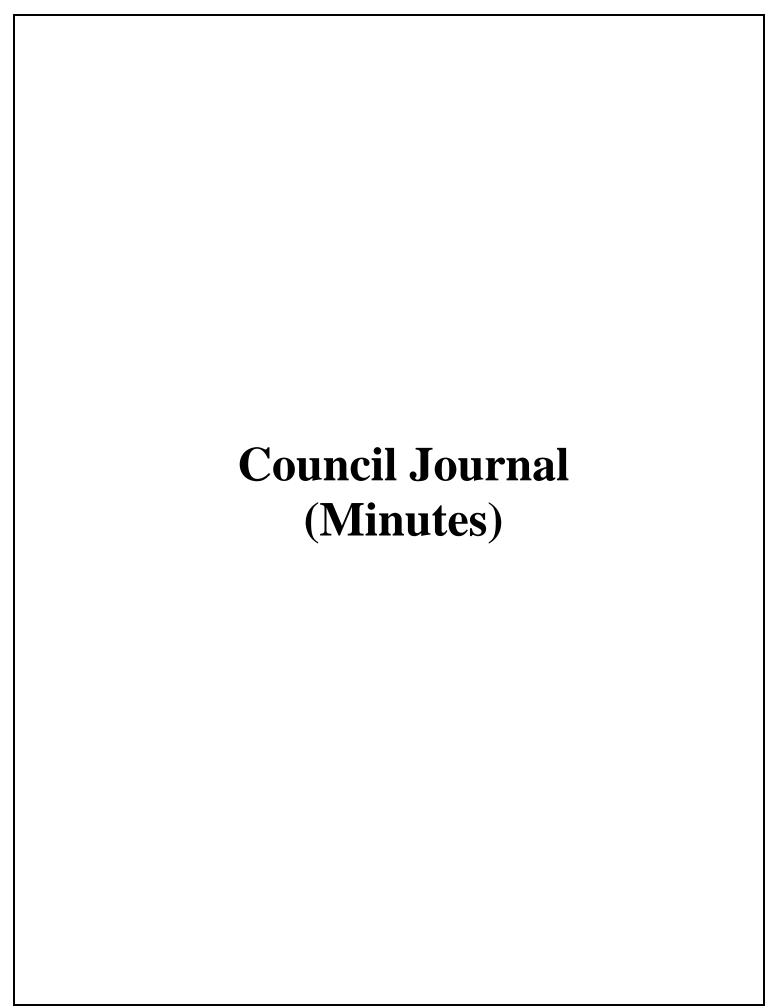


#### SIGNING OF LEGISLATION

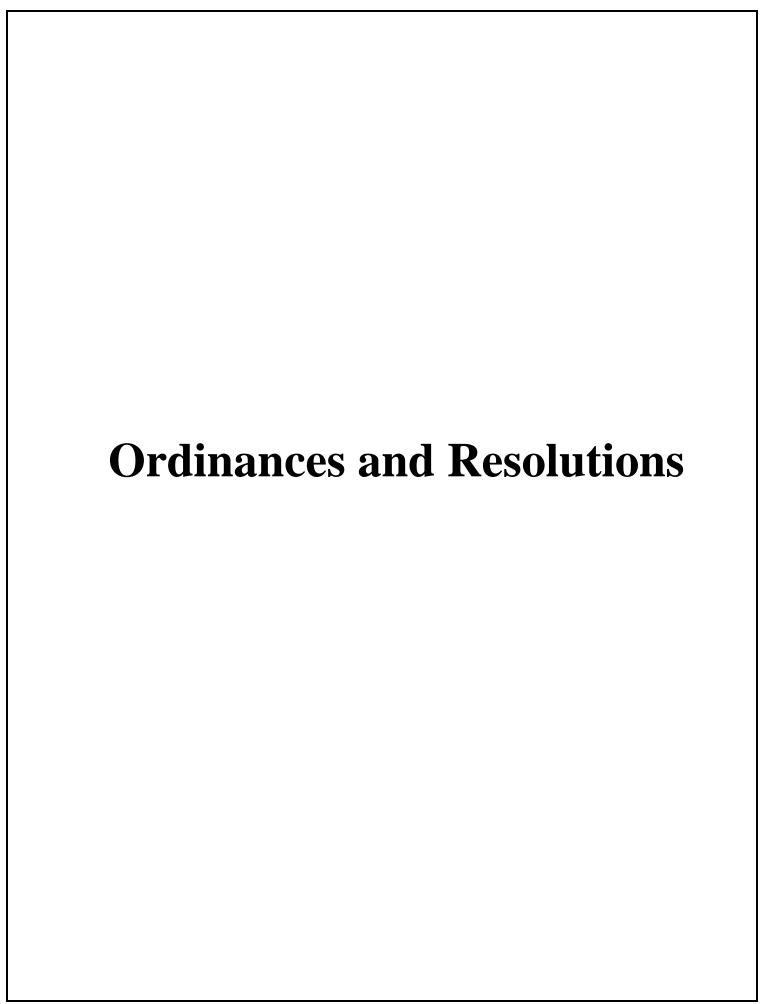

BACKGROUND: The City's Department of Public Utilities ("DPU") is performing the Fountain Square Stormwater Improvements Project, Project No. 610050-100000 ("Public Project"). The City must acquire certain fee simple title and lesser real estate located in the vicinity of Morse Road and Cleveland Avenue (collectively, "Real Estate") in order for DPU to timely complete the Public Project. The City passed Ordinance Number 1874-2016 authorizing the City Attorney to acquire the Real Estate. Accordingly, the City intends to appropriate and accept the Real Estate in the event the City Attorney is unable to (i) locate the owners of the Real Estate, or (ii) agree with the owners of the Real Estate in good faith regarding the amount of just compensation.

Columbus and Central Ohio are growing. The city and its partners are working to embrace the opportunities of growth, while also addressing the challenges it brings. Zoning is one of the most effective tools cities can use to manage change. It influences where we live, where we work, and how we get around. A 2021 assessment found that the current Columbus zoning code does not support our community's aspiration to be an equitable, thriving city. Built around dated ideas of what people and businesses want, the current code inhibits the creation of much-needed housing and transit-supportive development. It is difficult to use, creating a heavy reliance on project-by-project negotiations, variances, and rezonings to accommodate even simple projects.

In response, Columbus embarked on the Zone In Initiative, the first comprehensive update of its zoning code in 70 years. The goal of Zone In is to create a more effective, equitable, and sustainable framework for guiding land use, development, and growth. City staff from the departments of Building and Zoning Services and Development worked with consultant teams focused on code development, led by Lisa Wise Inc., and community engagement, led by RAMA Consulting.

The process also benefited from the active engagement of the Zone In Advisory Committee, which began its work in November 2022 with a charge from Mayor Ginther. Their mission was to help shape a comprehensive, community-responsive update fostering equitable opportunities for all Columbus residents. A total of twelve meetings were held. Summaries and presentations were posted on the Zone In project website. Topics of discussion included public engagement strategies, project background and technical analysis, housing, parking, development capacity, corridor selection and prioritization, place type analysis and zoning code elements. Members provided a diverse cross-section of expertise in community issues, zoning, development, and equity disparities.

While modernized zoning is needed throughout Columbus, data, policy, and public input all tell us that our corridors are the best place to start. As outlined in the report "Where Do We Begin," Phase One of the Zone In Initiative focuses on 140 miles of these "Main Streets" like West Broad Street, East Main Street, Morse Road, and commercial nodes like The Continent and the Eastland Mall site. These areas have the greatest development capacity to deliver the housing, mobility, and employment opportunities our community needs in ways that are economically and environmentally sustainable.

On October 9, 2023, City Council passed Resolution #0179X-2023, wherein Council resolved to adopt and

support the overall Zone In project goals and Phase One priorities, which focused on housing, mobility, urban design, equity, and local business. The resolution further directed the Project Team to apply the goals and priorities in the development of recommendations for updated zoning during phase one of the effort. The goals and priorities drew on extensive community engagement, technical analysis, adopted land use plans and larger efforts such as the Columbus Housing Strategy, LinkUS and the Climate Action Plan.

As the work of Zone In unfolded, a priority was that everyone, especially those who had not had their voices heard before, got a chance to weigh in and help shape the new code. Residents, businesses, property owners, community groups, and others were able to follow the effort and share their thoughts as new zoning strategies were formulated. Thousands of people engaged through one-on-one conversations, workshops, community presentations, a digital survey, webinars, and social media. Over five thousand written comments were received, over 100 presentations were made to community groups, and 15 community events were hosted throughout the City. A total of 6,602 completed surveys were received, the project website saw 27,400 unique visits, and 78,000 postcards were mailed to property owners and renters along the corridor.

