WHEREAS, the Fair School Funding Plan would fairly calculate the elements of a high-quality education for all Columbus City School District students and commit the state to picking up a greater share of that cost; and

WHEREAS, the Fair School Funding Plan would provide as much as \$1.8 billion in additional state revenue to support the education of Ohio's school children, reducing the burden that has been placed upon local property taxpayers to fund schools in Ohio over the last 30 years; and

WHEREAS, Columbus City Council remains committed to eliminating racism, reducing health inequities, and promoting systematic efforts to improve the quality of life for each of its residents, this includes a methodical

focus to eliminate poverty, increase economic mobility, and to address factors that impact the social determinants of health; this Council recognizes that Implicit biases remain a part of American culture, despite the efforts that have been made to create an accepting environment; this includes the passing of laws that embrace diversity and inclusion and the ongoing quest to reverse racist ideologies that assume that Black traits are inferior - despite these efforts black hair remains a rampant source of racial discrimination with somber economic and health consequences, especially for Black Americans - studies show that Black women are 1.5 times more likely to be sent home from the workplace because of their hair and that a Black woman is 80% more likely to change her natural hair to adhere to social norms or expectations in the workplace; and

WHEREAS, Columbus City Council expressed its commitment by adopting a resolution declaring racism as a public health crisis on June 1, 2020; it also adopted a resolution expressing its support for Creating a Respectful and Open World for Natural Hair on July 30, 2020; and codified legislation strengthening provisions within the Columbus City Code to include protections to prevent people wearing cultural or natural hairstyles from being discriminated against on December 17, 2020; and

WHEREAS July 3, 2021, marks the 2nd anniversary of the passing of the first legislation to recognize the CROWN ACT in the United States; in a ground breaking decision the State of California enacted legislation to recognize the impact of racism and implicit bias and amended the California Revised Code to express support for Creating a respectful an open world for natural hair; the legislature also added provisions to legally protect against discrimination and to assist people wearing natural hair styles; and

WHEREAS, The Official Campaign of The CROWN ACT Led by the CROWN Coalition was founded by Dove, the National Urban League, the Color of Change, and the Western Center of Law & Poverty in 2019; the campaign was created to defend against discrimination predicated on race-based hairstyles with the goal of extending statutory protections to hair texture and protective styles for men, women and gender association which includes braids, locs, twists, and knots in the workplace and in public schools - the CROWN Coalition has declared July 3rd as National CROWN Day; commemorating the anniversary of the signing of The CROWN ACT in California - the CROWN ACT has been introduced at the federal level; has passed in 7 states and has been introduced in more than 20 states since first being introduced by Senator Holly J. Mitchell in January 2019; and

WHEREAS, NATIONAL CROWN DAY will be a day of solidarity for the human rights of Black men, women and children to wear their natural hair boldly and proudly, without the fear of reprisal; the one-day celebration will feature a full day of virtual conversations; and people are encouraged to use #PassTheCrown on their social media platforms; and

WHEREAS, Columbus City Council recognizes and embraces its obligation to lead particularly during this heightened period of racial injustice and awareness; moreover, this Council calls for the eradication of discrimination in all of its forms, including acts which negatively discriminate against the Black community, including hair discrimination; this Council calls on the Ohio General Assembly and communities around Ohio to adopt legislation Creating a Respectful and Open World for Natural Hair; moreover this Council supports the Coalition's mission of asking the Black community and its allies to share the #PassTheCrown and to encourage their state and federal legislators in states that have not yet passed The CROWN ACT to do so; now therefore,

WHEREAS, Columbus City Council defines racial equity as when race no longer statistically dictates, determines, or predicts socio-economic status or ability to thrive; and

WHEREAS, Columbus City Council acknowledges racial inequities brought on by a legacy of systemic racism, unjust practices, and institutional policies implemented over decades by various federal, state and local government entities, helped create the conditions that exist today; including but not limited to, segregation, redlining, inequitable zoning, mass incarceration, and discriminatory hiring practices; and

WHEREAS, Black, Latinx, and other non-white communities most impacted by racial injustice must be heard and centered in the process of reform and transformation; and

WHEREAS, Columbus City Council recognizes the need for both short and long-term reforms and remedies based on building racial justice, and that these remedies and reforms must consider the breadth of issues and the interconnected relationships between policy areas, including but not limited to budgetary, procurement, public safety, and personnel decisions; and

BACKGROUND:

The City of Columbus recognizes that public on-street parking as well as off-street parking for individual businesses and residential land uses may be limited in some areas. In an effort to achieve specific development or traffic initiatives in these areas, Section 3312.05 of the Columbus City Code allows for the creation of a Special Parking Area (SPA).

Special parking areas can be established with different parking requirements that aid in balancing the needs of both residents and businesses in the defined area. Special parking areas benefit the community by enhancing efforts to review and manage parking impacts and demands.

The City of Columbus, in partnership with Kimley-Horn & Associates, developed a city-wide Strategic Parking Plan (SPP) that governs parking management decisions to support the growth and development of our urban core neighborhoods. The SPP analyzed existing conditions and recommends parking management strategies and parking demand management tools for the Downtown, University District, Franklinton and South of Downtown Neighborhoods.

The creation of an SPA to "right-size" parking requirements and a fee in-lieu process are just two recommendations from the SPP for Franklinton. The in-lieu fee establishes a process to effectively manage parking when residential and non-residential developments do not satisfy the required parking within the boundaries of the SPA. This process requires developers to pay a fee instead of providing all or a portion of the parking spaces required by the SPA. The revenue generated from the fees may only be spent on parking and mobility initiatives to balance the parking needs within the designated SPA.

The East Franklinton Review Board and the Franklinton Area Commission both support the creation of the SPA. The Columbus Development Commission reviewed and voted 5-0 on the ordinance at the monthly public meeting held on May 13, 2021.

FISCAL IMPACT: The potential revenue generated from the prescribed fees will be dedicated to enhancing parking and mobility initiatives to balance the parking needs within the special parking area To supplement the Columbus Zoning Code, Title 33, with a new Section 3312.053, in order to create the East Franklinton Special Parking Area; to amend various sections in Chapter 3323, to add a new section in order to clarify the limits on the ability of the East Franklinton Review Board to grant parking variances in the newly created special parking area, and to provide relief for historic properties.

WHEREAS, the City of Columbus recognizes that public on-street parking as well as off-street parking for individual businesses and residential land uses may be limited in some areas; and

WHEREAS, in an effort to achieve specific development or traffic initiatives in these areas, Section 3312.05 of the Columbus City Code allows for the creation of a Special Parking Area (SPA); and

WHEREAS, SPAs can be established to set different parking requirements that aid in balancing the needs of both residents and businesses in the defined area; and

WHEREAS, SPAs benefit the community by enhancing efforts to review and manage parking impacts and demands; and

WHEREAS, creating a SPA and fee in-lieu of parking process was key to developing alternative options to handle parking issues, encourage alternate modes of transportation, and create a process to manage parking variances while promoting economic development; and

WHEREAS, the East Franklinton Review Board and the Franklinton Area Commission both support the creation of the SPA in this area; and

WHEREAS, the Columbus Development Commission reviewed and voted 5-0 on the ordinance at the monthly public meeting held on May 13, 2021; and

WHEREAS, it has become necessary in the usual daily operation of the City to amend the Zoning Code; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS:

Section 1. That Columbus City Code Chapter 3312 is hereby supplemented with the creation of a new section, numbered 3312.053, reading as follows:

3312.053 - East Franklinton Special Parking Area

A. The East Franklinton Special Parking Area is that area indicated on the official city zoning map and bounded as follows:

Beginning at the point where the eastern right-of-way boundary of State Route 315 intersects with the northern right-of-way boundary of I-70;

Thence easterly to the intersection of the northern right-of-way boundary of I-70 and the northern bank of the Scioto River;

Thence easterly along the northern bank of the Scioto River to its intersection with the western boundary of the Downtown District;

Thence northerly along the western boundary of the Downtown District;

Thence westerly along the southern boundary of the Downtown District until it intersects with the eastern boundary of State Route 315;

Thence southerly until the place of the beginning.

B. Non-residential, off-street vehicle parking requirements in the East Franklinton Special Parking Area shall be One-Half (1/2) of the off-street parking as required in this chapter, except as follows:

Art Gallery - No off-street parking shall be required;

Eating and Drinking Establishment without a pickup unit, 1,500 square feet or less - No off-street parking shall be required;

Retail, Office, and Medical Office, 2,500 square feet or less - No off-street parking shall be required

Extended Stay Hotel - 1 space per unit;

Single-Unit Dwellings - No off-street parking shall be required for single-unit dwellings when located as a single unit on its own parcel that was subdivided prior to the effective date of this ordinance. For single-unit dwellings that do not meet the requirements in the preceding sentence, 1 space per unit shall be required;

Two-Unit Dwelling - 1 Space

Three-Unit Dwelling - 2 Spaces.

Four-Unit Dwelling - 3 Spaces

Multi-Unit Dwellings above Four-Units - 1 space per dwelling unit.

No other off-street parking reductions, including any provided by any commercial overlay, shall apply. C. Loading spaces and any required bicycle parking shall be as required in this chapter. Where there is no feasible means to locate bicycle parking spaces in a usable location on the subject parcel, the bicycle parking requirement may be satisfied by payment of a fee in lieu of providing the required bicycle parking spaces, as determined by the Director of Public Service, or designee.

D. In the East Franklinton Special Parking Area, no further reduction or variance to the number of required off-street parking spaces shall be granted by the East Franklinton Review Board, the Board of Zoning Adjustment or City Council.

E. The Director of the Department of Public Service shall promulgate rules and regulations for the administration of the East Franklinton Special Parking Area and shall have the authority to collect a fee in lieu of providing the required number of off-street vehicle and bicycle parking spaces as set out in these rules and regulations.

F. Upon the submission of an application for zoning clearance, the Director of the Department of Public Service, or his or her designee, shall determine the cost of the fee in lieu of providing the required number of off-street vehicle and bicycle parking spaces in the East Franklinton Special Parking Area.

G. Fees in lieu shall be dedicated for the establishment, operation, and maintenance of facilities and programs to address and/or mitigate parking demands and deficiencies within the boundaries of the East Franklinton Special Parking Area.

SECTION 2. That existing Section 3323.09 of the Columbus City Codes is hereby amended to read as follows:

3323.09 East Franklinton review board.

A. Creation, Terms, Membership and Officers.

1. Creation. The Review Board shall consist of seven (7) members appointed by the Mayor and approved by City Council.

2. Organization. Unless otherwise specified, as soon as convenient after the members of the Review Board are appointed by the Mayor and approved by City Council, the Review Board shall meet and organize by the election of a chairman and secretary.

3. Initial Terms. When the Review Board is first constituted, one (1) member shall be appointed for an initial term of one (1) year; three (3) members shall be appointed for an initial term of two (2) years; and three (3) members shall be appointed for an initial term of three (3) years. All subsequent terms shall be for a period of four (4) years.

4. Membership. At least four (4) members of the Review Board shall reside or own a business or property in Franklinton. Among the professions that shall be represented on the Board, one (1) member shall be engaged as a developer or realtor with experience in the sale or management of urban properties; one (1) member shall be an architect, landscape architect or urban planner; one (1) member shall be a design professional or contractor with historic rehabilitation experience; and one (1) member shall be a lawyer with land use experience. One (1) member of the board shall be recommended by the Franklinton Area Commission as its representative and one (1) member shall be recommended by the Franklinton Board of Trade as its representative. A member may represent more than one required role.

5. Nomination Process. Candidates for seats on the Review Board shall be recommended by the Development Department to the Mayor's Office for review and approval before submittal to City Council for final action. The Franklinton Area Commission and Franklinton Board of Trade shall each submit two (2) candidates for consideration by the city in fulfilling each organization's seat on the Board. The Development Department will review and select one of the nominees for submittal to the Mayor's Office.

6. Term. A member whose term has concluded may continue to temporarily serve on the Review Board until his/her appointment is renewed or is officially concluded through the appointment of a replacement member for that seat, provided that such temporary service shall not extend for more than one-hundred-twenty (120) days after the conclusion of a member's term.

7. Removal. By a majority vote of the Review Board, a member of the board may be removed from service for missing four (4) consecutive meetings or a total of five (5) meetings in one (1) calendar year.

8. Pay. Members shall serve without compensation.

9. Officers. The Review Board shall elect a chair and vice-chair each year at an organizational meeting each January. At that same meeting, the board shall review the list of Staff Approvable Items and vote to ratify, expand or modify the list (see Section 3323.13, Certificate of Approval- Staff Review).

