



BACKGROUND: Columbus Public Health has been awarded a grant from The Ohio Department of Public Safety, Ohio Traffic Safety Office. This ordinance is needed to accept and appropriate \$60,000.00 in grant funds to fund the Drive to Succeed grant program, for the period of April 1, 2023 through June 30, 2025. This project will develop a scholarship program to expand access to teen driver training to low-income populations in Franklin County. Our partners include Columbus City Schools, AAA Central Ohio, and The Working Professionals Driving Academy. Eligible students will be identified through an application process and will be awarded a scholarship to cover the cost of driver training at one of our partner schools. The training and in-car experience provided will provide youth with the knowledge and skills they need to be safe drivers once they are licensed.

Emergency action is requested because the grant period started April 1, 2023, and to allow the financial transaction to be posted in the city's accounting system as soon as possible, and to not delay the start of the Drive to Succeed Grant program. Up to date financial posting promotes accurate accounting and financial management.

FISCAL IMPACT: The Drive to Succeed grant program is entirely funded by The Ohio Department of Public Safety, Ohio Traffic Safety Office and does not generate revenue or require a City Match.

To authorize and direct the Board of Health to accept a grant from The Ohio Department of Public Safety, Ohio Traffic Safety Office in the amount of \$60,000.00 for the Drive to Succeed grant program; to authorize the appropriation of \$60,000.00 from the unappropriated balance of the Health Department Grants Fund; and to declare an emergency. (\$60,000.00)

WHEREAS, \$60,000.00 in grant funds have been made available through The Ohio Department of Public Safety, Ohio Traffic Safety Office for the Drive to Succeed grant program for the period of April 1, 2023 through June 30, 2025; and,

1. BACKGROUND

This Ordinance authorizes the Director of Public Utilities to renew and increase the professional engineering services agreement with Hill International, Inc., for the Professional Construction Management Services (PCM) - 2020 Project in an amount up to \$9,421,900.00.

This Professional Construction Management (PCM) contract assists the City with managing a capital improvement program consisting of multiple capital improvement projects to ensure completion in accordance with design requirements and City's needs, while serving as a liaison between the construction contractor, design professional (DP), and City personnel. Work performed to date includes program support services, design phase construction management services (e.g., construction cost estimating, constructability reviews, and construction scheduling), and construction administration / construction inspection (CA/CI) services. Future phases of the contact will continue these same services.

The Notice to Proceed (NTP) for the original contract occurred in December 2020. Construction projects will be assigned to this contract based on their advertisement date using a three year assignment period that starts at this contract's NTP date; thus, the assignment period is anticipated to run from December 2020 to December 2023.

The Community Planning Area is "99 - Citywide" because the water facilities associated with this contract serve multiple planning areas.

1.1 Future Renewals: Funds will be authorized through annual contract renewals (or more frequent renewals if required by fiscal needs). The PCM team will provide construction services through completion of the last construction project assigned to this contract. Thus, the end date for this contract will depend on the construction duration of the last construction project assigned.

1.2 Amount of additional funds to be expended: \$9,421,900.00

- **1.3. Reason other procurement processes are not used:** The current consultant has already provided both design phase and construction phase services for all the projects assigned to this contract. Bidding this work out to a new consultant would require duplication of some of the work already performed and would interrupt construction phase services for projects currently under construction.
- **1.4.** How the cost of renewal was determined: The City identified the services that would be needed for each project over the renewal period. The consultant developed a proposal for the hours/resources necessary to complete the services. The proposal was reviewed by the City's project personnel and subsequently revised by the consultant based on the City's comments.

2. ECONOMIC IMPACT/ADVANTAGES; COMMUNITY OUTREACH; PROJECT DEVELOPMENT; ENVIRONMENTAL FACTORS/ADVANTAGES OF PROJECT

This PCM contract will support various projects in the Division of Water capital program. These projects will maintain and upgrade drinking water supply and treatment facilities to provide a safe and reliable water supply to the central Ohio area. All of these functions are tied to the economic vitality of the service area.

Most projects will be located within secure areas of the water supply system that are not accessible to the public and for these projects no community outreach activities are anticipated. Community outreach activities will be considered for projects that impact the public.

The consultant team has identified a commitment to the Mayor's Green Initiative in their business practices and will be involved in applying Department of Public Utilities environmental management system (EMS) to the construction projects.

3. CONTRACT COMPLIANCE INFORMATION

Hill International's contract compliance number is CC-000990 and expires 12/8/23.

Searches in the Excluded Party List System (Federal) and the Findings for Recovery list (State) are not required for this contract as no Federal or State funds will be expended on the contract.

4. MINORITY AND WOMAN OWNED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE & SMALL LOCAL BUSINESS ENTERPRISE PROGRAM

This contract was put in place prior to the implementation of the City of Columbus MBE/WBE Program and is not subject to the requirements of that program. This ordinance enacts a new chapter of city code to provide protections for freelance workers in Columbus. This ordinance also amends sections of City Code related to the enforcement of these provisions by the Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement Commission.

Freelance work is one the fastest growing sectors within the workforce. Nearly 40% of the workforce is engaged in freelance work as of 2022. Researchers expect that over half of the workforce will be participating in freelance work by 2027 due to the rapid growth, and due to younger generations' interest in the flexibility and opportunities that freelancing provides. In Columbus, it is important to invest in and protect the freelancers today

and be prepared for the larger freelance sector of tomorrow.

Protecting freelance workers supports those at the foundation of the community. The majority of caregivers in the workforce choose freelance work because it allows them better opportunities to balance their priorities and responsibilities. Nearly 50% of freelancers choose this sector because they cannot work for a traditional employer due to personal circumstances. Protecting freelancers is one more step Columbus City Council can take to promote the financial stability and overall well-being of families.

These steps are necessary because the greatest unique challenge that freelancers face is uncertainty unpredictable income. Every year, 50% of freelance workers struggle to collect payment. 71% of freelancers will struggle to collect payment at least once over the course of their career. These changes to the Columbus City Codes will require that contracts are in place for freelance work representing more than \$250 of work, will require that freelancers are paid in full and in a timely manner, and will give freelancers a course of action if these agreements are not honored.

This ordinance establishes protections for freelance workers in Columbus, placing enforcement of these provisions with the Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement Commission. These updates will strengthen Columbus' workforce and Columbus' families.

FISCAL IMPACT: No funding is required for this legislation.

To enact Chapter 2337 and Section 377.18; to amend sections 377.02, 377.11, 377.12, 377.15, 377.16 and 377.17; and to repeal existing sections 377.02, 377.11, 377.12, 377.15, 377.16 and 377.17 of the Columbus City Codes, to provide protections to freelance workers in Columbus.

WHEREAS, freelancers often choose freelance work for increased flexibility, especially for caregivers who seek to balance responsibilities; and

WHEREAS, freelance workers do not have the same protections as traditional workers, and 71% will struggle to collect payment during their career and 50% will struggle to collect payment once a year; and

WHEREAS, protections to freelance workers will help alleviate concerns of income stability; and

WHEREAS, Columbus City Council seeks to promote financial stability for all members of the workforce and protect vulnerable workers; **NOW**, **THEREFORE**,

This ordinance authorizes the Director of Public Utilities to enter into a construction contract with Complete General Corporation for the Large Diameter Valve Replacement, Part 3 Project, CIP #690589-100002, in an amount up to \$4,686,561.65, and to encumber funds with the Department of Public Service for prevailing wage services in an amount up to \$2,000.00 for the project.

Ordinance 0997-2023 is pending City Council approval for the Department of Public Utilities to obtain loans directly from OWDA.

This contract was bid with an anticipated City of Columbus MBE/WBE Program goal of 12% as assigned by the City's Office of Diversity and Inclusion (ODI). After ODI's review of the Utilization Plan and other related information the contractor submitted with their bid response, ODI has approved an MBE/WBE Program goal of 12% for this contract. Failure by the contractor to meet this goal subjects the contractor to the Penalties for Non-Compliance as described in the "City's Minority and Women-Owned Business Enterprise & Small Local Business Enterprise Program Manual" and in the bid documents for this contract.