On March 25, 2024, City Council adopted Ordinance #0830-2024, which amended Chapter 3310 and outlined the plan to create a new Title 34 of the Columbus City Codes. Designated for the new 2024 Zoning Code, Title 34 will work in conjunction with the existing Title 33 Zoning Code. The ordinance also codified the process to rezone properties from Title 33 zoning districts to Title 34 zoning districts. This guidance is critical given the unique nature and scale of the Zone In Initiative. This resolution responds to the process enacted pursuant to Ordinance #0830-2024.

On April 4, 2024, Mayor Andrew Ginther presented, for City Council's consideration, the Zone In Columbus Phase One proposal to enact provisions of the 2024 Zoning Code. Based on adopted neighborhood and area plans, citywide policy priorities, and two years of technical analysis and engagement with thousands of residents, the proposal shows how we could create new mixed-use zoning along Columbus' busiest streets. Each district includes rules and standards for such things as land use, building height and setbacks, and form-based design elements. The code includes a height bonus for projects committing to affordability and allows for market-driven parking solutions. Additional code elements outline site development standards, such as street layout, screening, and lighting.

The Zone In Phase One proposal provided to Council includes a draft of Title 34, the 2024 Zoning Code, as well as maps and a parcel list depicting allocation of approximately 12,300 parcels of land to the new mixed use zoning districts. Supporting documentation includes an overview of the proposal as well as summaries of the engagement and technical processes.

With passage of this resolution, City Council states is intention to rezone identified parcels to the mixed-use zoning districts. This action initiates a 60-day public review process outlined in Ordinance #0830-2024. During this period, Area Commissions, the Historic Resources Commission, the Development Commission, and other applicable reviewing bodies will be provided with the Zone In Phase One proposal and supporting documentation. The proposal will be made available to the general public on the project website, and featured in an interactive Zone In Gallery space at 141 North Front Street. Mailing of notices to owners of impacted properties and owners of property within 125' of impacted properties will coincide with the review period. City Council will hold two or more public meetings during the comment period and an additional meeting at its conclusion to consider comments received prior to any further action.

**EMERGENCY DESIGNATION**: This resolution is being considered for emergency action in order to allow

community review and comment on the draft Zone In Initiative Phase One proposal to proceed without delay. Emergency consideration responds to the significant interest this initiative has generated and the need to pursue solutions to the housing crisis currently facing Central Ohio.

To declare this Council's intention to amend the Zoning Map by rezoning certain properties from Title 33 Zoning Code district designations to new Title 34 2024 Zoning Code district designations, and to declare an emergency.

WHEREAS, a 2021 assessment found that the current Columbus zoning code inhibits the creation of much-needed housing and transit-supportive development, is difficult to use and creates a heavy reliance on project-by-project negotiations; and

WHEREAS, Columbus embarked on the Zone In initiative with the goal of creating a more effective, equitable, and sustainable framework for guiding land use, development, and growth; and

WHEREAS, City staff from the departments of Building and Zoning Services and Development worked with Lisa Wise Inc. and RAMA Consulting to undertake the first phase of the Zone In Initiative; and

WHEREAS, the Zone In Advisory Committee was formed and met throughout the process, with members providing valuable advice and a diverse cross-section of expertise in community issues, zoning, development, and equity disparities; and

WHEREAS, the first phase of Zone In focuses on the city's "main streets" due to their capacity to deliver the housing, mobility, and employment opportunities our community needs in ways that are economically and environmentally sustainable; and

## 1. BACKGROUND

This ordinance authorizes the Director of Finance and Management, on behalf of the Department of Public Utilities, to enter into a contract with Elford, Inc. for the purchase of used trailers in an amount up to \$499,000.00.

City Council approved awarding the construction contract for the Water Quality Assurance Lab Renovations project, CIP #690515-100000, to Elford, Inc. (hereafter referred to as "Elford") via Ordinance #0339-2022, passed by City Council on 2/28/22. As part of this project, it was necessary to establish a temporary laboratory

facility to allow the Water Testing Lab to continue its work and for the Division of Water (DOW) to maintain compliance with regulatory requirements for testing while the permanent lab was being renovated. The temporary lab consists of a triple-wide office trailer, a restroom trailer, and three sets of double-wide modular lab trailers. The DOW has identified several potential secondary beneficial uses for these trailers to serve as office and lab spaces beyond the duration of the current project, including as temporary offices while the 910 Dublin Road office facility is renovated. The trailer complex readily provides the available space for these uses without the need for additional costly capital renovations elsewhere.

Now that the Water Quality Assurance Lab Renovations project is nearly completed, Elford does not have further use of the trailers. As part of the contract, Elford will have to pay to have the trailers removed and to restore the land to its original condition. Elford would then have to find a buyer for the trailers or otherwise dispose of them. Elford is willing to sell the trailers to the DOW to avoid these costs.

# 1.1. Amount of funds to be expended: \$499,000.00

Purchase Used Trailers \$499,000.00

# 1.2. How the cost was determined:

The Division of Water performed a cost benefit analysis on the purchase of new trailers versus used trailers. By researching the median cost of used trailers it was determined the amount Elford was requesting for the used trailers was fair. The DOW then negotiated with Elford to reduce the purchase price.

# 2. WAIVER OF COMPETITIVE BID REQUIREMENTS REQUESTED

A waiver of the competitive bid requirements of Columbus City Code Chapter 329 is requested as these are used trailers already configured for use as office and laboratory space and already in place on Department of Public Utilities property.

# 3. CONTRACT COMPLIANCE INFORMATION

Elford's contract compliance number is CC006059 and expires 12/28/2025.

# 4. FISCAL IMPACT

Funding is available for this expenditure in the Water PayGo Fund, Fund 6016. An amendment to the 2023 Capital Improvement Budget is needed to align budget authority with the proper project. A transfer of cash between projects within Fund 6016 is needed to align cash with the proper project, then the funds will need to be appropriated.

To authorize the Director of the Department of Finance and Management, on behalf of the Department of Public Utilities, to enter into a contract with Elford, Inc. for the purchase of used trailers; to authorize an amendment to the 2023 Capital Improvement Budget; to authorize the transfer of cash between projects within the Water PayGo Fund; to appropriate funds within the Water PayGo Fund; to waive the competitive bidding requirements of Columbus City Code; and to authorize the expenditure of up to \$499,000.00 from the Water PayGo Fund for the contract. (\$499,000.00)

WHEREAS, the Department of Public Utilities is engaged in the Water Quality Assurance Lab Renovations project; and

BACKGROUND: This ordinance authorizes the Public Safety Director to enter into contract with Leads Online LLC for continued access to the company's Automated Scrap Materials and Used Goods Transaction Information Management System. Residential and commercial burglaries, theft of motor vehicles, motor vehicle parts and various types of metal materials that have value as scrap metal are a significant problem for law enforcement agencies, contractors and builders, utility providers, business owners, home owners, and the residents of Columbus. This system allows for an online electronic reporting system for all pawnshop, secondhand, and scrap metal dealers in Columbus and nationwide access to pawn/secondhand transaction information, reports, and searches. The company maintains records from all participants operating as licensed scrap metal facilities located in the continental United States and makes the information available to the Columbus Division of Police for investigative searches of stolen goods, especially scrap metal.

Ordinance 0441-2007, passed in July 2007, amended Columbus City Codes to provide licensing and regulation of scrap metal dealers and ensures that motor vehicles and metal sold as scrap are legitimately owned by the seller. The City entered into contract with LeadsOnline, LLC on November 17, 2008, pursuant to Ordinance No. 1723-2008 for this service.

**Bid Information:** The City of Columbus first contracted with this vendor through the competitive RFP process. The contract was approved through ordinance 1723-2008 for access to this database and has continuously been in use since. This technology was a key effort in the City seminal effort to curb the scrap metal thefts within

the City. This vital database is a valuable tool for investigators and is now used throughout Central Ohio, the State of Ohio, and around the nation. The Division of Police requests a bid waiver to continue services with this vendor.

**Background:** This ordinance authorizes the Director of the Recreation and Parks Department to enter into a grant agreement with the State of Ohio, Department of Development, Office of Energy and Environment (OEE) for the Blackburn Park and Alum Industrial Energy Efficiency Grant Project. This ordinance will also authorize the appropriation of the grant in the amount of \$156,193.00.

The State of Ohio, Department of Development, Office of Energy and Environment (OEE) accepted the Recreation and Parks application for the energy efficiency program. OEE administers statewide grant funding to local governments for projects that provide lighting upgrades that result in energy savings. In July of 2023, Recreation and Parks applied for energy efficiency Funds through the Office of Energy and Environment's Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act State Energy Efficiency Program, Ordinance 2095-2023. This grant will be used towards the building automated controls upgrades in the Blackburn Community Center and the Alum Industrial maintenance facility.

These projects will install updated building automated system controls that will aide in the department's effort to comply with the City's Energy Management and Climate Action Plans. Thirty-two of forty-six Recreation and Parks facilities have been updated and integrated into an operational interface. The operational interface is currently projecting more than a 40% reduction of the Recreation and Parks energy footprint. Blackburn Community Center and the Alum Industrial facility are two of the remaining fourteen facilities without these upgrades.

