

February 2022 Recreation & Parks Commission Report

Administration Agenda Items

1. Davey Street Tree Contract Modification #3 (0385-2022)

Project History/Background: This ordinance will authorize the modification of an existing contract with Davey Resource Group to continue citywide street tree assessment as part of the Urban Forestry Master Plan. The expenditure of \$239,250.00 was legislated for the Street Trees – Site Assessment and Inventory 2020 Project by Ordinance 2336-2020. The contract was modified and increased by \$46,350.00 authorized by Ordinances 0641-2017, 2817-2018 & 2615-2019. The contract was modified again and increased by \$300,000 authorized by Ordinance 2040-2021. This ordinance will provide funding that will modify the previously authorized amount by up to an additional \$300,000.00. The aggregate total amount authorized for this contract, including this modification, is \$885,600.00.

In April of 2021, the Columbus Recreation and Parks Commission voted in support of and Columbus City Council passed a resolution to support the Columbus Urban Forestry Master Plan (UFMP) and its immediate implementation. By authorizing the implementation of the Urban Forestry Master Plan, the Forestry Section of the Recreation and Parks Department can implement key recommendations through hiring staff, purchasing equipment, procuring tree service contracts, inventorying the City's street trees, designing a new facility for Forestry's North Zone, and engaging urban forestry consultants.

Fiscal Impact: \$300,000.00 is budgeted and available from within the Recreation and Parks Voted Bond Fund 7702 to meet the financial obligations of this expenditure.

Area(s) Affected: Citywide (99)

Emergency Justification: Emergency action is requested for continuity of services furthering the implementation of the Urban Forestry Master Plan, beginning this urgent work of prioritizing, preserving, and growing Columbus' tree canopy. With challenges on the horizon like population

growth, public health issues, and climate change, beginning strategic investment in Columbus' trees immediately will ensure the continued health and safety of our residents.

Benefits to the Public: Street trees provide numerous environmental, health, and energy efficiency benefits to residents.

Community Input/Issues: More than 135 residents attended a public open house to provide input on the Urban Forestry Master Plan and more than 300 residents submitted feedback electronically. Many comments referred to the management of public trees and the need for additional tree plantings.

Master Plan Relation: This project supports the department's Master Plan by conserving, protecting, and enhancing the city's natural resources and overall environmental health, benefitting current and future generations.

2. 2022 Gym Floor Refinishing Program (0386-2022)

Project History/Background: This ordinance is to authorize the Director of the Recreation and Parks Department to enter into contract with Floor Care Concepts for the 2022 Gym Floor Refinishing Program and to authorize an expenditure of \$70,000.00 from the Recreation and Parks Operating Fund 2285.

A gym floor refinishing program (Program) was established by the Fiscal, Strategic Planning, and Design/Construction sections to standardize material specifications and to establish a schedule for maintenance. The Program occurs annually and includes sanding, screening, and logo/paint re-touches for the gym floors, stages, and dance floors located in CRPD Community Centers and Athletic Complexes. The annual Program will maintain a quality playing surface on the gym floors, stages, and dance floors in the most long-term and cost-effective manner for the Department.

Proposals were advertised through Vendor Services, in accordance with City Code Section 329, on January 13th, 2022 and received by the Recreation and Parks Department on January 27th, 2022.

Emergency Justification: Emergency action is requested in order to ensure the contractor can proceed with their work scheduled in late March of 2022. The schedules for the gym floor refinishing were pre-scheduled by center staff and have little to no flexibility for rescheduling due to programming demands.

Benefits to the Public: The public will be able to enjoy programming and athletics on high quality, ADA-compliant, and aesthetically pleasing wood surfaces.

Community Input/Issues: The gym floor, stage, and dance floor surfaces are on a rotating schedule for screening and sanding treatments. Any outstanding issue on a floor, such as significant damage or a request for additional sport court lines, was communicated through center managers and will be addressed in the contract.

Area(s) Affected: City Wide - Each facility with a wood floor will be affected.

Master Plan Relation: This project will support the mission of the Recreation and Parks Master Plan by helping to ensure that the facilities remain accessible, safe, updated, and able to be used by the public.

