RULES & REGULATIONS

- Vehicles: Motorized and non-motorized vehicles. including snowmobiles, ATVs, motorcycles, bicycles, and mopeds, are restricted to designated roadways and parking lots. All other areas are off-limits to vehicles. Handicapped accessible equipment is permitted on improved trails.
- Pets Prohibited: No person shall bring into the Nature Preserve any pets, with the exception of domestic dogs or cats, which are permitted only in the picnic areas, parking areas, and roadways. These pets must be controlled at all times and on a leash not more than six feet long. This does not exclude the use of canine aids.
- Riding: No person, except law enforcement personnel, shall ride or bring into the Nature Preserve any horse or other riding animal, except in areas designated for such use by the Executive Director of the Recreation and Parks Department.
- Feeding of Animals: No person, other than park personnel engaged in official duties, may feed any wild animal found within the confines of the Nature Preserve.

- Releasing of Plants and Animals Prohibited: No person shall release any wild or domestic animal nor shall any person plant any seed or vegetation of any type in the Nature Preserve, without the written permission of the Natural Resources Manager.
- Harassment: No person shall harass any animal life including homes and nesting sites.
- Removal of materials: No person shall collect, remove, or otherwise disturb ice, soil, sand, gravel, rocks, fossils, minerals, plants, plant materials, animals, or any other substance from the Nature Preserve. Collecting materials for research purposes may be permitted upon written application to and approval by the Natural Resources Manager. This shall not restrict a licensed fisherman who is fishing legally. No fishing is permitted in the Hoover Meadows and Mud Hen Marsh sections of Hoover Nature Preserve.









The diverse habitat at O'shaughnessy Nature Preserve includes bottomland elm-ash woods, oak-hickory uplands, open fields, streams and open water of the reservoir. Two statewide rare plant species, Drummond's aster and satin brome, grow along the stream banks. O'shaughnessy supports over 45 species of breeding birds and over 100 species of migrating birds.



Sawmill and Hickory Woods natural areas are two of the few wooded areas left within such a densely developed area of Columbus. The woods are predominately made up of mature hickory and beech trees with few invasive species throughout the understory. This is a popular area for nature walks especially in the early spring when wildflowers such as trillium and spring beauty are carpeting the ground.

The bottomland woods of Kiwanis Riverway hosts a variety of rare and interesting species. The stateendangered bottomland aster is only found at Kiwanis Riverway and a few other sites in Ohio. The area is also home to the state-threatened satin brome grass, statepotentially threatened snow trillium and white cedar.

Hayden Falls is a historically and geologically significant site for central Ohio. The limestone gorge includes a 35-foot waterfall and unique cliff-loving plants. The state-endangered spreading rock cress, one of Ohio's rarest plants, grows here. Two statewide rare species, purple cliffbrake and maidenhair fern, can also be found at Hayden Falls.

The confluence of Rush Run and the Olentangy River has an excellent diversity of flora. This preserve is mostly comprised of riparian woods with a variety of hardwoods including tulip, cottonwood, sycamore and sugar maple. The state potentially threatened nodding rattlesnake root can be found at Rush Run.








The natural area of Kenney Park provides habitat for many bird, owl and bat species. The area is primarily successional forest with a large portion of riparian habitat along the Olentangy River. This is a popular park for nature walks with various footpaths meandering throughout the


The Beechwold nature preserve includes riparian forest along the Olentangy River and a forested ravine that stretches up into the Beechwold neighborhood. The woods feature mature native trees such as beech, oak and hickory with a variety of woodland wildflowers and native shrubs in the understory.



Webster Park is one of Columbus' oldest parks, dedicated in 1909 as a "bird sanctuary and flower preserve". The preserve is a wooded habitat with an unnamed tributary of the Olentangy River. There are a variety of beautiful woodland plants such as yellow trout lily and Virginia bluebells.



Situated on high bluffs above Alum Creek, the natural area of Mock Park is made up of upland hardwood forest dominated by oak-hickory. This forest supports high bat populations including the federally threatened Northern Long-eared bat.


Woodward Park Nature Preserve features a high quality oak-hickory, beech-maple mature forest. During spring and summer, the forest floor is covered with a wide variety of wildflowers, including large white trillium, rue anemone and bloodroot. The mature forest supports a community of wildlife including salamanders, warblers, owls and flying squirrels.



Lazelle woods is rich in native wildflowers such as rue anemone, green dragon, jack-in-the-pulpit, cut-leaved toothwort, spring beauty, dutchman's-breeches, yellow trout-lily, hairy sunflower, wild blue phlox, may-apple, and sessile trillium. The woods also support a high bird population including Cooper's hawk, eastern phoebe, eastern wood-pewee, hairy woodpecker, red-bellied woodpecker, rose-breasted grosbeak, wood thrush, tufted titmouse and yellow-throated vireo.


The Hamilton Road Wetland Nature Preserve is comprised of mature woodlands featuring vernal pool wetlands. This preserve is home to the largest Great Blue Heron rookery in Franklin County. The herons nest in the interior beech-dominated area of the woods and have had as many as 50 nests at one time.


Information:

In 1954, Hoover Dam was built and the Hoover Reservoir was created. In 1988, over 925 acres of the land surrounding the reservoir was dedicated as nature preserve. The area has become a popular birding spot for viewing migratory waterfowl and shorebirds in spring and fall. The preserve also features the largest breeding population of prothornotary warblers in Ohio.

The Hoover Prairie Nature Preserve consists of 8 acres of prairie and 32 acres of wooded area. The prairie is over 100 years old, once referred to as the Central College Prairie. Naturalist John Thomas first discovered the wild indigo dusky wing skipper here in 1937. The prairie is now undergoing restoration. It is home to the only known Ohio population of the state-endangered Gattinger's foxglove.









Mud Hen Marsh is a popular birding spot for viewing red-headed woodpeckers, warblers and waterfowl. There are natural surface trails throughout the wooded and open areas and an observation blind that looks out over the meadow and pond.



Lawrence Woods is a forested area situated high above two ravines that feed into the reservoir. A natural surface trail includes two overlook points with views over the flooded ravines. In the fall, these areas drain and become mudflats.

The sort-of-island at Oxbow offers a unique site reaching out into the Hoover Reservoir. This is a popular fishing and boat launch spot. A footpath leading to the northern most viewpoint of Oxbow provides a more secluded view point over the water and shoreline.

Hoover Meadows is a wetland mitigation site with a diversity of habitat types including woodland, wetland, vernal pool, grassland and stream. The wetlands provide good habitat for migrating marsh birds such as soras and bitterns. There is a large vernal pool located in the woods. This pool that dries up by the end of the summer is vital breeding ground for amphibians.



In fall, when the water levels of the reservoir recede, mudflats are exposed at the northern end of the reservoir. These mudflats are vital stops on the migration route for shorebirds that nest in the Arctic. The boardwalk in Area M provides prime viewing access to birders. Other notable birds found in this area are osprey, bald eagle and peregrine and merlin falcons.








Cloverfield and Wren Way feature grass trails winding through open meadows along the riparian corridor of Little Walnut Creek.

Columbus Nature Preserves aim to preserve the local natural heritage for current and future citizens of the City of Columbus to enjoy. The first city nature preserves were adopted in 1987 with additional preserves added in 2000, 2004 and 2016. To date, the system includes over 1,300 protected acres across 12 nature preserves. The Columbus nature preserve system is the only city nature preserve program in the state of Ohio. The nature preserves are jointly managed by Columbus Recreation and Parks Department, Columbus Division of Water and the Nature Preserve Advisory Council.