BACKGROUND: This legislation authorizes the Director of Public Utilities to modify an indefinite quantity contract with Edwards Landclearing, Inc. for Yard Waste and Log Grinding Services to provide funding for

services through November 30, 2023.

The City of Columbus operates a composting facility that processes sewage sludge from two interconnected wastewater treatment plants into soil conditioner / mulch for wholesale. Maintaining continuous operations is necessary to comply with wastewater permit standards and to protect public health. The City utilizes ground yard waste, whole tree wood chips, sawdust, straw, logs, and ground wood waste as bulking agents to process sewage sludge. The services to be performed under this contract call for Edwards Landclearing, Inc. to provide equipment and an operator for grinding yard waste and wood waste, sizing and grinding logs.

The Department of Public Utilities opened three bids on June 23, 2021 and Edwards Landclearing, Inc. was the only responsive, responsible and best bidder. An indefinite quantity contract was established in accordance with Request for Quotation RFQ018927 and authorized under Ordinance Number 0150-2021. Modification #1 to add additional funding to the contract was authorized by Ordinance #0096-2022. Renewal/Modification #2 to extend the contract through November 30, 2023 and to add additional funding to the contract was authorized under Ordinance Number 2583-2022.

This legislation seeks to modify the indefinite quantity contract to add funding to provide services through November 30, 2023. This Ordinance is being submitted in accordance with the relevant provisions of Chapter 329 of City Code pertaining to contract renewals/modifications.

Without this service, the Columbus Public Health Department would lose the ability to operate the Environmental Health unit, which could result in the failure to meet requirements mandated by the State of Ohio.

Accela Inc. is the sole provider of maintenance and support for Envision Connect software. As such, this ordinance is being established in accordance with the sole source provisions of the Columbus City Code Chapter 329.

Finally, this ordinance authorizes the expenditure of \$150,713.07 for the above-described purpose.

This legislation authorizes the Director of Public Utilities to conduct a modified Request for Proposal ("RFP") process, which will include discussion and negotiation with short-listed proposers, and to enter into a power supply agreement with the selected supplier to serve the Department of Public Utilities' ("Department") purchased power requirements beginning January 1, 2026. The resulting agreement will be for a term of up to three years to begin upon the expiration of the existing power supply agreement on December 31, 2025.

Since the Department executed its existing power supply agreement, it has become a counterparty to certain solar renewable energy projects under development within the City that will serve as a source of supply for the Department's Division of Power ("Division"). As these new renewable projects serving the Division's load achieve commercial operation, it may be appropriate for the Department to utilize an approach to power procurement that differs from that which it has previously used. Accordingly, this legislation authorizes the Department to issue an RFP that requests suppliers to offer proposals to address the Department's changing purchased power requirements in a way that reduces market timing risks, minimizes liquidation potential, and maintains awarding of load-serving entity and back-office functions with the selected supplier. The RFP will also invite proposals that set forth other innovative approaches for the Department to procure its remaining power requirements given the Department's reliability and sustainability goals.

This legislation authorizes the Department to enter into a power supply agreement that will best meet the Department's requirements in light of these renewable energy projects and changing market conditions. The agreement may implement either a fixed-price, full-requirements supply with a single supplier for a fixed term or a laddering approach. Under a laddering approach, the Department may, from time to time as circumstances warrant during the agreement term, purchase blocks of energy, load-following blocks of energy, and/or indexed products. Purchases under a laddering approach would be executed upon approval of the Department during the agreement term such that the total size and duration of individual purchases would total 100% of hourly load needs prior to the start of an actual delivery period.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is an expenditure of \$1.00 associated with this ordinance to allow the Director of Public Utilities the authority to enter into a power supply agreement for a term beginning January 1, 2026.

EMERGENCY DESIGNATION:

This ordinance is requested to be an emergency measure to allow the Director of Public Utilities to conduct a competitive process to negotiate and enter into a power supply agreement with a supplier that reduces market timing risks and minimizes liquidation potential, allows contract negotiations to begin at the earliest possible date, and allows the Department to take advantage of the best market prices.

To authorize the Director of Public Utilities to conduct a modified request for proposal process to negotiate with multiple suppliers and to select a supplier to fulfill the Division of Power's electric power supply requirements for a one-year term beginning January 1, 2026 and extending for up to three year one-year renewal periods; to authorize the awarding of and entering into of such a power supply agreement; to authorize the Division to implement the strategy to purchase energy products on an ongoing basis if so provided under the terms of the power supply agreement; to waive provisions of Columbus City Code relating to the award of contracts through the request for proposal process as permitted by City Code Section 329.15; to authorize the expenditure of \$1.00

from the Electricity Operating Fund; and to declare an emergency. (\$1.00)

WHEREAS, the Division of Power (the "Division") needs to secure electric power supply for a term beginning January 1, 2026 to continue to provide electric power for the City and its businesses and residents; and

WHEREAS, the Division has historically fulfilled its electric power supply needs using a fixed-price, full-requirements supply contract with a single supplier for a fixed term ("Fixed Pricing"); and

WHEREAS, the Division desires to consider changes to the City's current Fixed Pricing strategy due to its purchase of renewable energy from certain solar projects and other entitlements; and

WHEREAS, due to the volatility of the electric power supply market, the City's plans for renewable energy sources to be a source of supply for the Division, and the necessity to lock-in favorable prices and power supply contracts immediately as they become available, it is necessary to vary the procedures, permitted by City Code Section 329.15, for entering into power supply contracts and to consider alternatives to Fixed Pricing; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to authorize the Director of Public Utilities to conduct a competitive process to negotiate with multiple suppliers and to select a supplier for the Division's electric power supply requirements for a term beginning January 1, 2026: and

WHEREAS, such a process may request proposals that set forth either a Fixed Pricing approach or alternatives to Fixed Pricing, including but not limited to a laddering approach, under which the Department may, from time to time as circumstances warrant during the agreement term, purchase blocks of energy, load-following blocks of energy, and/or indexed products; and

WHEREAS, in order to secure the best combination of contract terms and pricing, it is advisable to negotiate with more than one potential power supplier; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the City due to current market conditions to authorize the Director of Public Utilities to negotiate contract terms and enter into an agreement with the power supplier deemed to provide the best overall terms and pricing for a one-year term beginning January 1, 2026 and is subject to three one-year renewal periods; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to waive the provisions of Columbus City Code relating to selection using the request for proposal process to allow negotiation with multiple power suppliers, as may be authorized under City Code Section 329.15; and

WHEREAS, the City seeks an expenditure of \$1.00 or so much thereof as may be needed, to be authorized in Fund 6300, Electricity Operating Fund, in object class 02, Materials & Supplies, per the accounting codes attached to the ordinance; and

Background: This ordinance authorizes the Director of the Recreation and Parks Department to modify an existing contract with MKSK to provide professional design services for the West Case Park Design Project. The modification amount is \$1,293,000.00 and a contingency of \$82,000.00, for a total of \$1,375,000.00 being authorized by this ordinance.

In 2018, the Recreation and Parks Department acquired the former Ohio State University Agriculture Extension Sheep Farm at 2425 West Case Road. For several years, the Recreation and Parks Department had identified the 58 acre site as a key community park space as the parcel is one of the largest remaining undeveloped open spaces in the entire Northwest Community. At the same time, the surrounding neighborhoods have played an active role by providing support for the City's investment to buy the site and develop a signature green space for a highly underserved area for greenspace. INTRODUCTION: The applicant, Maronda Homes, LLC of Ohio is seeking to re-zone the Property containing approximately 64.553 +/- acres located at Gender Road and commonly known as Franklin County Auditor Tax Parcel Id. 2. PERMITTED USES:

A. Density, Height, Lot and/or Setback commitments.

- 1. The maximum number of dwelling units will be 177.
- 2. The minimum side yard setbacks shall total a minimum of 12 feet (6 feet on each side). The maximum side yard setbacks shall total a maximum of 16 feet (8 feet on each side). The minimum separation between single-unit dwellings will comply with all applicable building codes.

