This project will address aging infrastructure associated with several chemical feed systems that are necessary for adequate drinking water treatment. Bidders were requested to quote a discount off the listed prices for each standard published catalog they wish to bid. Bidders were also given an opportunity to quote multiple discounts. The solicitation stated it was the City's intention to make at least three (3) awards to maximize the selection and available discounts for Small Electric Motors, however, the two (2) lowest bidders can provide all the requested manufactures needed for City agencies to make their purchases. The City of Columbus has implemented a new e-catalog system. This system allows city agencies to search for items needed and compare pricing to get best value. A waiver of regulations is being submitted to award to multiple suppliers as the Code does not envision multiple awards for the same items.

The Purchasing Office has accepted two (2) proposals from major corporations that provide a wide range of small electric motors that our City agencies are currently purchasing. The proposals are from W.W. Grainger Inc. and GD Supply Inc. dba Johnstone Supply. Both suppliers submitted required documents and offered various discount percentages off their supplier catalog/ pricelist.

The Purchasing Office is recommending award to the lowest most responsive, responsible and best bidders as follows:

The goal of this project is to procure the upgrade and installation of a new Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) System for the Division of Water. The planning area for this project is "Citywide" since the system provides support to several central Ohio communities.

2. ECONOMIC IMPACT/ADVANTAGES; COMMUNITY OUTREACH; PROJECT DEVELOPMENT; ENVIRONMENTAL FACTORS/ADVANTAGES OF PROJECT:

The current SCADA system is over 17 years old and nearing the end of its useful life. The equipment is antiquated and no longer has any technical support available. Compatible replacement parts are no longer produced and have become extremely difficult to obtain. The new SCADA system will provide off-site emergency backup and will greatly reduce the risk of customers losing water service for an extended amount of time due to a SCADA system failure.

- **3.0 CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT AWARD:** The Director of Public Utilities publicly opened one bid on February 10, 2016 from Schneider Electric Buildings Americas in the amount of \$5,236,568.50.
- **3.1 PRE-QUALIFICATION STATUS:** Schneider Electric Buildings Americas and all proposed subcontractors have met code requirements with respect to pre-qualification, pursuant to relevant sections of Columbus City Code Chapter 329.

Legislation Number: 0585-2016

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This ordinance is to appropriate and transfer \$195,000.00 from the existing Hotel/Motel Tax appropriation to the Recreation and Parks Department for the support of various annual cultural arts programming for the enrichment of the community. Events typically supported by these funds include regional festivals and programming such as Jazz and Rib Fest, Fall Harvest Jamboree, Scioto Mile programming, Festival Latino and community events through the *Partnership through Sponsorship* Program.

Background: CAPA plans, organizes and manages Festival Latino, which at one time was coordinated by the Recreation and Parks Department. Funds are needed to secure a variety of performing artists of Latino heritage, promote and market the event, recruit volunteers, host free family activities, oversee event operations, obtain required state and city permits, and clean the venue to the satisfaction of the city.

The *Partnership through Sponsorship* Program was created in 1995 by City Council to support community groups and neighbors that host free, non-alcoholic events that celebrate cultural, ethnic and artistic diversity for the entertainment and enjoyment by the greater Columbus community. All events must occur within a Columbus park, facility, street, or public place.

Emergency Justification: Emergency action is requested as it is immediately necessary to appropriate and transfer funds for necessary expenditures starting in March.

Financial Impact:

The City Auditor is directed to appropriate and transfer \$195,000.00 from the Hotel/Motel Tax Fund to the Recreation and Parks Operating Fund.

This ordinance also authorizes an expenditure of \$25,000.00 from the Recreation and Parks Operating Fund 2285 to enter into contract with CAPA.

To authorize the appropriation and transfer of \$195,000.00 from the Hotel/Motel Tax Fund to the Recreation and Parks Operating Fund for the support of various annual cultural arts programming; to appropriate \$195,000.00 in the Recreation and Parks Fund; to authorize the Director of Recreation and Parks to enter into contract with CAPA for Festival Latino programming; to authorize the expenditure of \$25,000.00 from the Recreation and Parks Fund; and to declare an emergency. (\$195,000.00)

WHEREAS, Columbus City Code Section 371.02 allows for the allocation of a maximum of 1.59 percent in relation to the 5.1 percent Hotel/Motel Tax receipts for use for said purpose of the advancement of the cultural development of the community - the equivalent of 31.18 percent of collections; and

APPLICANT: Community Properties of Ohio Management Services, LLC; c/o Thomas F. Kibbey, Atty.; 41 South High Street, 2000 Huntington Center; Columbus, OH 43215.

