- 12 I hereby suspend purchasing and contracting requirements pursuant to CCC 329.15 to allow for the citizens of the City of Columbus in order to procure any necessary resources or supplies to protect the health, safety, and welfare of entering into contracts for the procurement of materials, supplies, equipment, construction or service
- 3 I further suspend all regulatory provisions of the Columbus City Code as necessary to allow for the time of the emergency. continued ability of the City to meet payroll, process insurance benefits, and pay vendors during the
- 4. I further suspend the requirement found in the Columbus City Health Code that the Board of Health orders pursuant to Health Code Section 775.04 except where specifically required by Revised Code and/or the Health Commissioner seek authorization from the Ohio Department of Health to issue
- 5 Emergency Management Agency of the State of Ohio. determined by the Director of Health of the State of Ohio and the Executive Director of the emergency no longer exists, such time to be determined by the Governor of the State of Ohio as This Executive Order shall take effect immediately and remain in full force and effect until the
