; July September; October December.
- (W) "Quarterly Report" shall mean any report due by the close of business on the last business day of the month following the end of the calendar quarter.
- (X) "Remedial Action Plan (RAP)" is a formal, written plan submitted by the Industrial User to the Pretreatment Program Manager within ten (10) days of receipt of a Notification of Violation. The RAP must state the steps the Industrial User will undertake to correct the violation and identify measures to prevent future noncompliance with the provisions of CCC Chapter 1145, subsequent regulations and Director's Orders.
- (Y) "Reporting Code" is a number used by the Pretreatment Office to identify reported data. The reporting code does not imply the type of analysis used, nor the sampling techniques employed. This code will be utilized to identify analytical data the Industrial User is required to submit to the Pretreatment Office.
- (Z) "Self-Monitoring" is collecting and analyzing samples taken by the Industrial User or its designee.
- (AA) "Self-Monitoring Reporting Period" is the period of time defined by the permit in which the Self-Monitoring must be performed and reported pursuant to CCC Chapter 1145 and subsequent Director's Regulations.
- (BB) "Sewer Use Ordinance" is the CCC Chapter 1145 and pursuant regulations, which controls discharges to the Columbus Sewerage System.
- (CC) "Slug" is any pollutant, including oxygen-demanding pollutants (BOD etc.) released by a User to the POTW at a flow rate and/or pollutant concentration, which may cause interference with the POTW, or any damage to POTW treatment processes, or pass-through the POTW and damage the environment or contaminate resultant sludges.
- (DD) "Time Proportioned Composite Sampling" means sampling performed over a prescribed period with collection of similar sized aliquots at a specific, timed frequency.

### OTHER REQUIREMENTS SECTION II:

#### REPORTING (A)

- All data required shall be reported on forms supplied by the Pretreatment Office and submitted as required in Section II: Monitoring Requirements, and/or Section III: Schedule of Compliance, of the permit. Unless otherwise specified in the Permit, all required monitoring reports are to be received at the Pretreatment Office no later than the last business day, close of business, of the month following the month of sample collection. The original copy of the Report form shall be signed in accordance with Columbus City Code (CCC) Chapter 1145.59 (A).
- If the Industrial User monitors any pollutant at the location(s) designated in the permit more frequently than required, and uses approved laboratory procedures as specified in the Definitions section, results of such monitoring shall be included in the calculation and reporting of all values required in report(s) specified above.
- Analyses of pollutants not required by the permit need not be reported to the Pretreatment Office, but records (3)shall be retained as specified in Standard Conditions, Section II: Other Requirements, Item D.
- The Industrial User shall notify the Pretreatment Office by telephone at (614) 645-5876, or if no answer at (4)(614) 645-7102, immediately upon becoming aware of any accidental spill or slug discharge to the sewer, as specified in CCC Chapter 1145.56.
- The Industrial User must notify the Director of any significant changes to the user's operations or system which might alter the nature, quality, or volume of its wastewater at least ten (10) business days before the change. Significant change shall mean a change in either discharge flow or mass of pollutants of more than fifteen percent (15%) above or below a user's current daily average flow or mass. a) The Director may require the user to submit such information as may be deemed necessary to evaluate the

changed condition, including submission of a wastewater discharge permit application under Section 1145.41

of this chapter.

- b) The Director may modify an existing wastewater discharge permit under Section 1145.44 (E) of this chapter in response to changed conditions or anticipated changed conditions.
- The Industrial User shall comply with all reporting requirements and conditions of CCC Chapter 1145.30 as (6)pertaining to upsets to, or accidental discharges from, its pretreatment facility.
- When applicable, not later than fourteen (14) days following each milestone date in any Remedial Action Plan (RAP) or Compliance Schedule, the Industrial User shall submit a progress report to the Pretreatment Office. This report must certify the completion of the increment of progress required at this milestone date. If the Industrial User is unable to complete the required increment of progress, the progress report must indicate the reason(s) that are beyond the Industrial User's control that caused the failure, and what measures are being taken by the Industrial User to return to the established schedule.
- All reports shall be submitted to the address specified in Section I: Definitions, Item U. (8)
- The Industrial User shall comply with all reporting requirements in CCC Chapter 1145.50 1145.59 and (9)pursuant Regulations.
- (10) An Industrial User subject to Categorical Pretreatment Standards may apply for a waiver from monitoring a pollutant neither present nor expected to be present in the discharge in accordance with CCC Chapter 1145.54 (B).
- (11) The Industrial User shall notify the Pretreatment Program Manager within twenty-four (24) hours of becoming aware of any violation discovered by Self-Monitoring. As applicable, the Industrial User shall perform an additional four (4) days of sampling and analysis for the parameters in violation, in accordance with CCC Chapter 1145.58. If applicable, these reports shall be submitted in accordance with Item 1, above.
- The Industrial User shall maintain compliance with all conditions and requirements of CCC Chapter 1145, pursuant Regulations, the permit and Director's Orders at all times.

