

Southside Families & Babies – February 2014

The month of February is typically used to celebrate the people we love for Valentine's Day and the people who came before us for Black History month. But let us not forget that last year by the end of the month of February 15 babies in Franklin County died before their first birthday. That is 15 children who will never get to ask another classmate to be their Valentine, or will never get to contribute to society like Dr. King or Sojourner Truth. Every baby that dies is denied the right to reach his or her full potential.

DATA NEWS

When a community's infant mortality rate is high, many other indicators of health and social condition are also not ideal. For example, zip codes with high infant mortality rates typically also have populations with higher rates of obesity, smoking, and joblessness.

Life expectancy data for 2007-2011 for zip codes in Franklin County range from 64.0 to 84.1 years. The Franklin County average is 77.5 years. Of 42 zip codes with data, 43207 and 43206 have the 7th and 10th worst (lowest) life expectancies, at 71.4 and 74.1 years respectively.

Recap of last meeting.

At our last meeting in November, the team discussed the rates of infant mortality on the South Side and compared the data to Franklin County, Ohio, and the United States. The perinatal periods of risk map below shows that the biggest contributor to infant mortality among South Side residents is issues and conditions related to the health of moms and prematurity.

As we move forward, begin to think of some strategies that can reduce infant mortality on the South Side. Since most of our deaths among infants are due to issues with maternal health and prematurity, some possible strategies include birth spacing, education, teen pregnancy, etc. "Do not regret growing older. <u>Local</u>

Caring for 2

Columbus Public Health Caring for 2 is one of 105 Federal Healthy Start Projects in the nation funded to implement community-driven services to address the rate of infant mortality, increase access to health care and eliminate disparity through outreach, case management and health education.

Caring for 2 interdisciplinary team of public health nurses, social workers and care coordinators provide in-home health education and social services including pregnancy tests, referrals and community education for pregnant and parenting women in three Columbus neighborhoods: Near East, Near South and South Linden (Zip Codes: 43201, 43203, 43205, 43206, 43207, 43209, 43211, 43215, and 43219).

Services address maternal medical and behavioral risks with a focus to improve poor birth outcomes and healthy behavioral.

Services are available at NO COST and referrals are received through our central intake 614-645-7068 or fax to 614-645-0865


Columbus Public Health Car Seat Program

This program helps provide car seats and booster seats at a reduced cost to families in need.

To get a seat, families must participate in a one hour car seat class. The class teaches the safety features of the car seat and how to install it in a vehicle the right way so that it can protect the child the best. All seats are new.

Costs

- \$30 for infant car seat
- \$30 for convertible car seat