3. Alum Creek Trail – Johnstown Road East Side Connector (0388-2022)

Project History/Background: This ordinance is to authorize the Director of the Recreation and Parks Department to modify an existing contract with CTL Engineering Inc. (ord. 0918-2020) to provide Professional Construction Management and Inspection services associated with Alum Creek Trail – Johnstown Road East Side Connector Project.

In 2014, the Department was awarded federal grant funding from MORPC, administered by Ohio Department of Transportation (PID 99828), for construction funds to improve safety and access to the Alum Creek Trail for the East Columbus/Krumm Park community. The project will build a trail from the Alum Creek Trail near Ohio Dominican University to Johnstown Road and Cassady Avenue. The one mile project also includes walking and biking improvements along Johnstown Road and 10th Avenue connecting to Krumm Park and William Adams Community Center.

The project includes separated trail, bike lanes, modifications to an existing trail bridge, and safety improvements for the neighborhood to connect to the regional trail. The East Columbus neighborhood is bounded by 5th Avenue to I-670 and Stelzer Road to Alum Creek. Over 4,000 residents and employees will be within a 10 min walk from this project. The connector opens up access to over 126 miles of regional trail network. A future section of this project will extend the bike lanes along Johnstown Road to downtown Gahanna.

By modifying this contract, CTL Engineering Inc. will be authorized to continue to provide construction management and inspection services for the remainder of the Alum Creek Trail – Johnstown Road East Side Connector construction project. The construction Project experienced a significant, unexpected delay, thus causing a need for a time extension for both construction and construction management and inspection services. This modification covers the management and inspection services. Another modification for construction will be forthcoming.

CTL Engineering Inc. would perform the services most efficiently and effectively since they have been on it from the start. Additionally, it would not be in the best interest of Recreation and Parks to not have a gap in construction management and inspection services, which would be

the case if the Department were to award the remainder of the work through another procurement process. The cost for this modification was determined by estimating remaining effort hours (based on historical hours spent during previous months of work on the contract) multiplied by established hourly rates.

Proposals were originally advertised through Vendor Services, in accordance with City Code Section 329, on March 11th, 2020 and received by the Recreation and Parks Department on April 3rd, 2020. Proposals were received from the following companies:

Fiscal Impact: The expenditure of \$898,362.74 was legislated for the Olentangy Trail - Arena District Connector Bridge project by Ordinance 1556-2017 and 1272-2019. This ordinance will provide funding that will modify the previously authorized amount by \$385,000. \$385,000.00 is budgeted and available in the Recreation and Parks Voted Bond Fund 7702 to meet the financial obligations of this contract modification. The aggregate total amount authorized, including this modification, is \$1,283,362.74.

Area(s) Affected: East Columbus (#50), All Columbus trail users

Number of residents served: Over 4,000 residents live within minutes of this project. Once completed, new connectivity and safer walking and cycling for all ages is provided to the regional network.

Emergency Justification: Emergency action is requested in order to enter into contract due to construction work is currently taking place, and Recreation and Parks does not want a delay in providing construction management and inspection services for the construction work.

Benefits to the Public: Cycling, walking, running, and active trail uses provide highly recognized year-round benefits to urban lifestyles. Access to trails and to key destinations is one of the top rated priorities noted by East Columbus residents.

Community Input/Issues: The department conducted extensive public involvement during plan development with neighborhood public open houses, letters of support from the community, City of Gahanna, and social media feedback from trail users around the region.

Master Plan Relation: This project will support the mission of the Recreation and Parks Master Plan by improving access to trails and greenways corridors. Providing a safer trail and active mode of transportation to a disadvantaged community.

4. Clean Ohio Conservation Fund: Franklinton Greenspace and Big Walnut South Protection (0389-2022)

Project History/Background: This ordinance authorizes the Director of the Recreation and Parks Department to apply for grant funding to acquire properties for preservation of the City's natural resources. The Clean Ohio Conservation Fund is accepting applications for funding to preserve natural areas and greenway corridors. The application requires a resolution of support from the Commission and City Council. If awarded funding, a separate piece of legislation will be submitted later to enter into a grant agreement, accept the grant funds, and allocate the local match funds.

These two grant applications for Clean Ohio Conservation Funds would provide funding towards fee simple acquisition of three sites along West Broad Street in the Franklinton community, and a 64.25 acre site along Big Walnut Creek near Three Creeks Park in the Far South side of the City. These applications require a resolution of support from the Commission and City Council. If awarded funding, a separate piece of legislation will be submitted later to enter into a grant agreement, accept the grant funds, and allocate the local match funds.

