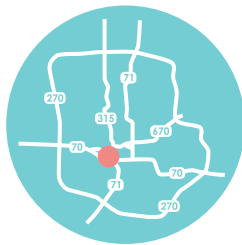


FRANKLINTON INFANT MORTALITY PROFILE

INFANT MORTALITY¹

This affects life expectancy

Infant mortality is the death of a child before they turn one year of age. In Central Ohio, black babies die at a rate 2.5 times that of white babies.

CAUSES OF INFANT MORTALITY

- Born too small and too soon
- Birth defects
- Unsafe sleep
- Smoking
- Neighborhood health

UNSAFE SLEEP¹

Once a baby is 1 month old, the biggest risk for infant mortality is sleep-related death. All babies should sleep alone, on their back, and in an empty crib.

One in four (25.0%) infant deaths in Franklinton were due to unsafe sleep, compared to less than one in six (14.1%) in Franklin County overall.

LOW BIRTH WEIGHT¹