Bylaws. The Review Board shall establish a set of bylaws for the conduct of its business.
 B. Proceedings. The Review Board shall adopt rules of procedure providing for regular and special meetings, provided that those rules do not conflict with this Chapter. Such rules shall not be deemed operative until reviewed and approved by the City Attorney or his/her designee. The Board members shall take official action

only by a vote of a majority of the Board members voting on the question on the table during a public meeting at which there is a quorum. A quorum exists when a majority of the Board members appointed to and serving on the Review Board are physically present at the meeting. All board meetings shall take place in a publicly accessible building and shall be open to the public. A record of proceedings shall be maintained and available for public inspection. Notices of all regular board meetings shall be published no less than twenty (20) days prior to the meeting in the City Bulletin. Notice of special meetings shall be published no less than five (5) days prior to the meeting in the City Bulletin or a newspaper of general circulation.

C. Duties. The Review Board shall have the following duties:

1. Design Review. The Review Board shall hear and decide applications for Certificates of Approval. A Certificate of Approval is issued by the board in accordance with the standards of this Chapter, East Franklinton Plan and guidelines as approved by City Council. The board shall conduct such review for any projects requiring a Certificate of Approval as outlined in section 3323.11, Certificate of Approval -Required. Project review may include preliminary consideration of conceptual or interim proposals. Design review shall be based upon the following considerations:

a. Compliance with the provisions and standards of this Chapter.

b. Consistency with adopted development standards and design guidelines that are part of the East Franklinton Plan.

c. Consistency with other adopted plans, guidelines and policies.

d. Other code and regulatory requirements as may be applicable.

In granting a Certificate of Approval, the Review Board may impose reasonable requirements and conditions regarding the location, dimensions, character, access, building materials, and other features of the proposed uses or structures to carry out the intent and purpose of Chapter 3323, East Franklinton District, and to otherwise safeguard the public health, safety and welfare.

The Review Board may modify applicable development and performance standards of this district as necessary in reviewing and approving a site plan, building, structure, parking, graphic or other related improvement under its jurisdiction. <u>Parking standards regulated by Chapter 3312 shall not be modified by the Review Board.</u>

The Review Board may delegate final review of minor items to a subcommittee of the Board or to the city staff. In so doing, the board should provide clear direction regarding its expectations for final resolution of such design issues. Subcommittee meetings shall be subject to public notice provisions and a written record of the deliberations shall be provided to the board.

2. Public Plan Review. Within its jurisdiction, the Review Board shall review and provide a recommendation to City Council regarding adoption for any public plan, including but not limited to neighborhood plans, streetscape plans, park plans, bicycle and pedestrian plans, and major street, parking and circulation plans.

3. Design Guidelines. The Review Board may recommend approval or disapproval to City Council of design guidelines or amendments thereto for use in reviewing applications that come before the board, including staff approvals.

4. Zoning Change, Variance, Special Permit or Temporary Use. The Director of the Department of Building and Zoning Services shall promptly transmit a copy of agendas or notices as issued for public hearing related to rezoning, special permits, variances, and zoning appeals, regarding property located wholly or partially within the East Franklinton District to the chairperson of the East Franklinton Review Board as a matter of information and for comments and advice. In addition, the city clerk shall include such chairperson on the council's mailing list for agendas. However, the Review Board shall be responsible for confirming that the mailing lists contain the currently appropriate name and address for proper notification. Failure of notification shall not constitute grounds for denial of a requested action or reversal of a prior decision; however, such failure may be a cause for postponement if appropriate.
5. Amendments to CC 3323, East Franklinton District, may be prepared by the city or

initiated by the Review Board.

6. Review of Public Art. The Review Board shall consider proposals for the placement of public art, as defined in Chapter 3114, Columbus Art Commission, and provide a non-binding recommendation to the art commission as provided for herein.

D. Appeals of Staff Decisions. Within thirty (30) days of a decision by the city staff regarding a Certificate of Approval, any person directly affected by said decision may file an appeal to the Review Board.

E. Appeals of Review Board Decisions. Within thirty (30) days of a decision by the Review Board regarding a Certificate of Approval, any person directly affected by said decision may file an appeal to the Board of Commission Appeals, as provided for in Chapter 3118.

SECTION 3. That existing Section 3323.13 of the Columbus City Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

3323.13 Certificate of approval - Staff reviews.

A. Authorization. As provided for herein, certain specified development projects may be reviewed and approved by city staff for issuance of a Certificate of Approval in place of the Review Board. In undertaking these responsibilities, the staff shall use the same principles, standards and guidelines as provided for herein and consistent with the Review Board's record in applying these principles, standards and guidelines.

B. Projects Subject to Staff Approval. The following projects are subject to staff review in place of the Review Board. If in the staff's professional opinion applications submitted for these types of projects are sufficiently complex or raise issues of concern, the staff shall forward said applications to the board for their consideration; nothing in this chapter shall preclude the city staff from seeking advice from the board chair in making this determination.

1. Replacement of existing graphics, such as sign faces, without enlarging or changing the graphic.

2. The replacement of exterior elements to existing non-residential structures, including, but not limited to, siding and windows, provided that the building elevations are not altered to accommodate the replacement elements nor that the gross floor area of the structure is not increased.

3. Changes of use that do not alter existing buildings or structures, or require changes to parking or other site components. All other changes of use are to be considered by the Review Board.

4. Parking reductions for historic preservation as determined by the standards set forth in section 3323.25.

The Review Board at its discretion may establish on an annual basis a list of additional development or project types that may be submitted to the staff for their approval.

C. Certificate Issuance, Reporting and Appeals. Upon approving the above noted development projects, the staff shall immediately issue a Certificate of Approval to the applicant and report such issuance to the Review Board at its next regular meeting. Staff denials are appealable to the board, as provided for herein. Such appeals shall be filed within 30 days of receipt of a notification regarding the denial.

SECTION 4. That existing Section 3323.21 of the Columbus City Codes is hereby amended to read as follows:

3323.21 Development standards.

A. Dimensional Standards. The following table summarizes applicable dimensional standards.

Table 2. Dimensional Standards(See ORD998-2021 Attachment1 3323.21 Table 2)

B. Development Standards. By reference herein, the Development Standards of the East Franklinton Plan shall be applied by the Review Board and staff in consideration of applications for Certificates of Approval. The following standards shall also apply:

1. All buildings shall front on a public street unless otherwise approved by the Review Board.

2. The provisions of Chapter 3321 General Site Development Standards shall apply as appropriate, but

in cases of conflict the standards of this chapter shall govern.

C. Lighting Standards. The height of a light fixture when located within twenty-five (25) feet of a residential use shall not exceed eighteen (18) feet above grade. In all other locations the height of a light fixture shall not exceed twenty-eight (28) feet.

D. Graphics. Graphics standards are as follows:

1. Within the District graphics that require a permit as determined by Chapter 3375, require the issuance of a Certificate of Approval from the Review Board prior to issuance of a graphics permit by the Department of Building and Zoning Services.

2. Graphics are subject to the provisions of Chapter 3375 and Chapter 3381. Whenever there is a conflict between the graphics code and this Chapter, this Chapter shall govern.

3. Nonconforming graphics are defined and regulated by the provisions of Section 3381.08, Nonconforming Graphics.

4. In addition to signs prohibited in Chapter 3375, the following types of signs shall not be permitted: off-premise signs, billboards, signs with flashing lights or bare bulbs, rotating signs, pole signs, automatic changeable copy signs, and roof signs.

E. <u>Parking Lot Circulation</u> Parking and Circulation. Parking standards in the Plan and Chapter 3312, Off-Street Parking and Loading, and the applicable standards of Chapter 3323 as provided for herein, shall apply in the District. In addition, the following standard shall apply. In cases of conflict, the standard provided below shall govern.

1.-Parking, stacking and circulation aisles are not permitted between the principal building and a street right-of-way line. This standard does not apply to existing buildings unless they are expanded by fifty (50) percent or more in gross floor area.

2. In recognition of the development pattern associated with this overlay, the required number of off street parking spaces for non residential uses shall be reduced in the following manner:

a. All uses, other than an eating or drinking establishment smaller than five thousand (5,000) square feet with a pickup unit, are permitted a twenty five (25) percent reduction of the required parking in Chapter 3312.

b. Retail uses (not including eating and drinking establishments, private clubs, places of assembly, and medical offices) that are ten thousand (10,000) square feet or less, are permitted an additional twenty five (25) percent reduction (for a total reduction of fifty (50) percent) of the required parking in Chapter 3312.

F. Encroachment. Portions of a building or structure may extend under, over or into the public right of way, pursuant to the approval of the Director of the Public Service Department. Such encroachments are subject to the provisions of 3323.11 Certificate of Approval – Required, and require a Certificate of Approval. Approval by the Department of Public Service is required for encroachments and access points into the public right of way. A Certificate of Approval for these actions does not constitute City approval.

<u>F. Landscaping and Screening. Parking standards in the Plan and Chapter 3312, Off-Street Parking and Loading, and the applicable standards of Chapter 3323 as provided for herein, shall apply in the District. In addition, the following standards shall apply. In cases of conflict, the standards provided for below shall govern.</u>

1. Interior landscaping. The interior of any parking lot containing ten parking spaces or more shall be landscaped with shade trees.

2. Parking setback and perimeter landscaping. Landscaping and/or screening in the parking setback area shall be required to buffer automobile and pedestrian areas and uses; to provide headlight screen; to provide adequate visibility and safety; and to avoid the illegal use of said area for parking.

a. The lot area between the right-of-way and the parking setback line shall be screened with landscaped plant material and/or a wall or fence and shall not be paved except for approved

walkways, bikeways, driveways, graphics, and other approved amenities and site elements. Note: Vision clearance will be reviewed per Chapter 3312.

b. In addition, any portion of a parking lot abutting any public street shall be screened for headlights on the perimeter adjacent to the public street.

3. Parking lot screening shall conform to the following standards:

For any buffering or headlight screening, screening shall be provided in a landscaped area at least four feet in width and shall be a total height of no less than three feet above the parking lot grade and to an opacity of not less than 75 percent. For screening with plantings, the opacity shall be determined when plants are in leaf.

Section 5. That Columbus City Code Chapter 3323 is hereby supplemented with the creation of a new section, numbered 3323.25, reading as follows:

3323.25 Historic Preservation - Parking Reduction

In recognition of the development pattern associated with this zoning district, and in an effort to preserve the character of the neighborhood while supporting a walkable, mixed use urban environment, the required number of off-street parking spaces shall be reduced in the following manner:

1. A fifty (50) percent reduction will be applied to the required parking in Chapter 3312.053 for:

a. Any use within a historic building or structure that qualifies for a fifty percent reduction; b. Any use within a non-contributing addition or expansion to a historic building or structure, where the historic building or structure qualifies for a fifty percent reduction and where the non-contributing addition or expansion is less than twenty percent (20%) of the overall gross floor area of a qualifying structure, and/or

c. An outdoor patio or dining area not in excess of 250 square feet that is accessory to a

primary use within a historic building or structure that qualifies for a fifty percent reduction. 2. To qualify for a fifty (50) percent parking reduction, a historic building or structure shall meet the following criteria:

a. The building or structure shall be forty (40) years old or greater; and

b. For building elevations that are visible from the public right-of-way or a private street the following shall be true: no wall or portion of a wall shall be removed, the building footprint shall not be altered, and the window and door openings shall not be altered; and

c. At least seventy-five (75) percent of the overall building footprint shall not altered.

3. A one-hundred (100) percent reduction will be applied to the required parking in Chapter 3312.053 for:

a. Any use within a historic building or structure that qualifies for a one-hundred percent reduction;

b. Any use within a non-contributing addition or expansion to a historic building or structure, where the historic building or structure qualifies for a one-hundred percent reduction and where the addition or expansion is less than twenty percent (20%) of the overall gross floor area of a qualifying structure, and/or

c. An outdoor patio or dining area not in excess of 250 square feet that is accessory to a primary use within a historic building or structure that qualifies for a one-hundred percent reduction.

4. To qualify for a one-hundred (100) percent parking reduction, a historic building or structure will meet the following criteria:

The building or structure shall be listed on the Columbus Register of Historic Properties.

SECTION 6. That prior existing sections 3323.09, 3323.13, and 3323.21 of the Columbus City Codes are hereby repealed.

SECTION 7. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

Background: This ordinance authorizes the Director of the Recreation and Parks Department to enter into contract with MKSK Inc. to provide professional services associated with the parkland design for the Case Road Park Project. The contract amount is \$217,419.00, with a contingency of \$18,406.00, for a total of \$235,825.00 being authorized by this ordinance.

In 2018, Recreation and Parks acquired the former Ohio State University Agriculture Extension Sheep Farm at 2425 West Case Road. For several years, the Department had identified the 58 acre site as a key potential community park space, as the parcel is one of the largest remaining undeveloped open spaces in the entire Northwest Community. At the same time, the surrounding neighborhoods have played an active role by providing support for the city's investment to buy the site and develop a signature green space for a highly underserved area for greenspace. The property is surrounded by high density housing, with over 1,000 households within a 10 minute walk. The Carriage Place Community Center is also within 200 yards of the parkland.