**Background:** This ordinance authorizes the Director of the Recreation and Parks Department to enter into a grant agreement with the Ohio Department of Natural Resource (ODNR) for the Urban Forestry Grant Program. This ordinance will also authorize the appropriation of the grant in the amount of \$500,000.00.

The Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) solicited competitive proposals for the Urban Forestry grant program and the Columbus Recreation and Parks Department submitted the grant application in December 2023. This Urban Forestry grant is a reimbursable grant that supports long-term growth and development of local urban and community forest programs. A requirement of the program is a focus on disadvantaged communities defined by The Council on Environmental Quality's Climate and Economic Justice Screening Tool (CEJST).

The goals of the Urban Forestry Grant Program align with the City's Urban Forestry Master Plan (UFMP). ODNR awarded \$500,000.00 to the City of Columbus Recreation and Parks Department for tree plantings within the project area. The City intends to utilize these grant funds to plant approximately 1,250 large-class street trees. The plantings will directly support the UFMP goal of investing in equitable canopy across all neighborhoods by 2030, focusing on neighborhoods with low tree canopy and high social equity needs. The census tracts identified for planting through the Climate and Economic Justice screening tool are also ranked as either high or very high priorities in the UFMP Social Equity Needs Index, meaning these tracts have low tree canopy and high need for new trees.

**Benefits to the Public:** Trees provide tangible benefits to Columbus residents. As the 15th largest city in the nation, Columbus is home to over 900,000 people. Columbus had the 8th most intense urban heat island effect of

major US cities, impacting health, energy use, and water quality. The recently published Columbus Climate Action Plan recommends planting trees as a solution. Street trees are the workhorses as they clean our air, reduce heat, and absorb stormwater. In an Ohio summer, trees provide the shade that makes walking outside bearable. **Background:** This ordinance authorizes the Director of the Recreation and Parks Department to enter into contract with Smoot Construction Company of Ohio for the Hoover Amenities Project. The contract amount is \$3,000,000.00 being authorized by this ordinance.

The Hoover Amenities project is located at three distinct locations around the Hoover Reservoir. The fishing pier and boat launch ramp project aspects can be found near the intersection of Sunbury Road and Walnut Street at 7940 South Sunbury Road. The mudflats boardwalk is located at the north end of the reservoir and is located off of Front Street near Galena, Ohio. At both of these locations there are existing facilities that will require demolition and removal. The fishing pier will be newly installed infrastructure.

The Recreation and Parks Department proposes to deliver this project using a Construction Manager at Risk contract. This delivery method will save the project money and time compared to traditional project delivery methods in this labor short market. CMAR is a "best value" selection in lieu of a "low bid" selection associated with traditional project deliveries. During a "best value" selection, a vendor's qualifications are evaluated and weighted as part of a total score. Costs, including project overhead, profit, and contingencies are evaluated, weighted, and scored. The vendor with the highest combined score represents the "best value." During this selection process, Smoot Construction Company of Ohio represented the "best value."

This contract will allow for procurement of long lead time materials such as boardwalk piers, pre-manufactured concrete planks, and railings. Plans are currently eighty percent complete and materials are ready to be procured. Procuring these materials early reduces the duration of the construction schedule, saving overhead costs for the project which translates into significant project savings to the city.

The scope of the work shall include complete construction services starting with planning confirmation, design

review, and completion of construction. This project will be constructed under a Construction Manager at Risk (CMAR) delivery method. The selected CMAR will coordinate work with the project design team. This \$3,000,000 contract is the first of two authorizations that will fund the construction of these amenities. There will be future guaranteed maximum price amendments for this contract provided by the CMAR after completion of design and competitive bidding for construction.

# Vendor Bid/Proposal Submissions (Office of Diversity and Inclusion designation status):

Proposals were advertised through Vendor Services, in accordance with City Code Section 329, on January 25, 2024 and initial responses were received by the Recreation and Parks Department on February 16, 2024. Following the receipt and evaluation of initial proposals and qualifications by the Construction Manager at Risk (CMAR) selection committee, two vendors were provided a request for technical proposals and costs. Initial proposals were received from the following vendors:

After initial proposals were evaluated by the committee, Smoot Construction Company of Ohio and The Ruhlin Company were the vendors selected to submit technical proposals for review. The firm was chosen based on their referenced projects, experience, qualifications, availability, timeline, project approach, and proposed fees. Smoot Construction Company of Ohio and all proposed subcontractors have met code requirements with respect to prequalification, pursuant to relevant sections of Columbus City Code Chapter 329.

**Background:** This ordinance authorizes the Director of the Recreation and Parks Department to enter into contract with Civil & Environmental Consultants, Inc. for the Three Creeks Wetland Restoration Project. The contract amount is \$142,584.86, with a contingency of \$14,258.49, for a total of \$156,843.35 being authorized by this ordinance.

Three Creeks Park is a 1,097 acre park in the Far South Community and is jointly managed by the Columbus Recreation and Parks Department and Franklin County Metro Parks. Three Creeks Park was historically farmed, but wetlands have been developing over the past decade as the land has naturally converted from agricultural use. It is important that the Recreation and Parks Department restores the wetlands at Three Creeks Park, as approximately 90 percent of all wetlands in Ohio have been lost. Wetlands improve water quality, provide flood control, serve as critical habitat for a variety of wildlife, and capture carbon dioxide.

The project will create a 12-acre wetland within a 20-acre restored area, north of Watkins Road and to the east of the Alum Creek Trail. Additionally, this project will plant additional trees to support the Urban Forestry Master Plan (UFMP) and increase the canopy in the Far South Community, which has low canopy cover. The Columbus Recreation and Parks Department received grant funding from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) H2Ohio Program to fund a wetland restoration at Three Creeks Park. In addition to the H2Ohio Grant, the Columbus Recreation and Parks Department also acquired a donation from Google for tree plantings in the project area. Construction is anticipated to start in spring of 2025 and is expected to be complete by spring of 2026.

**Vendor Bid/Proposal Submissions (Office of Diversity and Inclusion designation status):** Bids were advertised through Vendor Services, in accordance with Columbus City Codes Chapter 329, on January 29, 2024 and received by the Recreation and Parks Department on February 20, 2024. Proposals were received from the following companies:

"Kenzi" a canine that has been in service with the Division of Police's Canine Unit for nine years needs to be taken out of service.

"Kenzi" is an 11 year old canine and his handler is retiring from the Division of Police after thirty-four years of service. "Kenzi" has an obstinate temperament. Re-training him with another handler is unadvisable and economically impractical due to his age and his surpassed service life to the Division of Police Due to these facts it is in the best interest of "Kenzi" and the Division to take him out of service and retire him. Retiring "Kenzi" would keep the Division from paying the additional cost for food and medical expenses with no guarantee that he would be able to perform necessary duties.

It is recommended that "Kenzi" be retired and to permit his handler, Officer John D. Dollmatch #1497, to assume custody and care of "Kenzi" and purchase him from the Division of Police for the sum of \$1.00 as authorized by ORC 9.62, (C). Officer John D. Dollmatch #1497 has agreed to accept "Kenzi".

Additionally, the Division of Police Legal Bureau has developed a general release document that relinquishes the City of Columbus from any liability as it relates to the post retirement care and control of "Kenzi", and assigns that liability to Officer John D. Dollmatch #1497.

## **FISCAL IMPACT**:

At this time, there are plans to replace this canine with a new canine through the General Fund.

**BACKGROUND:** This ordinance authorizes the Department of Building and Zoning Services to enter into a contract to provide ongoing electrical inspection services on behalf of Franklin County. Ordinance Nos. 2249-2022 and 0182-2023 authorized the Department of Building and Zoning Services to provide inspections on behalf of Franklin County in accordance with Section 307.15 and Chapter 3781 of the Ohio Revised Code. Franklin County does not currently have the capability to perform electrical inspections for the permits it issues, but the City's Department of Building and Zoning Services is equipped and has the capacity to provide these required inspections. Due to negotiations between Franklin County and the City, a contract was not completed prior to the previous contract's expiration date of December 31, 2023. This contract is needed to ensure timely reimbursement to the City for costs already incurred and to ensure the City continues to be compensated for services rendered in 2024.

The term of the agreement for specified inspection services will be from January 1, 2024 through July 31, 2024. Emergency action is requested in order to ensure timely reimbursement to the City.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** Ordinance Nos. 2249-2022 (\$116,000.00) and 0182-2023 (\$223,000.00) authorized the Department of Building and Zoning Services to provide electrical inspection services to Franklin County. This legislation authorizes the additional receipt of \$116,666.69. Including this request, the aggregate amount for inspection services is \$455,666.69. Expenditures and revenues to provide these services are budgeted in the Development Services Fund, Fund 2240.