PROPOSED USE: Office, parking, and limited storage uses.

NEAR EAST AREA COMMISSION: Approval.

CITY DEPARTMENTS' RECOMMENDATION: Approval. The site is zoned R-2F, Residential District, and is developed with an existing maintenance facility and parking lot for a property management office located south of the site fronting on East Broad Street. This site was subject to Ordinance No. 1867-2003 (CV03-023), passed July 28, 2003, to allow for reuse of an existing vacant warehouse with parking lot improvements and variances to area district standards. The requested Council variance will permit general office uses within the existing maintenance building, and limited on-site storage, while carrying over the approvals for the existing parking lot. The variance is necessary because the R-2F, Residential District prohibits office, parking, and storage uses. Included in the request are variances for existing site conditions for building lines, side yards, rear yard, side or rear yard obstructions, loading space size, maneuvering, and parking lot screening. The site is located within the Near East Area Plan (2005), which contains criteria that can be used to determine if proposed commercial uses should be supported within residential areas. Key factors include whether the structure has a history of commercial activity and parking considerations. This request can be supported because the proposal includes a renovated commercial building, and has been designed to ensure compatibility with adjacent residential uses. Staff supports this request noting that the office use is appropriate for this location, and limits pertaining to size and location, screening, height, and types of materials to be stored have been included in the proposal.

To grant a Variance from the provisions of Sections 3332.037, R-2F, Residential District; 3312.21(D)(1), Landscaping and screening; 3312.25, Maneuvering; 3312.51, Loading space; 3332.18(D), Basis of computing area; 3332.21(D), Building lines; 3332.25, Maximum side yards required; 3332.26, Minimum side yard permitted; and 3332.28, Side or rear yard obstruction, of the Columbus City codes; for the property located at 933 EAST GAY STREET (43205), to permit office, parking, and limited storage uses with reduced development standards in the R-2F, Residential District, and to repeal Ordinance No. 1867-2003, passed July 28, 2003 (Council Variance # CV15-064).

WHEREAS, by application No. CV15-064, the owner of property at 933 EAST GAY STREET (43205), is requesting a Council variance to permit office uses, a parking lot, and limited on-site storage, with reduced development standards in the R-2F, Residential District; and

WHEREAS, Section 3332.037, R-2F, Residential district, prohibits office, parking, and storage uses, while the applicant proposes general office uses in a former maintenance building, continued use of a parking lot, and limited on-site storage; and

WHEREAS, Section 3312.21(D), Landscaping and screening, requires screening of parking lots within 80 feet of residential zoning districts to be five (5) feet high and 75% opaque, while the applicant proposes less than 75% opaque parking lot screening and planting as shown on the site plan; and

WHEREAS, Section 3312.25, Maneuvering, requires every loading space to have sufficient access and maneuvering area anywhere on a lot, while the applicant proposes to continue to use only the twenty (20) feet of the alley along the east property line for maneuvering; and

WHEREAS, Section 3312.51, Loading space, requires loading spaces to have a minimum length of fifty (50) feet, while the applicant proposes to maintain a length of forty (40) feet; and

WHEREAS, Section 3332.18(D), Basis of computing area, requires that the a residential building shall occupy alone or together with any other building no greater than fifty (50) percent of the lot area, while the applicant will maintain the existing lot coverage of the buildings and parking areas as depicted on the site plan; and

WHEREAS, Section 3332.21(D), Building lines, requires the building setback line to be the average distance of building setbacks on contiguous lots or parcels, but in no case less than ten (10) feet, while the applicant proposes a building line of zero (0) feet along the East Gay Street; and

