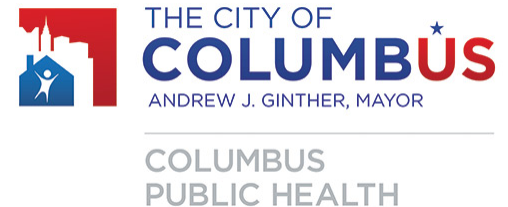

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Community Health Assessment (CHA)

Serves as a foundation for improved communication and cooperation within a community in identification of health and wellness service and evaluation needs.

Why a Community Health Assessment?

Objectives:

- Identify and understand the status of community health needs.
- Identify community strengths and areas for improvement.
- Define improvement areas to guide the community toward implementing and sustaining policy, systems, and environmental changes around healthy living strategies (e.g., increased physical activity, improved nutrition, reduced tobacco use and exposure, and chronic disease management).
- Assist with prioritizing community needs and consider appropriate allocation of available resources.

Benefits:

- Allows local stakeholders to work together in a collaborative process to survey their community.
- Offers suggestions and examples of policy, systems, and environmental change strategies.
- Provides feedback to communities as they institute local-level change for healthy living.

Moving from the Community Health Assessment to the Community Health Improvement Plan





What is the State Health Improvement Plan (SHIP)?

A collaborative process lead by the Office of Health Transformation and the Ohio Department of Health.

An actionable plan to improve health and control healthcare spending

Strategic menu of priorities, outcome objectives and evidence-based strategies to be implemented by:

- State agencies
- Local health departments, hospitals and other community partners
- Sectors beyond health