To authorize the Director of the Department of Building and Zoning Services to enter into contract with Franklin County to provide electrical inspections on their behalf; to authorize retroactive receipt of payment for services that began on January 1, 2024; and to declare an emergency. This legislation authorizes an amendment to Ordinance No. 2089-2023, passed by Columbus City Council on August 2, 2023, in support of the Tenant Advocacy Project (TAP) to provide legal representation to residents facing an eviction, and to authorize payment of expenses such as salaries and fringe, consultants and professional services, travel to conferences, space costs and rentals, bank charges, postage, printing, training, insurance, membership dues, legal library subscriptions, research related, litigation, interpreter expenses, and technology, starting January 1, 2024.

Ordinance No. 0240-2024, passed by Columbus City Council on 1/24/2024, authorizes the assignment of all existing and future business done by the City of Columbus with Legal Aid Society of Columbus (LASC) to Legal Aid of Southeast and Central Ohio (LASCO). This change will reflect a company merger and subsequent name change and Federal Identification Number change for all existing and future contracts and purchase orders established using the name Legal Aid Society of Columbus (LASC).

Ordinance No. 2089-2023 authorized the Director of Development to enter into a not-for-profit service agreement with the Legal Aid of Southeast and Central Ohio (LASCO) in an amount up to \$1,500,000.00 in support of the Tenant Advocacy Project (TAP) to provide legal representation to residents facing an eviction.

Tenants with legal representation are much more likely to avoid an eviction judgment and keep possession of their homes than unrepresented tenants. In addition to these primary effects, a right to counsel offers several secondary benefits to defendants who are sued for eviction. Attorneys may be able to keep eviction filings off tenants' records, arrange for alternative housing, negotiate reasonable amounts of time for tenants to move out, reduce or eliminate money owed to the landlord, or help tenants apply for rental assistance.

With these dollars, the Legal Aid of Southeast and Central Ohio (LASCO) will be able to staff additional TAP attorneys and support staff for an additional year. Because the Tenant Advocacy Project attorneys specialize in these services, this cannot be provided by existing city employees.

This amendment is to establish that the expenses identified above that have been incurred from January 1, 2024 until the creation of the purchase order be eligible for reimbursement.

FISCAL IMPACT: None.

#### 1. BACKGROUND

This ordinance authorizes the Interim Director of Public Service to modify and extend the agreement with Kapsch TrafficCom USA, Inc., hereafter referenced as Kapsch, to add additional funds to support and maintain the Connected Vehicle Control Center software on all components and configuration developed to monitor and control the Smart Columbus Connected Vehicle Environment Roadside Units along High Street, Morse Road, Cleveland Avenue and Alum Creek.

Ordinance 1312-2019 authorized the Chief Innovation Officer to enter into a professional services contract with Kapsch to provide and program infrastructure technology to enable the transportation environment; and develop and deploy the Connected Vehicle applications that enable the enhanced safety and mobility features Smart Columbus desires. The contract began upon issuance of a notice to proceed with the term continuing until completion of work. Ordinance 0695-2021 authorized the modification of the contract to cover the cost of work to support and maintain the Connected Vehicle Control Center software. Ordinance 1203-2022 authorized the transfer of signature authority from the Chief Innovation Officer to the Director of Public Service and the modification of the contract to cover the continued cost of work to support and maintain the Connected Vehicle Control Center software.

This planned contract modification is needed to maintain and operate the Columbus Connected Vehicle Environment at over 85 traffic signals that provide and receive information for safety applications currently active for the over 1,000 vehicles; 313 private owner, 383 COTA vehicles, 300 City vehicles, and 17 freight vehicles. Over \$7 million of investment was put into the Connected Vehicle Environment project and has always been planned to be maintained after the Smart Columbus grant period expires. This modification lasts into 2025.

This ordinance authorizes the Interim Director of Public Service to modify a professional services contract with Woolpert, Inc. to add additional funds for design of the Columbus Housing Initiatives - Wheatland Avenue

#### Improvements project.

Ordinance 1846-2021 authorized the Director of Public Service to enter into a professional services contract with Woolpert, Inc. for the Columbus Housing Initiatives - Wheatland Avenue Improvements project. The intent of this project is to provide the City of Columbus, Department of Public Service, additional engineering and related services necessary to produce construction plans and associated deliverables for improvements to North Wheatland Avenue from Broad Street to Glenview Boulevard. Improvements will generally consist of converting the roadway to two-way traffic and needed widening to provide for a parking lane on the west side. Improvements will consist of new curbs, sidewalks, storm sewer, electric distribution relocation, and street lighting. This ordinance authorizes the Interim Director of Public Service to modify the contract in the amount of \$35,000.00.

This project was awarded funds from the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Entitlement Program which provides annual grants on a formula basis to entitled cities and counties to develop viable urban communities by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment, and by expanding economic opportunities, principally for low- and moderate-income persons. The amount needed for this modification is included in the City's current Action Plan for the Community Development Block Grant Wheatland Avenue Street Improvements Design Activity and Wheatland Farm Complex Project.

CITY DEPARTMENTS' RECOMMENDATION: Approval. The site consists of two parcels, each developed with a single-unit dwelling, in the AR-4, Apartment Residential District, and is subject to the University District Zoning Overlay (UDZO). The requested Council Variance will allow the development of a mixed-use building consisting up to 17 apartment units and a 1,245 square foot coffee shop with an accessory patio. A Council Variance is necessary to allow a coffee shop in the AR-4 district. Variances to required parking, vision clearance, side yard, density, landscaping, lot coverage, front and rear setbacks, building separation and size, floor area ratio (FAR), height, and side yard are also included in the request. The site is within the planning boundaries of the *University District Plan* (2015), which recommends "Higher Intensity Residential" land uses at this location. Staff finds the requested variances supportable as they will allow a mixed-use development that is consistent with the Plan's goals for infill development in urban neighborhoods. Additionally, this request provides additional housing, consistent with the City's objectives, and is located within close proximity to a high intensity transit corridor, with multimodal transportation options.

To grant a Variance from the provisions of Sections 3333.035, AR-4, Apartment residential district use; 3312.49(C), Required parking; 3321.05(B), Vision clearance; 3325.901(A), Density; 3325.903(A), Landscaped Area and Treatment; 3325.905(A), Maximum Lot Coverage; 3325.907(B), Parking; 3325.909(A)(1), Building Lines; 3325.909(B), Building Lines; 3325.911(C), Building Separation and Size; 3325.913(A)(1)(c), Maximum Floor Area Ratio (FAR); 3325.915, Height; and 3333.23(d), Minimum side yard permitted, of the Columbus City Codes; for the property located at 127-135 E. WOODRUFF AVE. (43201), to allow a mixed-use development with reduced development standards in the AR-4, Apartment Residential District (Council Variance #CV23-130).

WHEREAS, by application #CV23-130, the owner of property at 127-135 E. WOODRUFF AVE. (43201), is requesting a Council variance to allow a mixed-use development with reduced development standards in the AR-4, Apartment Residential District; and

WHEREAS, Section 3333.035, AR-4, Apartment residential district use, does not allow commercial uses, while the applicant proposes a 1,245 square foot coffee shop with 185 square feet of accessory patio space within an apartment building; and

WHEREAS, Section 3312.49(C), Required parking, requires one parking spaces per 75 square feet of eating and drinking establishment space, or 17 spaces for a 1,245 square foot coffee shop, and one parking spaces per 150 square feet of dining patio space, or two spaces for a 185 square foot patio, while the applicant proposes a total of zero provided parking spaces for these commercial uses; and

WHEREAS, Section 3321.05(B), Vision clearance, requires a clear vision triangle of 30 feet by 30 feet on

each residential lot adjacent to a street intersection, while the applicant proposes no clear vision triangle at the intersection of Woodruff Avenue and Waldeck Avenue; and

WHEREAS, Section 3325.901(A), Density, permits no more than one dwelling unit per 700 square feet of lot area, while the applicant proposes reduced lot area per dwelling unit of 658 square feet; and

WHEREAS, Section 3325.903(A), Landscaped Area and Treatment, requires at least five percent of the lot area located behind the most rear portion of the principal residential building be planted with grass and/or other live vegetation, while the applicant proposes a reduced area of 3.8 percent at the rear of the lot; and

WHEREAS, Section 3325.905(A), Maximum Lot Coverage, requires that a building or combination of buildings, including any rear or side porch or roofed stairs but excluding any balcony, walkway, deck, front porch, carport or garage, shall cover no more than 30 percent of the lot area, while the applicant proposes an increased lot coverage of 53 percent; and

WHEREAS, Section 3325.907(B), Parking, requires 29 parking spaces for 17 dwelling units, while the applicant proposes a total of seven parking spaces for 17 dwelling units; and

This ordinance authorizes the Interim Director of Public Service to enter into contract with Complete General Construction Company for the Signals - Summit Street Phase 2 project and to provide payment for construction, construction administration and inspection services.

This project consists of replacing, and upgrading to current standards, the following existing traffic signals along Summit Street: Chittenden Avenue, 12th Avenue, 15th Avenue, Lane Avenue, E. Hudson Street, and other work as may be necessary to complete the contract in accordance with the plans and specifications set forth in the Bid Submittal Documents.