- 3. Vehicular access will be from one full curb cut access and one right-in, right-out curb cut access to and from the public right-of-way of Brice Road into the development, as shown on the Site Plan, with a landscaped entrance features and signage at the full curb cut access, except that additional access will be permitted for construction access during the development and initial construction on the Property, if necessary.
- 3. The street system will provide for a stub connection to the property to the immediate south, generally as shown on the Site Plan.
- 4. Minimum driveway width is 17 feet and maximum driveway width is 20 feet. Typical driveway length/depth is a minimum of 25 feet.

- 4. Pedestrian connectivity will be provided to the Property by the frontage sidewalk along Brice Road and shall connect to the sidewalks along the public right-of-ways within the development. An 8' wide asphalt multi-purpose path will be installed by developer within Reserves "A" and "F", as generally shown on the Site Plan, for connection for residents and guests within the development to the proposed 8' wide asphalt multi-purpose path within Reserve "G" (alignment to be determined) that shall be a future City-owned and installed multi-purpose path on the publicly dedicated parkland of Reserve "G", with connection to the Metro Park property to the north.
- 5. Additional landscaping and screening shall be installed, as follows:
- a. The Developer will install a 6' high black aluminum fence (with black netting product) for screening on the north property line of Franklin County Auditor Tax Parcel Id. No.: 530-166409-00 (starting at the southwest corner (rear) of any lot that shall be platted along that shared lot line with that portion of the Property consisting of Franklin County Auditor Tax Parcel Id. No.: 530-246911-00) that shall be maintained in perpetuity by the Homeowners' Association that is established for the development of the Property.
- b. Developer will also install a minimum 3' high (3:1 slope) landscaped mound with a mix of evergreen trees and deciduous trees along the east/rear property line (but inside) of Franklin County Auditor Tax Parcel Id. No.: 530-166409-00 (with said evergreens to be between 6'-7' high at planting and deciduous trees to be between 2" to 2.5" caliper at planting), where said mound and trees can be installed, if feasible, without damage to existing trees if those existing trees are located on the property consisting of Franklin County Auditor Tax Parcel Id. No.: 530-166409-00 (but, if any of the existing trees are located on that portion of the Property consisting of Franklin County Auditor Tax Parcel Id. No.: 530-246911-00, they may be removed to accommodate said landscaped mound as described hereunder). D. Building design and/or Interior-Exterior treatment commitments.

SECTION 1. That a variance from the provisions of Sections 3332.38(H), Private garage; 3332.38(G), Private garage; and 3332.26(C), Minimum side yard permitted, of the Columbus City Codes; is hereby granted for the property located at **146 MITHOFF ST. (43206)**, insofar as said sections prohibit a detached garage with habitable space on the second floor that does not connect directly with habitable space in the single-unit dwelling in the R-2F, Residential District; with a maximum garage height of 27 feet; and a minimum western side yard for the existing dwelling of 2.12 feet; said property being more particularly described as follows:

This grant will fund a portion of the salaries and fringe benefits of two (2) victim assistant staff for the continuation of a program to assist probation officers primarily in the domestic violence unit. The staff acts as liaisons to the City Prosecutor and works with the victims of crime when a perpetrator has been placed on probation. The grant period started on January 1, 2023.

Emergency Legislation is requested so the grant funds can be used as close to the start date as possible.

FISCAL IMPACT \$32,706.52 will be expended from the General Governmental Grant Fund.

To authorize and direct the Administrative and Presiding Judge of the Franklin County Municipal Court to accept a S.T.O.P. Violence Against Women grant award from the Franklin County Board of Commissioners; to appropriate \$32,706.52 from the unappropriated balance of the general government grant fund to the Franklin County Municipal Court Department of Probation and Pretrial Services to provide continued funding of two staff to work with the victims of crime when a perpetrator has been on probation; and to declare an emergency. (\$32,706.52)

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the City of Columbus to provide victim services in the Franklin County Municipal Court, Department of Probation Services; and

WHEREAS, a S.T.O.P. Violence Against Women grant from the Franklin County Board of Commissioners in the amount of \$32,706.52 has been awarded to provide a portion of the costs for victims of crime when a perpetrator has been placed on probation; and

Chapter 2337 – FREELANCE WORKERS

<u>2337.01 – Definitions.</u>

- (A) As used in Chapter 2337 of the Columbus City Codes:
 - (1) "Commission" refers to the Wage Theft Commission, as defined in Chapter 377 of city code.
 (2) "Freelance worker" means any individual or any organization composed of no more than one person, whether or not incorporated or employing a trade name, that is hired or retained as an independent contractor by a hiring party to provide goods or services in exchange for compensation. This does not include any of the following:
 - (a) An individual or organization who, pursuant to the contract at issue, is a sales representative as defined in Section 1335.11 of the Ohio Revised Code;
 - (b) An individual or organization who is in contract under a prepaid entertainment contract as defined in Section 1345.41 of the Ohio Revised Code;
 - (3) "Hiring party" means any person, including the City of Columbus, who retains a freelance worker to provide any service. "Hiring party" does not include the United States government, the state of Ohio, or any office, department, agency, authority, institution, association, society, or other body of the state, including the legislature and the judiciary, and any county or local government, other than the City of Columbus.

2337.02 – Written Contract.

- (A) Whenever a hiring party retains the services of a freelance worker and the contract between them has a value of \$250 or more, either by itself or when aggregated with all contracts for services between the same hiring party and freelance worker during the immediately preceding 120 days, the contract shall be reduced to writing. The hiring party shall be responsible for reducing the contract to writing unless the parties mutually agree to the use a written contract provided by the freelance worker. The hiring party to the written contract shall retain, for a minimum of five years from the date of execution, a copy thereof.

 (B) The written contract shall include all of the following:
 - (1) The name and mailing address of both the hiring party and the freelance worker;
 - (2) An itemization of all services to be provided by the freelance worker, the value of the services to be provided pursuant to the contract, and the rate and method of compensation; and
 - (3) The date on which the hiring party must pay the contracted compensation or, if not a specific date, no later than 30 days from when the contracted services are completed.

2337.03 – Payment Practices.

- (A) Except as otherwise provided by law, the hiring party shall pay the freelance worker the contracted compensation either:
 - (1) On or before the date such compensation is due under the terms of the contract; or
 - (2) If the contract does not specify when the hiring party must pay the contracted compensation, no later than 30 days after the completion of the freelance worker's work under the contract.
- (B) No hiring party shall, as a condition of timely payment, require a freelance worker to accept less than the contracted compensation.
- (C) Nothing in this section shall be construed as seeking to interfere with the operation of Chapter 1345 of Ohio Revised Code pertaining to unfair, deceptive or unconscionable sales practices.

2337.04 – Retaliation.

No hiring party shall threaten, intimidate, discipline, harass, deny a work opportunity, retaliate against or discriminate against a freelance worker, or take any other action that penalizes or is reasonably likely to deter a freelance worker from exercising or attempting to exercise any right guaranteed under this chapter.

2337.05 – Enforcement and Complaint Procedure.

Freelance workers may file a complaint alleging a violation of this Chapter with the Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement Commission under Chapter 377 of the Columbus City Codes.

2337.06 – Waiver and Effects on Other Laws.

- (A) Except as otherwise provided by law, any provision of a contract purporting to waive rights under this chapter is void.
- (B) The provisions of this chapter are intended to supplement existing law, and do not diminish or replace, any other basis of liability or requirements established by state or federal law.
- (C) Failure to comply with the provisions of this chapter does not render any existing contract between a hiring party and a freelance worker void or voidable or otherwise impair any obligation, claim, or right related to such contract or constitute a defense to any action or proceeding to enforce, or for breach of, such contract.
- (D) No provision of this chapter shall be construed as providing a determination about the legal classification of any individual as an employee or independent contractor.
- (E) The provisions of Chapter 2337 of the Columbus City Codes apply to any profession that is regulated pursuant to Chapter 4798 of the Ohio Revised Code only to the extent that they do not conflict with state law.

2337.07 – Severability.