This contract will complete the Master Planning Phase and preliminary design of this project. This phase will engage the surrounding neighborhoods to determine preferred layouts and amenities, obtain a detailed site inventory, develop preliminary engineering and cost estimates, and select priority construction items to open the park to the public. In early 2022, upon successful completion of this Master Plan and the selection of the first phase of improvements design, the department will request a contract modification to create final contract documents for construction. Improvements under consideration for this new park development project include, but are not limited to, athletic fields, walking paths, play space, community shelter(s), parking areas, natural areas, tree preservation, and walking path connections to surrounding neighborhoods.

Vendor Bid/Proposal Submissions (ODI designation status):

Proposals were advertised through Vendor Services, in accordance with City Code Section 329, on January 25, 2021 and received by the Recreation and Parks Department on February 16, 2020. Proposals were received from the following firms:

Of note, professional services contracts are quality based selections and not based on price. Costs were not requested nor were they part of this evaluation. Emergency Justification: Emergency action is requested due to the timeframe required to engage the public, perform the necessary site inventory, and complete the conceptual design by the end of 2021. Also, the environmental survey of the property needs to be completed and submitted for permitting review in July of 2021.

Benefits to the Public: Case Road Park will be one of the major greenspaces for the entire Northwest region of Columbus. The scale of the park will accommodate a wide range of passive and active recreation for all ages. It will be easily accessible to over 1,000 households nearby. The park will be designed to maximize walking and biking access, taking advantage of the close proximity of Carriage Place Community Center.

Community Input/Issues: Since 2017, the local communities have been extensively engaged with Recreation and Parks in the acquisition and development of this greenspace. The department has engaged with the Northwest Civic Association, Ohio State University, Don Scott Airport, nearby civic groups, and residents surrounding the parkland.

Area(s) Affected: Northwest (34)

Master Plan Relation: This project supports the department's Master Plan by providing quality recreational parks and trails while adding easy connectivity for Columbus residents of all ages.

The Smart City Challenge is a U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) grant program seeking to "create a fully integrated, first-of-its kind city that uses data, technology and creativity to shape how people and goods move in the future." In 2016 the City of Columbus, acting through the Department of Public Service, applied for and won the Smart City Challenge, receiving a \$40 million dollar grant from USDOT and a \$10 million grant from the Paul G. Allen Family Foundation (Vulcan).

As part of Columbus' overall response to the Smart City Challenge, the Smart Columbus Program Management Office (PMO) engaged a consultant capable of and qualified to integrate connected vehicles into the City's transportation environment by installing technology into vehicles to communicate with the environment; and develop and deploy the CV applications that enable the enhanced safety and mobility features Smart Columbus desires. To that end the Columbus, currently has over 1,000 vehicles including over 300 Columbus vehicles and Roadside Units operating at traffic signals.

This is a planned modification that is necessary for support and maintenance on Connected Vehicles on-board equipment and applications for vehicle-to-vehicle (V2V), vehicle-to-infrastructure (V2I) Safety and Mobility applications. Weather conditions (freeze-thaw) and exposure to treatment chemicals degrades concrete condition over time and periodic rehabilitation is needed to maintain pedestrian safety and structural integrity of the treatment facilities. The HCWP is an essential and integral component in the Columbus area water supply. An adequate supply of safe water is essential to economic growth and development of the central Ohio area.

Via a contract for services with EcoMap, the City of Columbus is proposing to develop a small business portal that will serve to meet all needs except need number 6 as identified in the assessment and subsequently detailed in the Columbus Small Business Agenda that was released to the public in December 2019. By streamlining access to resources, small businesses will benefit from this services in a number of ways including: 1) access to relevant resources across the entire business lifecycle, 2) having real-time access to stakeholders and service providers, and 3) have the ability to provide the public with up-to-date self-sourced and self-maintained profiles of local businesses at no cost the small businesses. These all major shortfalls of the current ecosystem, pre and post pandemic.

In short, the portal will serve as another key component along with the Architect/Builder Framework to operationalize and democratize the Columbus Small Business Agenda resulting in truly collaborative and inclusive entrepreneurship-based economic development for the City of Columbus and its partners.

The purpose of this legislation is to authorize the Director of Public Utilities to enter into a yearly agreement with the National Center for Water Quality Research (NCWQR) at Heidelberg University to provide funding for the continued operation of the Tributary Loading Station on the Scioto River at Chillicothe and to calculate the separate contributions of point-source and nonpoint-source loads of phosphorus and other pollutants in the Scioto watershed upstream of these stations. The first phase of this work was completed during the calendar years of 2014 through 2016. This second phase of the work is to be done during the calendar years of 2017 through 2021.

The NCWQR, founded in 1969 by Dr. David B. Baker, is a research organization within the science division of Heidelberg University in Tiffin, Ohio. The Heidelberg Tributary Loading Program (HTLP) began in 1975, and the Scioto River at Chillicothe has been included in the HTLP since 1996. Presently there are 16 stations in the HTLP in Ohio and Michigan and in both the Ohio River and Lake Erie basins. The HTLP is funded by a combination of state and federal agencies, foundations and industries, and all of the resulting data, including those for the Scioto, are publicly available at the tributary download website.

Measurements of pollutant export from watersheds are used to compare the amounts of pollutants derived from diffuse *nonpoint* sources, such as agricultural and urban storm runoff, with contributions from *point* sources, such as publicly owned wastewater treatment plants and industrial facilities. The two City of Columbus wastewater treatment plants (Southerly and Jackson Pike) are the two largest point source dischargers into the Scioto River watershed. Accordingly, collecting pollutant monitoring data in the Scioto watershed to enable the comparison of Columbus discharges with other pollutant sources is of significant interest to the City.

At the request of the Division of Sewerage and Drainage, the NCWQR will operate the Chillicothe monitoring station, obtain the best available data on point source loads to the Scioto River upstream of the monitoring station and will compute the proportional contributions of point-source and non-point source loads of total phosphorus and other pollutants of interest to the Division. The information will then be included in the interpretive summary. In addition, the NCWQR will analyze a subset of samples collected at the Chillicothe station during both base flow and storm runoff events, as coordinated with Division of Sewerage and Drainage personnel, for total dissolved solids, alkalinity and hardness. The NCWQR will also perform a solid comparison study at the Chillicothe station and provide guidance to the Division of Sewerage and Drainage and EPA.

The work for the second phase of these services will be performed during calendar years 2017 through 2021. It will continue as an annual ongoing contract. The cost estimate of the contract is \$45,000 for calendar year 2021 as a not-to-exceed amount. Funding requested for 2021 and any future years will be based upon budgeted funds and approval by City Council.

1. BACKGROUND

The Smart City Challenge is a U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) grant program seeking to "create a fully integrated, first-of-its kind city that uses data, technology and creativity to shape how people and goods move in the future." In 2016 the City of Columbus, acting through the Department of Public Service, applied for and won the Smart City Challenge, receiving a \$40 million dollar grant from USDOT and a \$10 million grant from the Paul G. Allen Family Foundation (Vulcan).

Pursuant to Ordinance 0820-2018, the Department of Public Service initiated a procurement effort that resulted in the award and execution of a professional services contract with Pillar Technology Group LLC in the amount of up to \$2,500,000.00 for design and delivery of advanced data and intelligent transportation systems related to the Smart City Challenge. The contract deliverables include technologies and applications that can be used to reduce traffic congestion, keep travelers safe, use energy more efficiently, respond to climate change, connect and create opportunities for underserved communities, and support economic vitality.

The first planned contract modification added funding to the original contract to allow for the continuation of requisite services by Pillar Technology Group LLC through October 31, 2018, but was cancelled.

The second planned contract modification replaced the first modification and added funding to the original contract to allow for the continuation of requisite services by Pillar Technology Group LLC.

The third planned contract modification authorized the assignment of all past, present, and future business done by the City of Columbus with Pillar Technology Group LLC to Accenture LLP and added funding to the original contract to allow for the continuation of requisite services in accordance with the USDOT schedule.

Columbus Public Health has been awarded a grant from the Ohio Department of Health. This ordinance is

needed to accept and appropriate \$199,706.20 in grant monies to fund the FY22 Moms Quit for Two Grant Program for the period of July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022.

Smoking during pregnancy remains one of the most preventable causes of infant mortality (CDC, 2004). According to 2015 data released by the Ohio Department of Health, 20.4% of all Ohio mothers and 23.4% of Franklin County WIC recipients reported smoking before or during pregnancy. The purpose of the Moms Quit for Two Program, an evidence-based smoking cessation program, is to increase smoking cessation rates among pregnant and postpartum women, by offering individualized tobacco cessation treatment, monitoring progress, and providing incentives for remaining smoke-free. This program aims to improve birth outcomes, reduce low birth weights and preterm birth rates, and increase overall quit rates as part of a larger strategy to reduce infant mortality.

Since 2014, the Baby & Me Tobacco Free Program at CPH has had a direct impact on infant mortality in Franklin County. Baby and Me Tobacco Free has unequivocally become the largest perinatal smoking cessation program in Ohio serving over 450 participants and their families since its inception. This award-winning and evidence-based program was named a "Best Practice" in May of 2018 by the Association of Maternal and Child Health Programs and continues to positively impact the community.

In 2019, 82% of the babies delivered in the program were full term and healthy, with 86% of participants remaining smoke-free through the baby's first year of life. At the end of 2019, 230 participants were enrolled and there were 638 referrals from community and clinical partnerships.

This ordinance is submitted as an emergency so a delay in service does not occur since the grant starts July 1, 2021.

FISCAL IMPACT: The program is fully funded by the Ohio Department of Health and does not generate revenue or require a City match (\$199,706.20).

BACKGROUND: This legislation authorizes the Director of Public Utilities to modify (Mod #3) the professional engineering services agreement with E.P. Ferris & Associates, Inc. for the Petzinger Road StormWater Improvements project (CIP 610739-100000), in an amount up to \$59,114.34.

While designing this project it was discovered that septic systems were present at eleven (11) of the properties that were to be serviced by the new storm sewer. Construction of the proposed storm sewer improvements was delayed until sanitary sewer service could be extended to the project area and the impacted properties were able to connect to the new sanitary sewer. As a result, a separate sanitary sewer project was developed, designed, and constructed to enable the abandonment of the existing septic systems. Construction for the sanitary sewer project was completed in 2019. The Health Department is currently overseeing the septic system abandonments and private property connections to the new sanitary sewer.

As the plans for the storm sewer improvements were completed and signed in 2006, it is necessary to revisit the plans and bring them up to current design standards while also updating the basemapping with pertinent information that was discovered during construction of the sanitary sewer project.

Reasons additional goods/services could not be foreseen:

The original contract did not anticipate the need for a sanitary sewer extension project, which would need to be designed and constructed, along with the completion of private property connections, prior to being permissible to construct. Once the sanitary sewer issues came to light, it was anticipated that plan revisions to the storm sewer improvements project would be necessary prior to bidding as a significant amount of time would pass between plan signatures and the installation of the sanitary sewer extension.

Reason other procurement processes are not used:

The design professional has already completed the original design and plan set, along with the design and as-built information for the sanitary sewer extension project. They are familiar with the nuances of the project area and the design requirements. Bidding of the contract modification would push completion of the project even further and residents are eager to see this work completed.

How cost of modification was determined:

The cost proposal was provided by E.P. Ferris & Associates, Inc., which has been reviewed and confirmed by the Division of Sewerage & Drainage (DOSD)/Stormwater Section.

The projected cost of said services is \$159,000.00, with the Department of Public Service agreeing to pay one-half of that sum. The purpose of this legislation is to enable the Department of Public Service to fulfill that commitment.

2. FISCAL IMPACT

Funding in the amount of \$79,500.00 is available within the Streets and Highways Bond Fund within the Department of Public Service to support this project. An amendment to the 2020 Capital Improvement Budget is necessary for the purpose of providing sufficient spending authority for the aforementioned expenditure. This legislation authorizes the Director of the Department of Public Utilities to renew and increase the service agreement with Johnson Controls Fire Protection LP (formerly SimplexGrinnell LP), in the amount of \$50,000.00, for FEM 1390.2 Life Safety System Maintenance Services. This contract will provide for the performance of inspections, diagnostic tests and repairs for all accessible peripheral devices currently connected to the facility life safety systems at the Jackson Pike and Southerly Wastewater Treatment Plants and the Sewer Maintenance Operations Center (hereinafter referred to as "SMOC") at 1250 Fairwood Avenue.

