DIVERSITY & INCLUSION

Promote diversity and inclusion across all city operations, and increase workforce and supplier opportunities for minorities and females



NEIGHBORHOODS

Engage and promote strong, distinct and vibrant neighborhoods with a focus on the greater Linden and Hilltop areas



ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Promote economic opportunity and shared prosperity through public investment and policies that help create jobs, increase median wages, improve access to affordable housing, and strengthen neighborhood infrastructure



EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT AND EDUCATION

Invest in programs and initiatives that reduce infant mortality and prepare children for future success, including high-quality prekindergarten, after-school care and summer programs



SAFETY

Enhance safety in all Columbus neighborhoods through the effective, efficient and sustainable deployment of resources and community-driven safety strategies



OPERATIONAL EFFICIENCIES

Complete a comprehensive review of city operations, identify efficiencies and reinvest savings in critical city services and programs

ALL OPERATING FUNDS

General Fund - \$872.7M (49.6%) —

Accounts for all general-purpose transactions which are not required to be accounted for in another fund.

Enterprise Fund - \$613.5M (34.9%)

Used to account for operations where the intent of the governing body is that the costs of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges.

Special Revenue Fund - \$173.5M (9.9%)

Accounts for the proceeds of specific revenue sources or to finance specified activities as required by law or administrative regulations.


Internal Services Fund - \$91.0M (5.2%) -

Accounts for the financing of goods or services provided internally to other departments or agencies on a cost-reimbursement basis.

Community Development Block Grant Fund - \$7.8M (0.4%)







WHERE DOES THE MONEY COME FROM?




WHAT DEPARTMENTS ARE SUPPORTED?

The city has established a goal of \$75M in savings.

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