If any provision or section of this chapter or the enforcement of any such provision or section is held to be invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unenforceability shall not affect or render invalid or unenforceable any other provision or section of this chapter. To this end, each of the provisions and sections of this chapter are severable.

377.02 Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement Commission.

(a) There is hereby created the Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement Commission, the duties and powers of which shall include hearing and determining whether an adverse determination should issue for a violation of section 377.03, 377.04, 377.05, 377.06, 377.07, 377.08, 377.09, or 377.10 of the city code or for a breach of any contractual obligation to the City to assume the obligations of any provisions within this Chapter; recommending to the City Attorney penalties and remedies for a finding of non-compliance with section 377.03, 377.04, 377.05, 377.06, 377.07, 377.08, 377.09, or 377.10 of the city code; approving settlement agreements to settle or compromise alleged violations of sections 377.03, 377.05, 377.06, 377.07, 377.08, 377.09, and 377.10 of the city code where the covered entity has taken reasonable action to cure, remedy, or correct the action which formed the basis for the alleged violation; approving staff resolutions alleging non-compliance with sections 377.03, 377.04, 377.05, 377.06, 377.07, 377.08, 377.09, or 377.10 of the city code; receiving complaints from residents, workers, and businesses regarding non-compliance with sections 377.03, 377.04, 377.05, 377.06, 377.07, 377.08, 377.09, and 377.10 of the city code; publishing and updating the adverse determination list; hearing and determining whether to grant a waiver or other relief pursuant to section 377.02(o)-(r) of the city code to a person with an adverse determination under section 377.01(a)(1)(A); hearing and determining whether there has been a violation of section 2337.02, 2337.03, or 2337.04 of the city code; approving remedies and settlements to violations of section 2337.02, 2337.03, or 2337.04 of the city code; hearing and determining whether a written decision should be issued for violations of section 2337.02, 2337.03, or 2337.04 of city code; collecting and reporting on data related to any complaints under 2337.02, 2337.03, or 2337.04 of city code; and participating in community education programs.

- (b) The Commission shall be composed of five (5) members. Upon appointment to the Commission, members shall serve for a term not exceeding three years, subject to 377.02(d) of this section. Members may be reappointed to a new three year terms at the conclusion of their term.
- (c) Of the five (5) members comprising the Commission, two (2) members shall be appointed by the Mayor, two (2) members shall be appointed by Council, and the fifth member shall be appointed by the Commission with the advice and consent of the Mayor and Council. All member appointments shall be subject to a vote by Council, with a majority in the affirmative required for appointment.
- (d) The initial appointments to the Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement Commission shall occur no later than April 1, 2021, and the terms for the initial appointments shall vary to provide for staggered terms:
 - (1) Two (2) members shall be appointed for a term not exceeding two years;
 - (2) Three (3) members shall be appointed for a term not exceeding three years;
 - (3) As provided in section 377.02(b), upon expiration of their initial term, any member may be reappointed to a new term not to exceed three years.
- (e) The Commission shall hold public meetings, the intervals between which shall not exceed sixty (60) days. Records of all proceedings shall be maintained and open to the public.
- (f) The Commission shall receive staff support, to be provisioned by the Department of Finance, equivalent to no less than one (1) full-time employee.
- (g) Upon receipt of a complaint alleging that a covered entity has violated section 377.03, 377.04, 377.05, 377.06, 377.07, 377.08, 377.09, or 377.10 of the city code, Commission staff shall conduct an investigation to determine if a violation has occurred.
 - (1) During the course of the investigation, Commission staff may work with a covered entity to attempt to cure or compromise any alleged violation of section 377.03, 377.05, 377.06, 377.07, 377.08, 377.09, or 377.10 of the city code so as to reach a settlement agreement to resolve the matter. If so reached, Commission staff shall present the proposed settlement agreement to the Commission for approval and, if approved by the Commission, no adverse determination shall be made based upon the allegation. Notwithstanding anything in this Chapter to the contrary, the Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement Commission has the authority to settle any alleged violation of section 377.03, 377.05, 377.06, 377.07, 377.08, 377.09, 377.10 prior to a final determination by the Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement Commission upon a hearing that a violation has occurred.
 - (2) Where there are reasonable grounds to believe that a violation has occurred and either a settlement agreement has not been reached or the allegation pertains to a violation of section 377.04, the matter shall be submitted to the Commission for a hearing to determine if a violation has occurred.
 - (3) The covered entity shall be notified by Commission staff of a pending investigation where it is determined that there are reasonable grounds to believe that a violation has occurred. Commission staff shall provide a covered entity with notice that it may submit information to the Commission staff relevant to whether the covered entity has violated this Chapter.
- (h) If the Commission staff determines, based upon its investigation and after reviewing any information provided by the covered entity, that there are reasonable grounds to believe that a violation of section 377.03, 377.04, 377.05, 377.06, 377.07, 377.08, 377.09 or 377.10 has occurred, a hearing on the alleged violation shall be conducted by the Commission at a meeting open to the public.

- (1) The Commission shall provide the covered entity with notice of the hearing and a description of the subject(s) of the investigation at least thirty (30) days in advance of the public hearing.
- (2) The Commission shall provide the covered entity with an opportunity to submit documents, present information, call, examine, and cross examine witnesses, and be heard by the Commission during the public hearing and prior to a vote.
- (3) The Commission shall determine, based on all of the information presented, if a violation of section 377.03, 377.04, 377.05, 377.06, 377.07, 377.08, 377.09 or 377.10 of the city code has occurred.
 - (1) A majority vote by the Commission finding a violation shall result in finding of an adverse determination.
 - (2) A covered entity may appeal to the Franklin County Court of Common Pleas pursuant to the procedures and requirements set forth in Ohio Revised Code Chapter 2506 or any successor thereto.
- (i) Upon receipt of a complaint alleging that a hiring party, as defined in Chapter 2337, has violated section 2337.02, 2337.03, or 2337.04 of the city code, Commission staff shall conduct an investigation to determine if a violation has occurred.
 - (1) During the course of the investigation, Commission staff may work with a hiring party to attempt to settle and remedy any alleged violation of section 2337.02, 2337.03, or 2337.04 of the city code so as to reach a settlement agreement to resolve the matter. If so reached, Commission staff shall present the proposed settlement agreement to the Commission for approval and, if approved by the Commission, no written decision of a violation of Chapter 2337 shall be made based upon the allegation. Notwithstanding anything in this Chapter to the contrary, the Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement Commission has the authority to settle any alleged violation of section 2337.02, 2337.03, or 2337.04 prior to a final determination by the Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement Commission upon a hearing that a violation has occurred.
 - (2) The hiring party shall be notified by Commission staff of a pending investigation where it is determined that there are reasonable grounds to believe that a violation has occurred.
 Commission staff shall provide a hiring party with notice that it may submit information to the Commission staff relevant to whether the hiring party has violated Chapter 2337 of the city code.
 - (3) Where there are reasonable grounds to believe that a violation has occurred and a settlement agreement has not been reached, the matter shall be submitted to the Commission for a hearing to determine if a violation has occurred.
- (j) If the Commission staff determines, based upon its investigation and after reviewing any information provided by the hiring party, that there are reasonable grounds to believe that a violation of section 2337.02, 2337.03, or 2337.04 has occurred, a hearing on the alleged violation shall be conducted by the Commission at a meeting open to the public.
 - (1) The Commission shall provide the hiring party with notice of the hearing and a description of the subject(s) of the investigation at least thirty (30) days in advance of the public hearing.
 - (2) The Commission shall provide the hiring party with an opportunity to submit documents, present information, call, examine, and cross examine witnesses, and be heard by the Commission during the public hearing and prior to a vote.