Ordinance 1634-2022 authorized the Director of Public Service, on behalf of the City of Columbus, to submit applications to and execute grant agreements with the Ohio Public Works Commission relative to the Local Transportation Improvement Program and State Capital Improvement Program. The ordinance also authorized the Director of Public Service to accept and expend awarded grant funds and issue refunds, if necessary, for the Signals - Summit Street Phase 2 project.

The estimated Notice to Proceed date is April 26, 2024. The project was let by the Office of Support Services through Vendor Services and Bid Express. Two bids were received on February 6, 2024, (both majority) and tabulated as follows:

Ryan for hearing officer services in an amount not to exceed \$10,800.00 for a new contract amount of \$14,850.00; and to modify an existing contract with Phillip L. Wright Jr. for hearing officer services in an amount not to exceed \$7,350.00 for a new contract amount of \$15,300.00. Both contracts were entered into on March 1, 2024 for the period ending February 28, 2025. The total increase in funding for both contracts shall not exceed \$18,150.00. All other provisions of the contracts remain in effect.

The need for additional goods or services could not be foreseen at the time both contracts were initially awarded because of the recently passed legislation by the Ohio General Assembly to overturn local laws prohibiting the sale of flavored tobacco products, resulting in an increased amount of hearings by businesses wanting to appeal their current fines in hopes they will be overturned as well.

It would not be in the city's best interests to have the additional contract requirements for both contracts awarded through other procurement processes as specified in Columbus City Code 329 because hearings are either scheduled or ongoing for the remainder of the contract cycle and there are select hearing officers who have the expertise to facilitate.

The price for the additional goods or services for both contracts was determined based on the number of currently scheduled hearings and estimated future number of hearings.

Columbus Public Health has a need for hearing officers to preside over hearings on matters relating to business conducted by the Board of Health as prescribed by Ohio Revised Code 3709.20, Ohio Administrative Code 3701-21-26 and Ohio Administrative Code 901:3-4-08 and Columbus City Health Code 209.05.

James G. Ryan and Phillip L. Wright Jr. are operating as sole proprietors in relation to these services and are therefore not required to be registered with the Secretary of State Office. Both underlying contracts did not require authorizing legislation based on their original contract amounts.

Emergency action is being requested to allow for scheduled appeals to be heard and addressed in a timely manner in accordance with the courts.

**FISCAL IMPACT** Expenditures to provide these services are budgeted in the 2024 Health Special Revenue Fund, Fund No. 2250. (\$18,150.00)

To authorize the Board of Health to modify existing contracts with James G. Ryan and Phillip L. Wright Jr., for hearing officer services; to authorize the expenditure to cover these modifications from the 2024 Health Special Revenue Fund; and to declare an emergency. (\$18,150.00).

## 1. BACKGROUND

This ordinance authorizes the Director of Public Utilities to enter into a contract modification to start detailed engineering design services with ms consultants, inc. for the Fourth Water Plant Transmission Main project, CIP #690502-100001, in an amount up to \$901,234.82.

This modification is to begin detailed design work including survey, soil borings, and base mapping for the design of water transmission mains that will be constructed in conjunction with the City's future fourth water plant. The transmission mains will extend from the fourth water plant located at 5992 Home Road, Delaware, Ohio, to a strategic connection point in the City's existing water distribution system, specifically the Cleveland/Henderson pressure district.

The initial contract funding was for preliminary design services (Phase 1 of the contract). Modification #1 services preliminary design for new Scioto River/Griggs Reservoir crossing(s) Cleveland/Henderson pressure districts and associated transmission main alignment(s) to connect the Fourth Water Plant transmission mains. The existing waterlines crossing the Scioto River do not have the capacity to convey flows from the future Fourth Water Plant, based on projected plant capacity. This current Modification (Modification #2) is needed in order to maintain the project's schedule to have at least one transmission main constructed by 12/31/28 by beginning on the first stages of Detailed Design for the chosen alignment. These early-stage services are only for Survey, Base Mapping, and Geotechnical work.

There are two additional planned contract modifications. One contract modification will be for Phase 2 (remainder of detailed design services). The final planned contract modification will be for Phase 3 (engineering services during construction).

The majority of the transmission main will be located outside the City of Columbus. The portion within the City of Columbus will be located within the Hayden Run Planning Area (30) and the Far Northwest Planning Area (31). The Citywide Planning Area (99) will be used for the accounting template due to the project covering multiple areas.

## **UPDATED TIMELINE**

The duration of Phase 1 (Preliminary Design Services) is still expected to take 18 months and end in mid-2024. Phase 2 (Detailed Design Services) is expected to have a duration of approximately 24 months following the completion of Preliminary Design Services. Phase 3 - Engineering Services during Construction is expected to have a duration of approximately 28 months.

# 1.2. Reason other procurement processes are not used:

It was the original plan to structure the contract to have contract modifications for the Detailed Design services and Services During Construction phases. In this case, it was decided to expedite a component of the detailed design phase prior to the completion of Phase I - Preliminary Design, in order to keep on Schedule and allow for the construction of at least one transmission main by December 31, 2028.

# 1.3. How cost of modification was determined:

ms consutlants, inc. provided a cost proposal as requested by the City based on the current contract rates for job titles, allowable expenses, and overhead. The fee proposal was reviewed by the Division of Water and deemed to be acceptable.

# 2. ECONOMIC IMPACT/ADVANTAGES; COMMUNITY OUTREACH; PROJECT DEVELOPMENT: ENVIRONMENTAL FACTORS/ADVANTAGES OF PROJECT

This project was scoped with a significant public outreach program. This outreach program will include public meetings, advisory group briefings for stakeholders, development of a project website, fact sheets, pop-up engagement at neighborhood gatherings, e-newsletters, social media posts, and news releases.

## 3. CONTRACT COMPLIANCE INFORMATION

ms consultants, inc.'s contract compliance number is CC006998 and expires 12/1/25.

Searches in the Excluded Party List System (Federal) and the Findings for Recovery list (State) produced no findings against ms consultants, inc. or their subconsultants.

# 4. MINORITY AND WOMAN OWNED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE & SMALL LOCAL BUSINESS ENTERPRISE PROGRAM

This contract was put in place with an ODI determined MBE/WBE program goal of 25.0%. ms consultants, inc. is classified as a majority company. ms consultants, inc. anticipates performing the work on this contract modification with the use of subconsultants. The MBE/WBE percentage for this contract modification is expected to be 48.56%.

As part of their proposal, ms consultants, inc. has proposed the following subconsultants/subcontractors to perform contract work:

The certification of ms consultants, inc. and the above companies was in good standing at the time of the contract modification.

## 5. FISCAL IMPACT

This design modification is expected to be financed with a loan from the Water Supply Revolving Loan Account (WSRLA) through the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency and administered by the Ohio Water Development Authority. City Council authorized this loan application and acceptance of funding via Ordinance 0363-2024, passed by Council on 2/12/24. This loan is expected to be approved in April, 2024.

A transfer of funds from the Water System Reserve Fund, Fund 6003, to the Water Supply Revolving Loan Account Fund, Fund 6011, in the amount of \$901,234.82 is needed to fund design for this project. This transaction is a temporary measure that is required until a loan is executed with the Ohio EPA to reimburse the Water System Reserve Fund. These funds will also need to be appropriated to be transferred and then appropriated after transfer to the new fund. An amendment to the 2023 Capital Improvement Budget is needed to align budget authority with the proper project.

# 6. EMERGENCY DESIGNATION

Emergency action is requested to keep construction of the water lines needed for the new fourth water on schedule so the new water plant is able to provide water when construction is complete and it is brought online, meeting future anticipated water demands to prevent a water shortage.

To authorize the Director of the Department of Public Utilities to enter into a professional services contract modification with ms consultants, inc. to add funding for the Fourth Water Plant Transmission Main project; to authorize an amendment to the 2023 Capital Improvement Budget; to authorize the appropriation and transfer of funds from the Water Reserve Fund to the Water Supply Revolving Loan Account Fund; to authorize the

appropriation and expenditure of \$901,234.82 from the Water Supply Revolving Loan Account Fund to pay for the contract modification; and to declare an emergency. (\$901,234.82)

WHEREAS, the Department of Public Utilities is engaged in the Fourth Water Plant Transmission Main project; and

The grant was authorized via ordinance 2715-2019 as a reimbursable grant in an amount up to \$5,600,000.00.

The funds to be expended under this legislation are funds that have been cancelled from grant agreements/purchase orders for projects already completed under the Lead Safe Columbus Program. Since appropriation has been received under Ordinance 2715-2019, only approval to expend these cancelled funds is needed.

**BACKGROUND**: Ordinance 3269-2023, passed December 11, 2023, authorized the expenditure of \$647,330.00 from the Safety Voted Bond Fund 7701 for the purchase of alternative response vehicles for the Division of Fire. Said ordinance and subsequent purchase order should have been funded using available cash existing in the Income Tax Set Aside Subfund 1000-100099.