WHEREAS, Section 3332.25, Maximum side yards required, requires the sum of the widths of each side yard shall equal or exceed twenty (20) percent of the width of the lot, provided that not more than sixteen (16) feet need be so devoted, while the applicant proposes to maintain the existing maximum side yard of 10.93 feet; and

WHEREAS, Section 3332.26, Minimum side yard permitted, requires a minimum side yard of five (5) feet, while the applicant proposes to maintain a minimum side yard of zero (0) feet along the east property line for the existing building, and proposes three (3) feet along the west property line for the storage area and building; and

WHEREAS, Section 3332.28, Side or rear yard obstruction, requires the area in the side or rear yard to be open from the finished grade to the sky, while the applicant proposes to maintain pavement for parking and maneuvering, and proposes a storage building in the side and rear yards; and

WHEREAS, the Near East Area Commission approval; and

WHEREAS, the City Departments recommends approval of the requested variances because the proposal includes a renovated commercial building that has been designed to ensure compatibility with adjacent residential uses. Staff supports this request noting that the office and limited storage uses are appropriate for this location with included limits to size, height and location of materials to be stored and the use of appropriate screening.

WHEREAS, said ordinance requires separate submission for all applicable permits and Certificate of Occupancy for the proposed use; and

WHEREAS, said variance will not adversely affect the surrounding property or surrounding neighborhood; and

WHEREAS, the granting of said variance will not impair an adequate supply of light and air to adjacent properties or unreasonably increase the congestion of public streets, or unreasonably diminish or impair established property values within the surrounding area, or otherwise impair the public health, safety, comfort, morals, or welfare of the inhabitants of the City of Columbus; and

The site is within the planning area of *The Far North Area Plan* (2014), which recommends "Very Low Density Residential" uses, with the option of up to 8 units/acre of multi-unit residential development for the R district portion of the site, and Regional Mixed Use development, including higher density multi-unit residential development for the L-C-4 district portion of the site. The Plan includes a number of design-related recommendations that are applicable to this location, including preservation and protection of natural resources, and site access. The limitation text includes provisions for maximum number of units, setbacks, building height, tree preservation, street trees, landscaping/screening, building materials, garage orientation, and a commitment to a site plan that reflects setbacks, access, and the Stream Corridor Protection Zone. The project also includes companion Council Variance No. CV15-063 (ORD No. 0619-2016) to allow a parcel line to divide the site development area, no fronting for a potential new parcel, and reduced perimeter yard.

INTRODUCTION:

The subject property is 12.627 +/- acres located on the west side of E. Powell Road, 400 +/- feet north of Worthington-Galena Road. Applicant proposes to develop the site with a multi-family residential and/or assisted living facility use(s). Either or both uses shall be permitted. The plan titled "Zoning Exhibit 3780 E Powell Road, Columbus, OH 43065", hereafter "The Plan", dated December 22, 2015, and referenced in Section 2.G. of this text, depicts the planned points of access to the property and minimum perimeter setbacks. See the following text for additional setback standards. Council Variance application CV15-063 is a companion ordinance with this rezoning for applicable variances.

1. PERMITTED USES: The permitted uses of the site shall be multi-family residential development, and accessory uses and structures, as permitted in Section 3333.03, AR-3, Apartment Residential District Use, and/or an "assisted living facility", and accessory uses and structures. For purposes of this ordinance, "assisted

living facility" shall mean "Home for the Aging", "Rest Home" and/or "Nursing Home", all as defined in Chapter 3303, Definitions, and Sections 3303.08, Letter H, 3303.14, Letter N, and 3303.19, Letter S, and as permitted in Section 3333.03, AR-3, Apartment Residential District Use of the Columbus City Code.

2. DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS: Except as specified herein, the applicable development standards of Chapter 3333, Apartment Residential Districts, Chapter 3312, Off-Street Parking and Loading and Chapter 3321, General Site Development Standards of the Columbus City Code shall apply. Council variance application CV15-063 is a companion ordinance to this rezoning and modifies certain development standards, as itemized in the variance ordinance.