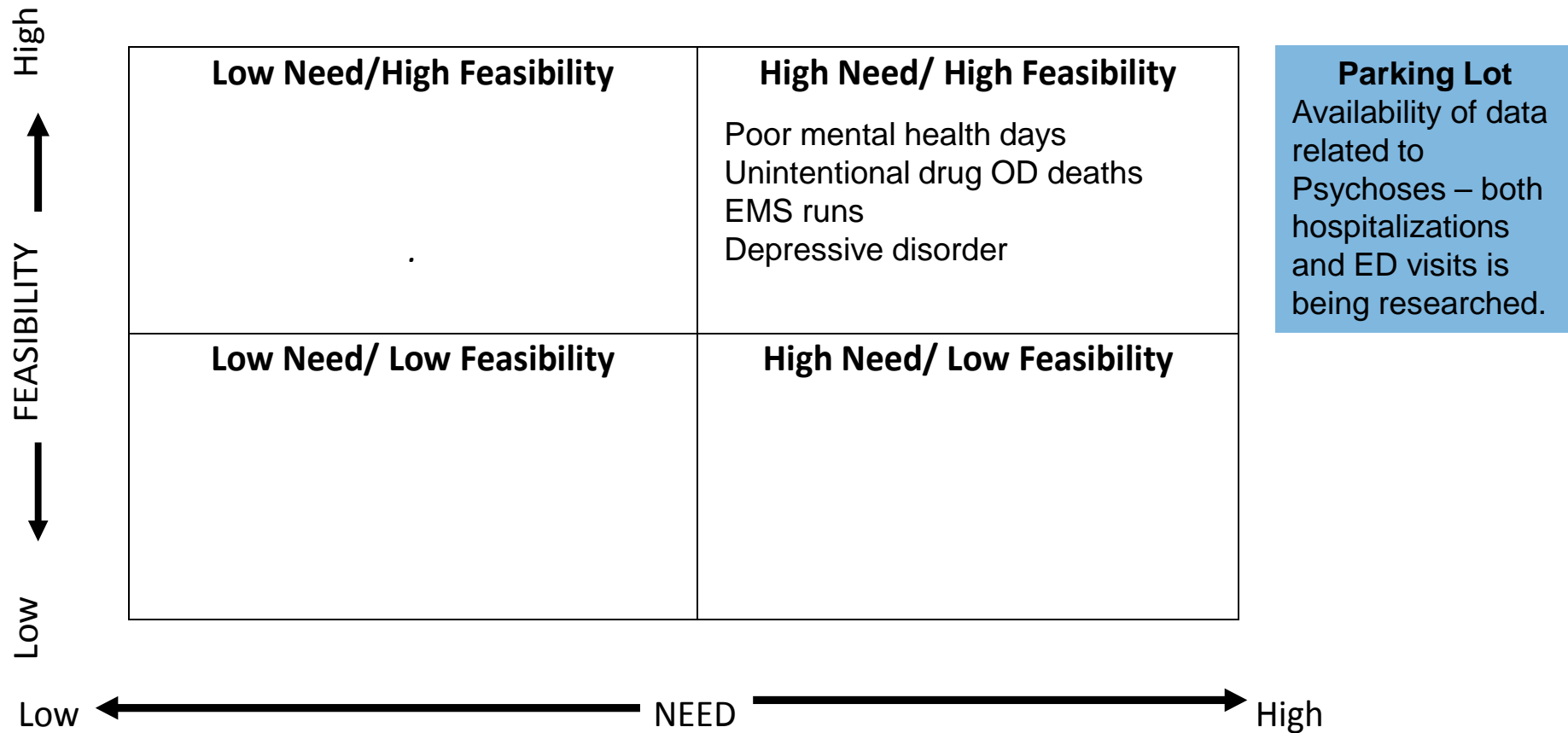

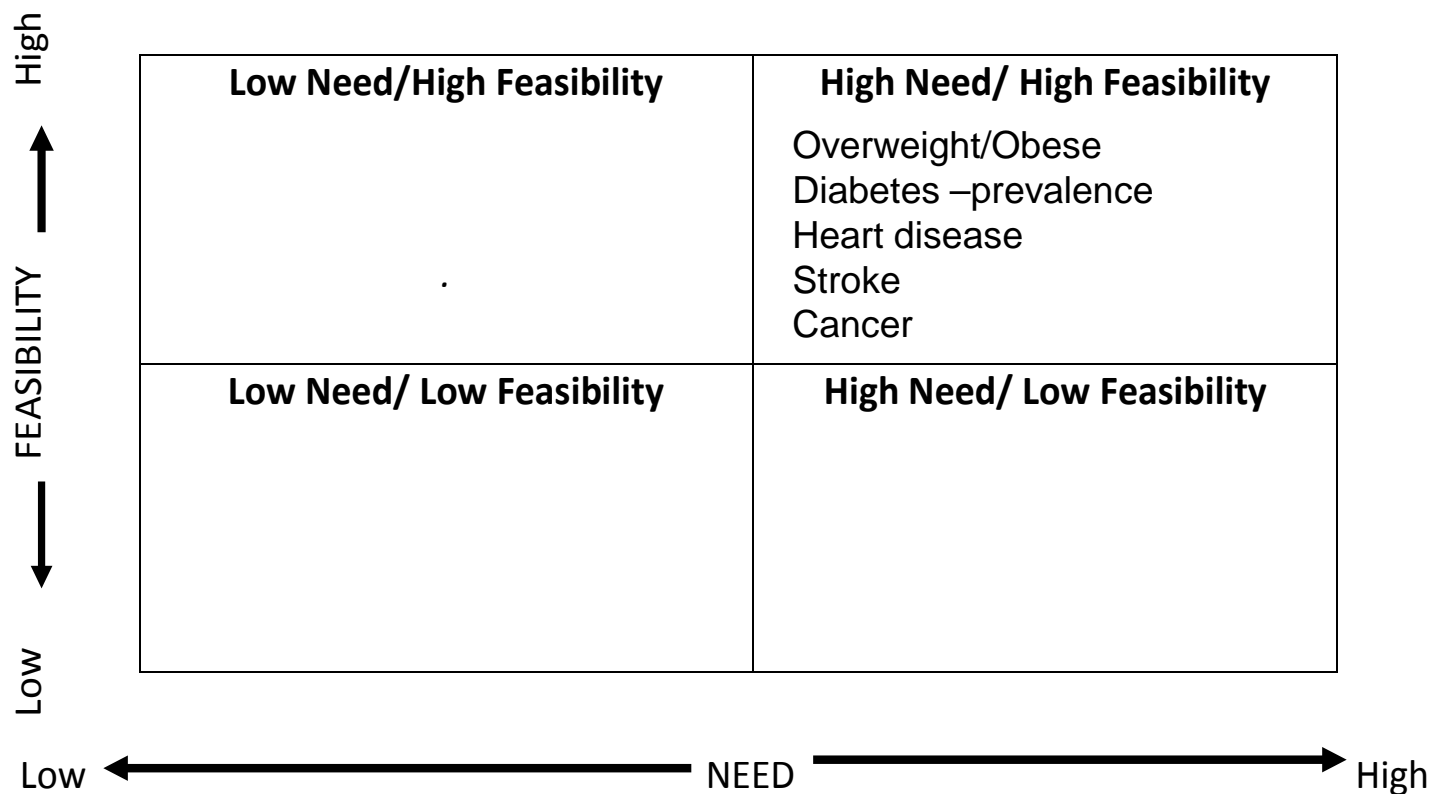

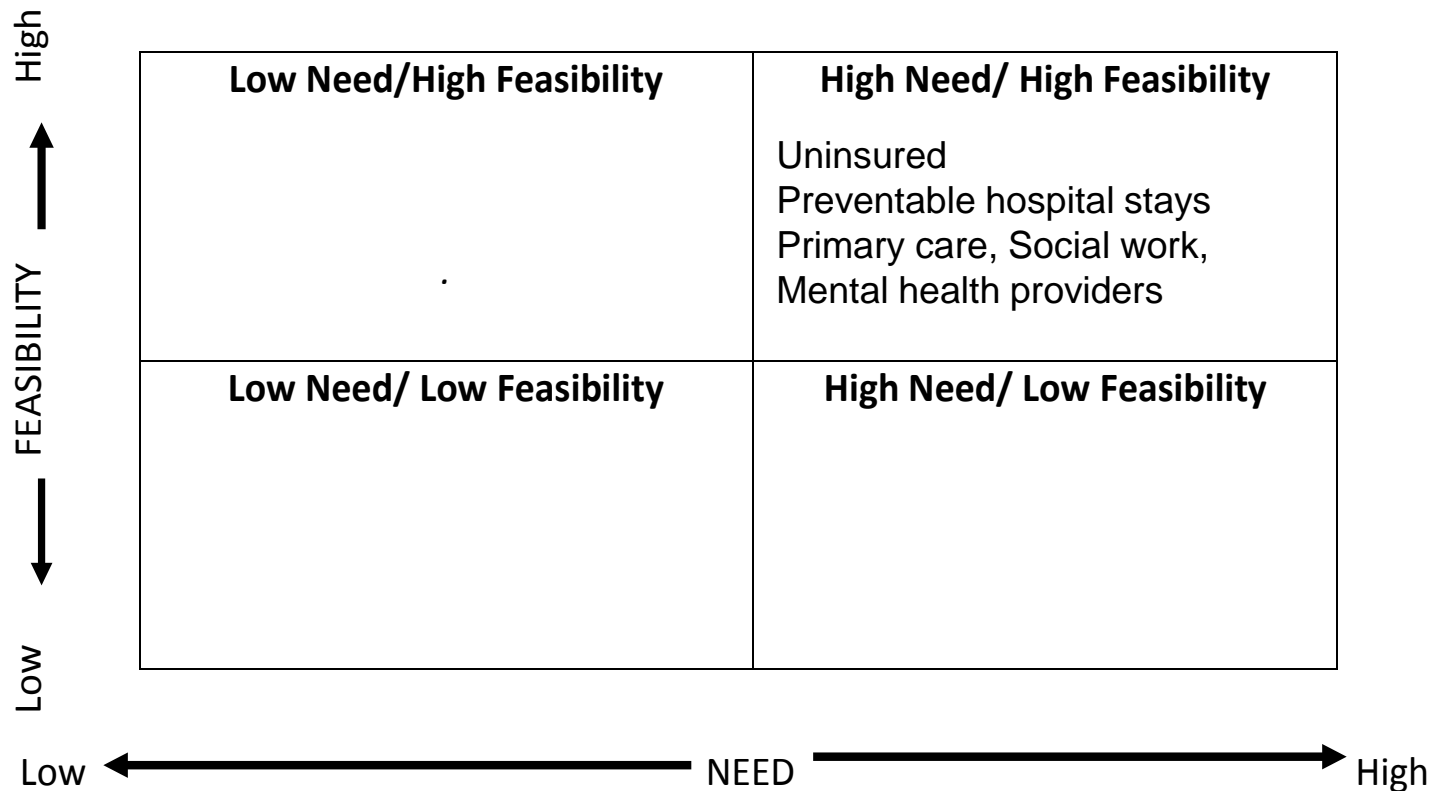

Selecting Outcomes

NEED	Low Need	High Need
Difference exist in jurisdiction	Issue is better locally	Issue worse locally
Alignment with State/Fed	No Fed/State requirements, mandates, laws	Required through Fed/State requirements, mandates, laws
Magnitude of Problem	Affects a small percent of the population	Affects a large percent of the population