### SAMPLING AND ANALYTICAL METHODS (B)

Samples and measurements taken as required herein shall be representative of the volume and nature of the monitored flow. Test procedures for the analysis of pollutants are specified in Title 40, Code Federal Regulation, Part 136 (40 CFR 136), "Test Procedures for the Analysis of Pollutants" unless other test procedures have been specified in the permit, or by Director's Orders, or in CCC Chapter 1145. The Industrial User shall calibrate and perform maintenance procedures on all monitoring and analytical instrumentation as needed, but in no case less than a minimum of once per year. The Industrial User is responsible for retaining records of said calibration(s) for the review of Division of Sewerage and Drainage (DOSD) according to provisions set forth in Standard Conditions, Section II: Other Requirements, Item D.

# RECORDING OF RESULTS

For each measurement or sample taken pursuant to the requirements of the permit, the Industrial User shall record the following information:

- the exact place, Source/Reporting Code (if applicable), date, and time of sampling; (1)
- the person(s) who performed the sampling and the analyses; (2)
- the date(s) the analyses were performed on those samples; (3)
- the results of all required analyses; (4)
- the analytical techniques or procedures used.

### RECORDS RETENTION (D)

- The Industrial User shall retain and preserve for no less than three (3) years, any records, books, documents, memoranda, reports, correspondence and all summaries thereof, related to monitoring, sampling and chemical analysis made by, or on behalf of the Industrial User in connection with its discharge and shall comply with all requirements of CCC Chapter 1145.66.
- All records that pertain to matters that are the subject of the permit, or any other enforcement or litigation activities brought by Division of Sewerage and Drainage (DOSD), shall be retained and preserved by the Industrial User for no less than three (3) years.
- Records shall include but not necessarily be limited to:
  - all sampling and analytical records (including internal sampling data not reported and data collected from other than approved laboratory procedures); all original recordings for any continuous monitoring instrumentation;
  - b) all instrumentation calibration and maintenance records;
  - c) all plant operation and maintenance records; d)
  - all reports required by the permit; e)
  - records of all data used to complete the application for the permit.

### DUTY TO PROVIDE INFORMATION (E)

The Industrial User shall furnish to the Pretreatment Program Manager, within a reasonable time as determined by the Pretreatment Program Manager, any information which may be requested to determine whether cause exists for modifying, revoking and reissuing, or terminating the permit, or to determine compliance with the permit. The Industrial User shall also furnish to the Pretreatment Program Manager, upon request, copies of records required to be kept by Standard Conditions, Section II: Other Requirements, Item D.

### CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION (F)

Except for data determined to be confidential under CCC Chapter 1145, all reports required and prepared in accordance with the permit will be available for public inspection at the Pretreatment Office.

### FACILITY OPERATION AND QUALITY CONTROL (G)

- At all times, the Industrial User shall maintain in good working order and operate as efficiently as possible, all treatment or control facilities, or systems installed or used by the Industrial User necessary to achieve compliance with the terms and conditions of the permit. Proper operation and maintenance also includes adequate laboratory controls, appropriate quality assurance procedures, and the creation and maintenance of a comprehensive O&M manual for the wastewater treatment system to be kept on-site. This provision requires operating back-up or auxiliary facilities or similar systems when the operation is necessary to achieve compliance with conditions of the permit.
- The Industrial User shall effectively monitor the operation and efficiency of treatment and control facilities and (2)the quantity and quality of the treated discharge.
- Maintenance of wastewater treatment works that results in degradation of effluent quality shall be scheduled during non-critical water quality periods, and shall be carried out in a manner to minimize detrimental effects on the effluent, approved by DOSD as specified in Standard Conditions, Section II: Other Requirements, Item L.