A. Density, Height Lot and/or Setback Commitments.

- 1. There shall be a maximum of 139 dwelling units on the 12.627 +/- acre site, hereafter "The Site". Density shall not exceed 11 dwelling units/acre, including per net acre if only part of the site is developed with a multi-family residential use. An "Assisted living facility" shall not be considered to be one or more dwelling units.
- 2. The following shall regulate the setback and height of buildings in relation to the north property line, as noted on The Plan:
 - a. Subject to a variance (CV15-063) to reduce the perimeter setbacks noted on The Plan to 15' and 20', detached garages may be built at a 15' and 20' setback from the property line, where noted on The Plan.
 - b. Other than detached garages, buildings shall be setback from the north property line as follows:
 - 1. A one (1) story building shall be setback a minimum of 25 feet.
 - 2. A two (2) story building shall be setback a minimum of 50 feet.
 - 3. A three (3) story building shall be setback a minimum of 65 feet.
- 3. The following shall regulate the setback and height of buildings in relation to the west property line, as noted on The Plan:
 - a. Detached garages, one (1) story and (2) story buildings may be built at the 60 foot west setback line.
 - b. A three (3) story building shall be setback a minimum of 65 feet from the west property line.
- 4. The maximum ridge height of all detached garages shall be 15'.

B. Access, Loading, Parking and/or Traffic Related Commitments.

1. There shall be a minimum of two (2) vehicular access points to The Site. If both permitted uses are developed, each use may only have one (1) direct vehicular access point off-site, but easements shall be reserved as needed to provide common circulation between the use areas to permit the use of access points to E. Powell Road and also vehicular access to the south for both uses. If both permitted uses are developed, separate parcels will be required and the west parcel may not have street frontage (See CV15-063).

- 2. The internal private streets shall be designed to discourage cut-through traffic between the Powell Road curbcut and vehicular connection to the south. It is anticipated the vehicular connection to the south will be a private street.
- 3. Prior to the approval of a site compliance plan, the developer shall complete a traffic study and shall make any required improvements defined by this traffic study, which shall be reviewed and approved by the Delaware County Engineer's Office.

C. Buffering, Landscaping, Open Space, and/or Screening Commitments.

- 1. Within the minimum setbacks depicted on The Plan, and subject to reduction of the perimeter setback for detached garages (CV15-063), as noted on The Plan, existing trees of 5" caliper or greater shall be preserved except where utility connections and vehicular connections require removal.
- 2. Street trees shall be provided along the Powell Road frontage at the rate of one (1) tree per 40 lineal feet.
- 3. Within the north setback, evergreen trees shall planted at approximately 20 feet on center, with spacing adjusted for trees to be preserved, if any, and also for placement of detached garage buildings.

D. Building design and/or Interior-Exterior treatment commitments.

- 1. Primary building materials shall be traditional and natural in appearance and shall consist of stone, stucco, brick, hardi-plank, or comparable, and/or vinyl siding or combination of same. No building, except detached garages, shall have an exterior finish of more than 50% vinyl siding. Exposed smooth face block is not permitted.
- 2. Primary building roof(s) shall be pitched and have a minimum slope of 6:12. Roofs on detached garages, one story components or primary buildings and porch roofs are not subject to the minimum 6:12 roof pitch and may use flat roofs.
- 3. All buildings, except detached garages, shall have four sided architecture and shall have the same level and quality of exterior finish on all sides.
- 4. On detached garage buildings located at a reduced setback in the perimeter setbacks, as permitted by CV15-063, all doors for car parking space bays shall be located on the interior side of the garage buildings.

E. Dumpsters, Lighting, Outdoor Display Areas and/or Environmental Commitments.

All new or relocated utility lines on-site shall be installed underground unless the applicable utility company directs or requires otherwise.

F. Graphics and Signage Commitments.

All graphics shall conform to Article 15 of the Columbus Graphics Code, as it applies to the AR-3, Apartment Residential District. All signage shall be monument style or shall be incorporated into an entrance feature. Any variance to the applicable sign requirements of the AR-3, Apartment Residential District shall be submitted to the Columbus Graphics Commission.