Quality of Life	Impediment to ability to work or function small	Impediment to ability to work or function large
Seriousness of Consequences	Does <u>not</u> cause severe illness or premature death	Causes severe illness or premature death
Disparities exist	Disparities do not exist	Disparities do exist

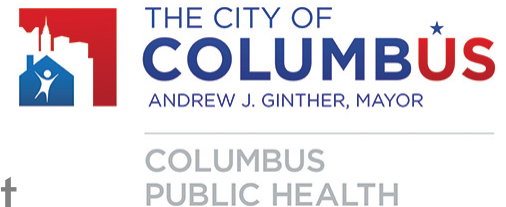
FEASIBILITY	Low Feasibility	High Feasibility
Cost Effective	Results are NOT worth the investment	Results ARE worth the financial investment
Potential for Impact	No evidence-based intervention exists to <u>positively</u> impact issue	Evidenced-based intervention exists to <u>positively</u> impact issue
Ability to monitor progress	No ability to track progress at the county level	Ability to track progress at the county level

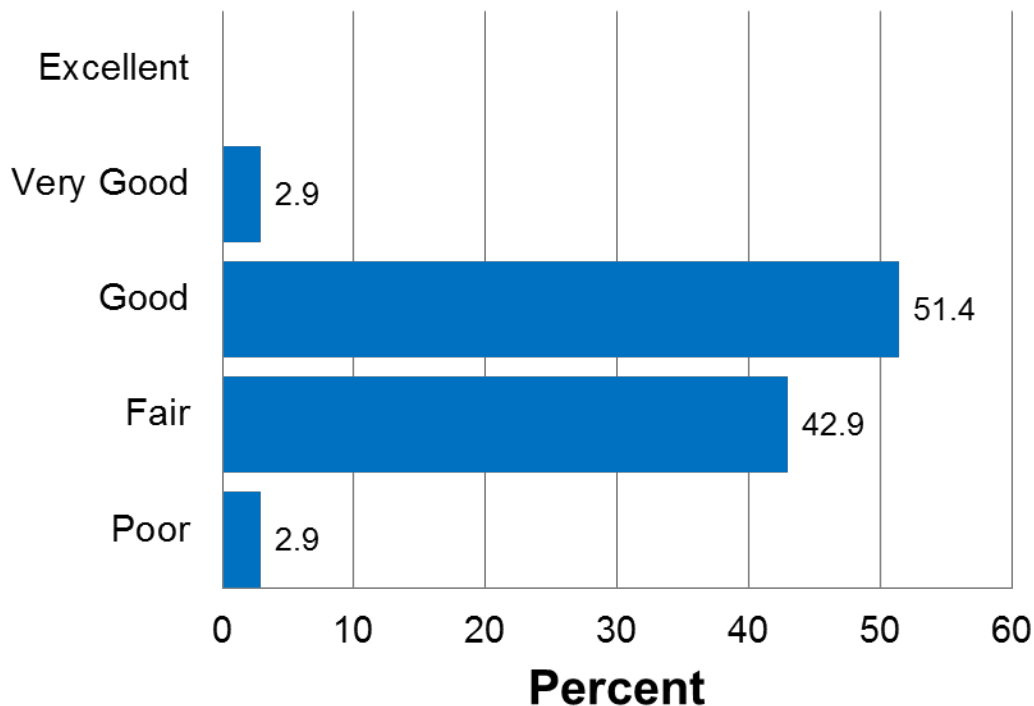