- (3) The Commission shall determine, based on all of the information presented, if a violation of section 2337.02, 2337.03, or 2337.04 of the city code has occurred.
 - (a) A majority vote by the Commission finding a violation shall result in a written decision finding a violation of Chapter 2337.
 - (b) A hiring party may appeal pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Chapter 2506 or any successor thereto.
- (<u>k</u>i) The Commission shall provide written notice of its findings of facts and conclusions of law and any recommended penalties and remedies for any adverse determination based on a violation of section 377.03, 377.04, 377.05, 377.06, 377.07, 377.08, 377.09 or 377.10, or for any written decision finding a violation of Chapter 2337 of the city code.
- (li) The Commission shall publish and update the adverse determination list at least once every sixty days.
- (<u>m</u>k) The Commission may receive complaints from residents, workers and businesses regarding non-compliance with sections 377.03, 377.04, 377.05, 377.06, 377.07, 377.08, 377.09, 377.10, 2337.02, 2337.03, and 2337.04 and 377.10 of the city code <u>for</u> investigation.
- (<u>n</u>l) The Commission may contract with a qualified non-for-profit organization to assist with investigations, and education programs, and providing consultation and resources to freelance workers impacted by a violation of Chapter 2337.
- (om) The Commission shall issue a report annually to Council on its activities and whether it recommends the reduction or revocation of any financial incentives defined in this chapter due to violations of Chapter 377.
- (pn) A member of the Commission may be removed by a majority vote of the rest of the members for inefficiency, neglect of duty, or malfeasance in office. Such a vote shall only be taken after the member is provided a copy of the charges and an opportunity to be heard in person or by defense counsel.
- (qΘ) A covered entity, or any person that reasonably believes it may become a covered entity, may request a waiver from the Commission for an adverse determination which would result in its placement on the adverse determination list. A covered entity shall submit any such waiver request in writing in a manner and form prescribed by the Commission and shall include one or more of the following bases for the grant of said waiver:
 - (1) There has been a bona fide change in ownership of the covered entity or an affiliate since the adverse determination occurred;
 - (2) The covered entity or an affiliate of the covered entity has taken significant and verifiable remedial actions to prevent any future adverse determinations from occurring and has complied with the requirements of the determination forming the basis of the adverse determination, including, as applicable satisfaction of the reporting obligation under this Chapter, providing the Commission with documents and information required by this Chapter, and the payment of required back pay, interest, penalties, and fines; and
 - (3) Other factors that the covered entity believes is relevant to the granting of a waiver.
- (rp) The Commission shall consider all information submitted by a covered entity or person under $377.02(q_{\Theta})(1)$ -(3) and may request additional information from a covered entity or person to determine whether to grant a waiver.
- (<u>sq</u>) The Commission may grant a waiver to a covered entity or person under 377.02 (<u>q</u> Θ)-(<u>r</u> Φ) by removing a covered entity or person from the 377.02 (<u>l</u> $\dot{\Theta}$) list, reducing the time period a covered

entity or person is on the adverse determination list, or allowing a covered entity or person a one-time waiver to enter into a financial incentive agreement with the City, receive a financial incentive provided by the City, enter into a City contract for goods or services, enter into a construction contract pursuant to, related to, or in furtherance of a financial incentive agreement, enter into an agreement to provide janitorial, maintenance, repair, property management, or landscaping services at a development location covered by a financial incentive agreement, or enter into an agreement with a covered entity to perform work or services pursuant to or in satisfaction of a City contract for services.

- (\underline{t}) A supermajority vote of the Commission shall be required to grant a waiver to a covered entity under 377.02 ($\underline{q}\Theta$)-($\underline{s}\underline{q}$).
- (<u>us</u>) If the Commission, in the course of performing its duties, discovers evidence or receives a complaint that a person has committed wage theft or payroll fraud, the Commission may refer the matter to the United States Department of Labor, the Ohio Department of Commerce, or any other appropriate entity for further investigation.
- (vt) A City Department may request a waiver from the Commission on behalf of a covered entity that has an adverse determination which would result in its placement on the adverse determination list. The Commission may grant the waiver if the City Department demonstrates that the inability of the City Department to contract with said covered entity would result in serious disruption to the efficient and orderly operations of the City or the covered entity is a sole source provider of goods or services that are necessary for the efficient and orderly operations of the City.

377.11 Rules and regulations.

- (a) The Commission shall develop rules and regulations for the following:
 - (1) Review of financial incentive agreements and City contracts to ensure that provisions required by this Chapter are included.
 - (2) Monitoring of financial incentive agreements and City contracts and the submission of required statements to ensure compliance with this Chapter, including reviewing complaints, referring complaints to an appropriate federal or state agency for investigation, and monitoring the outcome of complaints against covered entities for purposes of this Chapter.
 - (3) Pursuing remedies, imposing sanctions and levying penalties for failing to timely submit reports and sworn statements required by this chapter, and setting fees for filing disclosures and statements required by this Chapter.
 - (4) Protecting victims of wage theft and payroll fraud from retaliation or adverse action resulting from reports made pursuant to or required under this Chapter.
 - (5) Publication and updates to the Commission list of persons that have received adverse determinations.
 - (6) The processing and investigation by Commission staff of complaints made against covered entities for failure to comply with the provisions of Chapter 377.
 - (7) The processing and investigation by Commission staff of complaints made against hiring parties of violations of Chapter 2337 of the city code.
 - (78) Permissible settlement authority and Commission approval process for staff resolution of allegations of violations of section 377.03, 377.05, 377.06, 377.07, 377.08, 377.09, 377.10, 2337.02, 2337.03, or 2337.04 or 377.10 of the city code.
- (b) The adoption and promulgation of any rules or regulations by the Commission shall comply with the provisions of CCC 121.05.

377.12 Remedies.

- (a) Whenever the Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement Commission renders any adverse determination against a covered entity for any violation(s) of section 377.03, 377.04, 377.05, 377.06, 377.07, 377.08, 377.09 or 377.10, or a written decision finding a violation of Chapter 2337 of the city code, or if a covered entity or hiring party appeals any such adverse determination or written decision, whenever the final decision on appeal confirms the adverse determination or written decision, in whole or in part, the City may pursue any available legal, contractual or equitable remedies.
- (b) Upon rendering an adverse determination for any violation of sections 377.03, 377.04, 377.05, 377.06, 377.07, 377.08, 377.09 and 377.10 of the city code, the Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement Commission may, where applicable, recommend to the City Attorney that the City pursue any of the following:
 - (1) In the case of financial incentive agreements under the Community Reinvestment Area Act and Enterprise Zone Act, unilateral termination or modification of the financial incentive agreement, including unilateral reduction of the tax abatement by up to 100 percent of the future benefit of the financial incentive agreement, as recommended by the Tax Incentive Review Council to Council following receipt of a report and recommendation from the Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement Commission; provided, however, that no tax abatement shall be terminated or modified to the extent that the tax abatement benefit is recaptured by a payment in lieu of tax, special assessment, community development charge or similar charge levied by the State, the City or another political subdivision to service bond or other debt to finance the design or construction of public infrastructure improvements or any other permissible improvements under the Ohio Revised Code.
 - (2) In the case of financial incentive agreements under the Community Reinvestment Area Act and Enterprise Zone Act, recapture of subsidy and abatement benefits by up to 100 percent of accrued value agreement as recommended by the Tax Incentive Review Council to Council following receipt of a report and recommendation from the Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement Commission; provided, however, that no tax abatement shall be recaptured to the extent that the tax abatement benefit is recaptured by a payment in lieu of tax, special assessment, community development charge or similar charge levied by the State, the City or another political subdivision to service bond or other debt to finance the design or construction of public infrastructure improvements or any other permissible improvements under the Ohio Revised Code.
 - (3) Loss of low-interest rate commercial loan benefits;
 - (4) Suspension or revocation of grants; provided, however, that no grant agreement shall be suspended or revoked if the grant funds the design or construction of public infrastructure improvements;
 - (5) For any covered entity that has violated city code and has an adverse determination under 377.01(a)(1)(A) arising from wage theft or payroll fraud either at a development location covered by a financial incentive agreement or relating to a City contract for goods or services, the City may deem the covered entity ineligible for future contracts or financial incentive

- agreements with the City until all victims of wage theft and payroll fraud have been paid in full;
- (6) As a condition of continuing an active or future contract with the City, requiring the posting of a bond or other form of insurance equal to one year of gross wages and a certified monthly payroll report for the duration of the City contract if the covered entity has previously received an adverse determination; provided, however, that this remedy shall not apply to financial incentive agreements;
- (7) For any covered entity that has violated city code and has an adverse determination under 377.01(a)(1)(A) arising from wage theft or payroll fraud either at a development location covered by a financial incentive agreement or relating to a City contract for goods or services, the City may impose a stop work order until all victims of wage theft and payroll fraud have been paid in full and there is full compliance with the terms of this Chapter; provided, that a party to a financial incentive agreement may pay the victims of wage theft and payroll fraud on behalf of a covered entity performing work or services pursuant to, related to, or in furtherance of the financial incentive agreement, in which case the stop work order with respect to such work or services shall be rescinded; provided further, that in case of such payment on behalf of the covered entity, the covered entity shall remain ineligible for future contracts or financial incentive agreements until the party making the payment certifies to the City that it has been repaid by the covered entity for all payments made on behalf of the covered entity;
- (8) Permanent debarment for City contracts.
- (c) Upon rendering a written decision finding a violation of sections 2337.02, 2337.03, or 2337.04 of the city code, the Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement Commission may provide the impacted freelance worker with contact information for community legal services for consultation and review.