G. Miscellaneous.

- 1. The developer shall comply with applicable monetary payment requirements of Chapter 3318, Parkland Dedication, Columbus City Code.
- 2. The 12.627 +/- acres being rezoned consists of approximately 7.181 acres in Delaware County Auditor tax district/tax parcel 46-31844104005000 and approximately 5.446 acres in tax district/tax parcel 45-3184420202500. The two tax districts, 45 and 46, cannot be combined. For all purposes with development of the site, the tax district line shall be disregarded as permitted by CV15-063.
- 3. The plan titled "Zoning Exhibit, 3780 E Powell Road, Columbus, OH 43065", hereafter "The Plan", dated December 22, 2015, and signed by David B. Perry, Agent, and Donald Plank, Attorney, depicts approximate points of access to the property and minimum perimeter setbacks. The plan may be slightly adjusted to reflect engineering, topographical, or other site data developed at the time final development and engineering plans are completed. Any slight adjustment to any of the drawings shall be reviewed and may be approved by the Director of the Building and Zoning Services Department or his designee upon submission of the appropriate data regarding the proposed adjustment.

PROPOSED USE: Multi-unit residential and/or assisted living facility developments.

CITY DEPARTMENTS' RECOMMENDATION: Approval. The applicant has received a recommendation of approval from the Development Commission for a concurrent rezoning (Ordinance No. 0617-2016; Z15-022) to the L-AR-3, Limited Apartment Residential District. The subject site is proposed for development with 139 apartment units (11.01 units/acre) and/or an assisted living facility with a commitment to a setback plan and development standards in consideration of the abutting residential lots and the Stream Corridor Protection Zone. The requested variances allow no public street frontage for potential new lots, and reduced perimeter yard along the north and east property lines, and along any new interior parcel lines. The site is currently comprised of two Delaware County parcels that have different taxing districts which will not be able to be combined into one parcel. Technical variances for parking and maneuvering over a property line, parking calculations, and perimeter yard are also included in the request to address this issue, and are supported. Due to the presence of stream corridor protection zones within the property, the reduced perimeter yard along the north and east property lines is also supported because it provides a greater capacity to preserve natural features to the south and west. With the proposed variances, the request remains consistent with the land use

recommendations of *The Far North Area Plan* (2014) for medium density residential development.

To grant a Variance from the provisions of Sections 3312.09, Aisle; 3312.13, Driveway; 3312.25, Maneuvering; 3312.29, Parking space; 3312.49, Minimum numbers of parking spaces required; 3312.51, Loading space; 3321.01, Dumpster area; 3333.16, Fronting; and 3333.255, Perimeter yard, of the Columbus City Codes; for the property located at **3780 EAST POWELL ROAD (43035)**, to allow multi-unit residential and/or assisted living facility developments with reduced development standards in the L-AR-3, Limited Apartment Residential District and to declare an emergency (Council Variance # CV15-063).

PROPOSED USE: Multi-unit residential development.

ITALIAN VILLAGE COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION: Approval.

CITY DEPARTMENTS' RECOMMENDATION: Approval. The subject site consists of two development subareas separated by Detroit Avenue that were zoned to the AR-1, and AR-3, Apartment Residential Districts with Ordinance No. 1922-2015, passed July 27, 2015 (Z15-019). Concurrent Council variance Ordinance No. 1924-2015, passed July 27, 2015 (CV15-020), permitted reduced development standards for this urban infill project. The applicant has changed the development plans for the north subarea (Site A) to convert an existing 2-story brick industrial building into 20 apartment units with a 19-space surface parking lot in the AR-3 district. The former proposal was for conversion of the industrial building into 18 apartment units and interior parking, with construction of an attached 3-story, 13-unit apartment building with interior parking. The south subarea

(Site B) proposes a four-unit dwelling and 4-car detached garage in the AR-1 District, and remains unchanged from the former proposal. Variances are requested for required parking (from 36 required spaces to 23 spaces), vision clearance, setbacks, lot coverage, and yard and area standards. The proposed development will replace a potentially incompatible industrial site with multi-unit residential development in a predominantly residential neighborhood. The request is consistent with recent infill development projects in historic urban areas. The revised proposal represents a decrease of 11 units, lessens variances for parking reduction and vision clearance, and removes variances for maximum lot coverage on Site A.

