



Electric Energy System & Community Choice Refresher


How does this all work?

Our electricity system is composed of generation, transmission, and distribution




Most customers use AEP Ohio's Standard Service Offer (SSO) that covers generation, transmission, and distribution

AEP Ohio Standard Service Offer



AEP Ohio handles your transmission and distribution, but does not generate your electricity




Ohio is also one of seven states with legislation permitting community choice aggregation

Aggregated Electricity Consumers

What is community choice aggregation?

- Community choice aggregation is an easy and effective way for local officials to contract for competitively priced electricity based on group buying power for its residents.
- Under community choice aggregation, the City of Columbus will contract to provide residents and small businesses competitively priced, clean electricity from a retail generation supplier certified by the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio.
- Any Columbus resident or small business served by AEP Ohio will be eligible to participate in the City's community choice aggregation program.

How do residents join a community choice aggregation program?

- First, the community choice aggregation issue will be on the ballot on November 3rd, and must be passed by a majority of the voters.
- Once passed, all eligible residents and small businesses in the community will be enrolled and will begin receiving the renewable and clean energy generation pricing under the program.
- Residents do not need to do anything to join the program.

Opting out and other alternatives

What are my energy supply choices if I decide to opt-out?

You can stay with your current utility who will place you with a supplier of their choice, and will continue to supply your electricity as it always has, or you can shop for an alternative generation supplier

What if I've already selected an alternative generation supplier?

If you have already chosen an alternative supplier and community choice aggregation is approved by the voters, you will stay with your chosen supplier and you will not be sent an opt- out letter. Again, since you are currently in a contract, we simply remove you from the program at the beginning. You will have the option to join the City's community choice aggregation program when you decide it is best. The choice is always yours.

You will still receive one bill for transmission, distribution, and generation

What are we trying to achieve?

Aggregation will have multiple benefits for Columbus



100% CLEAN ENERGY

Columbus' goal is 100% clean, renewable energy by 2022 and to be carbon neutral by 2050. Clean energy can include sources such as wind and solar.



CLEAN ENERGY JOBS

Community choice aggregation creates demand for local renewable energy sources and good paying jobs that support workforce development in the clean energy industry.



COMMUNITY


The City bulk-purchases energy on behalf of residents and small businesses, providing competitive pricing and local control of the energy source. Residents receive the same service & bill from AEP. Participation is voluntary and residents can opt-out at any time.

It starts with a Vote...

On July 20th, the City of Columbus passed legislation to place clean energy electric aggregation on the November 3rd ballot. The language will appear as:

Shall the City of Columbus have the authority to aggregate the retail electric loads located within the incorporated areas of the City, to support local clean energy generation, energy savings, and Columbus's sustainable economy and for that purpose, enter into services agreements to facilitate for those loads the sale and purchase of electricity, such aggregation to occur automatically except where any person elects to opt-out, in accordance with Section 4928.20 of the Ohio Revised Code and Ordinance No. 1642-2020 adopted by the Council?

Columbus will use our energy supply contract for 100% renewable electricity