377.15 Community education and know your rights program.

(a) The City and Commission shall partner with employers, labor organizations, and community organizations for the purpose of informing residents of their workplace rights under federal, state, and local law and to communicate the benefits of the Columbus Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement provisions to businesses, employees, and communities.

(b) The City and Commission shall also provide information regarding the protections for freelance workers as set forth in Chapter 2337 of city code, including general information about the requirements of the chapter, complaint forms, and any other information or resources as determined relevant by Commission staff.

<u>377.16 – Data Collection and Reporting</u>

The Commission staff shall collect and report on data regarding Chapter 2337 of City Code and the complaints filed under that section, including but not limited to the following data collection and reporting requirements:

(A) No later than six months after receiving a complaint against a hiring party, the Commission staff shall send the freelance worker a survey requesting additional information about the resolution of the freelance worker's claims. Such survey shall ask whether or not the hiring party ultimately paid any or all of the

compensation the freelance worker alleged was due or if the matter was resolved in a different manner. Such survey shall clearly state that response to the survey is voluntary.


- (B) Commission staff shall collect and track information about complaints alleging violations of Chapter 2337. The information collected shall include, at minimum:
 - (1) The hiring party alleged to have violated this chapter;
 - (2) The freelance worker's occupation;
 - (3) The section of this chapter that was alleged to have been violated;
 - (4) The monetary value of the contract;
 - (5) The response or non-response from the hiring party to the Commission staff's inquiry; and
 - (6) Information from a completed survey.
- (C) On an annual basis, Commission staff shall submit to the Office of the Mayor and City Council a report detailing all of the following regarding freelance worker protections:
 - (1) The number of complaints received pursuant to this chapter;
 - (2) The monetary value of the contracts referenced in the complaints;
 - (3) The number of settlements and the average term of the settlements; and
 - (4) Any other relevant information, as determined by the Commission staff.

377.1<u>7</u>6 Just Pay fund.

- (a) There is hereby created the Columbus Just Pay Fund. The Fund shall be used solely for the purpose of paying expenses related to the administration of this chapter, expanding enforcement of wage and hour laws, and supporting community education on the rights of workers under wage and hour laws.
- (b) The Just Pay fund shall receive deposits transferred from the various funds of the city in an amount necessary to provide resources adequate to support the enforcement of the Columbus Wage Theft Prevention and Enforcement provisions. The amounts transferred from the various funds of the city into the Just Pay fund shall be calculated upon the number of purchase orders and purchase requisitions originating within each fund of the city, multiplied by a fixed dollar amount as determined by the Director of Finance and Management.

377.187 Severability.

The invalidity of any section, clause, sentence or provision of this chapter shall not affect the validity of any other part of this chapter which can be given effect without such invalid part or parts.

Bylaws

Mideast Area Commission

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These Bylaws establish the procedure under which the Mideast Area Commission shall execute those duties and functions set forth in and with authority granted under Chapter 3109 and 3111 of the Columbus City Codes (herein abbreviated as C.C.).

Article I - Name

A. The name of this organization shall be the Mideast Area Commission, herein referred to as the "Commission" or "MAC".

Article II - Area

Northern Boundary: The centerline of the Columbus & Ohio Railroad running from the Bexley (W) to Whitehall (E) city boundaries, then following the Whitehall city boundary south and then east to the

centerline of the Big Walnut Creek.

Eastern Boundary: The centerline of the Big Walnut Creek running from East Main Street (N), to Interstate I-70 (S), then west to the centerline of South Hamilton Road and following it south to HWY-270.

Southern Boundary: Following HWY-270 from the centerline of South Hamilton Road (W) to HWY-33, then following HWY-33 to the centerline of Frank-Refugee Expressway and turning west to the center line of Alum Creek.

Western Boundary: The centerline of Alum Creek running north from the centerline of Frank-Refugee Expressway to the Bexley city boundary at Livingston Avenue, and then continuing along the Bexley city boundary north to the centerline of East Main Street, then east to the centerline of James Road, then north to the centerline of East Broad Street, then west to the Bexley City border and following it north to the Columbus & Ohio Railroad right-of-way.

Article III - Purpose

A. The Mideast Area Commission is created to afford voluntary citizen participation in an advisory capacity within our boundaries. The Commission shall engage with Columbus City Council, City of Columbus officials, City of Columbus departments, adjoining Area Commissions, the adjoining cities of Whitehall and Bexley, business owners, schools, and commercial and residential developers to facilitate communications, understanding, and cooperation between neighborhood groups. This Commission will enhance and empower the importance of existing neighborhood organizations within its boundaries, making them more efficient and effective. As a commission, we will seek direct community input before decisions or recommendations are made that could affect our communities' safety, aesthetics, property values, or quality of life.

The MAC seeks to show UNITY and STRENGTH by working together in finding solutions toward a common goal of building a better, safer, & stronger community. The Commission embraces the belief of community empowerment through collaboration. Together with our partners in city government, code enforcement, and public safety we will work to improve OUR community. We believe in the philosophy of the MAC, having the power of many voices, which fights for the core values of a community collectively.

Through this process our core values will not change.

- Each neighborhood would continue to sit at the table. Equal representation for all!
- Each neighborhood will make its own decisions concerning internal matters.

- Support will be offered when requested. This could be in form of, but not inclusive to:
 MAC wide or individual community support letters, attendance at hearings and calling
 mass meetings to raise awareness and show strength in numbers for that particular
 issue or concern.
- Promote mass meetings of general interest for all the residents of all member organizations.

B. The Commission shall:

- 1. In the interests of local planning for local needs, identify and study problems and requirements of the Commission area in order to:
 - a. Create plans and policies which will serve as guidelines for future developments of the area.
 - b. Bring the problems and needs of the Area to the attention of appropriate government agencies or residents and local officials, and
 - c. Recommend solutions and/or legislation.
- 2. Aid and promote communication within the Commission area and between it and the rest of the City by means of:
 - a. Regular, interim and special meetings of the Commission, which are open to the public,
 - Public forums and surveys to provide an opportunity for area residents,
 businesses and organizations, institutions and governments to comment,
 - c. Initiating proposals and supporting those introduced by individual citizens or area organizations that will enhance the quality of life enjoyed by area residents and preserve the unique residential and commercial mix of the area, and
 - d. Promoting and encouraging business functions, methods of operation, architectural appearance, and locations are consistent with the character and requirement of the area.
- 3. Initiate, review and recommend criteria and programs for the preservation, development, and enhancement of the Commission area, including but not limited to parks, recreation areas, sidewalks, streets and traffic by means of:
 - a. Reviewing the proposed capital improvements budget and proposing new items and changes relating to the area,
 - b. Making recommendations for restoration and preservation of the historical and environmental elements within the area, and
 - c. Receiving and reviewing for recommendation prior to the adoption by governmental bodies, any new or revised comprehensive plan affecting the area.