To grant a Variance from the provisions of Sections 3312.13(B), Driveway; 3312.49, Minimum numbers of parking spaces required; 3321.05(B)(1), and (B)(2), Vision clearance; 3332.18(D), Basis of computing area; 3332.21(D), Building lines; 3332.27, Rear yard; 3333.18(D), Building lines; 3333.22, Maximum side yard required; 3333.23(b), Minimum side yard permitted; and 3333.24, Rear yard, of the Columbus City Codes; for the property located at **180 DETROIT AVENUE (43201)**, to permit multi-unit residential development with reduced development standards in the AR-1, and AR-3, Apartment Residential Districts, and to repeal Ordinance No. 1924-2015, passed July 27, 2015 and to declare an emergency (Council Variance # CV15-074).

WHEREAS, by application No. CV15-074, the owner of property at **180 DETROIT AVENUE (43201)**, is requesting a Council variance to permit multi-unit residential development with reduced development standards in the AR-1, and AR-3, Apartment Residential Districts; and

WHEREAS, Section 3333.02(3), AR-12, ARLD and AR-1 apartment residential district use, requires that a dwelling containing four units be in accordance with R-4, Residential District standards, while the applicant proposes a four-unit dwelling with variances to R-4 standards which are included in this request; and

WHEREAS, Section 3312.13(B), Driveway, requires a driveway width of twenty (20) feet at the street right of way, while the applicant proposes a driveway entrance width of 17.33 feet from the north alley for Site A due to the location of a city light pole adjacent to the east side of the driveway entrance; and

WHEREAS, Section 3312.49, Minimum numbers of parking spaces required, requires 1.5 parking spaces per apartment unit, for a total of thirty (30) parking spaces on Site A and six (6) parking spaces on Site B, while the applicant proposes nineteen (19) spaces on Site A and four (4) spaces on Site B; and

WHEREAS, Section 3321.05(B)(1), Vision clearance, requires clear vision triangles of ten (10) feet on each residential lot at the intersection of a street and an alley, while the applicant proposes encroachment into the clear vision triangle at the northeast corner of Detroit Avenue and Hamlet Street for the southwest portion of the 20-unit apartment building on Site A, and encroachment of the northeast portion of the detached garage building at the intersection of Detroit Avenue and the east Alley on Site B; and

WHEREAS, Section 3321.05(B)(2), Vision clearance, requires a clear vision triangle of thirty (30) feet on each residential lot adjacent to a street intersection, while the applicant proposes encroachment into the clear vision triangle at the southeast corner of Detroit Avenue and Hamlet Street for the 4-unit dwelling in Site B; and

WHEREAS, Section 3332.18(D), Basis of computing area, limits buildings from occupying more than fifty (50) percent of the lot area, while the applicant proposes an increased lot coverage of ninety (90) percent on Site B; and

WHEREAS, Section 3332.21(D), Building lines, requires the building setback line to be the average distance

of building setbacks on contiguous lot or parcels, but in no case less than ten (10) feet, while the applicant proposes building lines of zero (0) feet along Detroit Avenue and eight (8) feet along Hamlet Street on Site B; and

WHEREAS, Section 3332.27, Rear yard, requires a rear yard totaling no less than twenty-five (25) percent of the total lot area, while the applicant proposes a three (3) percent rear yard on Site B; and

WHEREAS, Section 3333.18(D), Building lines, requires a building line of no less than ten (10) feet along Detroit Avenue, while the applicant proposes to extend the existing building line of two (2) feet on Site A; and

WHEREAS, Section 3333.22, Maximum side yard required, requires that the sum of the widths of each side yard shall equal or exceed twenty percent (20%) of the width of the lot, provided that no more than sixteen (16) feet need be so devoted, while the applicant proposes a total side yard of three (3) feet at the narrowest point of the sum of the side yards on a lot that is one-hundred twenty-six (126) feet wide on Site A; and

WHEREAS, Section 3333.23(b), Minimum side yard permitted, requires a minimum side yard of five (5) feet, while the applicant proposes to maintain no minimum side yard along the west property line on Site A; and

WHEREAS, Section 3333.24, Rear yard, requires that each dwelling, apartment house, or other principal building shall be erected so as to provide a rear yard totaling no less than twenty-five (25) percent of the total lot area, while the applicant proposes a rear yard of seven (7) percent on Site A; and