This legislation authorizes the City Auditor to correct the funding source of the purchases made via Ordinance 3269-2023, to correctly align expenditures with the appropriate funding sources. **Background:** On December 22, 2023, the Department of Finance and Management, Real Estate Management Office, solicited a Request for Proposals (RFP) for Insurance Brokerage and Risk Engineering Services for Property Casualty, Boiler & Machinery, Aviation, General Liability, and Excess Liability Insurance (RFQ026631). The Real Estate Management Office (REMO) sought to identify qualified insurance brokers, insurance agencies, or insurance agents to provide insurance brokerage services for the City's property casualty, boiler & machinery, aviation, general liability, and excess liability insurance programs.

Responses to the RFP solicitation were due January 25, 2024. The City received two (2) proposals. A committee of three (3) members evaluated and scored the proposals. The proposal submitted by USI Insurance Services, LLC received the highest total point score and scored significantly higher in both the ability and pricing categories. The committee recommended USI Insurance Services, LLC as the responder best qualified to provide insurance brokerage and risk management services to the City.

The City's current insurance brokerage and risk engineering services contract expires on April 30, 2024. The City desires to establish a five (5) year contractual relationship with USI Insurance Services, LLC as the City's insurance broker by a contract with an initial one-year term commencing May 1, 2024 and four (4) additional consecutive automatic one-year renewals. Each renewal term being subject to the appropriation of funds by City Council and the certification of funds availability by the City Auditor. The insurance brokerage and risk engineering service fee for the initial one-year term and first renewal term will be \$52,000.00. Funds for the initial term are budgeted and available within the Finance and Management 2024 General Revenue Budget.

This ordinance authorizes the Director of Finance and Management to award and enter into a contract with USI Insurance Services, LLC for an initial one-year term commencing May 1, 2024 and terminating April 30, 2025 with four (4) additional consecutive automatic one-year renewals, each renewal term being subject to the appropriation of funds by City Council and the certification of funds availability by the City Auditor. A Council variance is required because the R-4 district does not permit two single-unit dwellings on one lot, while the applicant proposes to build a carriage house above an existing detached garage. Variances for fronting, minimum and maximum side yard, rear yard, lot width, and lot area required are included in this request. The site is located within the Short North Special Parking Area. There is

no Council adopted land use recommendation for this property. Staff supports the request as it is consistent with the existing residential development pattern of the neighborhood and will not add an incompatible use to the area.

**Background:** This ordinance authorizes the Director of the Office of Education to enter into a contract with Elevate Advocacy LLC to provide program management services in support of the Columbus Promise program.

The Columbus Promise program is a transformational college access, success, and workforce program made

possible by a coalition that includes Columbus City Schools, Columbus State Community College, I Know I Can, the Columbus Foundation, the Upjohn Institute, and other partners. Announced in the fall of 2021, the first cohort enrolled in the fall of 2022 and the second cohort enrolled in the fall of 2023, currently enabling Columbus City Schools students to attend Columbus State Community College. The vision for Columbus Promise program is an array of free college-to-career pathways for Columbus' students.

This contract will engage Elevate Advocacy LLC to provide program manager support to the City of Columbus by connecting stakeholders, providing regular reports, and engaging in strategic planning for the future growth of the Columbus Promise program. Ordinance 2783-2023 authorized the first contract between the Office of Education and Elevate Advocacy for these services, and this ordinance authorizes the continuation of those services. Given the relationships that the consultant has built with key stakeholders, it is in the best interest of the City and of the Columbus Promise program to continue contracting with Elevate Advocacy for program management needs. Competitive bidding would delay progress for the Columbus Promise program and is not conducive to ongoing partnerships given the relationships that have been established. Therefore, it is requested that competitive bidding requirements be waived.

Emergency legislation is required to provide compensation for program management services in a timely manner. Elevate Advocacy's previous contract expires on March 31, 2024, and work on the contract authorized by this ordinance will begin on April 1, 2024. Emergency legislation is also required in order to avoid delay of further progress in the management and collaboration of the Promise program.

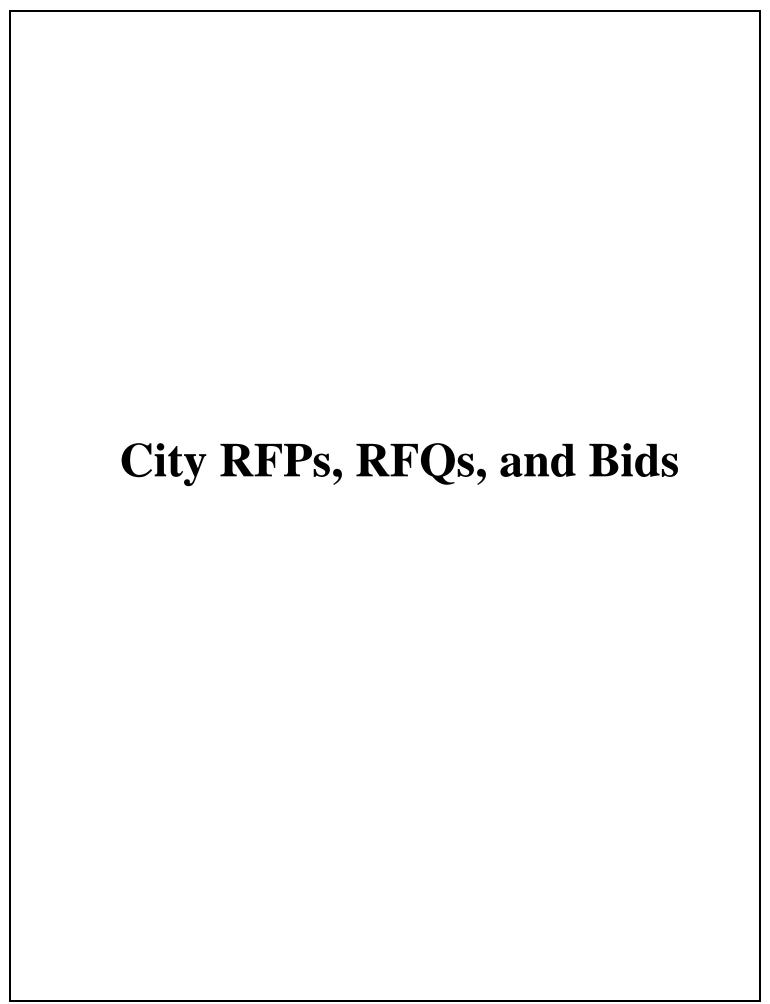

Board of Health, or required as defined in Ohio Administrative Code 3701-29, proof of required maintenance and operation will waive the permit fee if documentation is received by March 15 of the year.

# By-Laws of The Columbus South Side Area Commission

# INTRODUCTION

**THESE BY-LAWS** establish the procedures under which The Columbus South Side Area Commission shall execute those duties and functions set forth in and with authority granted under Chapters 3109 and 3111 of the Columbus City Code (hereinafter abbreviated as "C.C.") and Sections 60, 61 and 121 of the Columbus City Charter.

# Purpose

The purpose of this Commission is to afford additional voluntary citizen participation in decision-making in an advisory capacity to the City Administration and City Council as provided in C.C. Section 3109.01; and to facilitate communication, understanding, and cooperation among citizens, neighborhood groups, city officials and staff, and other stakeholders by performing those functions and duties set forth in C.C. Section 3109.14. The Commission shall not endorse any candidate for public office.

# Article I. Name

The name of this organization shall be The Columbus South Side Area Commission, hereinafter referred to as the "Commission" or "CSSAC".

# Article II. Commission Area

The area served by the Commission (the "Commission Area") shall be all incorporated areas of the City of Columbus, excluding those areas already made part of an Area Commission as set forth in C.C. Chapter 3111, and any area as hereafter adopted by the Commission and approved by the Columbus City Council ("Council"), as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the centerlines of Lathrop Street and East Livingston Avenue; thence easterly along the centerline of East Livingston Avenue to its point of intersection with the centerline of Studer Avenue; thence southerly along the centerline of Studer Avenue to its point of intersection with the centerline of first alley running parallel to and lying south of Livingston Avenue, otherwise known as Denton Alley; thence westerly along centerline of Denton Alley to its point of intersection with the centerline of first unnamed alley running parallel to and lying east of Linwood Avenue; thence southerly along the centerline of the first unnamed alley running parallel to and lying east of Linwood Avenue to its point of intersection with the centerline of second unnamed alley running parallel to and lying north of E. Whittier Street; thence easterly along the centerline of second unnamed alley running parallel to and lying north of E. Whittier Street to its point of intersection with centerline of Studer Avenue; thence southerly along the centerline of Studer Avenue to its point of intersection with the centerline of Whittier Street; thence easterly along the centerline of Whittier Street to its point of intersection with Rhoads Avenue and continuing thereon along the extended centerline of Memory Lane to the