- 4. Recommend priorities for and review government services and operation of the various government departments in the Commission area by means of:
 - a. Requesting and receiving from departments or agencies periodic reports concerning governmental services in the area,
 - Meeting with administrative heads of any department or agencies or any of their subordinates to obtain additional information deemed necessary for the Commission to fulfill its functions.
 - c. Requesting and receiving from departments or agencies, prior to implementation, full reports on any proposed changes,
 - d. Reviewing and evaluating pending legislation substantially affecting the area prior to its consideration by Columbus City Council, and
 - e. Review and comment on zoning issues and demolition presented to the Commission.
- 5. Recommend persons from Commission area for nominations to membership on City Boards and Commissions that make decisions or recommendations affecting the Commission area. The Commission shall not endorse any candidate for public office.

Article IV – Membership

- A. Appointment: All Commissioners shall be appointed by the Mayor of the City of Columbus with concurrence of City Council in accordance with C.C. 3109. The Secretary shall notify the Mayor of all nominations, elections, and vacancies within ten (10) days of such action.
 - Should the Mayor neither approve nor disapprove the action within thirty (30) days of notifications, the actions shall be deemed approved until notice from the Mayor as specified in C.C. 3109.
 - 2. A copy of each notice shall be sent to the City Council in care of the City Clerk.
- B. Members: The Commission shall consist of seventeen (15) Commissioners. Each Commissioner shall reside, work, or own property within the boundary of the commission.
 - Twelve (12) Resident Commissioners shall be selected. One (1) from each of the Civic Association and Block Watch areas, with the exception as noted below for neighborhoods that have been designated to share a Commissioner.
 - a. Neighborhood Areas with Exclusive Resident Commissioner Representation (9):
 North Eastmoor, South Eastmoor, Mayfair Peacekeepers, Berwick, Berwyn East,
 Easthaven, Remington Ridge, Thunderbird Acres, and Beechwood.
 - b. Neighborhood Areas with Shared Resident Commissioner Representation (3):

- East Hampton, Barnett, and Livingston Heights
- ii. Pinecrest and Sherwood
- iii. Leawood Gardens and Willis Park
- c. Each Resident Commissioner shall reside within the boundaries of the Neighborhood Area they represent. Resident Commissioners must maintain residence in their Neighborhood Area until the completion of their term. The selection of twelve (12) Resident Commissioners shall take place in September in accordance with the selection rules adopted by their Civic Association and/or Block Watch.
- d. If a consensus cannot be reached for selection of a Shared Resident
 Commissioner, a majority vote of the Commission will place the tie-breaking vote.
- 2. Three (3) At-Large Resident Commissioners shall be selected by the Commission in September by an Advisory Council comprised of the Presidents from each of the member Civic Associations and Block Watches. Each Commissioner shall reside within the boundaries of the Commission area. Commissioners must maintain residence in the Commission area until the completion of their term.
- 3. One (1) At-Large Commissioner shall be a Board Member nominated by the East Main Street Special Improvement District (SID) in September.
- 4. Any Commissioner seats left vacant by lack of selection by their Neighborhood Area or the SID shall be selected from that area by a majority vote of the Commission at the October Regular Meeting.
- All Commissioners shall be required to attend at least one Area Commission Training opportunity provided by the City of Columbus within one (1) year of appointment and report their participation to the Department of neighborhoods and the Commission Secretary.
- C. Terms: Members of the Commission shall serve without compensation for a term of three (3) years. All terms shall begin January 1, the year following their appointment and expire December 31 in the year that the term expires.
 - 1. Upon first establishment of the Commission, initial terms shall be staggered as determined by lot, one-third (1/3) of the initial Commissioners shall serve for one (1) year; one third (1/3) for two (2) years; and the remaining one-third (1/3), for three (3) years or until their successors are appointed. Upon expiration of each initial Commissioner's term and thereafter, each Commissioner shall serve as described in Article IV Sections B to maintain continuity of experienced representation.
- D. Commission Representation: No Commissioner, except the Chair or the Chairs designee shall represent the Commission in its official actions before any other public body or official, except
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- as specifically authorized in writing by the Commission. This shall not be construed as a restriction upon the right of the individual Commissioners to represent their own views before public or private bodies, whether in agreement or disagreement with the official action of the Commission.
- E. Disqualification: Commissioners shall maintain their residence, employment or business in the Commission area from which they were elected or appointed. Failure of a Commissioner to maintain his or her residence, employment or business in the Commission area, shall be deemed a resignation and the Secretary shall notify the Mayor, City Clerk and the Director of the Department of Neighborhoods within the ten (10) days of such action.
- F. Attendance: The year starts with the annual meeting in January. Commissioners shall, so far as possible, be regular in attendance. A Commissioner's absence from three (3) regular meetings in any one (1) calendar year (January to December) shall be deemed a resignation from the Commission unless a written petition has been received by the Chairperson of the Commission. The Commission must act upon the petition when it is received at either the next regularly scheduled meeting or the following regularly scheduled meeting. The petition must be made in writing and received by the Chairperson at least seven (7) days prior to the next regular meeting following the third absence. The petition is to request that some or all the absences be excused due to extenuating circumstances. The nature of the extenuating circumstances shall be explained. If the Commission accepts, by majority vote, all or a portion of the absences may be excused. If a petition is not received, it shall be deemed a resignation from the Commission and notice of such will be communicated to the City of Columbus by the Secretary within ten (10) days. After the second missed meeting, the secretary will remind the Commissioner of the attendance policy in writing within seven (7) days after the second missed meeting. After the third missed meeting, the Secretary will remind the Commissioner in writing within seven (7) days after the third missed meeting about the need to submit a petition to the Chairperson if the Commissioner would like to maintain their position. Commissioners shall, as soon as possible, inform either the Chairperson or the Secretary, prior to the meeting, when they know they will be absent.
- G. Removal: Any Commissioner can be removed for cause by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all Commissioners then in office, at any regular or special meeting of the Commission. The process of Commissioner removal shall be initiated by the Chairperson providing a notice by Registered Mail to the Commissioner proposed for removal of the reason or reasons for removal at least thirty (30) days before any final action is taken by the Commission. If the Commissioner proposed for removal is a Resident Commissioner as defined under Article IV, Section B-1, their nominating Civic Association and/or Block Watch shall receive a copy of the statement by Registered Mail. This statement shall be accompanied by a notice of the time when, and the

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- place where, the Commission is to take action on the removal. The Commissioner shall be given an opportunity to be heard and the matter considered by the Commission at the time and place mentioned in the notice.
- H. Vacancies: The Commission shall nominate one (1) or more candidates to fill any vacancy caused by death, resignation, disqualification, removal or other means for the remainder of the unexpired term by letter to the Mayor pursuant C.C. 3109. Vacancies shall be filled for the unexpired term by the Chairperson within thirty (30) days of the declared vacancy, with approval by the Commissioners by majority vote.

Article V – Officers

- A. The officers of the Commission shall be: Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Zoning Chairperson, Secretary and Treasurer. At the first meeting of the Commission, officers shall be elected by majority vote of the Commissioners. Thereafter, election of officers shall be at the January meeting annually. Officer terms shall be one (1) year, or until a successor is elected. A Commissioner may serve a maximum of three (3) consecutive terms as Chairperson, with the requirement that only one additional year can be requested if no successor is elected (2022). A Commissioner may serve a maximum of six (6) consecutive terms as Vice-Chairperson, Zoning Chair, Secretary, or Treasure. A term limited Commissioner may be re-elected after a gap of at least 3 consecutive years. Each officer shall have the right to vote on any question barring any conflict of interest (see Article VII, Section I). All officers shall be Commissioners.
- B. Chairperson: The Chairperson shall be a resident of the City of Columbus within the Mideast Area Commission boundaries, and will preside at all meetings of the Commission; prepare the agenda for each meeting; in consultation with other Commissioners, appoint standing and special committees of the Commission; serve as an ex-officio member of all committees; coordinate the action of officers and committee chairpersons; and perform other duties associated with the office as required. The Chairperson shall, from time to time, be asked or feel the need to write a letter of support or concern to agencies or about issues pertaining to the MAC. A draft of this letter will be distributed to the area commissioners for edit and approval.
- C. Vice-Chairperson: The Vice-Chairperson shall be a resident of the City of Columbus within the Mideast Area Commission boundaries; shall assist the Chairperson; perform all the duties of the Chairperson in her or his absence, or at the request of the Chairperson; and perform other such duties as may be assigned by the Commission.