WHEREAS, the Italian Village Commission recommends approval; and

WHEREAS, City Departments recommend approval because the requested variances allow residential redevelopment that will replace a potentially incompatible industrial site in a predominantly residential neighborhood. The request is consistent with recent infill development projects in historic urban areas; and

WHEREAS, said ordinance requires separate submission for all applicable permits and Certificates of Occupancy for the proposed uses; and

WHEREAS, said variance will not adversely affect the surrounding property or surrounding neighborhood; and

The project will coincide with major city projects at the west end of Nationwide Boulevard, including large scale office and residential developments, biking and walking improvements to the streets, and new park developments along the east bank of the Olentangy. The bridge also provides a significant non-motorized transportation facility to a heavily congested downtown area. Trails are a significant component of the city's health and wellness, diversity, social equity and conservation initiatives. Cycling, walking, running, and active trail uses provide highly recognized year-round benefits to urban lifestyles. Access to trails and to key destinations is one of the top rated priorities noted by residents, and this project fills a significant gap in gaining access to the core of the city. Over 2 million people visit the Arena District each year. The district contains major attractions, special events, employment centers, and rapidly expanding residential living. The Olentangy Trail travels along the west side of the river, and thousands of trail users cannot ride, walk, run, or access the east side. BACKGROUND:

The Department of Public Utilities has entered into a grant agreement through the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency's Ohio Environmental Education Fund (OEEF) for the development of a Green Infrastructure Workforce Development Program as authorized by Ordinance 1247-2015.

The City is developing a Green Infrastructure Workforce Development Program that has the potential to address poverty and unemployment within the community and promote the development of small, minority and female-owned businesses through creation of green-collared jobs. The Program has developed a training curriculum structured around livable wage jobs that will be created as a result of the City's implementation of green infrastructure. Graduates of the Program will receive a training certificate that will be recognized by the City and will be offered intense placement assistance in securing a green infrastructure maintenance job, be it with the City or a private entity contracted with the City.

The total cost of the project is: \$439,938.00. This total includes the original contract amount of \$390,000.00 between the City of Columbus and T&M Associates to provide professional services for the design and execution of the Columbus Blueprint Workforce Development Training Program, and the grant amount of \$49,938.00 from Ohio EPA's Environmental Education Fund. This anticipated modification is to add the additional \$49,938.00 from the grant to the original contract to complete additional field training and equipment and give trainees valuable experience applying classroom knowledge which will prepare them for a local job in green infrastructure maintenance.

The grant funds and the City's required match equal a total project amount of \$439,938.00.

EMERGENCY:

The grant monies have been awarded to the Department of Public Utilities and a grant agreement has been executed. The Department of Public Utilities is requesting City Council to deem this legislation an emergency measure to allow the Director to enter into the contract modification as soon as possible to fund this ongoing work.

1. 

2016 Special Event Application and Park Rental Fees

In researching park rates for dozens of the largest cities around the country we identified that there is no formula that can be copied to determine park rental costs in Columbus. Rates fluctuate from city to city, with many downtown city parks renting for thousands per day. Columbus' riverfront park rental fees have remained at \$50/hour since 2000. For 2016, the fee changes below are still based on a \$50/hr model for events that are free of admission, but the fee is doubled for private/gated events (still much less than other cities).

In the past, as riverfront parks were brought on-line there was no consistency in how park fees were applied. Now that the riverfront parks are connected, uniformity is needed to allow for more efficient management of the parks. Through policy accompanying these rates, each park will now have its own identity and purpose. Uniformity will be visible through implementation of a rental structure based on blocks of time. In the block structure all available riverfront parks can be reserved for a half-day (6 hour) or full day (12 hours), with features such as the Bicentennial Park stage and North Bank Pavilion being made available for an additional fee.

It is also necessary to recognize that event set-up creates an impact on public access to riverfront parks. With several major festivals and over thirty race events scheduled for 2016, event set-up could easily affect the visitor experience. We will continue to provide free community events with one (1) set-day and one (1) tear-down day, per park, at no-charge (Mon-Fri only), however, private/gated events, and those choosing to extend set-up over multiple days, will now pay for use.