At the Jackson Pike and Southerly Wastewater Treatment Plants and SMOC, there is a need for the performance of inspections and diagnostic tests for all accessible peripheral devices currently connected to the Fire Protection Systems. Background: The City through its Department of Public Utilities, Division of Power, owns and controls several conduits located under Wall Street between Gay Street and Elm Street and allows that one conduit may be used for fiber optic telecommunications cable. CenturyLink Communications, LLC ("CenturyLink") has utilized one conduit for its fiber optic cable since 2001. CenturyLink's initial use of the conduit was under the terms of a lease agreement that expired in 2016. The following ordinance authorizes the Director of the Department and Finance and Management on behalf of the Department of Public Utilities, Division of Power, to execute a license agreement specifying the terms and conditions for CenturyLink's use of the City's conduit and to establish compensation to the City for this continued use and for CenturyLink's use of the City's conduit

beyond the term of the original lease agreement. The term of the new license agreement will be fifteen (15) years, with an option to renew the term for an additional fifteen (15) year period with the license fee for the renewal term to be negotiated if the licenses is renewed.

Fiscal Impact: CenturyLink will pay the City a lump sum license fee of \$30,000.00 for the fifteen-year term of the License Agreement and an additional \$10,000.00 for CenturyLink's use of the City's conduit beyond the term of the initial lease agreement. These fee will be deposited in Fund 6300, the Power Operating Fund.

BACKGROUND: The need exists to amend and restate the Jobs Growth Incentive Agreement (JGI AGREEMENT) between the City of Columbus (CITY) and Northwest Bank (GRANTEE). The JGI AGREEMENT was entered into under Ordinance 0442-2020, which was approved by Columbus City Council on March 2, 2020. The Ordinance authorized the Director of the Department of Development to enter into a JGI AGREEMENT with the GRANTEE for an annual cash payment equal to twenty-five percent (25%) of the new Columbus resident or thirty percent (30%) of new non-Columbus resident tax withheld on new

employees for a term of up to five (5) consecutive years on the estimated job creation of 50 new full-time permanent positions to be located at 1 Easton Oval, Columbus, Ohio 43219 (**JGI PROJECT SITE**).

Additionally, the **CITY** entered into a Downtown Office Incentive Agreement (**DOI AGREEMENT**) with the **GRANTEE** effective June 30, 2020. Columbus City Council approved the **DOI AGREEMENT** by Ordinance No. 0443-2020, passed March 2, 2020, and granted a financial incentive based on an amount equal to fifty percent (50%) of new employee withholding tax paid at the project site, to commence on January 1, 2021 for a period of five (5) consecutive taxable years based on an investment of approximately \$50,000 and the creation of 10 new full-time permanent positions with a cumulative estimated annual payroll of approximately \$1,385,000 and retain 1 full-time permanent position with an annual payroll of \$310,000 at 401 N. Front Street, Columbus Ohio 43215 (**DOI PROJECT SITE**).

Per an offer letter from the CITY dated October 29, 2020 and an acceptance letter to the CITY from the GRANTEE dated January 7, 2021 and through additional correspondence, the GRANTEE indicated they planned to expand their original commitment by moving their full headquarters operations from Warren, PA to the JGI PROJECT SITE location, dissolve the DOI AGREEMENT and consolidate to the JGI PROEJCT SITE.

Under the JGI AGREEMENT, the GRANTEE committed to an investment of approximately \$20,000 in technology, \$100,000 in furniture and fixtures and the hiring 50 new full-time permanent employees with an associated annual payroll of \$3,192,317 to establish operations at the JGI PROJECT SITE. The relocation of headquarters operations from Warren, PA would increase that commitment by an additional 41 existing full-time permanent positions with an associated annual payroll of approximately \$7,056,731. The dissolution of the DOI AGREEMENT consolidates an investment of approximately \$50,000 and the creation of 10 new full-time permanent positions with an estimated annual payroll of approximately \$1,385,000 and retain 1 full-time permanent position with an annual payroll of \$310,000 to the PROJECT SITE.

The amended and restated **JGI AGREEMENT** will reflect a total investment of \$170,000 and a commitment to 101 new full-time permanent positions with an associated annual payroll of \$13,019,048 and 1 retained full-time permanent employee with an associated annual payroll of \$310,000 by December 31, 2025 at the **JGI PROJECT SITE**.

As a result of this expansion and consolidation, the City has dissolved the **DOI AGREEMENT** and will extend the existing term of the Jobs Growth Incentive an additional one (1) year for a total of six (6) years and as the **JGI AGREEMENT** will be amended and restated, the amended and restated **JGI AGREEMENT** will be based on the current "JGI Agreement March 2021" template.

This legislation is being presented as an emergency measure because it is necessary to clarify the project scope to allow the grantee to move forward with their relocation to Columbus as quickly as possible.

FISCAL IMPACT: No funding is required for this legislation.

(GRANTEE) by Ordinance Number 0442-2020 on March 2, 2020 with the **JGI AGREEMENT** having been made and entered into effective June 30, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the JGI AGREEMENT granted a financial incentive based on an amount equal to (i) twenty-five percent (25%) of the City of Columbus income tax withheld on the Columbus payroll of New Employees at the Project Site and (ii) thirty percent (30%) of the City of Columbus income tax withheld on the Columbus payroll of those New Employees at the Project Site who are also City of Columbus residents at the end of each calendar year, to commence on January 1, 2020 and for five (5) consecutive years thereafter, with the Project Site located at 1 Easton Oval, Columbus, Ohio 43219 (JGI PROJECT SITE); and

WHEREAS, additionally, the CITY also entered into a Downtown Office Incentive Agreement (DOI AGREEMENT) with the GRANTEE which granted a financial incentive also to commence on January 1, 2021 for a period of five (5) consecutive taxable years based on an investment of approximately \$50,000 and the creation of 10 new full-time permanent positions with a cumulative estimated annual payroll of approximately \$1,385,000 and the retention of 1 full-time permanent position with an annual payroll of \$310,000 at 401 N. Front Street, Columbus Ohio 43215 (DOI PROJECT SITE); and

WHEREAS, per an offer letter from the CITY dated October 29, 2020 and an acceptance letter to the CITY from the GRANTEE dated January 7, 2021 and through additional correspondence, the GRANTEE indicated they planned to expand their original commitment by moving their full headquarters operations from Warren, PA to the JGI PROJECT SITE location, dissolve the DOI AGREEMENT and consolidate to the JGI PROEJCT SITE; and

WHEREAS, the relocation of headquarters operations from Warren, PA would increase the new full-time permanent positions commitment by relocating 41 existing full-time permanent positions with an associated annual payroll of approximately \$7,056,731; and

WHEREAS, the dissolution of the DOI AGREEMENT consolidates an investment of approximately \$50,000 and the creation of 10 new full-time permanent positions with a cumulative estimated annual payroll of approximately \$1,385,000 and retain 1 full-time permanent position with an annual payroll of \$310,000 to the **PROJECT SITE**; and

WHEREAS, the amended and restated JGI AGREEMENT will be based on the current "JGI Agreement March 2021" template and will reflect a total investment of \$170,000 and a commitment to 101 new full-time permanent positions with an associated annual payroll of \$13,019,048 and 1 retained full-time permanent employee with an associated annual payroll of \$310,000 by December 31, 2025 at the JGI PROJECT SITE; and

WHEREAS, an emergency exists in the usual daily operation of the Department of Development in that it is immediately necessary to authorize the amendment of the AGREEMENT to allow the Grantee to move forward with their relocation to Columbus as quickly as possible, and to preserve the public health, property, safety and welfare; and NOW THEREFORE,

To set forth a statement of municipal services and zoning conditions to be provided to the area contained in a proposed annexation (AN20-004) of $1.044\pm$ Acres in Mifflin Township to the city of Columbus as required by the Ohio Revised Code and to declare an emergency.

WHEREAS, a petition for the annexation of certain territory in Mifflin Township was duly filed by Donald Bacharowski and Diana Kuiper on June 7, 2021; and

WHEREAS, a hearing on said petition is tentatively scheduled before the Board of County Commissioners of Franklin County on July 6, 2021; and

WHEREAS, the Ohio Revised Code requires that before said hearing the Municipal Legislative Authority shall adopt a statement indicating what services, if any, the municipal corporation will provide to the territory proposed for annexation upon annexation; and

of safety related services to the proposed annexation area. Such services will include police and fire protection as well as emergency medical service to the subject property.

While the petitioner for annexation may have proposed future development plans for the property in question, the Department of Public Safety requests that the City exercise its discretion in the coming development planning and review process to ensure any future development will be properly served by the Department of Public Safety. Discussions between the City and the present property owner or any future developers regarding post annexation changes in zoning or other changes to the property should include the Department of Public Safety and the Department of Development to ensure any proposed development of the annexation property may be adequately accommodated. Specific details for safety services are dependent upon the parameters of future development that is ultimately approved by the City.

Sanitation: Residential refuse collection services will be available upon annexation of the property.

Transportation: Maintenance will be available for any additional right-of-way that may be included in this annexation request. If this annexation contains existing signalized intersections, those intersections and signals are subject to Transportation Division Policy, which appeared in the December 6, 2003 Columbus City Bulletin, and any subsequent updates thereto.

Water: The site will be served by an existing 12" water main located in an easement along the east side of Sunbury Road, the connection to which will be made the owner's expense.

Sewers: All sanitary and storm sewers required shall be constructed privately by the owners and developers at their own cost and expense with no cost to the City.

Sanitary: This site can be served by an existing 8 inch sewer that will require a mainline extension to the south property line, situated within an easement and on the subject parcel. Sewer plan: RP-13359-362

Storm: All storm sewers necessary for development/redevelopment of the area shall be designed in accordance with design policy and zoning codes in effect at the time of development.

All sanitary and storm sewers required shall be constructed privately by the owners/developers at their own expense with no cost to the city.

Section 2. If this $1.044\pm$ acre site is annexed and if the City of Columbus permits uses in the annexed territory that the City of Columbus determines are clearly incompatible with the uses permitted under current county or township zoning regulations in the adjacent land remaining within Mifflin Township, the Columbus City Council will require, in the zoning ordinance permitting the incompatible uses, the owner of the annexed territory to provide a buffer separating the use of the annexed territory and the adjacent land remaining within Mifflin Township. For the purpose of this section, "buffer" includes open space, landscaping, fences, walls, and other structured elements: streets and street right-of-way; and bicycle and pedestrian paths and sidewalks.

The American Rescue Plan was signed into law on March 11, 2021. The Plan established the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund, and authorized the U.S. Treasury to make payments from that Fund to states and eligible units of local government, including the City of Columbus, to respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency and its negative economic impacts. The American Rescue Plan funds will be available for use through December 31, 2024.

The American Rescue Plan requires that the payments from the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund be used to cover expenses that respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency, or its negative economic impacts, including but not limited to: providing assistance to households, small businesses, and nonprofits, offering aid to impacted industries, or supporting essential workers. Expenditures authorized in this ordinance have the dual purpose of providing youth employment opportunities and career exposure while also investing in critical, up-stream efforts to mitigate the negative personal and community-level impacts of unintended pregnancies exacerbated by the pandemic.

Up to \$150,000.00 in funding will be used to implement a summer youth workforce and career development program facilitated by Planned Parenthood's Ohio Center for Sex Education in partnership with Nationwide Children's Hospital. This includes an 8-week, paid summer fellowship with the goal of learning life and work skills alongside professionals in the healthcare field while also becoming positive sexual health messengers within their communities. This paid fellowship program will be for youth ages 14-19 and serve a total of 50 participants.

Up to \$100,000.00 in funding will be used to expand the implementation of Planned Parenthood's local Peer Education program. The intent of this program is to recruit and train teenagers between the ages of 14-18 years of age to become peer educators and serve as sexual health ambassadors among their peers within Columbus

City Schools. Funds will allow Planned Parenthood to recruit and train an additional 50 peer educators with the ability to educate as many as 2,500 of their peers about sexual health. Recruitment priority will be given to students residing in CelebrateOne opportunity neighborhoods.

Emergency action is requested to allow program services to be provided without delay, as programming is intended to serve up to 100 youth with a majority of programming occurring over the summer months.

Fiscal Impact: \$250,000.00 of funding will be provided from the Recovery Fund, Fund 2209, which was established by Ordinance 1201-2021 and funded by the U.S. Treasury.

This ordinance authorizes the Director of the Department of Development to enter into contract with PMM for their work with the Commission on Black Girls in order to build upon the development and design of the 2021 programs to address the systemic inequities impacting young Black girls during COVID-19. The PMM Agency shall provide event planning services and marketing to assist with the coordination and execution of the following: Back-to-School Rally, Virtual Summit which will include live segments, Business Pitch Contest, Black Girls SOAR awards program, and activities related to the CROWN act (CROWN - Creating a Respectful and Open World for Natural Hair). PMM will also provide support for youth employment efforts for the Commission on Black Girls.

In today's unprecedented times, African-Americans continue to be disproportionately impacted across social, economic and educational lines. Black girls have disproportionately been impacted during the crisis of COVID-19 to further increase the systemic inequities of race, gender, mental health and wellness, civic and social injustices along with the areas that affect them such as trauma, chronic depression, anxiety, raising siblings and victims of bullying, detentions/suspension and expulsion as documented in "A Report on the Quality of Life of Black Girls in Columbus, Ohio" published in July 2020.