### SLUG CONTROL PLANS (H)

A Slug Control Plan shall be maintained in accordance with 40 CFR 403.8 (f)(2)(vi), when required. A slug discharge is any discharge of a non-routine, episodic nature, including but not limited to an accidental spill or a noncustomary batch discharge. The plan shall contain, at minimum, the following elements:

- Description of discharge practices, including non-routine batch discharges; (1)
- Description of stored chemicals; (2)
- Procedures for immediately notifying the POTW of slug discharges, including any discharge that could violate (3)a prohibition under 40 CFR 403.5 (b), with procedures for follow-up written notification within five days;
- If necessary, procedures to prevent adverse impact from accidental spills, including inspection and (4)maintenance of storage areas, handling and transfer of materials, loading and unloading operations, control of plant site run-off, worker training, building of containment structures or equipment, measures for containing toxic organic pollutants (including solvents), and/or measures and equipment for emergency response.

# PROPER DISPOSAL OF PRETREATMENT SLUDGES AND SPENT CHEMICALS (1)

Disposal of sludges and spent chemicals generated by the Industrial User's pretreatment system shall be in accordance with Section 405 of the Clean Water Act, and Subtitles C and D of the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act. Records of the disposal method, location, quantity disposed, and analyses shall be made available to DOSD upon request.

#### AUTHORIZED DISCHARGES (J)

All discharges authorized shall be consistent with the terms and conditions of the Permit. The discharge of any pollutant identified in the Permit more frequently than, or at a level in excess of, but authorized by the Permit, shall constitute a violation of the terms and conditions of the Permit.

(1) Specific Pollutant Limits; Per CCC 1145.23, and Director's Rules and Regulations pursuant to CCC 1145.11, no user shall discharge any wastewater in excess of the following standards.

- (2) Mass limitations are available only to a User, discharging a combined total of less than ten thousand (10,000) gallons per day directly into a sanitary sewer, combined sewer and/or at a designated trucked waste disposal site by means of trucked waste haulers.
- (3) Mass limitations are not available to a user who is subject to National Categorical Pretreatment Standards.
- (4) Wastewater may also be sampled for billing purposes and assigned charges based on CCC 1145.02.031 and CCC-1147. Constituents sampled for billing purposes include 5-day Biochemical Oxygen Demand (BOD5), Total Suspended Solids (TSS) and Total Kjeldahl Nitrogen (TKN).

### UNAUTHORIZED DISCHARGES (K)

- The Industrial User shall not discharge any substance at any time that will cause interference with the operation of the sewer system, including interference with DOSD's use or disposal of resultant municipal sludges.
- The Industrial User shall not discharge any substance at any time that will pass through the POTW, or (2)otherwise be incompatible with treatment processes and alone or in conjunction with other substances cause harm to the receiving environment or cause violations of applicable water quality standards in the receiving stream.
- The Industrial User shall not at any time discharge any substance that will cause acute danger to City (3)employee health or safety.
- The Industrial User shall not at any time discharge any substance in any quantity that would constitute a slug (4)to the POTW.

#### BYPASSES (L)

- Bypassing or diverting wastewater from any process of the Industrial User's treatment system is prohibited (1)unless all of the following conditions are met:
  - bypass is unavoidable to prevent loss of life, personal injury or severe property damage; and a)
  - there was no feasible alternative to the bypass, such as the use of auxiliary treatment facilities, retention of untreated wastes, or maintenance during normal periods of downtime. This condition is not satisfied if adequate backup equipment should have been installed in the exercise of reasonable engineering judgment to prevent a bypass which occurred during normal periods of equipment downtime for preventive maintenance; and,
  - the Industrial User submitted notices as required under CCC Chapter 1145.33. C)
- If the Industrial User anticipates the need for a bypass, it shall submit prior notice to the Pretreatment Program Manager at least ten days in advance if possible, but in any case, as soon as, the Industrial User is (2)aware of the need for bypass.
- The Pretreatment Program Manager may approve an unanticipated bypass after considering its adverse effects, if the Pretreatment Program Manager determines that it will meet the conditions as listed in Item (1) (3)above.
- The Industrial User shall submit notice of any unanticipated bypass as required in CCC Chapter 1145.33 (A) (4)
- The Industrial User may allow any bypass to occur which does not cause effluent limitations to be exceeded if that bypass is for essential maintenance to assure efficient operation, and if that bypass is approved by the (5)Pretreatment Program Manger prior to its occurrence.