1. Franklinton Greenspace Protection (Three Properties)

Statistics show that the West Franklinton community has the least amount of public greenspace in Columbus: 10.8 acres parkland in a community of over 9,000 residents.

The purpose of the project is to acquire 5 acres of greenspace in the West Franklinton community, on West Broad Street. The properties are within 3 blocks of each other:

Site 1--4 lots at West Broad Street and West Park Avenue.

Site 2--1 parcel at West Broad and Glenwood Avenue.

These sites will become protected passive greenspace in the city's most underserved community for parks and open space. They will add additional public greenspace adjacent to existing parkland, provide open space for trees and passive recreation, and increased walking and biking opportunities.

2. Big Walnut Creek South Preservation

Big Walnut Creek is known to be one of the highest quality major waterways in Central Ohio. For several years, the south segment of the river has been a focus of Recreation and Parks to acquire and preserve endangered riparian corridor.

The purpose of the project is to acquire 64.25 acres of riparian property on Big Walnut Creek on the southeast side of Columbus, near Winchester Pike and I-270. Over 0.75 mile (3,700 l.f.) of Big Walnut flows through the site. Acquiring this property along the west bank of Big Walnut will complete the protection of 1.5 miles of the river corridor, both banks.

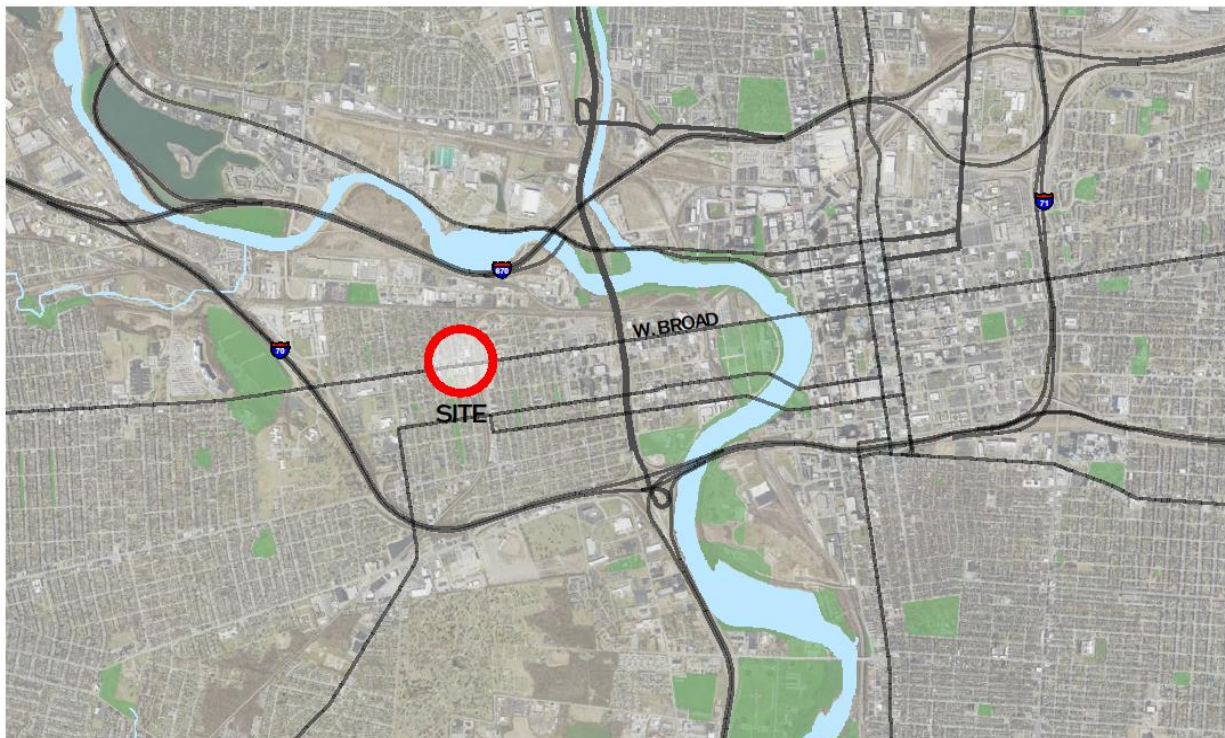
Number of residents served: Over 6,800 residents live within a 1 mile radius of these projects.