The intent of the events executed by PMM Agency is to uplift, empower, and educate Black girls that have

experienced increased mental health challenges during COVID-19. Organizations that have partnered with the Commission on Black girls reported that due to COVID-19 and the remote learning that took place in 2020 and 2021, Black girls are feeling isolated, are having difficulty connecting with their peers, and are experiencing increased "Adultification" as they are expected to take on more household chores and care for younger siblings. As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic and remote education many students of color have falling behind academically. The expenditure for PMM will help in engaging a demographic that has been adversely impacted by COVID-19. The events and activities coordinated by PMM will place an emphasis on education, career pathways, and self-care. The events will also focus on areas addressed in "A Report on the Quality of Life of Black Girls in Columbus, Ohio" including: academic, mental health and well-being, and economic impact. These quality of life indicators are important elements to developing resources for Black girls and young women to build stronger neighborhoods and successful futures. Moreover, the messaging created by PMM will be responsive to the experience of Black girls which include systemic inequities of race, gender, mental health and wellness, civic and social injustices, and natural hair discrimination.

Back-to-School Rally and Summit for Black Girls

For the Back-to-school rally, PMM will target a year-over-year increase from 2020 (350 attendees) at a minimum of 20% to reach at least 425 young girls.

This year's summit will include a LIVE feed- to enhance the recorded content format used in 2020 - maximizing its momentum, also with year-over-year increase from 2020 (nearly 500 attendees) at a minimum of 20% to reach at least 600 young girls.

Further, the summit is a "safe space" convening African-American girls, ages 11 - 22 years, to learn, reflect and empower themselves and others among a community of young Black queens. Designed to provide important life-skills and tangible best practices in the areas of leadership, critical thinking, professional development, financial literacy, self-care, self-love, health and wellness and more, the Summit will feature national, regional and local thought leaders/speakers across a variety of general sessions and specialized workshops.

The summit will include:

- **Black Girls Marketplace** The summit will include an expo floor featuring businesses and organizations with products and/or services that enhance the lives of Black girls in the areas of college readiness, grooming, mental health, wellness, self-love and professional development.
- **Business Pitch Competition** With women of color being the fastest growing segment of entrepreneurs this is an effort to proactively equip Black girls to succeed in business. As part of the Black Girls Soar summit there will be a business pitch competition, offering mentorship and financial resources to winners.
- Black Girls SOAR Award Black Girls SOAR is a crowning salute to the exemplary young women in Central Ohio who've got NOW and NEXT and are using their talents and voices to positively affect change. Black Girls SOAR will highlight the achievement and excellence of Black girls in the areas to be considered across academics, athletics, creativity, performing/visual arts, entrepreneurship, perseverance, social justice, service and volunteerism, along with STEM & innovation.

Create a Respectful and Open World for Natural Hair - CROWN Act

This year, PMM also will add an in-market campaign toolkit for the Crown Act. This will include content, consultancy to Columbus City Council call-to-action host site/resource platform. Important to activities with the

Crown Act will be working with Black girls to promote the messaging around the acceptance and beauty of natural hair.

Support for Youth Employment

Finally, PMM will work with The Center for Healthy Families to guide the work of girls ages 16-24 years old. The girls will gain job skills in various areas while helping with the planning and implementation of the Back-to-school rally, Summit, and Crown Act activities.

A bid waiver is requested in order to provide for the most efficient deployment of services recommended by the Commission on Black Girls. PMM Agency is a woman and minority owned marketing firm.

Rules of the Community Relations Commission Effective June 24, 2021

To become America's opportunity city, Columbus must be just and inclusive for all residents. The Department of Neighborhoods, through the Community Relations Commission (CRC), plays an important role in the promotion of mutual understanding and respect of different communities in Columbus. This work helps to eliminate the effects of current and past discrimination.

Section 1 - Practice and Procedure

a) <u>Scope of Rules</u>

These rules outline how the work of the Community Relations Commission as defined in Chapter 139 and 2331 of the Columbus City Code will be implemented.

b) Amendments

A majority vote by the members of the Commission can be used to amend the rules. Ten business days prior to a vote on a proposed rule change occurring, all CRC members must receive the proposed amendment(s). The amendment shall be distributed to all members in the same manner used for regular meeting materials.

c) <u>Attendance</u>

Commissioners shall notify the Chair of the Commission and the Director of the Department of Neighborhoods when they are unable to attend a Commission meeting. Commission members shall be allowed to miss two regularly scheduled meetings of the full Commission per year. Any Commissioner absent for three regularly scheduled meetings in one year shall be considered to have provided their notice of intent to resign from the Commission. Prior to action being taken to remove a CRC member, any extenuating circumstances shall be considered by the Chair and Director.

d) Regular and Special Meetings

An annual schedule for Commission and Executive Committee meetings shall be established by the Executive Committee each November and posted to the City Bulletin and Department of Neighborhoods website. Full Commission meetings shall be held six (6) times annually, and Executive Committee meetings shall be held up to twelve (12) times annually. Special meetings may be called by the Chair, or at the request of any five members of the Commission. Notice of a special meeting shall be given to each member at least seventy-two (72) hours before the time of the meeting. The manner of delivery shall be the same used to distribute regular meeting materials.

e) Quorum and Voting

Quorum shall be reached when fifty (50) percent plus one (1) Commission members or Executive Committee

members who have been confirmed by City Council at the time of a

meeting are present. A majority vote of the members present at any such meeting in which a quorum exists shall be required to pass any motion. Members must be present at the meeting to vote. Voting by proxy or by electronic means is prohibited.

f) Conflict of Interest

In the case when a member of the Community Relations Commission has a conflict of interest, they are expected to disclose the conflict to the Commission Chair and/or Director of the Department of Neighborhoods and exclude themselves from any further engagement on the matter.

g) <u>Commission Minutes and Records</u>

Records of the Community Relations Commission shall be maintained in accordance with the Department of Neighborhoods' approved records retention schedule. The Director of the Department of Neighborhoods, or her/his designee, shall prepare minutes of all meetings and shall provide a copy to all members of the Commission.

Section 2 - Organization

a) <u>Membership of the Commission</u>

The Commission shall comprise of fifteen (15) members appointed by the Mayor and approved by City Council. In addition, there shall be five (5) non-voting advisors to the Commission who represent City elected officials and Department Directors as outlined in Chapter 139 of the Columbus City Codes. The Commission shall strive to be representative of the diverse communities found in Columbus.

b) Expectations of Membership

The Commission shall establish by majority vote expectations for all members regarding meeting attendance and participation in Commission activities. All members are expected to acknowledge and adhere to the policy that is established.

c) <u>Commission Officers and Executive Committee</u>

The Commission, at its regular meeting in November of every other year, shall elect a Chair, Vice Chair, and three (3) additional members to serve on the Executive Committee to begin on January 1 of the following year. Executive Committee members are to serve a term of two (2) years. The Chair shall preside over all meetings of the Commission and Executive Committee and shall decide all points of procedure pursuant to Roberts' Rules of Order. In the absence of the Chair, the Vice Chair shall preside over Commission and Executive Committee meetings.

d) Executive Committee

The Executive Committee shall conduct Commission business between regular meetings. All actions of the Executive Committee shall be subject to review by the Commission.

e) <u>Committees of the Commission</u>

In addition to the Executive Committee, the Commission may establish, by a vote of a majority of the Commission, official committees for the purpose of aiding in the discharge of its duties. The activities of all committees shall be subject to the direction and control of the Commission. The chair of every Committee shall be appointed by the Chair of the Commission and subject to the approval of the Commission for a term of one (1) year. Membership of a Committee shall be coordinated and maintained by the Chair of the Committee.

Section 3 - Complaints of Discrimination

a) <u>Definitions</u>

Definitions of all terms included in investigatory procedures shall be found in section 2331.01 of the Columbus City Code.

b) Processing Complaints of Discrimination

A complaint of discrimination that is submitted to the CRC may be accepted if it meets the following requirements:

- · Occurred within the geographical limits of the City of Columbus
- Occurred within the past six months
- Occurred on the basis of a protected class and within the area(s) of employment, public accommodation, or housing
- · For allegations related to employment, the employer must have at least four or more employees

Complaints will be referred to other governmental agencies in instances where another agency has the primary jurisdiction for a matter. Referrals may also be made if the type of relief sought by a complainant is only possible through another governmental agency. A record of all complaints received will be maintained by the Community Relations Commission.

Complaints may be filed electronically through the Department of Neighborhoods' website, or by paper. The intake form will be made available for download online or may be picked up at the Department of Neighborhoods' administrative office. Completed paper forms can be mailed in or dropped off at the Department of Neighborhoods' administrative office.

Forms will be made available in English, Somali, and Spanish, and may be made available in other languages upon request.

When a complaint is submitted, a staff person who is assigned to accept complaints will perform an initial inspection to confirm that all requirements to accept a complaint have been fulfilled.

If more information is required to determine if a complaint can be accepted, a staff person will immediately contact the complainant for more information.

If a complaint does not meet the requirements a staff person will contact the complainant to inform the complainant that the complaint cannot be accepted. When possible, a staff person will also offer to identify a referral to another agency.

It is the responsibility of the complainant to notify and update the CRC on any changes to information on the complaint form. This includes phone number, address, email, and any other details that emerge regarding the complaint.

If the CRC has attempted to contact the complainant, and the CRC has not received a response for a period of sixty (60) days, the CRC may dismiss the complaint.

The Commission shall strive to resolve, dismiss, or refer for prosecution complaints within six (6) months of receipt of the complaint. If at six (6) months after the date of receipt a complaint is not resolved, dismissed, or referred for prosecution, or no fine is issued, the CRC shall notify the complainant of the current status of their complaint and when possible, provide information on other organizations that may accept the complaint.

The Commission will maintain records of all complaints filed in accordance with the Department of Neighborhoods' records retention schedule.

c) Investigatory Procedure

(A) Whenever it is alleged in a complaint,—in writing, by a person or aggrieved organization, hereinafter referenced to as "complainant," that any person, employer, employment agency, and—or labor organization, hereinafter referred to as the "respondent," has engaged in or is engaging in any unlawful discriminatory practices as defined in Title 23, Chapter 2331 of the Columbus City Codes, or upon its own initiative, in matters relating to such discriminatory practices, the community relations commission staff may initiate a preliminary investigation. Such complaint shall be filed with the community relations commission within six (6) months after the alleged unlawful discriminatory practices are committed.

(1) If the community relations commission staff determines after such investigation, that there is no reasonable basis to believe that unlawful discriminatory practices have been or are being engaged in, staff may recommend to the community relations commission that the complaint be dismissed. If the commission approves, staff shall notify the complainant that it has so determined, and the complaint will be dismissed.

(2) If the community relations commission staff determines, after such investigation, that there is a reasonable basis to believe that unlawful discriminatory practices have been or are being engaged in, they shall endeavor to eliminate such practices by informal methods of conference, conciliation, and persuasion.

(a) If after such investigation and conference the community relations commission staff is satisfied that any unlawful discriminatory practice of the respondent will be eliminated, staff may recommend to the community relations commission that it treat the complaint as conciliated. If the commission agrees, staff shall notify the complainant that the complaint will be dismissed.

(b) If the community relations commission staff fails to effect the elimination of such unlawful discriminatory practices or to obtain conciliation of the matter, or, if the circumstances warrant, in advance of or during any such preliminary investigation or endeavors to conciliate the matter, the community relations commission may refer the complaint to the City Prosecutor to evaluate for criminal prosecution.

(c) If the community relations commission staff fails to effect the elimination of such unlawful discriminatory practices or to obtain conciliation of the matter and no referral to the City Prosecutor to evaluate for criminal prosecution is then pending, the community relations commission may direct staff to issue and cause to be served upon the respondent a notice of finding of an administrative violation and imposition of civil penalty. The notice shall notify the respondent of the right to request an administrative hearing before a hearing officer appointed by the community relations commission to contest the finding of administrative violation shall constitute a waiver of the right to a hearing.

(B) If a hearing officer is appointed, the hearing officer shall have the authority to:

(1) Conduct an administrative hearing;

(2) Provide to all the parties, witnesses, and the Community Relations Commission timely notice of the

hearing date, time, and location;

(3) Direct the exchange of discovery;

(4) Set, change as necessary, and timely communicate to the parties such reasonable procedural rules as the

hearing officer shall deem appropriate including:

(a) A member of the Community Relations Commission staff shall have the burden of going forward with the presentation of evidence. All parties shall have the right to appear and be heard in person, or by legal counsel, to present their case.

(b) All parties shall have the right to: offer and examine witnesses and present evidence in support of their case; cross examine adverse witnesses; and proffer evidence into the record if its admission has been denied.

(c) Testimony shall be given under oath.