### DILUTION (M)

No Industrial User shall increase the use of potable or process water or, in any way, attempt to dilute a discharge as a partial or complete substitute for adequate treatment to achieve compliance with the limitations contained in the Permit.

## NONCOMPLIANCE NOTIFICATION (N)

- The Industrial User shall report by telephone the following immediately upon discovery to (1)(614) 645-5876 or if no answer to (614) 645-7102:
  - any noncompliance which may endanger the public health or the environment;
  - any unanticipated bypass, which exceeds any effluent limitation in the Permit; b)
  - any upset which exceeds any effluent limitation in the Permit; or, C)
  - any slug discharge or spill as specified in CCC Chapter 1145.32 d)
- The following information for these telephone reports must be provided: (2)
  - the time at which the discharge occurred, and the time it was discovered;
  - the approximate amount and the characteristics of the discharge; b)
  - the sewer affected by the discharge; c)
  - the circumstances, which created the discharge; d)
  - the name(s) and telephone number(s) of the persons who have knowledge of these circumstances; e)
  - what remedial steps are being taken; and, f)
  - the name(s) and telephone number(s) of the persons responsible for such remedial steps. g)

- (3) These telephone reports shall be confirmed in writing within five (5) days of the discharge, and submitted to the Pretreatment Office. The report shall include the following:
  - a) the limitation(s) which has been exceeded;
  - b) the extent that the limit(s) was exceeded;
  - c) what caused the limit(s) to be exceeded;
  - d) the exact date(s) and time(s) that the limit(s) was exceeded;
  - e) if uncorrected, the anticipated length of time that the limit(s) will be exceeded; and,
  - f) steps being taken to reduce, eliminate, and prevent recurrence of the limits being exceeded.
  - g) within thirty days of discovery of the occurrence, the wastestream must be reanalyzed by the Industrial User and the report must be submitted in accordance with Section II: Other Requirements, Item A (1).
- (4) If the Industrial User is unable to meet any date for achieving an event, as specified in a Schedule of Compliance, the Industrial User shall submit a written report to the offices of DOSD within fourteen (14) days of becoming aware of such situation. The report shall provide the following:
  - a) the compliance milestone which has not been, or will not be, met;
  - b) the cause of the failure to meet milestone date;
  - c) the remedial action being taken;
  - d) the probable date by which compliance will occur; and,
  - e) the probability of meeting subsequent and final compliance schedules.
- (5) If the Industrial User becomes aware that it failed to submit any relevant facts in a Permit application, or submitted incorrect information in a Permit application, or in any report to the Pretreatment Office or the Director, it shall submit such facts or information within ten (10) days of discovering the error or omission.
- (6) Industries with production-based limits are required to report any substantial changes in production within two days after the Industrial User has a reasonable basis to predict the changes.

# (O) <u>DISCHARGE CHANGES</u>

The following changes must be reported to the Pretreatment Office as soon as practicable:

- (1) Any significant change in characteristics of the discharge which the Industrial User knows, or has reason to believe has occurred, or which will occur, which would constitute cause for modification or revocation and reissuance of the permit. The Industrial User shall notify the Pretreatment Program Manager in advance of any planned changes in the facility, or activity, which may result in noncompliance with Permit requirements. Notification of Permit changes or anticipated noncompliance does not stay any Permit condition.
- (2) Any proposed facility expansions, production increases, or process modifications, which will result in new, different, or increased discharges of pollutants. Following this notice, modifications to the Permit may be made to reflect any necessary changes in the Permit conditions, including any necessary effluent limitations for any pollutants not identified and limited herein by the Director as deemed appropriate.