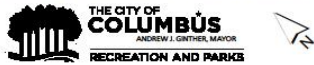
Emergency Justification: Emergency action is being requested for this authorization as it is required as part of the grant application, which is due March 11, 2022. These applications require a resolution of support from the Commission and City Council.

Benefits to the Public: Protection of the City's high quality waterways, inner city park space, greenway corridors, ravines, and urban forests. Both projects are within rapidly urbanizing or built out areas of the city, and preservation of key natural sites is one of the main missions of Recreation and Parks. Conservation of these sites proposed in this Clean Ohio project relies heavily upon outside funding assistance to achieve these benefits.

Community Input/Issues: During the past decade, residents in these communities, and the city at large, has expressed strong priority for more protected stream corridors, headwater tributaries, access to nature, walking paths, and urban forest conservation.

Master Plan Relation: Protecting the environmental health and resilience of the city's waterways; providing long term protection corridors for walking and biking and outdoor experiences. Expanded and equitable access to inner city greenspaces.

5. Glenwood Park – Natural Area Improvement Project (0390-2022)

Project History/Background: This ordinance is to authorize the Director of the Recreation and Parks Department to enter into contract with Resource International to provide Professional Engineering services for the Glenwood Park Natural Area Improvement.

The Columbus Recreation and Parks Department (CRPD) sought proposals from qualified Consulting Firms for professional design and engineering services for Glenwood Park Natural Area Improvements (Project). Glenwood Park is located at 1888 Fairmont Avenue in the City of Columbus, Ohio. Glenwood Park consists of 16.7 acres in a west central location of the City of Columbus (City) and contains approximately 8.7 acres developed land with a recreational facility, swimming pool, and 8.0 acres of undeveloped wooded terrain.

For years, the local community has advocated for beautification of the Greater Hilltop area presented in the Envision Hilltop: A Community Plan for Shared Success

(<https://www.envisionhilltop.com/>). Neighborhood volunteer groups, including Friends of Glenwood Park and the Highland West Civic Association have partnered with the City to remove invasive species, dead, dying, and diseased trees, and litter. These efforts reflect the Hilltop community's desire to revitalize this underutilized acreage of Glenwood Park. The overarching goal with improving Glenwood Park includes, creating more access, improving line of sight, and enhancing overall site safety for the community.

The entire 16.7-acre property is divided into three (3) separate physiographic areas. The existing Glenwood Community Center and Pool are in a relatively high flat topographic land space that is higher than West Broad Street, defined as the Upper Terrace. Along the land slope there is an intermediate perched flat area, defined as the Middle Terrace. An existing natural trail clearing, former Superior roadway, is evident along the Middle Terrace with a buried stone staircase down to the bottom of the slope. The lower wooded terrain and wooded land slope, defined as the Lowland Area, is relatively equal to or lower in elevation to Broad Street. The Lowland Area is the primary focus of this project, including but not limited to; trail design, wetland enhancement, park signage, amenities, park boundaries and street frontage and aesthetics.

Proposals were advertised among 3 of our prequalified consulting firms in accordance with City Code Section 329, on January 10, 2022 and received by the Recreation and Parks Department on January 21, 2022. Proposals were received from the following companies:

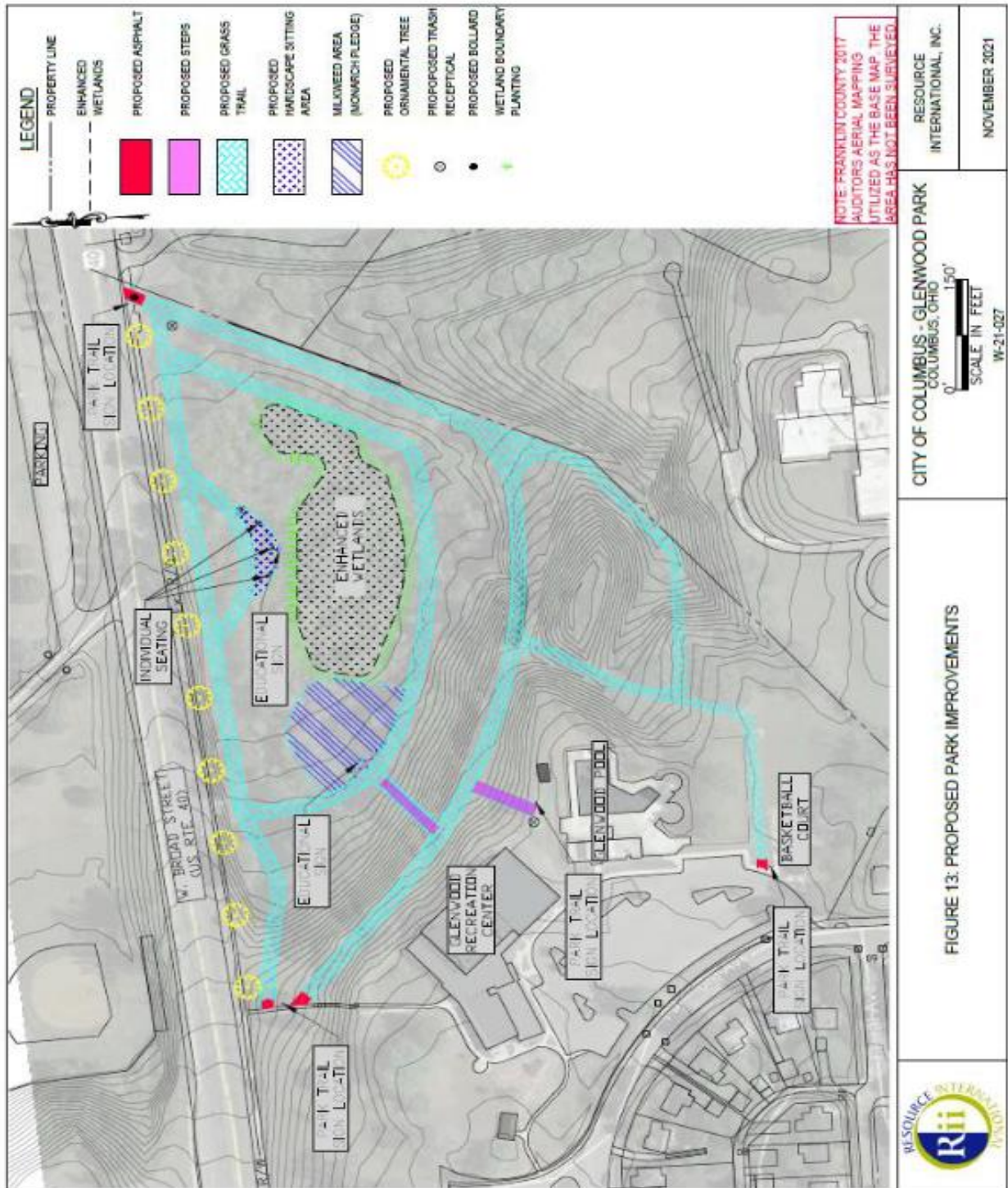
Emergency Justification: With the Community Engagement now complete on the project, we are anticipating a late fall start date for construction. Emergency Legislation is required to provide time for the design so that the construction can start in 2022 and finish by the spring of 2023 when the park will be in use by the residents.

Benefits to the Public: This project will benefit the community by providing a safe, accessible, and fun place for children to play and adults to passively recreate. This project will also provide educational components of the natural resources, such as wetlands, tree species etc., to support the neighborhoods knowledge.

Community Input/Issues: The concept of the improving the natural Glenwood parkland has been discussed by the Greater Hilltop AC, the Highland West and Friends of groups within this area for the past five (5) years. Over the past 18 months, we've had monthly meetings with said groups and often times, we've visited groups separately, at their monthly scheduled meetings. They will continue to be involved throughout the design and construction process to provide input as well as volunteer support.

Number of residents served: 2,189 residents live within a 10 minute walk from the proposed park development.

Master Plan Relation: This project will support the mission of the Recreation and Parks Master Plan to provide quality recreational parks, trails, and easy, all-age connectivity for Columbus residents.

6. **KNS Surveillance Maintenance (0164-2022)**

Project History/Background: This ordinance authorizes the Director of the Recreation and Parks Department to enter into contract with KNS Services Inc. for parts and labor to do inspection, maintenance and repairs of the department's surveillance camera systems.