(d) The hearing officer shall make recommendations on all matters of evidence. In so doing, the hearing officer is not strictly bound by the rules of evidence. The hearing officer may ask questions of any witness at any point in the proceedings and may set time and other limitations for each side in the presentation of evidence. A record of proceedings shall be kept. Parties seeking a stenographic record shall acquire such stenographic record at their own expense.

(5) Except as otherwise prescribed by law, the hearing officer shall submit to the Community Relations Commission a written report setting forth the hearing officer's findings of fact and conclusions of law and a recommendation of the action to be taken by the Commission.

(a) If the Hearing Officer finds, by a preponderance of the evidence, that respondent did engage in, or continues to engage in, an unlawful discriminatory act or practice under this chapter as noticed in the finding of administrative violation, the Hearing Officer's report shall so indicate by recommending that the finding of violation be upheld.

(b) If the Hearing Officer finds that the evidence presented failed to support the finding of violation, the Hearing Officer's report shall so indicate by recommending that the finding of administrative violation be overturned and the complaint dismissed.

(c) The final report of the Hearing Officer may not include any orders for reinstatement of employment, refund of monies paid, other mitigation of damages, or any other orders for corrections or sanctions, except as provided in this section.

(6) A copy of the Hearing Officer's written report and recommendation shall, within five days of the date of filing thereof, be served upon the respondent or respondent's attorney, by certified mail. The respondent may, within ten days of receipt of the copy of the written report or recommendation, file with the Community Relations Commission written objections to the report and recommendation, which objections shall be considered by the Community Relations Commission before approving, modifying, or disapproving the recommendation. The Community Relations Commission may grant extensions of time to the respondent within which to file such objections. No recommendation of the Hearing Officer shall be approved, modified, or disapproved by the Community Relations Commission until ten days after the service of the report and recommendation as provided in this section. The Community Relations Commission may grant extensions may order additional testimony to be taken or permit the introduction of further documentary evidence.

(7) The Community Relations Commission, by majority vote, may approve, modify or disapprove the recommendation from the Hearing Officer by written decision which shall become effective upon service to the affected parties, unless otherwise stated in the Community Relation Commission's decision.

(8) The final decision of the Community Relations Commission may be appealed pursuant to the provisions of R.C. Chapter 2506.

(B) Civil Penalties

(1) Upon an administrative finding of violation by the commission, a civil penalty in an amount not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000) may be imposed;

(2) Upon an administrative finding of violation by the commission, if the violator has been found to have committed one violation of this Chapter during the five-year period immediately preceding the date on which a complaint was filed with the community relations commission, a civil penalty in an amount not to exceed two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) may be imposed;

(3) Upon an administrative finding of violation by the commission, if the violator has been found to have committed two or more violations of this Chapter during the five-year period immediately preceding the date on which a complaint was filed with the community relations commission, a civil penalty in an amount not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000) may be imposed;

(E) If a civil penalty has been imposed by the Community Relations Commission, and any portion thereof remains unpaid thirty days following receipt of service of the notice of finding of violation or, if an administrative hearing had been requested, thirty days following receipt of service of the final written decision of the Community Relations Commission, the City Attorney may institute civil enforcement proceedings against the respondent.



REVISED BYLAWS

of

THE NORTH LINDEN AREAS COMMISSION

Amended July 16, 2020

ARTICLE I. NAME & BOUNDARIES

All members shall be appointed by the Mayor with the concurrence of City Council.

Section 1. There is hereby created in the city of Columbus a Commission area to be known as the North Linden Area Commission, hereafter in this document referred to as the Commission.

Section 2. This area shall be bounded and described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the centerline of the railroad right-of-way west of Joyce Ave. and Hudson St. and proceeding in a westerly direction along the center line of Hudson St. to the first north-south railroad right-of-way immediately east of Indianola Ave.; thence proceeding in a northerly direction along the centerline of the railroad right-of-way to Cooke Rd.; thence proceeding in an easterly direction along the centerline of Karl Rd. to Karl Rd.; thence proceeding in a northerly direction along the centerline of Karl Rd. to Ferris Rd.; thence proceeding in an easterly direction along the centerline of Ferris Rd. to the north-south railroad right-of-way west of Joyce Ave.; thence proceeding in a southerly direction along the centerline of the railroad right-of-way west of Joyce Ave.; thence proceeding in a southerly direction along the centerly direction along the railroad right-of-way west of Joyce Ave.; thence proceeding in a southerly direction along the centerly direction along the railroad right-of-way west of Joyce Ave.; thence proceeding in a southerly direction along the centerly direction along the centerly direction along the railroad right-of-way west of Joyce Ave.; thence proceeding in a southerly direction along the centerly direction alo

ARTICLE II. PURPOSE

HAN

Section 1. These Bylaws shall establish the proceedings by which the North Linden Area Commission shall execute its duties and functions under the grant of authority set forth in Chapter 3109 of the Columbus City Code.

Section 2. This Commission is established to afford citizen participation in the decision-making *D*rocess functioning in an advisory capacity and to facilitate communication, understanding and cooperation between neighborhood groups, city officials and developers.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. There shall be maximum of 9 members of the Commission. All members shall be appointed by the mayor with concurrence of City Council.

a) Seven (7) persons living in the Commission area shall be selected as resident members by the selection procedure outlined in Art. III, Sect. d.

b) Two (2) members, who need not be area residents but who have shown a demonstrated interest in the area, shall be nominated by the selected members of the Commission.

c) For selected members running for consecutive selected terms, the signatures of 25 residents within the area are not required.

d) Except as otherwise specified, all members have equal rights.

e) All members shall serve without compensation

Section 2. Selection, Terms, Vacancies

a) Initially, terms shall be determined by lot with five (5) selected, two (2) nominated members and the Mayor's appointee serving for a term of three (3) years, four (4) selected and three (3) nominated serving for a term of two (2) years.

b) Thereafter, all terms shall be for a period of three (3) years, staggered with four (4) of the commissioners' terms expiring on a given year and three (3) commissioners' terms expiring on a different year.

c) Each term shall end on December 31 of the year the term expires.

d) After the selection of initial Commissioners, selection of subsequent commission members shall be by residents of North Linden by petition and election.

i. Candidates must submit a resume, short biography, essay, and petition with signatures of at least 25 North Linden residents.

ii. Availability of petitions will be announced at the regular June and July meetings and published in available media.

iii. Petitions are due by the second Thursday in August.

iv. Candidates must be 18 years of age or older and be a North Linden Resident

v. Signers of petitions must be 18 years of age or older and be residents of North Linden.

vi. Petitions must contain 25 or more valid signatures for a candidate to be considered for selection.

vii. An election shall take place annually in the month of September.

- a. All valid candidates, (Article III, Sect. 2d, i-vi), shall be placed on the ballot.
- b. Election shall be by secret ballot. All North Linden residents and Commissioners attending the September meeting may cast a ballot.
- viii. No election shall be scheduled if the number of candidates is less than or equal to the number of selected Commissioners with expiring terms.

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e) Any vacancies caused by death, resignation, disqualification, or by other means shall be filled for the unexpired term by appointment of the Mayor with the concurrence of Council. The area commission may recommend appointees to the Mayor to fill vacancies. Candidates for appointment must submit a resume, cover letter, essay and qualifying petition (ARTICLE III, Sect. 2d, i, iv-vi)

f) Λ commissioner who is elected or appointed to a seat may not be elected or appointed to a different seat until the term of the seat held by the commissioner has expired.

Section 3. Expectations and Responsibilities of Commissioners

a) No member shall represent the Commission in its official actions except as specifically authorized by a majority vote at a regular or special meeting. This shall not be construed as a restriction upon the rights of individual members to represent their own views before public or private bodies, whether in agreement or disagreement with the official actions of the Commission.

b) Statements made by Commissioners outside of official meetings, including on social media, do not represent the Commission unless the Commissioner has been directly authorized by position or vote to represent and speak on behalf of the Commission.

c) When presenting personal views before public or private bodies or on social media, Commissioners should clarify that they are not representing or speaking on behalf of the Commission.

Section 4. If a member of the Commission selected by the selection procedures moves out of the described Commission area, such member must relinquish his or her resident status *in writing* and be replaced per Section 2e. Resignation will be officially announced at the next public meeting.

Section 5. Attendance

a) Commissioners are required to attend all meetings of the Commission

b) Commissioners who communicate an absence to the Chair prior to a public meeting will be deemed excused. Except for emergency, Commissioners are not permitted to have more than three (3) consecutive excused absences.

c) Commissioners who fail to communicate absence to the Chair prior to a public meeting will be deemed un-excused. Two (2) consecutive unexcused absences from regular monthly meetings (Art. V, Sect.1) or from four (4) regular monthly meetings in a 12 month period are in violation of Sect. 5a.

d) A Commissioner in violation of part (b) or (c) of this section will be officially removed by the Commission at the next regular meeting.

ARTICLE IV. OFFICERS

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Section 1. The Officers of the Commission shall be Chair, Vice-chair, Zoning Chair, and Treasurer.

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Section 2. Officers shall be elected by a majority of the Commission members present at the October monthly meeting.

Section 3. Each Officer shall be elected for a term of one (1) year, beginning January 1.

Section 4. The duties of the officers shall be:

a) The Chair shall preside at meetings of the Commission and prepare the agenda for Commission meetings, in consultation with the other Commission members.

b) The Vice-Chair shall perform the duties of the Chair in the Chair's absence and shall perform such special duties that may arise from time to time at the request of the Chair.

c) The Treasurer shall receive and submit all Commissioners' requests with receipts for reimbursement; and shall receive and disburse all funds of the Commission.

Section 5. The Vice-Chair shall fill a vacancy in the Chair position. A vacancy in every other position shall be filled by election by a majority of the Commission members present at the subsequent monthly meeting. A vacancy filled for six (6) months or more shall be considered full term.

Section 6. Election of officers shall be by roll call.

ARTICLE V. MEETINGS

H/J A 8/15/2020 Section 1. Regular Meetings

a) Regular meetings shall be on the third Thursday of each month at a stated time to be determined by two-thirds vote of the Commission and shall be open to the public. Regular meetings shall commence no later than 15 minutes after the stated time.

b) The first regular meeting in January shall be the Annual Meeting at which time the new Commissioners shall take office, officers shall be elected by roll call (Article IV, Section 6) and annual reports from committees will be received.

c) A regular meeting may be cancelled, or the meeting date changed, by a two-thirds vote of the Commission.

Section 2. Special Meetings

a) Special meetings may be called by the Chair or by a majority of members present in a regular or special meeting or by the Chair at the written request of at least five (5) members.

b) Written notice of any special meeting shall be given to each Commission member and the public at least seven (7) days in advance, except in an emergency. This written notice shall specify the date, time, and place of the meeting and describe all business to be conducted at the meeting.

c) No business shall be conducted at a special meeting unless it was included in the notice of the special meeting.

d) Special meetings shall be open to the public.

Section 3. Quorums

A quorum shall be defined as greater than 50% of the Commission members. A majority of the Commission members present and voting shall be required to approve a motion, except as otherwise provided.

Section 4. The business of the Commission shall contain the following unless otherwise directed by a majority of members present:

Call to Order Roll Call Approval of previous minutes Recognition of Public Officials City Reports Scheduled speakers Reports of standing committees (Old and New Business) Reports of special committees (Old and New Business) Reports from Neighborhood Organizations For the Good of the Order - Announcements and Comments Adjournment

Section 5. The Chair may recognize members of the public who wish to address the Commission and have turned in speaker slips concerning issues under discussion and on the agenda a) If a member of the public wishes to be included on the Agenda, the person must contact the Chair. In turn, the Chair will inform the Commission.

b) The member of the public must state their name and the issue to be presented.

c) A uniform time limit for such presentations may be set by the Chair.

Section 6. Issues brought before the Commission that are not under discussion, nor on the Agenda may be discussed or tabled by a vote of a show of hands so that proper authorities can be consulted.

Section 7. When guests are invited to speak to the Commission the time will generally be limited to fifteen (15) minutes or at the discretion of the Chair.

Section 8. Dissenting or non-concurring Committee member's reports may be filed by Commission or committee members and shall be attached to the Standing and Special Committees' reports.

Section 9. Commission meetings shall be limited to not more than three (3) hours unless deemed appropriate and approved by a majority of the Commission members present.

Section 10. Except as otherwise specified, meetings of the Commission shall be conducted in an orderly and reasonable manner using the latest current revision of Robert's Rules of Order as a guide.

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- a) Voting shall take place by a show of hands
- b) At the request of any Commissioner, a roll call vote may be granted.

ARTICLE VI. COMMITTEES

Section 1. Appointment of Commission members to both standing and special committees shall be made by the Chair in consultation with Commission members and shall be subject to the approval of a majority of the Commission members.

Section 2. Each standing committee may appoint persons who are not Commissioners as committee members, subject to the approval by the Commission. All committee members have voting privileges within that committee. Non-commissioners may or may not outnumber Commissioners on any standing committee.