#### RIGHT OF ENTRY (P)

The Industrial User shall comply with all requirements and conditions of CCC Chapter 1145.60 and pursuant Regulations regarding right of entry. The Industrial User shall allow DOSD representatives access to the premises of the Industrial User for the purposes of inspection, sampling, or records inspection as delineated below:

- Enter the premises where wastewater is generated or discharged or where the Industrial User's treatment process is located, or where records are kept pursuant to the conditions of the permit.
- Have access to, and copy, at reasonable times, any records that are kept under the conditions of the permit. (2)The Industrial User shall provide copies of all requested records.
- Inspect at reasonable times, any facilities, equipment (including monitoring and control equipment), practices, (3)or operations regulated or required under the permit.
- Sample or monitor, at reasonable times, for the purposes of assuring Permit compliance or as otherwise authorized by the Clean Water Act, any substances or parameters at any location.

### REVOCATION OF PERMIT (Q)

The permit may be revoked in accordance with provisions of CCC Chapter 1145.47 and pursuant Director's Regulations.

### LIMITATION ON PERMIT TRANSFER (R)

The Wastewater Discharge Permit is nontransferable without prior notification to the City of Columbus in accordance with CCC Chapter 1145.13 and provisions for furnishing the new owner or operator with a copy of the existing wastewater discharge permit.

# FALSIFYING INFORMATION OR TAMPERING WITH MONITORING EQUIPMENT (S)

Knowingly making any false statement on any report or other document required by the permit, or knowingly rendering any monitoring device or method inaccurate is illegal and forbidden. Penalties for violations will be under criminal laws of the City, as well as, being subject to civil penalties and revocation of the permit.

### MODIFICATION OR REVISION OF THE PERMIT (T)

- The terms and conditions of the Permit may be subject to modification by the City at any time as limitations or (1)requirements, as identified in the City's Ordinances, are modified or other just cause exists.
- The permit may also be modified to incorporate special conditions resulting from the issuance of a Director's (2)Order.
- The terms and conditions of the permit may be modified as a result of United States EPA promulgating a new Federal Pretreatment Standard or Ohio EPA regulation changes.

### DUTY TO REAPPLY (U)

The Industrial User shall apply for reissuance of the permit at least ninety (90) days but not more than one-hundred, twenty (120) days prior to the expiration of the permit.

# (V) SEVERABILITY

The provisions of the permit are severable, and if any provision of the permit, or the application of any provision of the permit to any circumstance, is held invalid, the application of such provision to other circumstances, and the remainder of the permit shall not be affected thereby.

# (W) PROPERTY RIGHTS

The issuance of the permit does not convey any property rights in either real or personal property, or any exclusive privileges, nor does it authorize any invasion of personal rights, nor any infringement of federal, state or City regulations.

# SECTION III: PENALTIES

Any violation of the conditions of the permit, including but not limited to:

- Violations of discharge standards,
- 2) Violations of sampling and/or reporting requirements,
- 3) And violations of any schedule,

shall be a violation of CCC Chapter 1145 and will subject the violator to a variety of sanctions and penalties. The sanctions and penalties include, but are not limited to:

- 1) formal notification of the violation and inclusion in the violator's file at the Pretreatment Office;
- administrative fines up to \$5,000 per day per violation;
- 3) recovery of costs and damages incurred by the City and fines levied against the City;
- 4) requirement for the violator to obtain a performance bond and/or liability insurance;
- 5) Director's Consent, Compliance, and/or Cease and Desist Orders;
- 6) publication of the violator and conditions of the violation in the Columbus Dispatch;
- declaration of the violator to be a Public Nuisance;
- revocation of violator's eligibility to receive contractual awards for the sale of goods and services to the City of Columbus;
- 9) civil penalties of up to \$25,000 per day per violation;
- 10) revocation of the permit;
- 11) termination of sewer service; and/or
- criminal penalties; Any Industrial User who recklessly violates CCC Chapter 1145 may be fined an amount not to exceed \$5,000 or imprisonment for not more than six (6) months or both.