K.N.S. Services, Inc. has provided surveillance system installation and repair for the department for many years. They also service many other city departments including Public Safety, Finance and Public Utilities. They have established a unique relationship with the Department of Technology to provide robust service to multiple departments in the city. The City of Columbus selected the Genetec software platform years ago for all departments to utilize for their surveillance systems with the vision of aggregating these services city wide. This effort has resulted in K.N.S. Services becoming the premiere provider of these services for several departments. The amount of infrastructure development, security clearance access and continued excellent support provided by this company leaves it as the only clear choice to continue logistical support for our systems.

CRPD owns 55 unique surveillance systems comprised of 508 cameras around the city. Most of these systems are on the Genetec platform which provides remote viewing, access management and organizational integration. In the past we have had several staff involved in keeping these systems monitored and repaired, in addition to the contract help of K.N.S. The task has simply become too great for our staff to keep up with and we need professional help in the way of system function checks and priority service response. This contract accomplished that by have K.N.S. personnel do system function checks on our systems twice weekly and immediately dispatching to effect repairs on no-functioning components of the system. We will continue to ask our site managers to keep an eye on their systems and report issues.

This contract not only gets a quicker response time for repairs, but also makes available to us 24/7 access to an emergency response in the event of a serious crime occurrence if the system is having a issues of recall or playback. These are frequently network or hardware issues that require a trained technician to pullup video history. In addition, this contract will establish a more robust par stock of cameras, digital recording units, switches, etc. on the shelf for immediate deployment when failures occur within our system. We have had instances where delays in receiving replacement components has taken weeks leaving a system inoperable. The new par stock will minimize these extended downtimes.

7. Columbus Urban League - NVI 2022 (0250-2022)

Project History/Background: This ordinance authorizes the Director of Recreation and Parks Department to enter into contract with Columbus Urban League (CUL) for the amount of \$329,500.00 in order to provide violence interruption and crisis response activities that include responding to specific violent confrontations, working to mediate and diffuse conflict tensions, and actively promoting peace building among our youth. Contractor shall maintain a 24-hour, 7-day-a-week schedule to respond to calls regarding youth violence confrontations such as shootings, aggravated assaults, homicides, and other violent incidents.

The Contractor shall respond to incidents or conflicts that within their assigned zone(s) or may impact their assigned zone(s). The Contractor shall also provide support services to victims' families and friends. Support services will be provided after making initial contact with victims'

families and friends at the scene of an incident, hospital or at a time and location chosen by the victims' families and friends. Support services can also include Contractor attending funerals, vigils, peace marches, etc. Additionally, Community Intervention Workers shall participate in Neighborhood Violence Interruption (NVI) activities and initiatives focusing on reducing youth violence citywide and improving community collaborations to support the NVI initiative. The Columbus Urban League will hold a surety bond in the amount of \$100,000.00 and Certificate of Insurance as required by the City.

8. Community for New Direction - NVI 2022 (0260-2022)

Project History/Background: This ordinance authorizes the Director of Recreation and Parks Department to enter into contract with Community for New Direction (CND) for the amount of \$329,500.00 in order to provide violence interruption and crisis response activities that include responding to specific violent confrontations, working to mediate and diffuse conflict tensions, and actively promoting peace building among our youth. Contractor shall maintain a 24-hour, 7-day-a-week schedule to respond to calls regarding youth violence confrontations such as shootings, aggravated assaults, homicides, and other violent incidents.

The Contractor shall respond to incidents or conflicts that within their assigned zone(s) or may impact their assigned zone(s). The Contractor shall also provide support services to victims' families and friends. Support services will be provided after making initial contact with victims' families and friends at the scene of an incident, hospital or at a time and location chosen by the victims' families and friends. 9. ODE Grant for 2022 Summer Food Program and CCS (0151-2022)

Project History/Background: This ordinance authorizes the Director of Recreation and Parks Department to accept a grant from the Ohio Department of Education in the amount of \$2,500,000.00 for the operation of the 2022 Summer Food Service Program and to enter into contract with the Columbus City Schools in the amount of \$2,300,000.00.