- Commission Members, Civic Association Boards, and Block Watch Organizers receive information about zoning and development inquiries brought before the commission.
- E. Secretary: The Secretary shall be a resident of the City of Columbus within the Mideast Area Commission boundaries; shall call and record roll; remind a Commissioner of his or her absences per Article IV, Section F; record and maintain accurate voting records and meeting summaries that shall be open to public examination; maintain such other records as the Commission may direct; notify the Mayor of any Commissioner vacancies and nominations; perform related duties as may be assigned by the Commission; and in the absence of both the Chairperson and the Vice-Chairperson, call the meeting to order and preside until the immediate election of Chairperson pro tempore. The Secretary shall also maintain Public Records such as (emails, memos, meeting notes, minutes, etc.) that the Commission creates as the Commissioners go about Commission business. The records shall be available to the public at request. The Commission shall also abide by the City of Columbus's Record Retention schedule, which describes the dates and process for retaining and destroying documents.
- F. Treasurer: The Treasurer shall receive all funds and disburse all funds with the Commission's approval; insure all financial records of the Commission are maintained and reported to the Commission at each regular meeting and to the City of Columbus as required; be responsible for ensuring sound financial practices are maintained; and perform any other duties the Commission may require. The Commission shall provide for a reconciliation of the financial records of the accounts prior to each annual meeting.
- G. Vacancies: A vacancy in the office of the Chairperson shall be filled by the Vice-Chairperson. A vacancy in any other officer position shall be filled in the same manner as the original selection.

Article VI- Meetings

- A. Regular Meetings: Regular monthly meetings of the Commission shall be held the third Tuesday of each month, except for August and December, unless otherwise directed by the majority vote of the Commission present in sufficient time to notify constituents and the City Administration of such change. Each meeting shall be held in the Commission area unless suitable facilities are unavailable. Commissioners may seek suitable facilities contiguous to the Commission area. The facility will have an appropriately large room convenient for Commissioners and the public and will be chosen by the Commission as its regular meeting place unless otherwise specified at least fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. Notice of the meeting with an agenda shall be published on the official Commission website prior to changing meeting time or location.
- B. Zoning & Development Meetings: Meetings shall be held as required by caseload of zoning and development issues before the Commission. The Zoning Committee shall make all efforts to Page 8 of 11

- contact the affected MAC Civic Association(s) members to request input and recommendations which will be discussed and voted at the Zoning committee meeting. Notice of the meeting with an agenda shall be published on the official Commission website prior to changing the meeting time or location. Anyone wishing to present an issue for review by the Zoning & Development District must do so at least 30 days prior to a scheduled meeting.
- C. Interim Meetings: Interim meetings are held on a monthly basis with the primary purpose of conducting committee business.
- D. Annual Meeting: The annual meeting shall be the first regular meeting in October.
- E. Special Meetings: Special meetings may be called by the Chairperson or by a majority of Commissioners present at any Commission meeting. The person or persons calling a special meeting shall give written notice of the special meeting's purpose, date, time, location and agenda to all Commissioners. No business will be considered at the special meeting unless it was stated when the meeting was called. Except in cases of emergency, seven (7) days' notice shall be given for a special meeting. The Commission shall maintain a list of persons who have requested to be contacted prior to a Special meeting being called.
- F. All meetings shall be open to the public, and notice shall be published, when possible, at least seven (7) days in advance on the web site unless stated otherwise in these by-laws.
- G. Quorum: A simple majority of the current Commissioners shall constitute a quorum for conducting business
- H. Voting: A simple majority of the Commissioners present and voting shall be required to approve any action other than to override the recommendation of Zoning & Development. A vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the seated Commissioners present is required to override the recommendation of a Zoning & Development. A tie vote is disapproval. The Chairperson shall state each issue in a positive form such as "The question before the Commission is," "Shall the application for ______ be approved?" and "Request approval for ______ be approved?" All votes shall be public and recorded, including Commissioner name and "yay" or "nay" vote. Area Commission members must be present in person at a meeting in order to be considered present or to vote at the meeting.
- I. Conflict of Interest: Each Commissioner shall determine for themselves when they have a conflict of interest that warrants their recusal from participating and voting on a particular matter before the Commission. A conflict of interest generally exists when an area commission's decision may produce a benefit, or detriment, for the area commissioner or a commissioner's family member. Should a 'conflict/recusal' issue arise in an open Commission meeting, the meeting shall include full discussion, noting any motion, voting and reporting in the Minutes.
- J. The order of business may be determined by the Chairperson.

- K. The Chairperson shall recognize members of the public who wish to address the Commission concerning issues under discussion. The Chairperson shall uniformly limit debate to an equal amount of time for each speaker on an issue. Time limits may be set by the Commission. When appropriate, further action on the issue may be deferred to the next Commission meeting.
- L. Dissenting or non-concurring reports may be filed with the Secretary by any Commissioner and shall be attached to the majority report.
- M. Individual citizens or Commissioners may be asked to research a specific topic and report findings to the Commission.
- N. Agenda: The agenda for each regular meeting shall set forth all matters for discussion. When possible, all matters for the agenda, including previous meeting's minutes and committee reports shall be submitted in writing to the Chairperson at least ten (10) days prior to a meeting. When possible, the Chair shall send all Commissioners a notice of the meeting including the agenda, minutes, and committee reports at least seven (7) days prior to the Commission meeting.
- O. Discussion Limitation: Persons present at meetings who are not Commissioners shall have the right to participate in discussions of matters for consideration by Commission and the Chairperson shall recognize them for that purpose. The Chairperson shall determine the limitation of discussion.
- P. Guests' Speaking Time Limit: When guests are invited to speak to the Commission, time will generally be limited to fifteen (15) minutes, or at the discretion of the Chairperson.
- Q. Meeting Time Limit: Commission meetings shall be limited to not more than ninety (90) minutes unless deemed appropriate and approved by a majority of the Commissioners present.

Article VII - Committees

- A. The Chairperson shall appoint Commissioners to standing committees giving due consideration to their individual preferences and subject to approval by a majority vote of the Commissioners.
- B. The Chairperson shall appoint Commission residents to committees from recommendations by Commissioners appointed to that particular committee subject to approval by a majority vote of the Commissioners. Residents appointed shall have full voting privileges in all proceedings of the committee to which they are appointed.
- C. Committee members shall serve at the pleasure of the Chairperson and their appointments shall expire December 31 unless extended by the Chairperson.
- D. The Chairperson shall be an ex-officio member of all committees.
- E. After appointments are approved, the members of each committee shall select a Committee Chairperson from among the Commissioners appointed to the committee.

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- F. Notice of all committee meetings and copies of all committee correspondence shall be filled with the Secretary and the Chairperson of the Commission. Committees findings that propose action or resolution shall be submitted at a regular meeting of the Commission for consideration.
- G. Current Committees:
 - a. Zoning
 - b. Communications
 - c. Traffic and Safety

Article VIII – Amendment of Bylaws

A. These Bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting of the Commission by an affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the Commissioners present provided the amendment was submitted in writing and read at the previous regular meeting. The Secretary shall file any approved amendment immediately after its adoption with the City Clerk for publication in the City Bulletin. Such amendment shall take effect ten (10) days after such publication per C.C. 121.05.

It has been brought to my attention by the City Attorney's office related to the City code sections referenced below that Area Commission by-laws filed with the clerk (and for publication in the City Bulletin) need to be "certified" copies. To accomplish that, each of them (going forward) needs to have a signed statement from the Chairperson stating:

Article V – Officers

A Commissioner may serve a maximum of six (6) consecutive terms as Vice-Chairperson, Zoning Chair, Secretary, or Treasure. Each officer shall have the right to vote on any question barring any conflict of interest (see Article VII, Section I). All officers shall be Commissioners.