# Article III Membership

Section 1. Members. There shall be fourteen (14) members of the Commission who shall be known as "Commissioners." Thirteen (13) of the Commissions are elected by general election as provided in Article VIII. One (1) Youth Commissioner is appointed by the Chair and elected by majority vote of the Commission. All members shall have equal standing as a Commission member. Unless otherwise provided herein, each Commissioner shall reside, have employment, or ownership in real property in the Commission Area; District Commissioners shall reside within their District Area; be duly appointed by the Mayor with the concurrence of Council; and serve without compensation. Commissioners shall have resided, have employment, or ownership in real property in the Commission within the Commission Area at least six (6) months prior to their nomination and election and shall maintain their residency in the Commission Area at all times they is serving as a Commissioner. Unless otherwise adopted and approved in accordance with Article XI herein, Commissioners shall be elected and appointed as follows:

- Nine (9) members; one (1) from each of the nine (9) Districts as set forth in Addendum A, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference, or any amendment thereto, to represent such District;
- One (1) member elected at-large who is a resident of the Commission Area, either as a tenant or homeowner, to represent residents, who will be designated as "At-Large Resident";
- One (1) member elected at-large who is a business owner who resides in, or who's business
  resides within the Commission Area, to represent businesses or organizations which provide or
  promote tangible services or substantial economic benefit to the Commission Area, who will be
  designated as "At-Large Business";
- One (1) member elected at-large who is a resident of the Commission Area, to represent individuals or entities organized for religious, social or other public interest purposes, who will be designated as "At-Large Religious & Social Services";
- One (1) member elected at-large who is a resident of the Commission Area, to represent individuals or entities organized for educational purposes, who will be designated as "At-Large Education"; and
- One (1) member who shall be appointed by the Chair and elected by the Commission who is a resident of the Commission Area and under the age of 18 at the time of appointment, to represent the area's youth, and who will be designated as "At-Large Youth".

Newly created commission seats may be nominated and appointed by the Commission as if filling a vacancy as outlined in Section 7 of this article for terms to coincide with the Election Schedule in Addendum D.

Section 2. Terms. All terms shall be for a period of three (3) years. All terms shall expire on the last day of the month of December in different years. The term of elected members, or members nominated by the Commission to fill a vacancy, shall commence no sooner than thirty (30) days after notice of nomination has been received by the Mayor's Office and be for no more than the time left in the term of said vacancy. Resignations may be accepted by the Commission Chair.

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# Article IV. Officers

**Section 1. Officers.** The Officers of the Commission shall be the Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary and Treasurer. It is desirable, but not required, that all Officers must have served no less than one year on the Commission to be eligible.

Section 2. Election of Officers. Nominations for officers will occur at the January meeting and will be open to all commissioners on the commission. Election of officers will then be held at the beginning of the January meeting, immediately after all new commissioners are seated. A Chair Pro Tempore will be chosen at the November meeting in the event that the current chair will not be a part of the commission in the January meeting to preside over the election of Officers. Commission officers shall serve without compensation for a term of one year.

Section 3. Chair The Chair shall preside at all meetings of the Commission; in consultation with the Commissioners, represent the Commission before public bodies and at public hearings; appoint Standing and Special Committees of the Commission; serve as an ex-officio member of all committees; coordinate the actions of officers and committee chairpersons; and perform other duties associated with the office as necessary and appropriate or as may be assigned by the Commission. The Chair, in consultation with the Commissioners, shall prepare the agenda for the regular meetings of the Commission and the Executive Committee. The Chair, in consultation with the Commissioners, shall direct, delegate and appoint the chairperson of standing committees. Persons elected as Chair are required to have served no less than one year on the Commission to be eligible.

Section 4. Vice-Chair. The Vice-Chair shall assist the Chair: perform the duties of the Chair in their absence; and perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Commission. The Vice-Chair shall be the liaison between the Commission and any volunteers or staff hired or assigned to the Commission.

Section 5. Secretary: The Secretary shall maintain an accurate and objective record of Commission meetings and meetings of the Executive Committee and provide for the reporting of minutes; maintain records of all votes of the Commission and the Executive Committee; call the roll at all Commission meetings and Meetings of the Executive Committee; coordinate the preparation and distribution of the Commission's agenda in aid of the Chair; maintain all records of the Commission and any other such records as the Commission may direct; and perform related duties as may be demanded by the Secretary's office. The voting records and minutes of all public Commission meetings shall be open to public examination and forwarded to the City as provided in C.C. Section 3109.07. In the absence of both the Chair and the Vice-Chair, the Secretary shall call the meeting to order and preside until the immediate election of a Chair Pro Tempore. In the absence of the Secretary another Commissioner may serve the role of the Secretary. Section 6. Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be the Fiduciary Agent for the commission and shall have the care and custody of all monies belonging to the Commission and shall be solely responsible for such monies; shall cause to be deposited in a regular business bank all funds received from the City or any other funds; be one of two or more Officers who shall sign checks on behalf of the Commission and in no event shall a check or other disbursement of monies be signed or authorized in advance of a real and tangible need; shall render at regular intervals and at the Commission's Annual Meeting a written account of the finances of the Commission which reports shall

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# Article V. Meetings

Section 1. Regular Meetings. Regular meetings of the Commission shall be held at 6:30 p.m. on the fourth (4<sup>th</sup>) Tuesday of each month unless otherwise directed by a majority vote of the Commission. All Commission meetings shall be held in the Commission Area in a regular meeting place which shall be an appropriate large room convenient for members and the public. The Commission shall provide to its constituents and the City Administration seven (7) days advanced notice of any change in the meeting time or place handled one or more of the following ways - by publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the Commission Area, by door-to-door notice, or through electronic media (which may include email, social media such as Facebook, and website pages). All Commission meetings are open to the general public and shall comply with the open meeting requirements set forth in C.C. Chapter 121, and the provisions of the Ohio Open Meetings Act, Ohio Revised Code Section 121.22, as applicable.

The Commission may meet via digital forum while the City of Columbus is under a public health or other emergency order, or as deemed necessary to protect the public health and welfare. In such cases, proper public notice shall be given, and accommodations made to ensure proceedings are open to the public. All Commission business and votes taken under such conditions shall carry the full weight of votes conducted during in-person meetings.

Section 2. Annual Meeting. The Annual Meeting shall be the Commission's regularly scheduled meeting following the seating of newly elected commissioners, at which time the Commission shall elect Commissioner Officers.

Section 3. Recess. The Commission shall not hold a regular meeting during the month of August unless two-thirds of those members present and voting determine that extenuating circumstances justify that the Commission meet during the month of August.

**Section 4. Special Meetings.** Special Meetings may be called by the Executive Committee, the Chair or by a majority of the Commissioners in a regular or special meeting. The special meeting's purpose, date, time and location shall be stated in the meeting notice. No business will be considered at a special meeting unless it was included in the meeting notice and a quorum is present.

In the case of a special meeting, the Commission shall provide to its constituents and the City Administration three (3) days advance written notice of the proposed special meeting handled one or more of the following ways - by publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the Commission Area, by door-to-door notice, or through electronic media (which may include email, social media such as Facebook, and website pages).

**Section 5. Notice of Meetings.** All meetings shall be open to the public and notice shall be published at least seven (7) days in advance in accordance with City codes and regulations.

Section 6. Quorum: A simple majority of the members seated shall constitute a quorum for the conduct of business at all Commission meetings. Nothing herein shall prevent the adjournment of any such meeting to a later specified date, regardless of the presence of a quorum.

**Section 9. Presentations.** The Chair shall recognize all members of the public who wish to address the Commission concerning issues under discussion. The Chair may uniformly limit debate to an equal amount of time for each side of an issue; and when appropriate, the issue will be referred by the Chair to the proper Committee for action and report at the next Commission meeting. Debate and comment time will be conducted as follows, unless the Chair deems time limits should be adjusted based on evening's agenda:

- 1. Informational Presentations will be limited to ten (10) minutes for each presentation with an additional five (5) minutes for questions from the commissioners. Requests for informational presentations must be submitted to the Chair within fourteen (14) days of the meeting that they wish to present. A limit of three (3) informational presentations will be permitted at any given meeting.
- 2. Zoning Variance Presentations will be limited to a total of ten (10) minutes for each presentation with an additional ten (10) minutes for questions from the commissioners. Zoning presentations should only be placed on the meeting agenda by the Zoning Chairperson. A civic association representative may have up to five (5) minutes to speak on behalf of the civic association.
- 3. Public Comments on zoning presentations will be limited to three (3) people in favor and three people opposed, and each will be permitted three (3) minutes of speaking time. In the event that there is a large number of individuals wishing to speak, speaker slips will be made available prior to the meeting and will be chosen on a first turned in basis.
- 4. Public Announcements will be limited to two (2) minutes per person who wishes to share general information on a public topic. This will be limited to the amount of time available at the end of the meeting.

Section 10. Dissenting or Concurring Reports: Dissenting or concurring reports may be filed with the Secretary by any Commissioner and shall be attached to the majority report.

