

Through collaboration with families and their communities, we advocate for the safety, permanency and well-being of each child we serve in a manner that honors family and culture.










Vision

Safety, Permanency and Well-being for every child






Black Girls Currently Make up 21% of the Children Served by FCCS


Age Breakdown of Black Girls Currently Being Served by FCCS

Outcomes of Services


- Ensure Black Girls remain in the community and educational setting

Permanency Challenges

- Youth want to stay with siblings
- Youth not open to leaving Ohio
- Youth want to remain in same school setting and current community
- Youth want to maintain relationship/close proximity with family
- Youth with treatment needs
- Divided loyalties






Opportunities in Provision of Services

- Increase kinship placement and supports when removal from home is necessary
- Increase involvement/participation in leadership opportunities
- Build a culture of equity throughout the agency to foster positive outcomes for Black Girls and all children and strengthen relationships with our partners
