Columbus Dedicates New Building to Former Mayor Michael B. Coleman



Mayor Andrew J. Ginther and the City of Columbus named a new downtown office building after the city's longest serving mayor on February 12. The Michael B. Coleman Government Center, 111 N. Front Street, is part of the Columbus Government Municipal Campus that includes City Hall, police headquarters and a renovated building at 77 Marconi Street.

The eight-story,

180,000 square foot office building realizes the vision to create a "one-stop shop" that consolidates four departments: Building and Zoning Services, Public Service, Development and a portion of Public Utilities. Bringing these departments together into one location delivers convenience to residents requiring assistance from multiple departments on one visit. On March 19, the Department of Public Utilities'

revenue reception and permit offices moved to the building, along with numerous staff members.

"Much of the city's success today can be traced directly to the courage and leadership of Mayor Coleman," said Mayor Ginther. "His vision catapulted Columbus to a top-tier city. I am proud to name the newest downtown building after him."

Coleman said he was thrilled and humbled by the naming honor. "I always dreamed of Columbus having a downtown

campus of city government buildings," he said. "Not only is that vision becoming a reality, but it will bear my name. I simply do not have the words to express my gratitude."

The campus exterior features a central campus green with pathways connecting buildings, seating, lighting, art and a rain garden. Just north of the center is a new eight-story garage to provide the City Hall campus additional parking for employees, fleet vehicles and customers.

> Additionally, as Assistant Director Roland Saunders mentioned in an email to staff, I have begun a series of roundtable discussions with department employees. 

nize teams of practicing engineers to expose senior environmental engineering students to actual projects being implemented by the department. Each year a capital improvement project currently under design or construction is chosen. The goal is for students to develop a preliminary design report that is evaluated by city engineers and the Ohio EPA prior to construction. To familiarize students with as much of the industry as possible, a mix of consulting, city, and OEPA engineers provide information related to a certain aspect of the design project. The students are then tasked with performing a preliminary design on that aspect.

They work with the instructors well in advance to plan a project and work with consulting engineers. Once a schedule is set, they work with the practicing engineers to assure there is connection on the content from week-to-week, and also each presents during the course and participates on the panel to evaluate the projects.

At the end of the semester, the students bring together results of weekly tasks into a preliminary design report and present it to a panel of practicing engineers that have been involved in the course. The presentations are attended by Director **Tracie Davies**, DOSD Administrator **John Newsome**, DOW Administrator **Dr. Rick Westerfield**, Columbus City Council members, and the engineers who have worked on the project.

The presentations provide valuable visibility for the students in front of central Ohio environmental engineering professionals – not only a great educational experience, but also a chance to present their skills and impress potential future employers. Eppich and Sanson have created a unique partnership between the city and OSU, which is highly valued and greatly needed. This is a tremendous example of what can be accomplished when both academic and professional resources are leveraged. The value to OSU is obvious, but the importance to the city is that we have begun to provide better-trained graduates ready to tackle the environmental challenges of the 21st century.

DOW Administrator Update

Algae in drinking water supplies can cause a number of problems for the water treatment plant as well as our customers. These include taste and odors, filter clogging, interference with the coagulation and settling process, and the production of algal toxins.

The DOW started monitoring algae in the source water in 1938, in response to a taste and odor event. Since that time, monitoring has expanded as additional water supply reservoirs

were constructed. Historically, the monitoring focus has been on organisms that cause treatment problems and taste and odors. However, over the last few years, harmful algal blooms in Lake Erie and in Grand Lake St. Mary's have made national news. In response, Ohio EPA now requires all surface water systems to test for algal toxins in the source and finished drinking water, as well as do molecular genetic testing in the source water to look for the genes that produce the toxins. Results from this weekly testing are used to track algal growth in the reservoirs and confirm complete removal through the treatment processes at the plants.

The multi-barrier treatment processes at the water treatment plants provide several options that are used in combination to address all the algae related issues. These include potassium permanganate which is a mild oxidant used early in the treatment process to kill algae cells and help them settle out. Powdered activated carbon is added to adsorb taste and odor molecules as well as any toxins present. Alum coagulation and settling removes the algae cells as well as any fine sediment in the water. This is followed with a strong oxidant called ozone. Ozone breaks large organic molecules like the taste and odor compounds and toxin molecules into smaller harmless pieces. These small organic pieces are then removed by the biologically active filters. After the biologically active filters, chlorine is added. Chlorine is a strong oxidant as well, and has been used by the division for over 100 years to disinfect the water and kill bacteria. An additional benefit of chlorine is that it destroys any toxins that may have made it through the other barriers.

Through long term monitoring and investment in the treatment processes at the plants, the DOW has created a multi-barrier treatment system designed with multiple options to address anything that comes down the river, including algal toxins.

Thanks to all our employees for doing a great job monitoring and treating our drinking water.

The festival, made possible by numerous agency volunteers and sponsors, was held at the Indoor Adventure Center at the city's Franklin Park. It focuses on all things




water, including conservation and protection.