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The Committee shall report committee business at the next regular meeting of the Commission and provide an annual committee report at the Commission's Annual Meeting.

Any and all developers, planners, lawyers, public advocates or representatives, or any other such person, making an application or request to the City for any zoning, building or housing related issue will be required to address the Commission. Applications and requests will only be placed on the agenda of the Commission once the CRNA(s) within whose jurisdiction such application or request resides has been notified of such application or request in accordance with its respective by-laws, rules or regulations, and has been provided an opportunity to approve or disapprove thereof, in accordance with the CSSAC Zoning Policy, attached hereto as Addendum B.

Demolition permit applications will be distributed to the Zoning Committee Chair by the City. It is understood by the Commissioners on zoning matters, that they shall follow the current city code. Once a demolition permit is issued, the Zoning Chair shall notify the Zoning Committee, the Area Commissioner and CRNA President(s) of the affected area. The Chairperson shall give ten (10) business days for objection(s). If no objections are made, the Chairperson shall recommend the demolition. If there are objections, a discussion shall be held at the next scheduled Commission meeting. Emergency demolitions are issued by the City if it is determined the building is an immediate safety issue for the residents of the area. In the event of an emergency demolition, the Zoning Committee Chair will notify the appropriate CRNA(s) of the City's intentions. See policies for demolitions and zoning in Addendum B.

- C. The Public Services and Planning Committee. The Public Services and Planning Committee shall review the adequacy and operation of all public services, including but not limited to utilities, safety, infrastructure, health, parks, and emergency response, provided by the City and other public agencies to the Commission Area, and recommend priorities and improvements thereto. The Committee shall make themselves aware of all relevant city codes that apply to the Commission Area and all decisions of the Committee shall be made in accordance therewith. The Public Services and Planning Committee shall receive and review existing and proposed area plans; and recommend guidelines for the comprehensive social, economic, commercial, and physical developments of the Commission Area. The Committee shall examine local legislation substantially affecting the area to implement plans in the Commission Area and shall develop means for citizen participation in any planning which affects the Commission Area. The Public Services and Planning Committee shall meet at the discretion of the Committee Chair, to conduct necessary and appropriate business, and with at least three (3) days' notice. The Committee shall report such business at the next regular meeting of the Commission and provide an annual Committee report at the Commission's Annual Meeting.
- **D. The Public Relations Committee.** The Public Relations Committee shall conduct all public relations activities, including but not limited to establishing media contacts, advertising the existence of the Commission, coordinating news and press releases, newsletters, and

# Article VII. Elections

Section 1. Election Procedure. All District Commissioners, the At-Large Resident, At-Large Business, At-Large Religious & Social Services, and At-Large Education Commissioners shall be elected by general election from the Commission Area. All Commissioners shall be registered to vote with the Franklin County Board of Elections, with the exception of the At-Large Youth Commissioner who is exempt from the voter registration requirement due to age. Commissioners shall be elected to serve as a delegate to the Commission to represent a specific geographic area as defined in these By-Laws or the Commission's Election Rules and shall represent all interests within the Commission Area and the interests within the Commissioner's respective area of representation. The Elections Committee shall present final election results to the Commission at its next meeting following the general election in the same year.

The Commission shall accept such results by a simple majority vote of the Commissioners present and voting. The Secretary shall submit approved election results to the Mayor for appointment and concurrence of Council.

Section 2. Elections Committee. The Elections Committee shall consist of one (1) appointed commissioner to serve as chairperson (who is not up for reelection) along with at least one (1) Commissioner and up to three (3) area residents appointed by the Chairperson with the approval of the Commission at the regular meeting in July of each year (due to August Recess). Candidates for election, and individuals substantially connected with a candidate for election shall not be an election official, a member of the Elections Committee or polling staff in the year or years in which the candidate's name appears on the ballot. Vetting of qualifications for election is the responsibility of the committee as set forward in the election committee procedures and election packet.

Section 3. Elections Committee Responsibilities. The Elections Committee shall accept any reasonably necessary volunteer assistance with the election process; provide for printing and distributing necessary forms, including, but not limited to petitions, ballots, and tallies; receive petitions and signed copies of the Commissioner Job Description Synopsis; locate polling places; certify persons who have qualified as candidates; conduct the election; hear and decide complaints concerning the election or campaign; and certify the winning candidates to the Commission pursuant to C.C. Section 3109,08 and all other activities incidental thereto. The Elections Committee shall properly notice and post a list of seats opening for District and At-large Commissioner at least 30 days prior to the start of the elections process. This list shall also be posted publicly via electronic means. It is the responsibility of the Elections Committee to solicit candidates. Section 4. Election **Process.** Elections shall be by secret ballot and determined by plurality vote if three or more candidates vie for a single position: otherwise, a majority of votes cast shall elect. Any natural person eighteen (18) years of age or older who resides or owns real property in the Commission area (or portion thereof) may be an eligible elector. Electors must show proof of residency by providing a State Issued Identification Card or a utilities bill with the address of the individual wishing to vote that is located within the district. Electors need not be registered with the Franklin County Board of Elections but must be certified by the Elections Committee as an eligible elector. The Elections Committee shall conduct each election on the first Saturday in November or as otherwise hereafter determined by a majority vote of the Commission.

# Article VIII. Public Records

The Commission shall adhere to all public record requirements in the Ohio Revised Code and Columbus City Code. The Commission shall maintain and make available for prompt inspection any public records in their possession. Storage of all records for the Columbus South Side Area Commission will be maintained at the South Side Pride Center located at 280 Reeb Avenue, Columbus, Ohio 43207 or at its subsequent re-location. Additional copies of minutes and By-Laws can be received by requesting copies be sent via email or regular mail by contacting the Recording Secretary by email with a copy to the Chairperson and Vice Chairperson.

# Article IX. Parliamentary Procedures and Authority

Latest Edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern in all cases to which they are applicable and not inconsistent with these By-Laws and any special rules of order the Commission may adopt.

# Article XI. Amendment of By-Laws

Section 1. Procedure. These By-Laws may be amended as permitted in C.C. Section 3109.14 at any regular meeting of the Commission by an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the Commissioners provided that the amendment was properly submitted in writing at the previous regular Commission meeting. The Recording Secretary shall file any approved amendment immediately after its adoption with the City Clerk for publication in the City Bulletin. Such amendment shall take effect ten (10) days after such publication per C.C. Section 121.05. Section 2. Review. In May of every even numbered year, the Commission By-Laws shall be reviewed by a Special Committee appointed by a majority vote of the Commission to determine whether revisions or amendments should be made thereto.

# By-Laws of the Columbus South Side Area Commission

In accordance with <u>Article V</u> of the By-Laws and the Election Rules, one (1) Commissioner shall be elected from each of the nine (9) Districts set forth below to represent such District or geographic area identified therein. The District Commissioners shall be elected by a majority vote of the persons who reside or own real property in such District, and each District Commissioner shall maintain their residency in the District from which he or she was elected. Failure to maintain such residency shall constitute resignation from the Commission pursuant to <u>Article IV</u> of the By-Laws.

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# Addendum B

# Columbus South Side Area Commission Zoning Policy

The following are the steps to follow in order to complete the process for variances within the Columbus South Side Area Commission (CSSAC) boundaries.

Council Variances or BZA Applications:

- 1. File application for demolition or variance with the City Buildings Department.
- 2. Contact the CSSAC Zoning Chair, by email at (zoning chair email) to alert them that an application has been filed.
- Receipt of application from the City is necessary for the process to continue. No requests for variance will be considered until the application has been received by the CSSAC Zoning Chair from the city buildings department.
- 4. Once the application has been received, an email or phone call will be sent to the applicant and area civic association representative informing them of the application and explanation of the request. Zoning Chair will forward application to each of the committee members and presidents of affected civic associations. Further, if the application is located on a border of an adjacent area commission, the Zoning Chair shall notify said area commission. The civic association will have 45 days to return a recommendation to CSSAC.
- 5. If the Zoning Chair determines a project is of significant magnitude to warrant additional notice and discussion, the Zoning Chair may issue appropriate 7-day public notice of a special, informational meeting to discuss the application, which the applicant is required to attend. The affected civic associations may request a public meeting via the Zoning Chair, which will be approved at the sole discretion of the Zoning Chair. Special meetings shall be conducted at a public location and open to the general public.
- 6. Following special meetings as outlined in step 5 or in the event special meetings are not warranted, the applicant must attend the next scheduled civic association meeting to present the reasons for the request. Applicants are required to appear before the civic association no more than one time per application.
- 7. Upon considering the request, the civic association will issue a recommendation and send notice via email to the CSSAC Zoning Chair (zoning chair email) within 3 business days containing the completed City of Columbus approved zoning form including the outcome of the vote and

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the integrity of the South Side of Columbus. It is important that you plan for this process in your timeline. The CSSAC highly recommends applicants engage the appropriate civic association early in the process, possibly before a formal application is submitted to the City, to ensure the process runs smoothly and as quickly as possible.