Policy for Regional and Neighborhood Parks

• There is no park rental fee for use of a regional or neighborhood park. However, events must rent all facilities located in the designated park for all event days.

Parks with an Enclosed Shelter House:

- Shelter house time blocks must be rented for all event dates, or times that building access is requested- (8a-12p, 1p-5p, 6p-11p). If multiple blocks are rented the hour between rental blocks is free. In order to reserve the entire day, all 3 blocks must be rented. No set-up day charges to parks outside of the downtown boundaries.
- · Goodale Park: Gazebo wedding site must be rented at current rate (no charge for gazebo if set-up occurs on Mon-Thurs).
- Whetstone Park: 3 of 4 wedding time slots must be rented on event day in order to reserve full day (\$1500). No charge for wedding slots if event occurs on a city holiday.

Race Event Policy/Fee Changes (Summary)

In order to more efficiently manage the race event permitting process and minimize impact on downtown businesses, public transportation and city departments we propose the following changes. Changes will allow the City to recover costs incurred by all City Departments involved in the permit process (CRPD, CPD, CFD, Public Service), establish custom course fees for new courses outside of downtown, and to establish pre-approved courses which originate at traditional race venues (McFerson Commons, Columbus Commons, Huntington Park and Genoa Park). A base limit of 1000 participants will now be required for a road course, and all race permits issued for parks with enclosed shelter houses will now recognize the facility "block rental" times established by the Permits Office.

2016 Special Event Application and Park Rental Fees

In researching park rates for dozens of the largest cities around the country we identified that there is no formula that can be copied to determine park rental costs in Columbus. Rates fluctuate from city to city, with many downtown city parks renting for thousands per day. Columbus' riverfront park rental fees have remained at \$50/hour since 2000. For 2016, the fee changes below are still based on a \$50/hr model for events that are free of admission, but the fee is doubled for private/gated events (still much less than other cities).

In the past, as riverfront parks were brought on-line there was no consistency in how park fees were applied. Now that the riverfront parks are connected, uniformity is needed to allow for more efficient management of the parks. Through policy accompanying these rates, each park will now have its own identity and purpose. Uniformity will be visible through implementation of a rental structure based on blocks of time. In the block structure all available riverfront parks can be reserved for a half-day (6 hour) or full day (12 hours), with features such as the Bicentennial Park stage and North Bank Pavilion being made available for an additional fee.

It is also necessary to recognize that event set-up creates an impact on public access to riverfront parks. With several major festivals and over thirty race events scheduled for 2016, event set-up could easily affect the visitor experience. We will continue to provide free community events with one (1) set-day and one (1) tear-down day, per park, at no-charge (Mon-Fri only), however, private/gated events, and those choosing to extend set-up over multiple days, will now pay for use.

Policy for Regional and Neighborhood Parks

• There is no park rental fee for use of a regional or neighborhood park. However, events must rent all facilities located in the designated park for all event days.

Parks with an Enclosed Shelter House:

- Shelter house time blocks must be rented for all event dates, or times that building access is requested- (8a-12p, 1p-5p, 6p-11p). If multiple blocks are rented the hour between rental blocks is free. In order to reserve the entire day, all 3 blocks must be rented. No set-up day charges to parks outside of the downtown boundaries.
- Goodale Park: Gazebo wedding site must be rented at current rate (no charge for gazebo if set-up occurs on Mon-Thurs).
- Whetstone Park: 3 of 4 wedding time slots must be rented on event day in order to reserve full day (\$1500). No charge for wedding slots if event occurs on a city holiday.

Race Event Policy/Fee Changes (Summary)

In order to more efficiently manage the race event permitting process and minimize impact on downtown businesses, public transportation and city departments we propose the following changes. Changes will allow the City to recover costs incurred by all City Departments involved in the permit process (CRPD, CPD, CFD, Public Service), establish custom course fees for new courses outside of downtown, and to establish pre-approved courses which originate at traditional race venues (McFerson Commons, Columbus Commons, Huntington Park and Genoa Park). A base limit of 1000 participants will now be required for a road course, and all race permits issued for parks with enclosed shelter houses will now recognize the facility "block rental" times established by the Permits Office.