Section 3. Each committee shall select a member to Chair the committee, and may select other Officers and adopt internal rules necessary to carry out their assigned task. The selected Chair of any committee shall be a Commissioner.

a) The selected Chair of any committee may be requested to step down as the Chair of that committee by the Commission Chair. The selected Chair of any committee may be voted out as the Chair of that committee by a two-thirds majority vote of the Commission.

b) Voting by the entire Commission, for the purpose of removing a selected Chair of a committee shall be conducted at a Special Meeting of the Commission.

c) At any time before voting by the entire Commission, for the purpose of removing a selected Chair, the selected chair may resign the chair.

d) Leaving the committee is the decision of the individual. If the individual remains on the committee, the individual shall not publicly represent the committee or the Commission in a position of authority with regard to that committee or any of that committee's functions. The individual is an internal member only on that committee.

Section 4. A special committee may be established or dissolved by a majority vote of the Commission. Its size, powers and duties shall be specified by the creating resolution.

Section 5. All committee meetings must be publicized by sending the date, location, time and agenda to the Department of Neighborhoods at least 7 days in advance for submission to the city bulletin.

Section 6. The Chair of the Commission shall be an ex-officio member of all committees.

Section 7. The standing committees and their responsibilities are:

a) Executive Committee

1. Consists of Chair, Vice-Chair, Zoning Chair, and Treasurer;

2. Prepare the agenda of regular meetings; plan the direction and scope of Commission activities;

3. Review finances and policies.

b) Planning & Development Committee

1. Review & recommend long-range plans for the North Linden Area;

2. Investigate funding for implementation of such plans;

3. Develop methods for involving the citizens in such planning;

4. Maintain planning files.

c) Zoning Committee

Receive, review and make recommendations concerning applications for rezoning, zoning variances, demolitions and special permits for property located in the area.

d) Community Engagement Committee

1. Review social and recreation services in the area and take appropriate action to improve or maintain them;

2. Monitor consumer - business relations in the area;

3. Initiate, coordinate or assist at community-wide events;

4. Work to develop a community identity;

5. Work to improve the quality of life for all our residents;

6. Publicize the North Linden Area Commission as a community resource.

e) Health & Safety Committee

1. Coordinate and/or initiate efforts to reduce crime in the community. Work with other groups as desired;

2. Initiate and/or help with efforts to maintain a clean community;

3. Initiate and/or assist with efforts to control conditions which interfere with the health of residents.

4. Sub-committee - Code Enforcement

- a. Report known code violations in the North Linden Area Commission area to the appropriate Code Enforcement officer of the City of Columbus;
- b. Become knowledgeable about code enforcement problems in the community and make constructive suggestions about remedying them; and
- c. The Committee may undertake programs to educate the community about code enforcement issues.

f) Job Creation and Workforce Development

1. Providing opportunities for entrepreneurship;

2. Partnering with businesses to offer employment.

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3. Sub-Committee - Education

- a. Linking business owners and educators;
- b. Promoting training for employees.

g) Transportation Committee

Initiate and/or assist with efforts to alleviate vehicular traffic problems in the community

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ARTICLE VII. CODE OF CONDUCT

Commissioners have an obligation to limit comments from litigious content that jeopardizes the NLAC. If comments are deemed harmful, by the NLAC, to any member of the Public and/or the NLAC, then the offending Commissioner must issue a public statement for the record at the subsequent NLAC meeting. This statement must include reference to the offense and indicate that her/his opinions and comments were personal and had no bearing on the NLAC.

ARTICLE VIII. AMENDMENTS

Section 1. A proposed amendment to these Bylaws shall be submitted in writing by any Commission member at any regular meeting.

a) The proposed amendment shall first be read at the regular meeting when submitted and again at the next two (2) regular meetings following. The proposed amendment shall be voted on after the reading at the third regular meeting.

b) With a unanimous vote of the Commission members present at the first reading, the proposed amendment may be voted on at the next regular meeting.

c) Adoption of the proposed amendment shall be by a two-thirds majority vote of the entire Commission.

Section 2. In accordance with Chapter 3109 of the Columbus City Code, the approved amendment shall be filed immediately with the Department of Neighborhoods after its adoption. Such amendment shall take effect thirty (30) days after publication in the City Bulletin.

Far East Area Commission Bylaws

These Bylaws establish the procedure under which the Far East Area Commission shall execute those duties and functions set forth in and with authority granted under Chapters 3109 and 3111 of the Columbus City Codes (herein abbreviated as C.C.)

Article I. Name

The name of this organization shall be the Far East Area Commission, herein referred to as the "Commission".

Article II. Area

The boundaries of the Commission: to the north, City of Columbus city limits, to the east City of Columbus city limits, to the south, Centerline of the Conrail Railroad and to the west, Centerline of Big Walnut Creek. The Commission serves the incorporated areas of the City of Columbus, and strives to maintain an effective working relationship with the jurisdictions that fall within the Commission's boundaries which include: Franklin County and Fairfield County.

Article III. Purpose

1. The purpose of this Commission shall be to afford additional voluntary citizen participation in decision making in an advisory capacity to the City Administration and City Council and to facilitate communication, understanding, and cooperation between neighborhood groups, city officials, and developers. The Commission shall:

A. In the interests of local planning for local needs, identify and study problems and requirements of the Commission Area in order to:

- 1. Create plans and policies, which will serve as guidelines for future developments of the Area:
- 2. Bring the problems and needs of the Area to the attention of appropriate government agencies or residents; and 3. Recommend solutions or legislation.

B. Air and promote communication within the Commission Area and between it and the rest of the City by means of:

- 1. Regular and special meetings of the Commission which are open to the public;
- 2. Public hearings on problems, issues or proposals affecting the area;
- 3. Public forums and surveys to provide an opportunity for Area residents, businesses and organizations, institutions, and government.

- 4. Initiating proposals and supporting those introduced by individual citizens or area organizations, which will enhance the quality of life enjoyed by area residents and preserve the unique residential and commercial mix of the Area; and
- 5. Promoting and encouraging businesses whose functions, methods of operation, architectural appearance, and locations are consistent with the character and requirement of the Area.

C. Initiate, review, and recommend criteria and programs for the preservation, development and enhancement of the Commission Area, including. But not limited to, parks, recreation areas, sidewalks, street, and traffic, by means of:

- 1. Reviewing the proposed Capital Improvements Budget and proposing new items and changes relating to the Area;
- 2. Making recommendations for restoration and preservation of the historical elements within the Area; and
- 3. Receiving and reviewing for recommendation, prior to the adoption by governmental bodies, any new or revised comprehensive plan affecting the Area.

D. Recommend priorities for and review government services and operation of the various government departments in the Commission Area by means of:

- 1. Requesting and receiving from departments or agencies periodic reports concerning governmental services in the Area;
- 2. Meeting with administrative heads of any department or agency, or any of their subordinates, to obtain additional information deemed necessary for the Commission to fulfill its functions.
- 3. Requesting and receiving from departments or agencies, prior to implementation, full reports on any proposed changes;
- 4. Reviewing and evaluating pending legislation substantially affecting the
- Area prior to its consideration by Council; and
- 5. Review and comment on zoning issues and demolitions presented to the Commission.
- E. Recommend persons from Commission Area for nomination to membership on City boards and commission, which make decisions or recommendations affecting the Commission Area.

2. The Commission shall not endorse any candidate for public office.

Article IV. Membership

1. Appointment. All Commissioners shall be appointed by the Mayor of the City of Columbus in accordance with C.C. 3109. The Secretary shall notify the Department of Neighborhoods of all nominations, elections, and vacancies within ten days (10) of such action.

A. Should the Mayor neither approve nor disapprove the action within thirty (30) days of notifications, the action shall be deemed approval until notice from the Mayor as specified in C.C. 3109.

B. A copy of each notice shall be sent to the City Council in care of the City Clerk.

2. Members. The Commission shall consist of eleven (11) members. Each member shall either reside, work, including affiliation with nonprofits, or own property in the Commission Area, and serve without compensation. There shall be no more than 2 members elected from any given district. Those members outside of the Commission Area are limited to no more than one-third (1/3) of the membership.

- A. Eight (8) Elected District Commissioners shall be selected from the Far East Area. The eight (8) District Commissioners shall be selected in accordance with the selection rules adopted by the Far East Area Commission. Each elected District Commissioner must be a resident in the City of Columbus.
- B. Three (3) At-Large Commissioners, shall be nominated by the Commission. The three (3) individuals nominated by the Commission may be from, but not limited to, the following: one (1) official from Far East City Schools; one (1) representative of the Far East clergy; and one (1) from a Far East Area Business Association or Non Profit.
- C. The Commission must maintain (2/3rds) of the members to be residents of the Far East boundaries.
- D. All Commission and Committee members must adhere to all bylaws and all rules/regulations/guidelines/policies, established by the Far East Area Commission and approved with a majority vote.

3. Terms. The term of membership of elected officials shall be three (3) years. All terms shall expire during the annual meeting; however, a member may continue to serve beyond term expiration until a successor is appointed. Terms shall be staggered so as to maintain continuity of experienced representation. Term of at-large commissioners shall be for three years (3). A letter of resignation shall be forwarded to the chair and posted to the Commission.

4. No Commission member, except Commission Chair, shall represent the Commission in its official actions before any other public body or official, except as specifically authorized in writing by the Commission. This shall not be construed as a restriction upon the right of the individual members to represent their own views before public or private bodies, whether in agreement or disagreement with the official action of the Commission.

5. Disqualification. Members shall maintain their residence, work, including business or affiliation with nonprofits, property or business in the Commission Area from which they were elected or appointed. Failure of a member to maintain his or her residence, property, business and or affiliation in the Far East Commission Area, shall be deemed a resignation and the Secretary shall notify the Mayor, City Clerk and the Department of Neighborhood.

6. Attendance. The year starts with the annual meeting in January. Members shall, so far as possible, be regular in attendance. A member's absence from three (3) regular meetings in any one (1) year, shall be deemed a resignation from the Commission, unless a petition has been received by the Chairperson of the Commission. The Commission must act upon the petition after it is received at either the next regularly scheduled meeting or the following regularly scheduled meetings. The petition must be made in writing and received by the Chairperson prior to the next regular meeting following the third absence. The petition is to request that some or all of the absences may be excused to extenuating circumstances. The nature of the extenuating circumstances shall be explained. After the second missed meeting, the secretary will remind the member of the about the need to submit a petition to the Chairperson if the member would like to maintain their position. Members shall, so far as possible, inform either the Chairperson or the Secretary, prior to the meeting, when they know they will be absent.

7. The Commission shall nominate one or more candidates to fill any vacancy caused by death, disqualification, or other means for the remainder of the unexpired term by letter to the Mayor pursuant to C.C. 3109. A replacement shall be nominated by the remaining members for appointment within thirty (30) days of the declared vacancy to fill the position until the next selections or annual nomination.

Article V. Officers

1. The officers of the Commission shall be: Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer and Zoning Chair. At the January Meeting of the Commission, officers shall be elected by majority vote of the Commission members. Officers shall serve one (1) year, or until a successor is elected. Each officer shall have the right to vote on any question. All officers shall be Commission members.

2. The Chairperson shall preside at all meetings of the Commission; in consultation with other Commission members, appoint standing and special committees of the Commission; serve as an ex-officio member of all committees; coordinate the actions of officer and committee chairperson; and perform other duties associated with the office as required.

3. The Vice-Chairperson shall assist the Chairperson; perform all the duties of the Chairperson in his or her absence, or at the request of the Chairperson; and perform other such duties as may be assigned by the Commission.

4. The Secretary shall call and record roll; remind a member of his or her absences per Article IV, section 6; record and maintain accurate voting records and meeting summaries which shall be open to public examination; maintain such other records as the Commission may direct; notify the Department of Neighborhoods of any vacancy;

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perform related duties as may be assigned by the Commission; and in the absence of both the Chairperson and the Vice- Chairperson, call the meeting to order and preside.

5. The Treasurer shall receive all funds and disburse all funds with the Commission's approval. The Commission shall provide for a reconciliation of the financial records of the accounts prior to each annual meeting.

6. A vacancy in the office of the Chairperson shall be filled by the Vice-Chairperson. A vacancy in any other position shall be filled in the same manner as the original selection.