The Summer Food Service Program is administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture through the Ohio Department of Education. The program provides nutritionally balanced breakfasts, lunches, and snacks to qualified children in need during the summer months. The program will serve approximately 150,000 breakfast meals, 250,000 lunch meals, and 90,000 snacks. Thousands of children will be served through this program at 150-200 sites throughout the greater Columbus area.

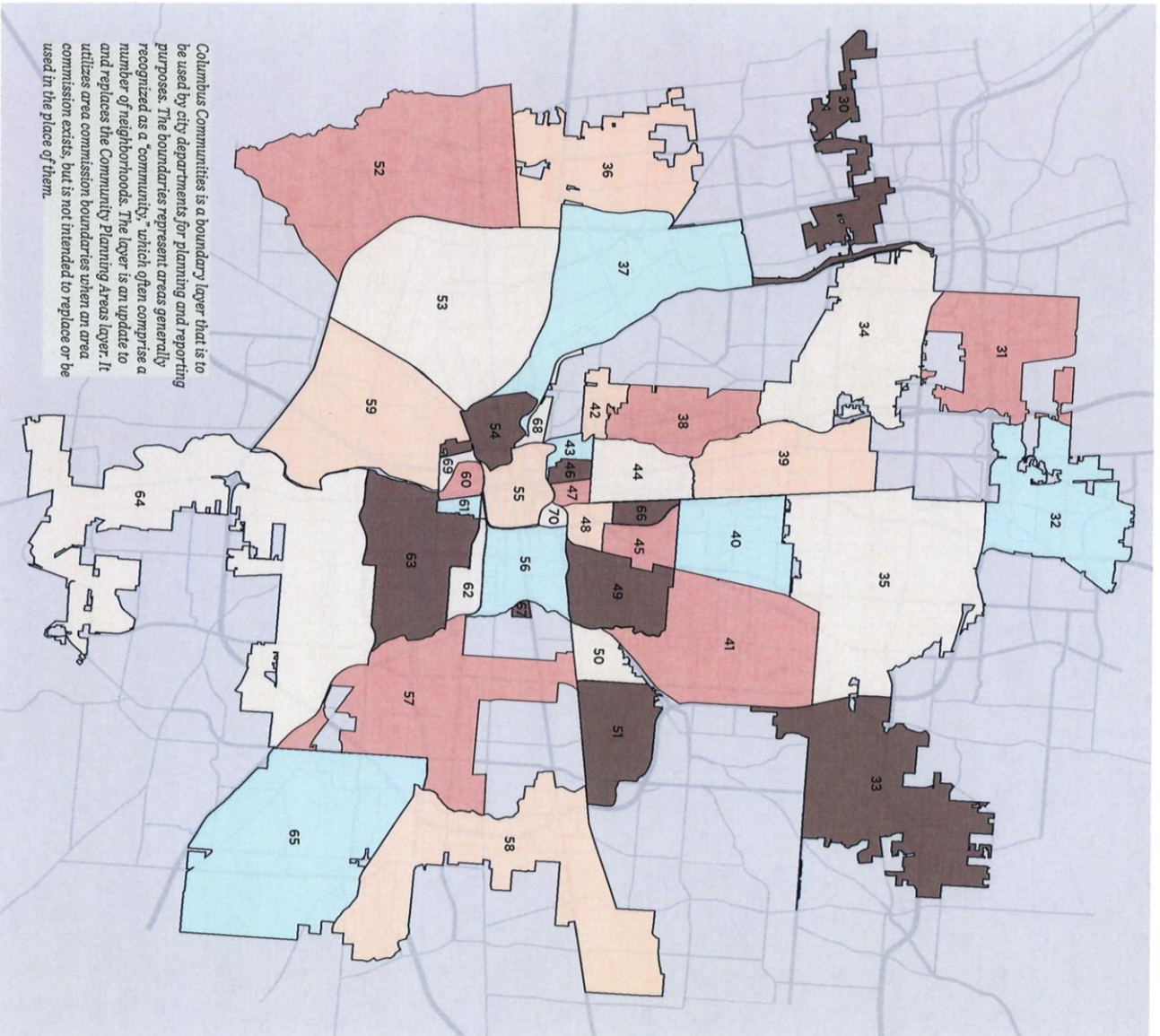

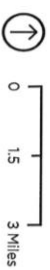
