

Fact Sheet: Earned Preference Points for Secondary Language Fluency

For the 2022 Police Officer Exam, you will have the opportunity to earn points added to your final, phase III test score. You can earn up to 10 points for a qualifying language proficiency.

You will need to take and pass the two written phases of the Police Officer Exam given in English.

When you apply for Police Officer, select the language you are fluent in, if any. If you would like to take a language fluency exam but did not select this on your application, contact the Civil Service Commission (CSC) at 614.645.0800 or policefiretesting@columbus.gov.

After passing the written exams, if you selected one of the languages, the CSC will email you about your opportunity to take a language proficiency exam.

The CSC will pay for the language assessment administered by language testing experts.

The language proficiency exam will be a remotely proctored verbal exam that you can take from your home if you have a computer or laptop with an enabled webcam and audio (a smartphone is not an alternative). Alternatively, you can schedule to take the exam at 1111 E. Broad St. Columbus, OH.

You must complete the language proficiency exam by the designated date to earn points.

Your language proficiency test results must be at a level of intermediate mid to superior to earn points.

You may qualify in only one of the languages listed above.

Use the following table as a self-assessment to better understand the ranges assessed through the language proficiency exam and the possible points earned.