Article VI. Meeting

- 1. Regular meetings of the Commission shall be held every month on the first Tuesday at 6:45 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. unless otherwise directed by the Chair person in sufficient time to notify constituents and the City Administration of such change. Each meeting shall be held in the Commission Area unless suitable facilities are not available in which they may seek suitable facilities contiguous to the Commission Area in an appropriate, large room convenient for members and the public chosen by the Commission as its regular meeting place, unless otherwise specified at least fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. Notice of the meeting shall be made available to the local Neighborhood Pride Center prior to changing meeting times or location.
- 2. The annual meeting shall be the first regular meeting in January at which time newly elected members will be seated.
- 3. Special meetings may be called by Officers, the Chairperson, or by majority of the members in a regular or special meeting with written notification to the chairperson. The meeting's purpose, date, time, and location shall be stated when the meeting is called. No business will be considered at a special meeting unless it was stated when the meeting was called. Except in cases of emergency, three (3) days notice shall be given for a special meeting.
- 4. All meetings shall be open to the public, and notice shall be made available to the local Neighborhood Pride Center.
- 5. Quorum: A majority of the Commission members shall constitute a quorum for conducting business.
- 6. Voting: A majority of the Commission members present and voting shall be required to approve any action. A tie vote is disapproval. The Chairperson shall state each issue in a positive form such as "The question before the Commission is: Shall the application (request approval) for _____ be approved?"
- 7. The Order of Business can be determined by the Chair. A suggested format is:

8. The Chairperson shall recognize members of the public who wish to address the Commission concerning issues under discussion. The Chairperson shall uniformly limit debate to an equal amount of time for each side of the issue. Time limits may be set by the Commission. When appropriate, further action on the issue may be deferred to the next Commission meeting.

9. Dissenting or non-concurring reports may be filed with Secretary by any Commission member and shall be attached to the minutes

10. Individual citizens or Commissioners may be asked to research a specific topic and report findings to the Commission.

Article VII. Committees

- 1. The Chairperson shall appoint Commission members to standing committees giving due consideration to their individual preferences and subject to approval by a majority vote of the Commission members.
- 2. The Chairperson may appoint non-members to Commission committees subject to approval by a majority vote of the Commission members. Non-member appointed shall have full voting privileges in all proceedings of the committee to which they are appointed. The number of non-members on any committee shall not exceed the number of Commission members appointed.
- 3. Committee members shall serve at the pleasure of the Chairperson and their appointments shall expire at the next annual meeting.
- 4. The Chairperson shall be an ex-officio member of all committees, except the Nominating Committee.

- 5. After appointments are approved, the members of each committee shall select a Committee Chairperson from among the Commission members appointed to the committee.
- 6. Committees will be formed as needed.
- 7. Notice of all committee meetings and copies of all committee correspondence shall be filed with the Secretary and the Chairperson of the Commission. Committee findings which propose action or resolution shall be submitted at a regular meeting of the Commission for consideration.

Article VIII. Elections

1. The Elections Board shall consist of a minimum of three (3) Commission Area residents appointed by the Chairperson with the approval of the Commission at the last regular meeting in August of each year. No individual running election night activities can be connected in any way with any candidate appearing on the ballot for the Commission.

2. The Board shall appoint any necessary officers; provide for printing and distributing necessary for such as, but not limited to, petitions, ballots and tallies; receive petitions; certify persons who have qualified as candidates as candidates. Locate polling places, conduct the election; tally the votes; hear and decide complaints concerning the election or campaign; and certify the winning candidates to the Commission pursuant to C.C. 3109 and the Selection Procedure, including all activities incidental thereto.

3. Candidates for selection shall not be members of the Elections Board or polling staffs in year or years in which their names appear on the ballot.

4. Elections shall be by secret ballot and determined by plurality of vote if three (3) or more candidates vie for a single position, otherwise a majority of votes cast shall elect. Any person eighteen (18) years of age or older may be an elector. Electors need not be registered with the Franklin County Board of Elections or Fairfield County Board of Elections. Thereafter, each election shall be conducted by the Elections Board at the next annual meeting-in September. Members shall take office at the January Meeting

5. The Election Board shall adopt Election Rules for governing the elections by majority vote of its members provided such rules shall conform with these Bylaws and Selection Procedure. Such rules shall not be changed during the ninety (90) days before an election nor thirty (30) days after an election. The adoption of amendment of such Rules shall be presented to the Commission at the beginning of a regular meeting. Should the Commission not disapprove of them prior to adjournment, such Rules take effect. The Commission may amend the Election Rules without action by the Elections Board in the same manner as an amendment of these Bylaws.

Article IX. Parliamentary Authority

Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern in all cases to which they are applicable and not inconsistent with these Bylaws and any special rules of order the Commission may adopt.

Article X. Amendments of Bylaws

These Bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting of the Commission by an affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the Commission Members provided that the amendment was submitted in writing at the previous regular meeting. The Secretary shall file any approved amendment immediately after its adoption with the City Clerk for publication in the City Bulletin. Such amendment shall take effect ten (10) days after such publication per C.C. 121.05.

INCOME TAX DIVISION

General Rules and Regulations for Chapters 375 and 376, Columbus City Code City Auditor's Office – Division of Income Tax City of Columbus, Ohio Effective July 1, 2021

- I. General Provisions and Administration of Tax
 - A. **Authority:** Chapters 375 and 376 of the Columbus City Code establish the tax on amounts received as admission to any place located within the City of Columbus and authorizes the City Auditor or their designee to adopt and enforce rules and regulations pertaining to the administration and enforcement of the provisions of those chapters.
 - B. **Purpose of rules:** the rules and regulations herein are intended to clarify provisions in Columbus City Code Chapters 375 and 376 for the purposes of administration of and compliance with the chapters. The rules and regulations are a supplement to, and not a replacement of, the language contained in Columbus City Code Chapters 375 and 376.
 - C. Admissions: taxable admissions, as defined in 375.01(a) and 376.01(a), do not include the following:
 - i. Virtual events, streaming services, digital content, online services and subscriptions;
 - ii. Entry fees that are payments to participate in a competition, competitive event, fitness event, or exhibition.
 - iii. Fees for non-entertainment services that include entry or access to a facility only if the entry or access to the facility is ancillary to non-entertainment services provided. The burden of proving that any transaction is not subject to the tax imposed by this chapter is upon the person upon whom the duty to collect the tax is imposed.
 - D. Location: taxable admissions, as defined in 375.01(a) and 376.01(a) include admissions charged to places and events located within the Columbus taxing jurisdiction for income tax purposes.
 - E. **Designee of City Auditor:** Under 375.01(b) and 376.01(b), the Income Tax Administrator is hereby designated to carry out the administration and enforcement of the provisions of this chapter on behalf of the City Auditor and is hereby empowered to adopt and promulgate and to enforce rules and regulations relating to any matter or thing pertaining to the administration and enforcement of the provisions of this chapter.
 - F. **Collection and remittance:** Each vendor, or authorized agent thereof, shall on or before the twentieth day of each month make and file a return for the preceding month using Form A-1, Monthly Return of Admissions Tax.
- II. Memberships and Packages
 - A. **Applicability:** Memberships that grant admissions (including but not limited to memberships to attractions, exhibits, country clubs, etc.) shall be taxable under Chapters 375 and 376. Memberships for non-entertainment services (e.g. wine clubs, gym memberships, tanning beds, massage clubs, newspaper subscriptions, etc.) are not taxable. Memberships for non-entertainment services that include entry or

access to a facility are not taxable under Chapters 375 and 376 only if the entry or access to the facility is ancillary to the non-entertainment services provided (e.g., gym membership). The burden of proving that any transaction is not subject to the tax imposed by this chapter is upon the person upon whom the duty to collect the tax is imposed.

B. Taxable value of a membership:

- i. The taxable value of a membership is the daily non-member admission rate for one visit multiplied by the number of guests included in the membership.
- ii. For memberships that do not define number of guests that may be admitted, the taxable value of the membership is the lesser of:
 - a. The daily non-member admission rate for one visit multiplied by two guests, or
 - b. The total cost of the membership.
- C. **Taxable value of a package:** For packages that include admission and other services (e.g. birthday party packages) or goods (e.g. merchandise, food, beverage), the taxable value of the package is the lesser of:
 - i. The value of admissions included in the package if sold separately from the package, or
 - ii. The total cost of the package.
- D. **Taxable value of resale admissions:** A vendor making or facilitating the resale of admissions must tax the resale value, which shall be calculated as the difference between the full resale price and the face value price (also known as the established price or base ticket price) of admissions.

III. Exemptions

- A. **Venue capacity:** Capacity for a place where an event is conducted is determined by the total of all occupancy permits issued by the City of Columbus for that specific address.
- B. **Capacity vs. attendance:** Admissions to an event conducted in a place with capacity for 400 or fewer attendees are exempt from the admissions tax. The capacity exemption applies to a capacity of 400 or fewer people, not attendance of 400 or fewer people.
- C. Proceeds partially benefit exempt organization: The tax is applied to the full price to gain admission, except for admissions where the proceeds <u>exclusively</u> benefit an organization listed in C.C.C. 375.09(a) or 376.08(a). The full amount paid to gain admission to an event where proceeds partially benefit an organization listed in C.C.C. 375.09(a) or 376.08(a) shall be considered taxable.

IV. Third Party Vendors

- A. Non-exempt vendors selling on behalf of an exempt organization: Non-exempt organizations that charge admissions to an event where the admissions proceeds exclusively benefit an organization exempt from taxation under C.C.C. 375.09(a) are not required to charge or collect the admissions tax.
- B. **Tax collected at each point of sale:** The tax is charged at each point of sale. If an organization sells admissions *through* a third party vendor, the organization must charge the tax through the platform or vendor selling on behalf of the organization. If an organization sells tickets *to* a third party vendor for resale, the organization must charge the tax on the admissions sold to the third party.

V. Nexus for Remote Vendors

A. Nexus:

- i. "Substantial nexus with this city" means that the vendor has sufficient contact with this city, in accordance with Section 8 of Article I of the Constitution of the United States, to allow the city to require the vendor to collect and remit admissions tax made to consumers in this city. The vendor must engage in continuous and widespread solicitation of purchases from residents of this city or otherwise purposefully directs its business activities at residents of this city.
- ii. "Substantial nexus with this city" is presumed to exist when the vendor does any of the following:
 - a. Uses an office or any place of business within this city, whether operated by the vendor or any other person, other than a common carrier acting in its capacity as a common carrier.

- b. Regularly uses employees, agents, representatives, solicitors, salespersons, or other persons in this city for the purpose of conducting the business of the vendor.
- c. Uses any person, other than a common carrier acting in its capacity as a common carrier, in this city for any of the following purposes:
 - a. Receiving or processing orders;
 - b. Using that person's employees or facilities in this city to advertise, promote, or facilitate sales by the vendor to customers;
- d. Has an affiliated person that has substantial nexus with this city.
- e. Has gross receipts in excess of one hundred thousand dollars in the current or preceding calendar year from the sale of admissions to events or places located in this city.
- f. Engages, in the current or preceding calendar year, in two hundred or more separate transactions selling admissions to events or places located in this city.
- iii. A marketplace facilitator, as defined in C.C.C. 375.01(e) and C.C.C. 376.01(e), is presumed to have substantial nexus with this state if either of the following apply in the current or preceding calendar year:
 - a. The aggregate gross receipts derived from sales of admissions to events or places located in this city, including sales made by the marketplace facilitator on its own behalf and sales facilitated by the marketplace facilitator on behalf of one or more marketplace sellers, exceed one hundred thousand dollars;
 - b. The marketplace facilitator engages in on its own behalf, or facilitates on behalf of one or more marketplace sellers, two hundred or more separate transactions selling admissions to events or places located in this city.

RENEWAL OF PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY DECLARATION

In response to the developing community health crisis surrounding COVID-19/Coronavirus and pursuant to Chapter 775 of the Columbus City Health Code, Chapter 3709 of the Ohio Revised Code, and the contract between Columbus Public Health and the City of Worthington, Resolution No. 20-08, a declaration of Public Health Emergency (PHE), to include the cities of Columbus and Worthington, was passed and issued by the Columbus Board of Health on March 13, 2020.

That declaration automatically terminated on April 12, 2020.

On March 17, 2020, pursuant to Chapter 775 of the Columbus City Health Code and Chapter 3709 of the Ohio Revised Code, Resolution No. 20-09, authorizing the Health Commissioner to declare a public health emergency without convening the Board of Health, was passed by the Columbus Board of Health.

Previous renewals of the original Board of Health PHE declaration issued on March 13, 2020 have expired.

The most recent renewal issued Monday 5/24/21 will expire at 11:59pm on Tuesday June 22, 2021.

Due to the ongoing community health emergency related to COVID-19/Coronavirus in the cities of Columbus and Worthington and consistent with the States of Emergency declared by the Governor of Ohio and the Mayor of Columbus and Orders issued by the Ohio Department of Health, and pursuant to the authority granted in Columbus Board of Health Resolution No. 20-09, Chapter 775 of the Columbus Health Code Chapter, and Chapter 3709 of the Ohio Revised Code,

I HEREBY ORDER:

Renewal of the Public Health Emergency declaration for the cities of Columbus and Worthington initially issued by the Columbus Board of Health on March 13, 2020. Unless amended or rescinded, this renewal shall be in effect from 12:00am on Wed June 23, 2021 until 11:59pm on Thurs July 22, 2021.

This renewal of the PHE declaration shall supersede and take precedence over any prior renewal.
